The Haskell City Council held their monthly meeting Tuesday, April 24 at 7:30 p. m. in the council room.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Louis Wilson met with the

A new fund has recently been created by the Haskell County Hospital Administration, on request from local taxpayers. This fund has been established to enlarge and modernize the existing emergency room at Haskell Memorial Hospital. The project would include building two more rooms and moving the lab from its existing emergency room.

Hospital Administrator, Alfred Turnbow expressed his and the hospital administration's appreciation for the contributions given to the Heart Monitoring fund which was purchased in 1970, and is within \$150.00 of being paid for.

A representative of the Hersey Meter Co. met with the council concerning the purchase of water meters. After looking over specifications and the construction of the Hersey meter, councilmen voted to purchase 102 meters over a period of 60 days.

Plans were presented to the council for a building at the dump grounds. Council voted to advertise for bids. This building would be used far maintenance and sanitation equipment storage.

R. C. Couch was voted by the council to be reappointed as director to the Water Authority for the coming two-year term.

Councilmen submitted names of prospective people who could serve on the equalization board, to city secretary, Dulaney. The names submitted will be contacted and three will be approved by the council.

Selaries and benefits of city employees were discussed. The Council voted to give any city employee who had been with the city for over five years, a two-week vacation. Bills from 4.10.73 to 4.24.73 were read by the council, and payment was asproved.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Haskell county during the month of March. acording to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1973 shows a total of 19 accidents resulting in one person killed and nine persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region No. 5 for March, 1973, shows a total of 468 accidents, resulting in 19 persons killed and 263 persons injured as compared to March 1972 with 420 accidents, result ing in 23 persons killed and 218 persons injured. This was 48 more accidents, 4 less fatalities and 45 more injured in 1973, at the same period of time.


