Bogata Lions Club Serves Community Through Service Projects

The people of Bogata and surrounding communities have been very generous in their support of the Bogata Lions Club fund raising projects.

The profit from Frontier Day, rodeo concessions, fish fries, stew suppers, bake sales and other special drives have been used to help local people.

I the past year, 14 children in the Bogata school system had eye examnations and glasses which the Lions Club paid for in the amount of \$773.40. In addition to this, donations were made to: fire department, \$550.00; Dixie Debs Baseball National Stars, \$100.00; Red River Softball Association, \$25.00; Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation, \$200.00; seven families, \$400.00; Boy Scout Troop #135, \$250.00; First Baptist Church Camp Group, \$100.00; gifts for bingo winners at Red River Haven Nursing HOme, \$271.90; Christmas Parade prizes, \$200.00; Christmas food baskets andgifts, \$1,020.04.

The Club also sponsored the pancake breakfast and other activities for Frontier Day at a cost of \$647.30. They gave \$534.00 to the Lions Club Crippled Children's Camp and two Rivercrest graduates received a \$500.00 scholarship each.

Also, \$1,500.00 was set aside for the Community Park Care Endowment Fund, \$145.00 was spent on the mowing of the Park and the utilities at the Community Center were paid for by the Club.

All of this totals \$7,716.64 that has been raised by the Bogata Lions Club and shared in the community.

The Club has two very important on-going projects to which contributions have been made. Everyone is encouraged to support these projects through individual donations.

The Ronnie White Memorial Scholarship Fund is one of these projects. The goal of the Lions Club

is to have enough funds donated to a savings account that would guarantee a \$500.00 scholarship each year to a Rivercrest graduate.







Managing Beef Herds With Limited Forage

By Paul D. Payne CEA-AG

Who would believe that there would be a grass shortage in the area after the flooding problem in May? But that is exactly the situation now on area farms and ranches.

Hay yields have been running from 30 to 50 percent of normal this summer with the prospects of another cutting not too promising at the present time. However, the picture could change dramatically with additional rainfall this week or next. There is plenty of time remaining to get an additional one or two cuttings, but having adequate rainfall is the limiting factor.

Grass meadows will need additional fertilizer if they are to produce a quantity of quality hay. Being smart or lucky enough to apply the fertilizer to the grass just prior to a rain is the key since a considerable quantity of the nitrogen can be lost where rainfall does not move the fertilizer into the soil. This is particularly true of urea fertilizers as they volatilize much more quickly.

Milk supplies less than half of the nutrients needed by a calf to gain rapidly after it is three to four months of age according to Dr. Randall Grooms, Livestock Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. If the pasture that is available to the calves is not adequate, then one can expect to take lighter calves to the market.

Creep feeds to supplement pasture

to meet these additional requirements are not economical under all conditions, but producers with a grass shortage this summer should take a close look at creep feeding. Kansas State University reported in a review of 31 university trials that calves gained 0.38 pound faster daily an drequired an average of 9 pounds of creep feed for an extra pound of gain.


The inefficient feed conversions for creep rations is due to calves substitutin g creep feed for forage when pastures are good and because calves often fatten when creeps are full fed. So it would seem that creep feeding would be more economical at this time of year.

An approach to improve the efficiency and profatibility of creep feeding is to limit feed creep rations. A high protein creep (34 to 44%) has been used in many studies and limited to about 1.0 pound per pound of extra grain.

So, if you are getting short on grass, you might want to take a second look at creep feeding your calves.

Many spring flowering shrubs will be forming flower buds in late July and August. Drought conditions can reduce the quality and the quantity of





Future Hay Production Depends **Upon Fertility Program**

Most producers still do not have enough hay to winter their livestock, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., extension agronomist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

"Due to the winter freeze, the first cutting of hay in East Texas was about one-third to one-half less than it should have been," said Dr. Reeves. "If a second or third cutting is needed, fertilizer should be applied now to take advantage of the next rainfall."

Reeves said that fertilizer requires a rain to be activated. Therefore, if fertilizer is applied after a rain, it will still be on top of the ground waiting for the next rain.

"The greatest loss of nitrogen to the air occurs when nitrogen is applied as the soil is drying," Reeves said. "Fertilizer put out on dry soil remains intact until it receives moisture. Phosphorus and potassium are not lost to the atmosphere."

Reeves suggests storing hay inside a barn or shed if possible. Hay will maintain it's quality for several years if protected from the weather. If round bales are stored outside, be sure the storage area is well drained.

"Loose wrapped round bales stored outside may loose one-third to onehalf their quality and weight the first year," Reeves said. "The outer six inches of a six-foot diameter bale contains about one-third of the total quantity of the bale. If you examine hay left over from last year and stored outside, this will give an indication of the amount of hay lost."


