Then, there are those little recollections that most of us have, about by gone times or funny things that have happened.

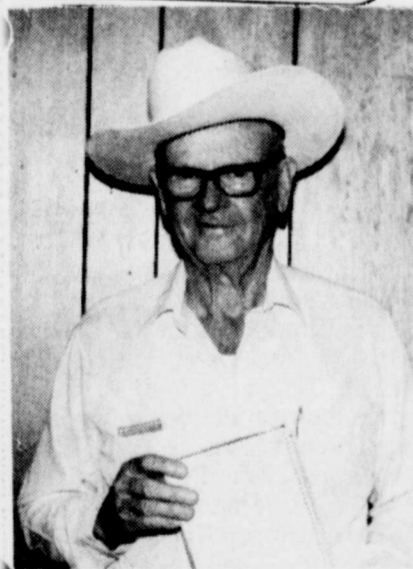

Rodeo Draws Largest Number Of Contestants Ever... Purse Will Exceed \$19,000.00

It's Rodeo Time In Bogata!!!

On Thursday afternoon at 5 p.m., the 1990 version of the Bogata Rodeo officially gets underway with the first of two downtown parades, kicking off a weekend full of special activities for everyone in the country to enjoy.

The first performance of the rodeo begins at 8:30 p.m. at the Bogata Rodeo Arena, and promises to be chock full of chills and spills and wild-west action.

This year, the Bogata rodeo has attracted an excess of 350 contestants who entered the seven championship events, and will be vying for nearly \$20,000.00 in prize monies during the three days of competition.

Last year's All Around Champion of the Bogata rodeo, Rick Yocham of Bartlesville, OK will be trying to duplicate his award from 1989. From Bogata last year, Yocham went on to be crowned the 1989 All Around Champion of the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association, during the Finals Rodeo held in Tulsa, OK last October.

Yocham will be on hand in Bogata, along with every current champion and champion hopeful in the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association.

The current "hot hand" in CRRA competition is young Clayton Macom of Stigler, OK, who has a lead to 1990 championships in the bull riding and the All Around, and who is also listed among the Top 15 in the bareback riding.

Many favorites will be returning to Bogata this year, such as David Wesson of Delaware, OK, two-time bull riding champion and former All Around champion for the CRRA. Wesson made a big hit in Bogata several years ago when he was on hand to sign autographs prior to the final performance of the Bogata rodeo.

And many favorites in the back pens will be at Bogata again this year as well. The stock provided by the Wing Rodeo Company, is talked about far and wide, and many "headliners" will be waiting for their turn in competition at this year's rodeo.

This year marks the 23rd year that the Bogata Rodeo has been produced by the Wing Rodeo Company, and the stock has never let the standing room only crowds down, moreover, it has usually kept them on their feet.

Thursday night is Hub Whiteman

night, when some lucky spectator will receive a \$100 savings bond. On Thursday night, also, the Bogata Rodeo Princess will be crowned during the performance. This year three contestants are entered in the competition.

Friday night at the Bogata rodeo will be dedicated to Ronnie White, long-time supporter and avid rodeo enthusiast.

And on Saturday, the day starts bright and early with Frontier Day activities in downtown Bogata. The first event of the day will be the free pancake breakfast at 7:30 a.m., followed by day-long, fun-filled contests and lots of good, home-made food.

The second rodeo parade will be held Saturday afternoon at 5 p.m. and the week will conclude with the final performance of the rodeo, at which time the 1990 Bogata Rodeo Champions will be crowned.

Even though the weather has been hot and uncomfortable, don't let it keep you from coming to the rodeo, you won't want to miss a minute of it. Action starts at 8:30 at the Bogata Rodeo Arena. Don't miss it!

