Red River County Asks For Prisoner Training Facility

Two busloads of Red River County were among the officials and citizens from every corner of the county who descended on the state capitol at Austin Tuesday. Others arrived by air and private car.

The message they carried was that Red River County needs and would warmly welcome the jobs that would be provided by a facility for non-violent prisoners nearing the end of their terms.

The Red River County delegation, headed by County Judge L.D. Williamson, attended a session of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice at

which Governor Clements was also present. The delegation was introduced by Senator Bill Ratliff and Representative Barry Telford, who addressed the board in full support of the County's proposal for a pre-release prison facility.

"Six cities are seeking the prison facility," noted Commissioner Drue Pirtle, who was a member of the delegation. "We wanted the folks in Red River County to believe our proposal is the best one."

"The people of Red River County are well aware of the problems of the

criminal justice system," said Representative Telford. "They want to be a part of the solution."

The prison facility to be established would provide job training and opportunities for non-violent prisoners scheduled for early release. The aim is to make it easier for the released prisoner to earn an honest living, and thus to reduce the likelihood of further crime and further burdens on the state's correctional facilities.

From the first ground-breaking, the facility would provide employment for substantial numbers of local residents.

Bogata Man "Found" By Brother After 25 Years

Bill Scott of Bogata has been found. No, he wasn't lost in the woods, but his brother has been searching for him for a long time, and recently that search was rewarded.

When William Leslie Hawkins (known in Bogata as Bill) was three years old he was adopted by Rev. and Mrs. Herbert McGee Scott, a Methodist Minister and his wife.

His older brother, James Darryl "Eli" Smith, was five when their biological mother made the painful decision to put the children up for adoption.

For eight years Bill's older brother has been working the little information he could find to trace down his brothers and sisters, as well as his biological parents.

Eli lives in Nicholasville, Kentucky, and a story in the Lexington Herald-Leader about how his search had yielded up his father's identity and his mother ran on April 26 of this year.

In that story he spoke of recalling holding his little brother, William Leslie on his lap and feeding him a hamburger that fateful day when the children were separated.

Eli spoke of how he wanted to find the last three people to make a reunion complete: his brother, (William Leslie), and his sisters, Lisa Mae and Carolyn Veronica.

After that article appeared several phone calls led to the discovery of the locations of his brother and sisters, and a follow up article in the Lexington paper spoke of the reunion held in Nicholasville.

Bill and his wife, Kim, the granddaughter of the late Essie and Chalmers Moore, live in Bogata, where he is a construction worker.

After "big brother" contacted them they hopped in the car and drove sixteen hours, arriving to find more than 100 people at the house!

Sister Lisa Mae was killed in a car accident in 1982, but as well as Bill, sister Tammy Cantrell (born Carolyn Veronica) was on hand too.

The Scotts have over three hours of home video detailing the happy reunion, including a reunion with an aunt and uncle, Frank and Bessie Hawkins of Lancaster, Ky. who have grieved over losing their neices and nephews to adoption since it occurred.

The children's biological mother, Joyce Keeton, is now Joyce Hunter. She was 17 when she met Floyd Hawkins, then in his late 40's. Joyce and Floyd Separated after 7 years together. Several months pregnant, Joyce took the two boys and moved away. Floyd died in 1987 at the age of 72.

Joyce moved to Lexington and lived with her married sister, and Lisa Mae was born, but she simply couldn't cope with raising the children alone. The burden became greater after her second daughter, Carolyn (whose name was changed to Tammy after adoption) and finally she gave the children up. Although she had misgivings about giving them up, she wanted desperately for life to offer them more than she was able to give.

In an interview with the Garrard County News in Lancaster, Kentucky Bill and Kim and shown with their rediscovered Aunt and Uncle, plus other family members.

Also at the reunion were two younger half brothers James and Russell, Jr., and an older half sister, Lily Mae Wells. Yet another half sister, also older, was unable to make the get together.

How does Bill's adoptive family feel about all this? They are happy for him, and plans are in the works for them to actually meet Joyce.

How did Bill learn his brother was looking for him? His dad, Rev. Scott called him up and told him about Eli contacting him. Bill had the choice of responding or not...and chose to respond happily and immediately. Soon he and his brother were on the phone, the miles unimportant as they made their first contact in 25 years!

Bill Scott remembers a few things about his life before adoption...the barn at his uncle Frank's, the pony his mom still has, but of that fateful day he was given up, he recalls nothing. But the gaps have been filled, his family expanded to include biological AND adoptive family.

It's a testimony to the power of family ties...proof that the capacity for caring isn't limited to just one "set" of parents...and Bill and Kim are looking forward to years of more family reunions, contacts and sharing, brought about because of one man's persistence in locating the brothers and sisters he has missed for twenty-five years.

