Recipes. Everywhere we look there are recipes. Recipes for light foods, cool foods, hot foods, fattening foods, slimming foods!

Microwave recipes, one dish meals, complicated and simple, recipes abound.

Monday morning I was talking with several other women, and the subject of old recipes came up.

And for perhaps the first time, I realised what a treasure there is in history contained in something as simple as a recipe.

To begin with, every area in the world has its own recipes. Various dishes are traditional in one area and unknown in another.

And the ingredients available in a time before supermarkets dictated what kind of recipes were treasured and handed down.

Blackberry cobbler is a favorite throughout east Texas. But in many parts of the country blackberries are unknown, so no such recipe exists.

A friend who was born in the Dakotas said that cornbread was a dessert all the years of growing up. It was sweet, like cake. After marriage to an East Texas she discovered that sweet cornbread was heresy, in his opinion!

But even more than being different, old recipes that are treasured and handed down from generation to generation are an indication of the roots and beginnings of a family.

Almost everyone has a "tea cake" recipe from grandma. These cookies are delicious. They are also the direct product of modifying a Scotch shortbread recipe to fit the ingredients on hand. That, of course, reflects the Scotch immigration to the U.S.

Recipes for Jewish foods are rare in this area...reflecting the fact that there was almost no Jewish immigration into this countryside.

German recipes about in South Texas, and west, where the Germans settled in colonies and numbers.

Stews were common Irish food, and many people still call them "Mulligan" stews, as their Irish forebears did.

Chili is an acquired taste for this area, but many people have recipes that have been used for two or three generations.

Its a rare family that doesn't have two or three recipes, for a special coconut cake, shortbread, cobbler, casseroles, or even canning recipes.

Frequently these recipes are written on stained and ragged cardboard, and the title reads "Aunt Mimi's Gingerbread" or "Grandma's pecan cake".

We all make these special foods giving very little thought to the fact that they reflect heritage, a family's personal tastes, and the ingredients readily available in an earlier time.

Families might even consider making up a "family cookbook" interspersed with short recollections and stories. For the recipes are special. They are part of our inheritance, and as such, should be explained and carefully preserved for a younger generation.

## Rodeo, Frontier Day Activities Planned For June 28-29-30

Each year during the last full weekend of June, one of northeast Texas' most exciting events takes place right here in Bogata. You've got it, the Bogata Rodeo Association's annual championship rodeo and the Bogata Lions Club's Frontier Day activities.

This year, the weekend is June 28-29-30, with three rodeo performances scheduled for 8:30 p.m. nightly at the Bogata Rodeo Arena, just three blocks southwest of downtown Bogata.

In addition to the championship rodeo events scheduled for this year's rodeo, a new, exciting event will take place on Thursday night, June 28, for females only, the first annual Calf Dressing Contest. This event is open to three-member teams, and only the first six teams will be accepted. Each team is required to have a sponsorship of \$50.00 for the competition. Anyone interested in entering the Calf Dressing should contact Eddy Denny at 632-5716.

The Frontier Day activities will begin at 7:30 a.m. on Saturday, June 30, with a free pancake breakfast for everyone, compliments of the Lions Club.

Following the pancake breakfast, a host of events will be held at the Bogata Community Center during the day, including the famous dunking booth, featuring Bogata's upstanding businessmen and the city's finest. A complete schedule of the day's activities are listed below.

Anyone interested in an arts and crafts booth should contact Donnie Lewis at 632-5387. There is a \$5.00 charge for space.

The second annual Duck Race will be held at 12:45 p.m. on Saturday, with a \$1,000 purse. Registered ducks, please. Tickets for the race may be obtained from any Lions Club member at a cost of \$10.00 each.

On Thursday afternoon at 5 p.m., the first of two rodeo parades will tour downtown Bogata. The second parade will be held on Saturday afternoon, also at 5 p.m.

The Bogata Lions Club will be in charge of the concessions at the Bogata Rodeo this year.

Summer-like temperatures will soar when the Bogata Rodeo Arena stands fill up to watch the 1990-style Bogata rodeo, sponsored by the Bogata Rodeo Association, and produced by the Wing Rodeo Company, home-based in Bogata.