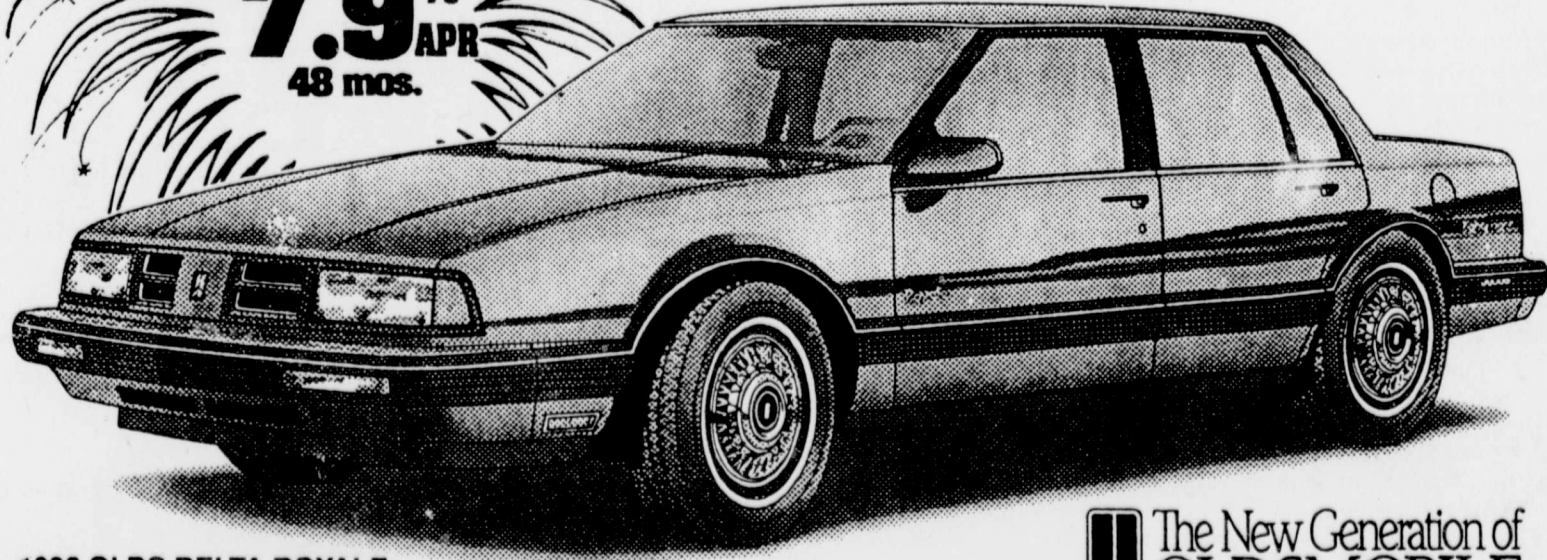

Resident Camp Season Opening At Camp Gambill

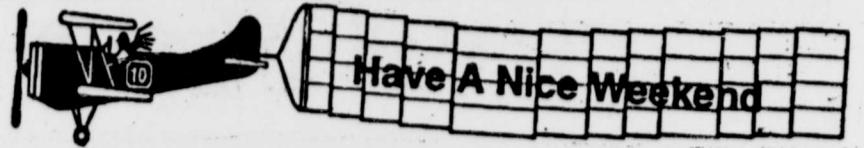

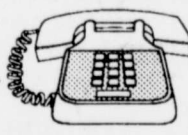

He said that if there ever was a perfect coach's wife, Paulette is it.

**On Stew, Chili
And Hot Tamales!**

My dad, Roger Bell, and my uncle, Stanley Bell, were both pretty well known for their good chili and stew, both being caterers, they certainly were experienced!

While visiting uncle Stanley recently, the Dept Chili Cook Off was brought into our conversation and he began telling me the difference in his and daddy's concoctions and how some of the local ladies came to talk to him about the way to make a good stew. Corn and carrots are definitely a "no-no". In his "flowery" description of what they do to stew, simply meant you want syrup, get a bottle of Kar and take a swig! Being 96 years old, his mind is sharp and his memory unbelievably good.

