This has happened about once a month. The rack is in place, but the heavy metal tube has been cut off.

The thing that has been so very frustrating about this is that the lock and coin tube costs so much more than the amount of money the thieves get.

There is never more than two or three dollars in this rack because we empty it constantly!

Finally, though, we decided to give it up.

We put a paper cup inside the store and people leave their quarters inside.

Last week, when my husband came in he had a slightly awed look on his face.

"Look at this," he said. And he poured a whole handful of quarters out onto the counter.

It seems that virtually every single person who had taken a paper had made the effort to step inside the store and pay for it.

It opened our eyes. Instead of being frustrated and angry because of the coin tube theft, we found ourselves impressed that so many people were so honest!

Sure, it's aggravating that there is someone willing to go to all that trouble to steal a few dollars, or at least aggravate us.

But the assurance that there are SO many more people who are honest enough to pay for something when there isn't even a coin slot handy was heartening.

And it put things back into perspective.

In a world where every news media source is trumpeting violence, theft, dishonesty and ruin, it's nice to have a reassurance that people are still basically decent and honest...that it is only a very few who cause all of this problem.

The glass, which had been appearing half empty, suddenly looks half full again.

## Sales Taxes Show Healthy Increase, According to Comptroller Bullock

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that sales taxes collected in April, May and June of this year showed a healthy increase over last year's collections.

"This is further confirmation of a recovered Texas economy and of a state that's in economic expansion," Bullock said.

The Comptroller's office sent \$148 million in sales tax rebate checks to cities and counties throughout Texas.

Payments to cities totaled \$135 million, an 11% increase over last August's payments and an 8% increase over last year's total payments at this time.

In Lamar County, Blossom received \$3,016.65, marking a 6.46% decrease while Deport received \$2,383.35, marking a 3.23% decrease over last year's payments for the same period.

In Titus County, Mt. Pleasant received \$146,978.59 for a 6.40% increase and Talco received \$2,601.14, for a 14.83% decrease over the 1989 payments.

In Red River County, Bogata received \$4,049.96 for a 1.41% increase. Clarksville received \$26,398.61 for a 1.91% increase and Detroit received \$2,324.32.

Houston received \$23 million, the

state's largest payment, while Dallas received the state's second largest payment of \$14 million.

Rebates to counties totaled \$13 million this month for an increase of 18% over last August's payments. That sizeable jump is largely due to more counties collecting sales tax now than last year, Bullock said.

All local sales taxes must be approved by area voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General fund and use it for operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement.

## Rivercrest D-Fy-It Chapter Holds Second Meeting

The Rivercrest Chapter of D-Fy-It held their second meeting last Thursday night at the high school.

The program was outlined in detail for those present at the meeting, beginning with the purpose.

The purpose of the program is to provide high school and middle school students with a voluntary program that rewards them for being drug free and to influence those who abuse drugs to reject them through the use of positive peer pressure.

Goals of the program are: to promote drug free students in Talco-Bogata CISD; to educate the student community in the dangers of drug abuse and provide more positive alternatives; to reduce the demand size of drug abuse in the Talco-Bogata area; to improve communication between youth, police and the community; to enhance the leadership capabilities of students; and to do our part toward a drug free Texas.

Emphasis is placed on: certification of drug free by use of drug testing; and card membership with discount privileges.

Regarding the organization of the club; a governing board will be formed and a chairman elected; Advisory Board--Chief of Police (coordinator) and following divisions: law enforcement, education, medical and counseling, media, Chamber of Commerce, Ministerial Alliance, service organizations and community. The board provides program and funding support to the student leadership group.

Activities included in the program are: organization (by laws/membership applications, meetings, program decisions); testing (entering the program and random testing); public relations (program publicity, education and awareness campaigns); programs and activities (i.e. lock ins, ice cream and coke parties, pizza parties,

dances, programs on drug abuse, etc.); lgo and printing (cards, banners, T-shirts, etc.).

All testing will be provided by Titus County Memorial Hospital. Testing and collection site will be at Talco-Bogata school facilities. Testing will be monitored by the school counselor, school nurse, health teacher, elected student leadership group, and the law enforcement officer assigned the chapter. Students in the program are subject to random testing or at the direction of the student leaders.

Students who fail the test forfeit their card and privileges for a determined amount of time (assessed by the student leadership). Testing screens four types of drugs, amphetamines, marijuana, cocaine and PCP. Card members are entitled to such privileges as theater, food and clothing discounts, special programs and activities and other benefits in Talco-Bogata and participating communities and counties.

Any member who loses his or her card must pay \$5 to secure another card. Card membership can be removed for failing drug screen test, alcohol consumption and other reasons established by student leadership. However, care is taken to encourage the student to re-enter the program.