This year will mark the 23rd consecutive year that the Bogata rodeo has been produced by the Wing Rodeo Company.

This year's rodeo is approved by the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association, headquartered in Shawnee, OK, and co-approved by the Central Rodeo Association, a state association based in Irving.

Thursday night's performance will be highlighted by the annual drawing for the Hub Whiteman savings bond. Also on Thursday night, the Arigo

Riders drill team will perform, and during Friday's performance.

On Friday evening, that performance will be dedicated to the memory of Ronnie White of Bogata.

On Saturday, the Red River Riders drill team will perform.

A calf scramble for the youngsters will be held at each performance of the rodeo, and the rodeo band "Texas Express" will be back in Bogata again to entertain spectators with their musical talents.

Winners from last year's Bogata rodeo include: bareback riding, Jimmy Rivette, Katy, TX; saddle bronc riding, David Warren, Bogata, TX; calf roping, Robby Woodrell, Sapulpa, OK; steer wrestling, Coty Battles, Stringtown, OK; cowgirls barrel racing, Suzie Pruitt, Ardmore, OK; team roping, Ryan Hammett-Todd Williams, Bogata, TX. Rick Yocham of Bartlesville, OK was the All Around Champion and was awarded a trophy belt buckle, along with his prize money winnings.

Rodeo tickets are on sale now from any Princess contestant for \$3.50 advance for adults. Tickets at the gate will be \$4.00 for adults and \$3.00 for children.

Entries for the rodeo will be open on Monday, June 25 from 5 to 10 p.m., at 214/966-2231. No early or late entries will be accepted. Local entries within a 25-mile radius will be accepted at the discretion of the rodeo committee.

Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Ford are longtime Rugby residents with a variety of skills and hobbies.

They both use their hands to create interesting and unusual items. Both retired, they are seldom idle, preferring to keep busy with a variety of activities.

Their very pleasant house features a perfect miniature windmill, patterned after the Dutch windmills, as a centerpiece for a flowerbed. The windmill was hand made by Lloyd Ford plans he found in a magazine.

Mrs. Ford paints and pieces quilts. Many of the quilt tops go to Colorado City and Houston, where they are sold for top dollar.

The Fords originally lived in the Paris area. They had a place at Ford's Academy from 1942 until 1946, but the construction of Camp Maxey, the war-time army camp, meant that they had to move.

They purchased a place on the highway in Rugby, located between Deport and Bogata, from Mr. Lemons.

The couple opened a country grocery store, with all the usual items for sale.

It wasn't until 1950 they Herbie Stevens was talking to Lloyd about having problems with the lawn mower he had bought. Lloyd vows he said he didn't know much about them, but he'd try. He managed to fix the ma-

chine, and soon everyone in the area was bringing their lawn mower to him for repairs.

That became an even bigger business as more and more people told friends and relatives about his proficiency with lawn mowers, and eventually the grocery became a lawn mower business.

Lloyd recalls that his mother lived in East Post Oak back in 1950. She had electricity, so he traded her an

electric motor for a gasoline engine. He set to thinking, and soon had created his own lawn mower. The engine was mounted on a set of rails with wheels on it, and he used it to mow with for many years.

The Ford's have two children, Norma Lou Foster of Crossplane and Gary Ford of Paris.

In addition to building things from wood and metal, Lloyd counts fishing and gardening among his hobbies.

Mrs. Ford cooks good food, and works at her painting and quilt piecing.

The couple are always gracious and pleasant to visit with, and have lots of friends and neighbors.

It's worth a drive by their home just to see the windmill! More than likely, when you go by, one or the other, or both, will be on hand, working hard at hobbies or gardening.

In lieu of flowers, memorials may be made to the Ella McFadden Hospice at St. Joseph's Hospital.

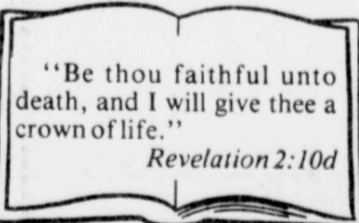
### Leo Owen Dies June 16

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## Nearby Farm Has Unusual Livestock

Ostriches grazing, strolling, feeding. A sight to be seen on the African plains? A sight to be seen in a zoo? Yes, but also a sight to be seen pretty close to home.