A grant of \$157,000 from the Texas Department of Commerce is expected to cover most of the cost.

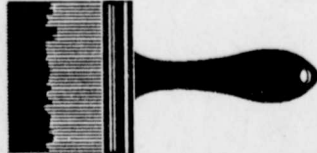

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Duane Allen Inducted Into Texas Hall Of Fame

At the Texas Gospel Music News Fans Awards held recently in Garland, Duane Allen of the Oak Ridge Boys was inducted into the Texas Music Hall of Fame.

Allen grew up in Cunningham, graduated from Cunningham High School, Paris Junior College, and received his bachelors degree in music from East Texas State University. He is the son of Mrs. Loretta Allen of the Deport Nursing Home, formerly of Cunningham and the late Fred Allen.

He began his musical career singing with his family. For a number of years, he sang with J. Howard Rogers and the Southernaires Quartet of Paris. From the Southernaires he went with the Prophets Quartet in Nashville, TN and 25 years ago, joined the Oak Ridge Boys of Nashville.

Lou Wills-Hildreth of Nashville and Houston, and Calvin Wills of Carlington, chairman of the board of the Southern Gospel Music Association, presented the award.

J. Howard Rogers of Paris, a 1988 inductee into the Texas Music Hall of Fame and former manager of Allen in the Southernaires Quartet, accepted the award for Allen and read a telegram from the honoree and reviewed his history in music.

Glimpses Of Village Life, Farm Life and Life As Past Royalty

As you may recall from last week's vacation account, we had arrived in Oatsmarsum, a village over 1,000 years old, and were getting ready to go into Germany.

I suppose most of us who have grown up on tales of World War II have some prejudice against Germany deep within us. And the little we saw of Frankfurt, Germany on our unscheduled stop there only two days before had done nothing to dispell that.

When our tour bus arrived at the German border it looked rather forbidding, with military vehicles and personnel around. But we made only a brief stop there, then proceeded to Munster the "City of Churches".

Our little group quickly split up as some went shopping, others simply wandering.

Bill and Berniece Buck, from Channelview, were looking for a few children's books such as Mother Goose. Their daughter, who is a teacher, wanted her class to be able to see what familiar stories looked like in another language. So we went from book store to book store, finding that not as many Germans spoke English well enough to communicate as the Dutch do.

Still, we made side trips to beautiful cathedrals, and saw window shutters painted in bright red and white, newspaper windows with their best issues glassed and on display, and stairways with a ramp to roll bikes down. Yes, bicycles were the primary mode of transportation in Germany too.

We had lunch in a Greek restaurant, where the little waitress spoke little English. Figuring out the menu wasn't easy, in fact, we never did know for sure what we were eating, only that it had beef and macaroni in it!

We had started back down the street when a cry of "Allo, allo" rang out and the waitress came running down the street as fast as she could with Berniece's camera!

Everyone was friendly and pleasant, and most of those stereotypes about Germans went down the drain.

After Munster we went to Tecklenburg, a quaint village in hills much like those found in Arkansas. There, on the simple cobblestoned square, old men sat with their dogs and swapped tales and smoked their pipes. Little blond headed boys peeked at us from the door of flower shops, and bells sent their timely message over the hills.

We wandered once more through the local cemetery, surprised to find that every grave was a miniature flower garden, planted with the brightest of living plants. Somehow, we always like to visit a local cemetery, for we believe how a people care for their dead says something about them.

The Germans frequently take picnic lunches to the cemetery on Sundays, an elderly lady told us, and tidy the graves and visit with friends who have also come.

For a while I couldn't figure out what the "Heir Rust" at the top of so many headstones meant. "Surely", I asked Thomas, "there can't be that many people with the last name or Heir Rust or Rust?" Slowly it soaked into my thick skull. That was German for "Here Rests"!

After a leisurely drive through the Tutoburger forest we were once more "home" in Oatsmarsum. We hurried downtown to do some shopping at the pleasant stores, purchasing hand painted tiles for friends back home. The shop keeping at the antique store spoke no English, but we managed non the less to get prices straight and purchases wrapped safely.

Dec, a tour member from New York, came flying up to us to ask if she could borrow ten guilders, being short and finding that they couldn't take Traveller's Checks or credit cards.

After loaning it to her we walked back through town with her. There we discovered a statue in honor of the town nightwatchman and discovered a striking difference between American and Dutch philosophy.

The nightwatchman used to wander through the streets of villages, and he swung a large clapper or ratchet noisemaker. This alerted anyone who might be about to commit a crime to quit what they were doing and flee,

so that the crime was prevented, and no confrontation occurred. Quite a difference between the American attitude of catch if you possibly can!