I can still remember the yellowish-brown sack the dried chili's came in and from being packed and handled they would be slightly crushed. A slight handful would be dropped into the pot. Hot? You bet!

James Grant never ordered one bowl at a time, but would eat one while the other cooled, swearing rolling down his face. Now, that's chili!

I don't recall very much about the stew making, but I do know everyone wanted a "red top", that was stew with a little chili on top.

Uncle Stanley said he used elbow macaroni for a filler and he guessed they liked it, because they ate it.

There were hot tamales, too. I can remember having to go to the barn with brother Bud to get the shucks. They were washed, trimmed and scalded before rolling the masa filled with what ever kind of meat available. Daddy and Mama would cook and grind the meat, it might have been an old tough rooster, hence a cheap cut of pork or beef, season it just so. The tamales were then tied in bundles and boiled until daddy said they were ready.

He would take them to town, keeping them hot in a lard stand over a cool oil burner. I believe it was the Vetco building which had a recessed front, that served as a good wind break. He sold them for 35¢ a dozen. Then, that was about as much money as the three dollars and fifty cents we pay now.

Times have changed and so have our lifestyles, but good stew, chili and hot tamales have stayed the same.

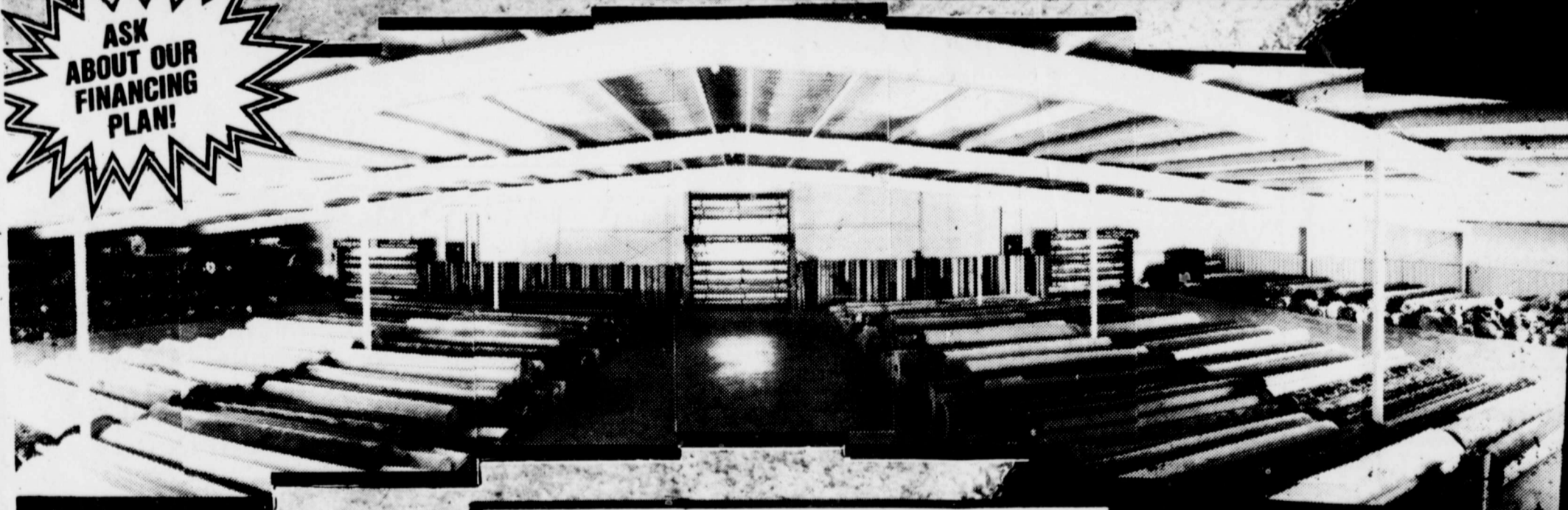

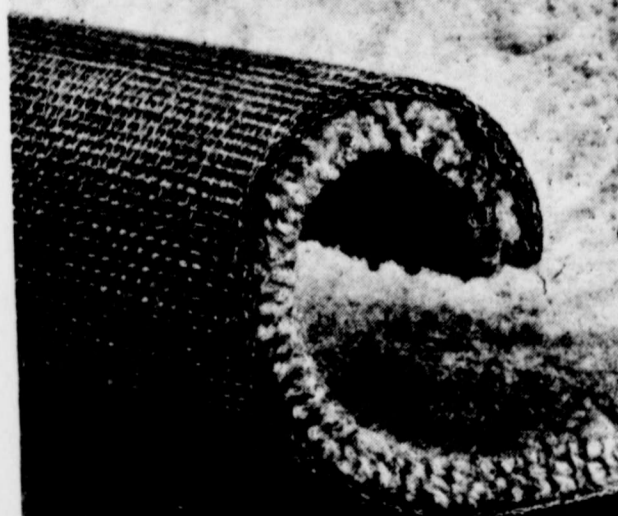

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by severe storms, flooding and tornadoes occurring April 15 and continuing are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office in Clarksville, FmHA County Supervisor, Frank B. Stroud, said recently.

Red River County is one of eight in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the storms, flooding and tornadoes.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lend-

ers, the interest rate is 4.5%.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Stroud said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations and cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.





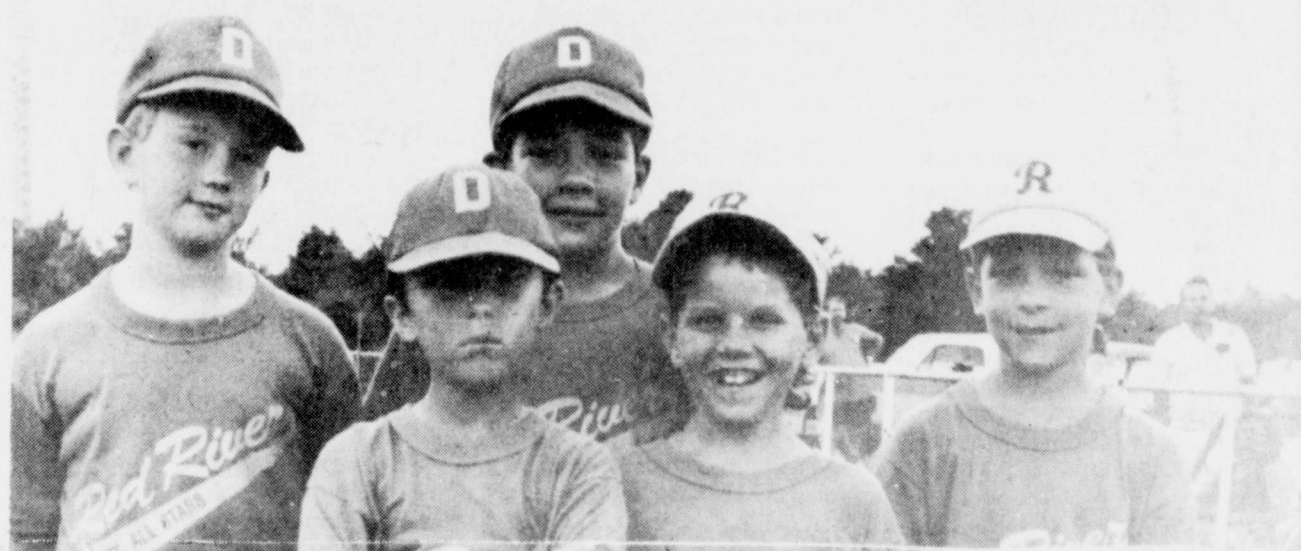