Bonnie and Frank Thrasher have an ostrich farm in close-at-hand Franklin County, just north of Mt. Vernon.

There have been murmurs that ostrich farming was an up-and-coming industry in this country for some time.

The Thrashers began their ostrich farming when they purchased an adult pair about a year ago. Now they have nine yearlings, and two babies, plus eggs in the incubator.

Frank came home one day and simply said, "I have something for you to do...raise ostriches."

Bonnie enjoys her work, unusual as it is. Each ostrich egg weighs about four pounds, and takes 42 to 45 days to hatch in the incubator.

Bonnie candles the eggs to see if they are fertile. Unfertile eggs are

used for a variety of crafts. Bonnie removes the insides of the eggs and paints them intricately. She says that a plain, undecorated egg sells for \$25 each while the decorated eggs sell for \$45 to \$50 each. The big eggs are certainly curiosities with great appeal.

Even more valuable, of course, are baby ostriches. They can sell for about \$2,000 each, while an adult pair goes for \$45,000!

The high strung, aggressive birds are capable of taking care of themselves, but are kept in a fenced pen close to the Thrasher's home so that they can keep an eye on them. "They must be protected from people, dogs and injury, especially when young" Bonnie reported.

The huge, stately birds can stand over 8' tall and weigh about 300 pounds. They have never been important on the livestock or poultry industry in the United States, but the Thrashers feel this may change soon.

They say the meat is excellent,

with the consistency or appearance of beef, but is lean and low in cholesterol.

Of course, the feathers have long been a favorite in fashion and feather dusters, even used for cleaning computer systems and turbochargers.

Their popularity is growing, and there is even an American Ostrich Association. The demand of the big birds has increased since an embargo went into effect during Ronald Reagan's presidency.

That has made the price go way up and the Thrasher's anticipate an escalation in the market for several years.

The couple, in addition to the giant birds, also have ducks, pheasant and geese. Bonnie says she prefers the work involved with the ostriches to cattle ranching, and it should be interesting to see if, in the future, it's ostriches that are "home on the range" instead of cattle. For now, that's a reality in nearby Franklin County!!

## Three Die, One Injured In Wreck

The community of Deport was stricken along with surviving family members Saturday evening when three Deport residents were killed and another seriously injured when a car/pickup collision occurred Saturday afternoon on FM 410 just south of Detroit.

Edith Arriaga, age 54, and her granddaughter, five-year-old Crystal Smith, were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace James Smith, according to Department of Public Safety reports.

The accident occurred about 5:45 p.m., just after a 1988 Chevrolet pickup, driven by Kelly Copelin of Paris, turned onto the eastbound lane and accelerated to speed, according to reports. Copelin told DPS Trooper

Jim Trammell that he had been adjusting the radio dials when he looked up and found he was in the wrong lane.

The Smith/Arriaga vehicle, a 1986 Oldsmobile, was straight ahead of him, and he swerved back to the east bound lane. As he did so, Tracie Smith, the driver of the Oldsmobile, also swerved in the eastbound lane, attempting to avoid the collision, DPS reports indicate.

The two vehicles collided head on. Copelin was not injured in the accident.

Edith Arriaga was the mother-in-law of Tracie Smith and the grandmother of Tracie's two children, Crystal and Christopher. The group was on their way to Detroit to a Little League ball game. Christopher is a member of the Deport Little League Team.

Joint funeral services were held Tuesday, June 19 at the First Baptist Church in Deport with the Rev. Glen Renfro and the Rev. David Hamm officiating.

Burial followed in Highland Cemetery by Grant Funeral Home.

## Fifty Million Bulbs -Overwhelming!

As we continue our trip tales we appreciate those who have expressed their pleasure in the stories we have run.

Delft has to be one of the most charming of country towns. We traveled there one day from Amsterdam, to visit the Porcelain Flies, which has been in existence since the sixteenth century.

Blue Delft comes in many forms, from the completely hand created and intricate, to the rather casually made.

At the Flies we saw them hand "throwing" the pottery, then using charcoal to trace the pattern on. Finally, they handpainted the intricate design onto the piece, prior to a lengthy firing process.

It is expensive, but understandably so, since the painting alone takes 2 to 6 hours of handwork.

