### Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 18, 1990. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases of \$54,879,334, or 17.00%. TNP is proposing an alternative rate base treatment for Unit 1 of TNP One, the first unit of the Company's generating facility located in Robertson County, Texas. Under this alternative, the costs of Unit 1 will be included in rate base in a three (3) step, ten (10) year phase-in plan. If adopted, the phase-in plan results in an increase in gross revenues of \$43,074,934 or a 13.34% increase over adjusted test year revenues during the first year of the plan. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 163,083 customers located within the state of Texas.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin, Texas, and with all cities served by Texas-New Mexico Power Company which have retained original jurisdiction. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at each business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your area.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. 



### CPR Course To Be Taught At PJC Through Continuing Education

Paris Junior College through con- diopulmonary resuscitation recertitinuing education classes, strives to provide opportunities for individuals in the community to participate in programs and activities designed to develop particular skills without pursuit of a college degree. Continuing education classes have no entrance requirements or examinations and most often have no age require-

Weather Is Bad News

For Farming By Paul D. Payne CEA-AG

Lamar County The continuous monsoon season has made a shambles of all spring farming operations in the Red River Valley. Farming plans have changed daily as wet soil has delayed the planting of most of the corn. This may not all be bad, as it is highly probably that most of that already planted could have a skimpy stand.

April 15 has passed and very few soybean seed are in the soil. This is of concern as yields of Group III and IV varieties are reduced when planting is delayed past the middle of April. However, we are not suggesting that you change soybean varieties at this

Wheat has been the most adversely affected by the rainy weather. It will be difficult to determine of wet weather or disease problems reduced wheat yields the most. We can anticipate reduced yields form those fields with poor internal drainage and where water has stood.

There is a good possibility that a late outbreak of rust and septoria will further reduce yields. We continue to receive discouraging reports from

wheat producers who did not apply a fungicide prior to the head emerging and now find an alarming amount of one or both of these diseases in their crop. I cannot suggest that one apply a fungicide after head emergence as it is not recommended on the label.

We are pleased that thousands of acres of area wheat were treated with a fungicide at the proper time. Only time will tell if that was a wise decision, but sometimes we must make those tough decisions and not look back. It is easy to look back 10 days ago and say it was a wise decision to spray when very little disease was present at that time. Hopefully, 1990 will be another learning experience and not a costly one.

At a rate of \$.33 per hundred dollars of valuation, if you have \$10,000. of taxable property you would pay \$33 per year; if you have \$100,000 of taxable property, it would be \$330. per year and only \$3,300 per year for\$1,000,000 of property. What is unfair about that?? If you are a millionaire, you are certainly receiving more of the blessings from our bounty and should pay proportionately more.

<u>LIE #3</u>

The taxpayers of Red River County must pay the entire cost of the Dimple Reservoir.

<u>TRUTH</u>

The bonding capacity of the property in Red River County will be used to secure the necessary credit to build the lake. The water will be paid for by the people who use it, whether for personal consumption or industrial use. The lakes in all our surrounding Counties are major contributors to their local tax bases and economies!! Clarksville will buy a significant portion of the water but the present Dimple Reservoir Board members refused to discuss the purchase in a serious, businesslike way. Red River County Water Supply Corporation, Annona and Avery all need additional water supplies according to state records and Texarkana has been unwilling to commit before determining their own needs. Bogata is also trying to secure more water to meet its minimum needs and is planning to drill another well. Remembering the problems we had in finding water in that area when I represented the Fulbright Water Supply Corporation in the early 1960's, we can all just wish them the best. Dimple Reservoir would assure all the users a reliable future supply of water.

LIE #4

You will get no individual benefit from Dimple Reservoir.

TRUTH

The Dimple Reservoir will decrease your tax burden because it will increase the taxable property values for the County, bring in additional sales taxes and tourists' dollars. In addition, the lake will be there for fishing, boating, picnicing, camping and relaxation for your personal use at any time.

LIE #5

We should wait until someone commits to use the water before we start planning the lake.

If you wait that long, it is too late!! It takes about seven years or more to plan and build a lake and neither industry nor government can wait that long after their needs are apparent.