The next mornig we went to Palais Het Loo (pronounced Low).

This was once the royal residence and was simply awesome.

It contained uncountable rooms, with striking murals adorning ceilings and walls, crystal chandeliers, procelains and a wide variety of stunning fireplaces, carvings and furniture.

At one time Napoleon occupied the palace, and painted over much of the beauty with Empire Red and gilt!

The "backyard" was perhaps the most fantastic part of the place, though. Patterned after the gardens at Versailles in France, scrolls and intricate patterns trimmed from a wide variety of shrubs whirled the mind up and out to fasten upon fountains in the shape of huge globes, complete with golden continents, and statuary to delight any eye.

Live horses champed and snorted softly in the Javish stables, and displays of royal sleighs, wgons, buggies and tack boggled the senses with the exquisite craftsmanship. Out under the stable porch the cobble stone were actually wooden, to soften the sounds of carriages and horses iron-shod hooves.

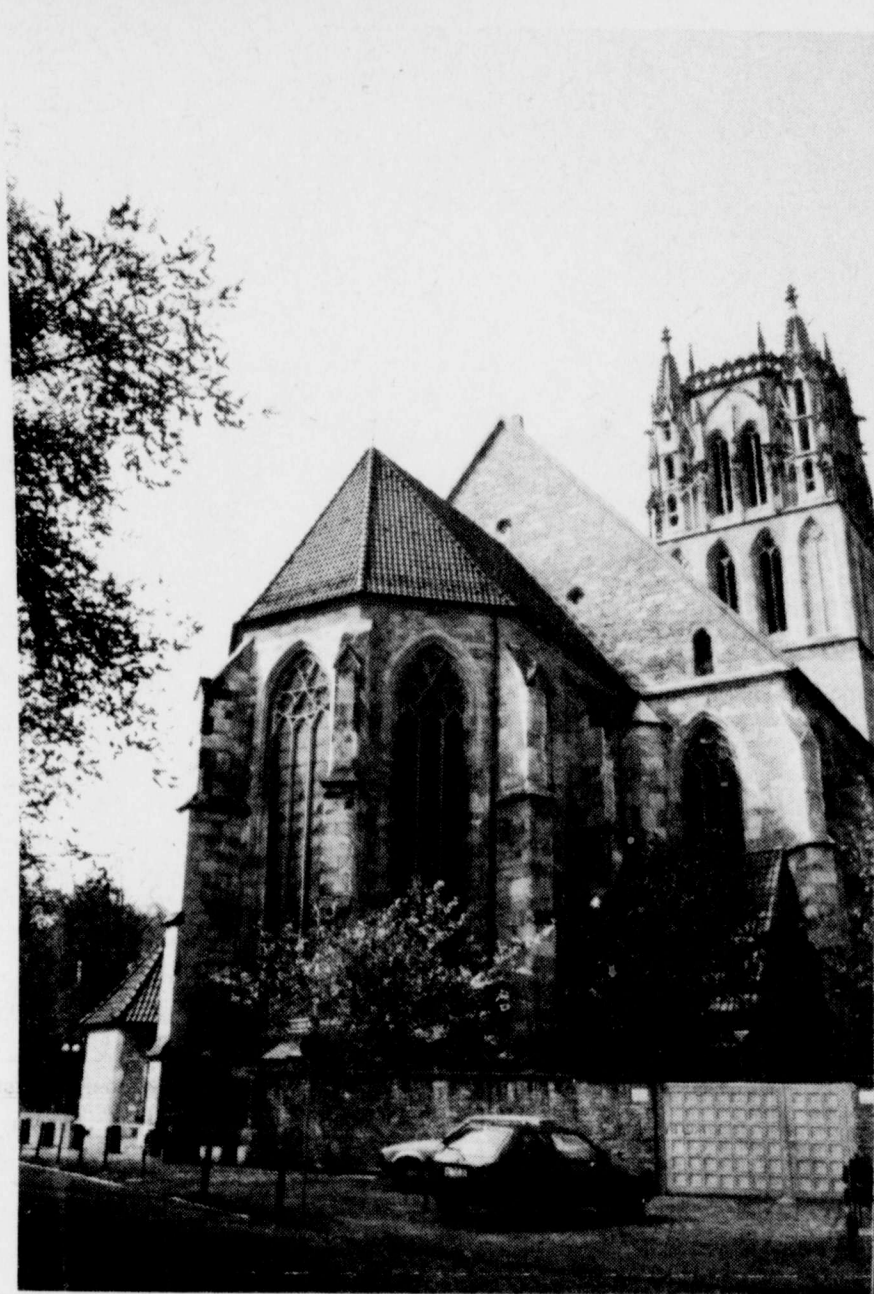
Peacocks strutted their haughty way across lush green lawns.