Then we wandered downtown to the charming old city center.

It was like a carnival! A horse-drawn calliope played lively airs, while the flower markets were breathtaking. For about \$1.50 (American money) one could purchase an armful of gorgeous, just-opening tulips or carnations.

A flea market sported T-shirts, housewares, Blue Delft (of the much less expensive kind) and a bewildering variety of goods. People roamed up and down the streets.

While Maria, Cynthia and Thomas sat at a sidewalk cafe ran across the road and prowled through an art shop, looking for a painting or print to bring home. Imagine my horror when I knocked off a picture, shattering the glass!

I apologized profusely, to a man whom I quickly discovered spoke no English.

I tried to pay him...he refused. Finally, I went back across the street, red faced and embarrassed, and explained to Thomas what I had done. He handed me a slice of bread-pizza and told me to finish lunch.

After that though, we went back to the shop and purchased a small print of the streets of Delft, and now, whenever I look at it, I am reminded of my clumsiness and the generosity of an elderly Delft shopkeeper!

That afternoon we went on to Keukenhof.

On the way we passed the acres and acres of bulb fields that stretch along the roads.

There is no way to tell of what the beautiful fields are like, nor what it feels like the first time one sees the cutting machines. You see, to grow strong bulbs the blooms must be cut off, and they do this by driving a big machine down the rows.

But then we entered Keukenhof. What to say? How to try to describe what 55 acres of gardens with 50 million bulbs blooming is like?

Even if you don't really care for flowers, Keukenhof is absolutely incredible!

Fountains and waterfalls punctuate the exact, overwhelming plantings. Sculpture stands surrounded by masses of tulps, hyacinths, daffodils and narcissus.

Thatched cottages with gorgeous flower arrangements offer bulbs for sale at very good prices.

Greenhouses hold masses of amaryllis, while others hosts rare plants.

We walked under windmills and skinny bridges lit with a rosy glow from hundreds of thousands of blooms.

At one place the gardeners, picking spent blooms, noticed Thomas' cowboy boots. Grinning, one of them panted to them, and said "John Wayne". Soon we were chatting away with them, in sign language and their ragged English.

When we started to move on the man said "you like our country?"

"Oh, yes" we replied.

"Lots of pretty flowers, yes?" he continued.

"Yes, but lots of wonderful people too!" I answered. Whereupon they both smiled even wider, shook our hands and waved goodbye as we wandered on.

All because of a pair of boots.

We kept on wandering and exclaiming, shooting up film at an amazing rate as colors and shapes kept impressing us.

Finally, it was time to go back to the bus, which we did, exhausted from so much beauty! Exhausted, but happy, for Keukenhof was surely one of the highlights of the trip.

That night we went out to eat with six other tour members.

We ate at an Italian place on Rembrandt Square, and enjoyed the meal enormously. The waiter had told us we would only get one ticket, however, and we had to go back to the hotel lobby and figure out who owed what...which made them wonder if we had set up a casino, the way money was changing hands.

That night, I sat and watched it rain over the lighted city and dreaded the fact that we only had one full day left in this lovely country.

## A Farewell To Holland, All Too Soon

The last day in Holland. Determined to make the most of it, we set off that morning for the Van Gogh museum in Amsterdam. Because of the parking problems, our bus let us off at the door and drove away.

Imagine our surprise when, one of the first in line, we were confronted with an angry guard who didn't want to let us in. It seems that the travel agency had handed Anne Marie the wrong packet of tickets, giving our group tickets for the previous day, and the previous day had received ours. Then, that afternoon we went on to Zaan Schuans, a sea-side town where the buildings were all in dark green, trimmed with pristine white and curved, false facades.

There five windmills sat in a row along a dike, turning in a cold, high wind. It created a picture from the past.

We wandered through a cheese factory where fresh milk was converted into rich, yellow rounds of cheese.

On to a clog makers we saw hundreds upon hundreds of pairs of wooden shoes...painted, carved, plain and varnished, they hung from walls and ceilings alike while workmen bent over lathes and used hooks and knives to create the unusual, but practical shoes. The work "clomp" comes from the Dutch word for the loud footwear "Klommen".