This program can be expanded to other cities in the state of Texas. The focus of this program is "NO USE".

In order to achieve a drug free community, it will require the efforts of the entire community working together in a partnership against substance abuse.

A membership application, along with a parental consent/release form and rules for membership, will be sent home with Talco-Bogata students, for anyone interested in joining the D-Fy-It program.

## Talco-Bogata CISD Accepts Bids

The Talco-Bogata School Board met August 14 in the homemaking room at Rivercrest High School and accepted the bid for dairy products from Oak Farms Dairy to provide milk products to the school for the 1990-91 school year.

Also, the bid from Wonder Bread was accepted to provide service to the school.

The cafeteria lunches and break-

fast prices will remain the same as last year.

Hiring of several personnel was also done. Hired were Special Ed Aide, Tammy Case for Talco; Cafeteria Worker, Sandra Parson for the Talco building; Sixth Grade Language, Georgia Robinett; Compensatory Aide, Donna Miller to work on the Bogata Campus.

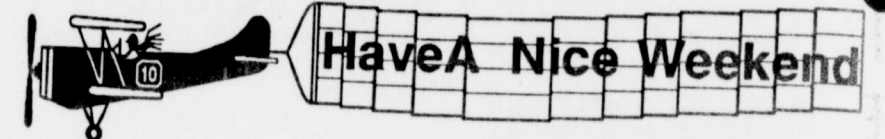

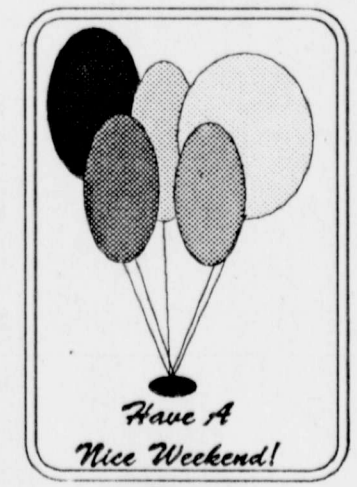

The Talco-Bogata School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for \$1.05 per day or \$5.25 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.20 per day or \$6.00 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 55¢ and high school students may buy breakfast for 65¢. Meals are also available free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or aid to families with dependent children for any of your children, those children can get free meals. If your total household income is at or below the amounts on the Income Chart, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals for 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

Eligibility may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year. You may be asked to send information to prove that your children should get free or reduced price meals. If you do not agree with the school's decision, you have the right to a fair hearing. Call or write: Freddy Wade, Box 130, Bogata, TX 75417, 632-5205.

The first annual Paris PRCA rodeo is looking forward to presenting Richard Hedeman, better known as "Tuff" Hedeman, on August 30-31 and September 1.

Tuff is the World Champion Bull Rider for 1986 and 1989. With a bull riding earning of \$122,765 in 1989, he claimed his second world championship. He also received the Lane

Frost Memorial Award for the highest scored bull ride at the 1989 National Finals Rodeo. This was quite touching for Tuff, because Frost was his best friend.

The PRCA rodeo is part of the Red River Valley Fair and Rodeo which starts August 28 and runs through September 2 at the Fairgrounds Arena in Paris.

One In The Same**

Rodeo is a unique sport, however, it holds many of the same traits as other sports. For example, each has the concept of "practice makes perfect". Like all sports, professional rodeo has language, customs, practices and rules of its own.

These practices will be in full effect during the PRCA rodeo in Paris, August 30-September 1.

Visitors and fans of the rodeo will experience the full force of American top spectator sport, when cowboys form all parts of the United States and Canada compete for prize money in seven different events.

It is not uncommon for a contestant to have already competed in 500 or more rodeos before he ever enters his first PRCA contest as a permit holder, the PRCA's definition of an apprentice seeking professional ranking.

Today's rodeo is more than a rough native-born sport. It has become a

living history that is vividly portrayed in professional rodeo. This heritage brings in a special breed of men that drive for the best when in competition.

While professional rodeo has no quarters, halftimes or any other form of designated times of showing, it doesn't mean there's no "halftime" entertainment. Rodeo clowns can be very entertaining. They take time out to bring humor to the audience, sometimes taking his unpredictable behavior up to the bandstand, but his main purpose is to keep the bull off

the cowboy in the bull riding. Still, a number of these men are skillful animal tamers and could probably make use of their talents with great success, at other types of spectator gatherings.

There are several stages in the rodeo industry, like Little Britches, Junior, High School, College and Amateur, all the way up to professional. But, no matter what stage, it takes consistent work, dedication and determination to become knowledgeable of the sport. Others make it on ambition alone.