I spoke for some time to the bus driver about the Dutch farming situation. They are in much the same situation as the U.S. farmers, with their prices fixed by the European Community of which they are a part, and production costs steadily going up. They are trying to reduce the number of farms, and pay farmers to quit farming. This seemed to us, so sad, since their farms were so beautifully kept, obviously cared for by people with a deep and abiding sense of love for the land and a willingness to work.

Late that afternoon we arrived in Amsterdam, and our tour took on a whole new tone, of which we will speak later.

Child Care Bill Can Help Put America First Again

Before summer, President Bush will have an opportunity to sign into law a new child care bill that helps the states provide \$1.75 billion in child care assistance for low-income families who otherwise have difficulty finding or keeping jobs. He should sign the bill quickly a a major step in taking care this country's pressing needs after so many years of successfully promoting American-style capitalism abroad.

The legislation going to President Bush is distinctly American, however, has been fine tuned over the past year to comply with his ideas.

It contains the tax breaks the President wanted for low-income families in which one parent chooses to remain at home to care for the children.

The bill provides assurances that the states themselves--and not any federal bureaucracy--will be responsible for deciding minimal health and safety protections for child care centers. The bill recognizes that in America churches always have and must continue to play a big role in providing child care services. And the bill gives help to families who choose to leave their children with relatives.

The bill doesn't do anything new except change the odds on getting help and the opportunities for economic self-sufficiency. The sooner Congress can put finishing touches on this legislation, and the sooner the President can sign it, then the sooner America can start taking care of itself again.

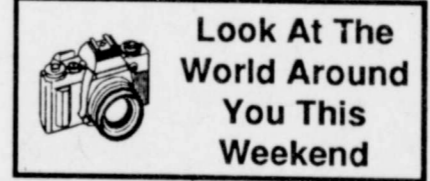

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

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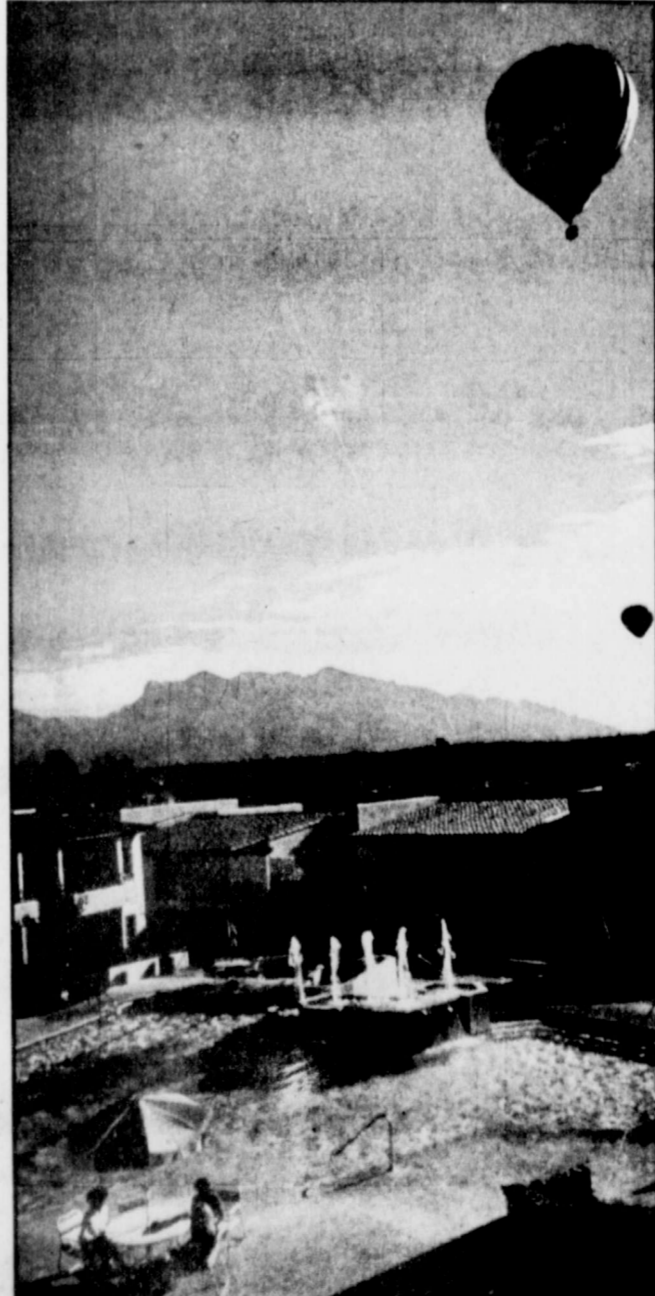