We climbed up into the inside of a windmill, feeling the huge structure rumble and shake from the power of the wind whirling the huge blades. The blades have sails on them so that their speed and strength can be regulated.

The windmill we were in is called "Van Katt" "the cat". Most of the mills have names, often affectionate. And indeed, they almost seem to have personalities.

Climbing through the 3 story structure on narrow, steep ladders, I finally began to get claustrophobic, and left my fascinated husband filming moving wooden cogs and wheels. Making my way slowly and carefully down the last ladder it was with shock that I felt a tremendous blow to the top of my head. Nearly knocked out I clung desperately to the ladder. Momentarily stunned, I finally registered that a Dutchman in wooden clogs was hanging on to the ladder above me.

"This ladder is for going down" he said indignantly.

"Yeah," I retorted angrily, and that's exactly what I was trying to do!

Instantly remorseful he said "Oh, sorry, you were going down care-

fully" and with that he jumped around me and swarmed down the remaining ladders much like a monkey, wooden clogs and all!

Sitting outside, out of the wind waiting for Thomas I nursed the big lump on top of my head, thinking dark thoughts. As soon as the headache ended, so did my ill temper, however.

We went to bakers, candy makers, the dairy and costume museum.

Little canal laced the immaculate town, and the ever-present bicycles whizzed up and down.

Finally we had to leave, and return for our last night in Amsterdam. There, revived by hot tea and a hot shower, we readied ourselves to walk through the streets of the city as a group for the last time.

We arrived at an Indonesian restaurant for a "Rikstabel", and Indonesian speciality where various dishes are served to be passed up and down the length of the table. The best way to describe the food, which ranged from mild to fiery hot, was a cross between Chinese and East Indian food.

Finally, our farewells said, our group already dissolving, we wandered through the streets of Amsterdam, past shimmering canals and gaudy "joints", monuments and tacky souvenir shops, for the last time.

The next day it was one last ride to Shiroppol airport for a ride on the big KLM Royal Dutch Airlines jet to Atlanta. Left behind was a nation of proud, clean people, whose views on the world may be different from ours, but who were friendly, healthy people.

It may well be one of the best trips we have ever taken, and one I would recommend to anyone with a love of beauty.

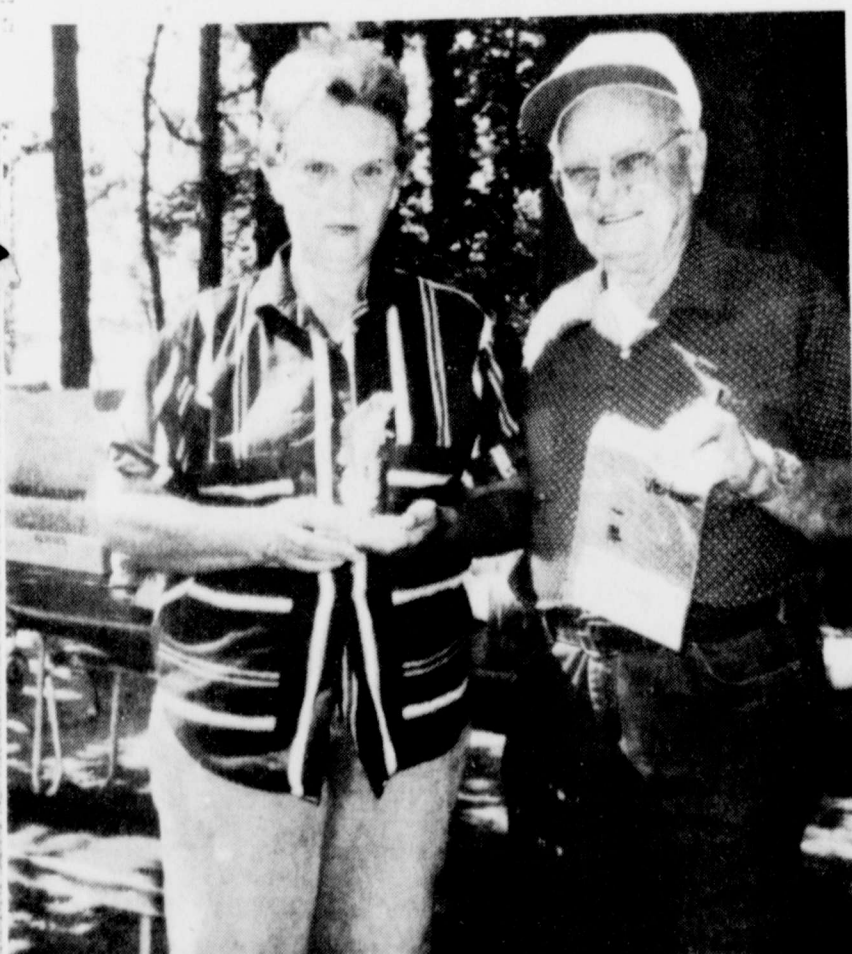
## Summer Library Program To Begin June 26

## EIA Test Is The Law

Barrel racers, calf ropers, steer wrestlers, team ropers, trail riders or anyone taking horses to fairs, races or events must have the animals tested for Equine Infectious Anemia, an infectious virus that can weaken or kill infected animals. Although some horses infected with the virus develop symptoms of fever and weight loss, other horses appear healthy, but carry the virus and could spread disease.

To protect against the virus, the Texas Animal Health Commission requires that, along with the customary certificate of veterinary inspection, an EIA test document must also be shown when horses are taken to an event.

The certificate of veterinary inspection is valid 45 days for animals that are not to be sold. The EIA test, commonly known as a Coggins test, must have been run within the previous six months. To run the test, a veterinarian draws blood from the animal and sends a sample to one of the U.S. Department of Agriculture approved laboratories, of which 30 are located in Texas.

EIA can be transmitted from an

infected horse by biting flies, blood transfusions, or by the use of unsterilized and contaminated medical instruments, such as needles or scalpels. Animals affected by the disease include horses, donkeys, asses and other members of the equine family.

During the state's 1989 fiscal year (September 1988-89), 484 EIA reactor horses were found in Texas, with most cases occurring in Northeast and Gulf Coast Texas. Since September 1989, another 414 EIA reactors have been found, and 164 of these were in TAHC's Area 4, which includes Mt. Pleasant.

When an EIA reactor is confirmed, a TAHC veterinarian or animal health inspector works with the owner and private veterinarian to determine how to care for the animal. State regulations require that the owner must choose either to keep the infected animal permanently quarantined at least 200 yards from other horses; obtain a permit to transport the animal to a TAHC-approved research or diagnostic facility to aid in disease research, or have the animal destroyed.

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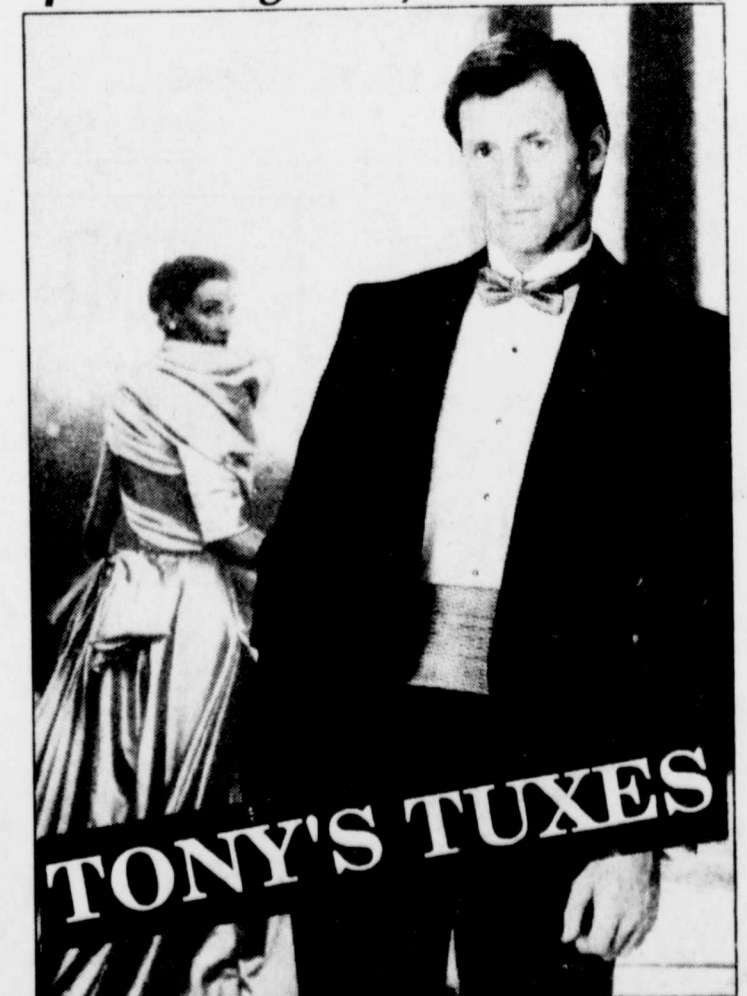

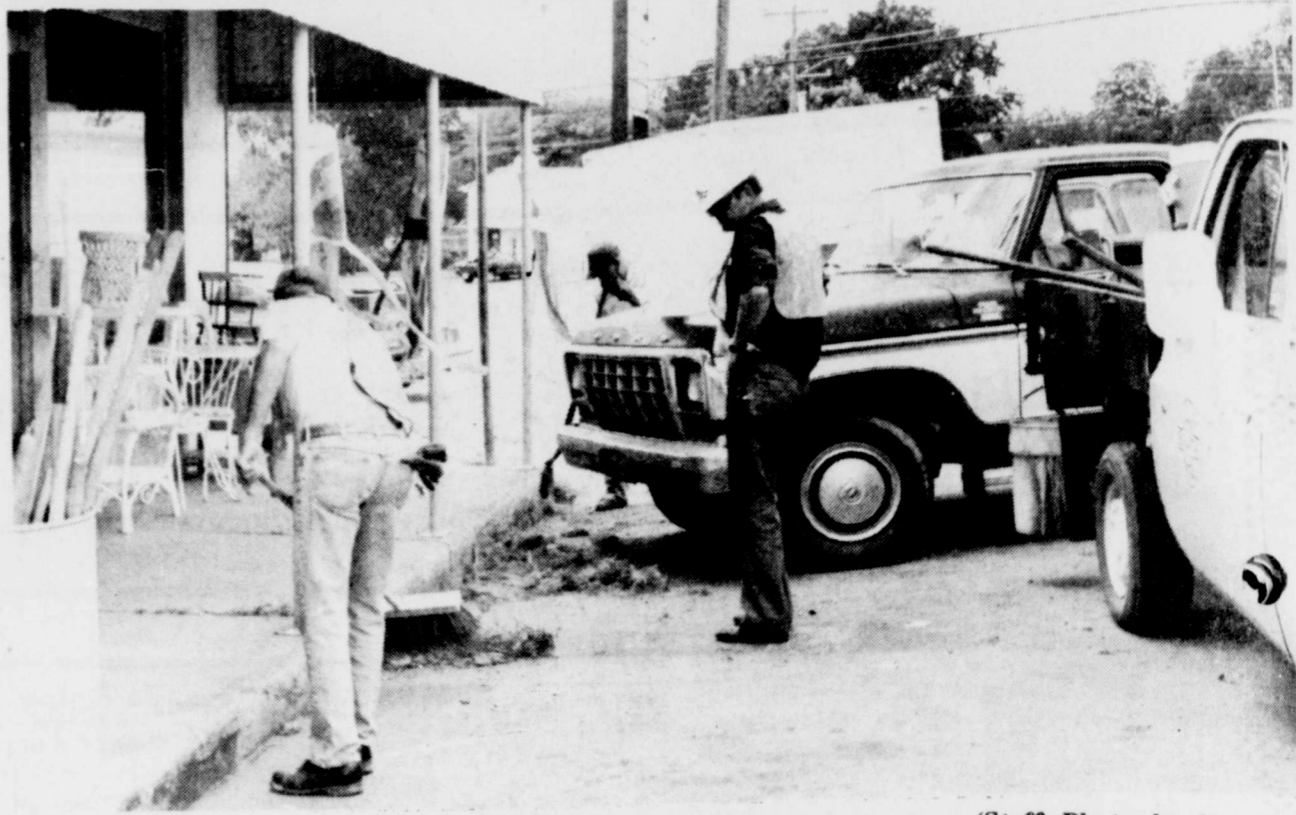
