This reminds me of a makeshift version of a building back at San Angelo. I miss that town and the little church.

I hope to be coming home by February, 1991. Thanks for the pictures of Rachael, LStephanie and Julie.

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Rebel Sports Report

Rebels Lose Close Game To Warriors, 27-22

A fifty-seven yard pass by Warriors quarterback Chad Huffer to Richard Bates with one minute left in the fourth quarter set up the winning touchdown Friday night as the Honey Grove Warriors defeated the Rebels by a score of 27-22.

Rivercrest took the opening kick off and marched thirty eight yards before turning over the ball. Rebel David Davidson intercepted a Huffer pass at the twentyfive to set up the first touchdown of the contest.

The TD came with 3:36 in the first quarter with a quarterback sneak from the Warrior's two yard line by Rebel quarterback Ronald Simmons and the ppoint attempt was credited to Jesse Woods, putting the Rebels in the lead.

Honey Grove claimed the second quarter marching sixty-seven yards and scoring for the Warriors was Rodney Bateman. The second touchdown came from a blocked punt of Rivercrest's by Keith Moreland who returned the ball to the Rebel fifteen yard line and Bateman scored again with 4:13 left in the half. Rivercrest Rebel Shane Beers blocked the point after attempt, with the Rebels trailing 13-7.

Returning for the third period of play the Rebels were fired up. Honey Grove took possession when on

the second play quarterback Chad Huffer's handoff was fumbled and Rebel Clint Burns recovered. Tony Sanders and Shane Beers moved the ball down the field. Tony Sanders scored from the one with Jesse Wood adding the extra point conversion and Rivercrest took the lead 14-13.

However, the Rebels lead lasted for only a little while when the Warriors scurried down the field for six and two point conversion.

Rivercrest offense tallied back with a power play with 4:54 Shane Beers crossed into the endzone from twenty yards out and also claimed the two extra points, which put the Rivercrest squad up by one with 1:45 to play.

Honey Grove quarterback Huffer hit freshman Richard Bates for 56 yards. He eluded several of the defensive Rebels, moving into the ten yard line of Rivercrest.

Bateman scored the winning TD for the warriors with one minute to play in the fourth quarter.

MRivercrest had less than a minute to move the football down field but QB Ronald Simmons could not connect with his receiver. The clock ran out, leaving the Rebels a little short of a win.

Rivercrest will finish off the season at home on November 9, at Rivercrest Stadium at 7:30 against the Cooper Bulldogs.

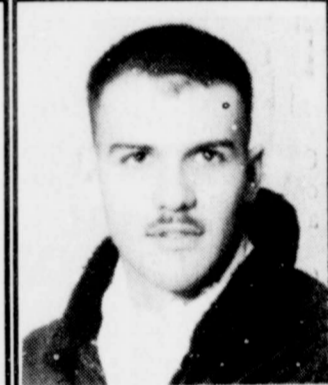

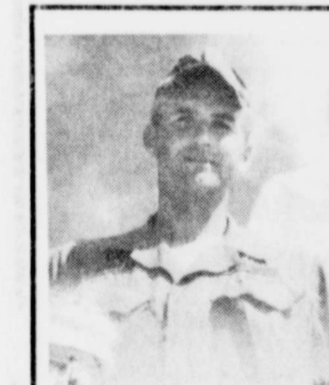

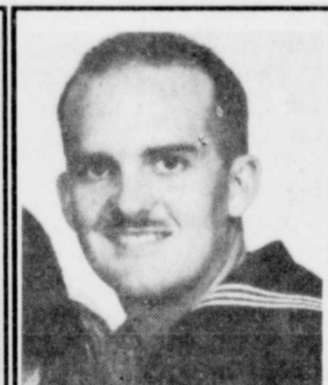

FmHA Supports Farm Safety For "Just Kids"

The Farmers Home Administration, an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture, has selected the Farm Safety for "Just Kids" program as its public service project for 1990-91, through its Wellness Program's Public Safety Campaign, according to Billy Curb, FmHA County Supervisor for Lamar County.

Farm Safety for "Just Kids" is a non-profit organization dedicated to education parents and children about farm injury prevention. This organization stresses raising awareness levels regarding on-farm hazards. Each year, farm accidents result in the death of 300 young people and 5,000 serious injuries. The primary age group effected is 5 to 14 years old.

A Cornell University study reveals

that children bear the blunt of farm accidents when the injury rate is adjusted to account for the time each worker is in the workplace. In 1988, 35.6% of farm accident victims were children ranging in age from 5 to 14 years. There are three factors today which may be aggravating the dangers for children: increased mechanization; new safety hazards, 50% of ATV accidents have involved children, and; stressful economic conditions.

"We believe Farmers Home Administration in Texas can make a tremendous contribution to this organization in reaching thousands of children and young adults in rural areas that would have otherwise been missed," Curb said.

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1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
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1/4 teaspoon salt
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1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup skim milk
2 cups coarsely chopped unpeeled apples
1/4 cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350°F and grease muffin cups. In a small bowl, stir together flour, baking powder and salt. In a large bowl, beat egg; stir in oil, sugar and vanilla. Stir in 1/2 of the dry ingredients. Stir in milk and then remaining dry ingredients. Fold in apples and nuts. Fill muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake for 20 minutes. Allow to cool 5 minutes in muffin cups before removing to wire racks.

Makes 16 muffins.
Per serving (one muffin): 122 calories, 2g protein, 5g fat, 18g carbohydrate, 0mg cholesterol, 119mg sodium.

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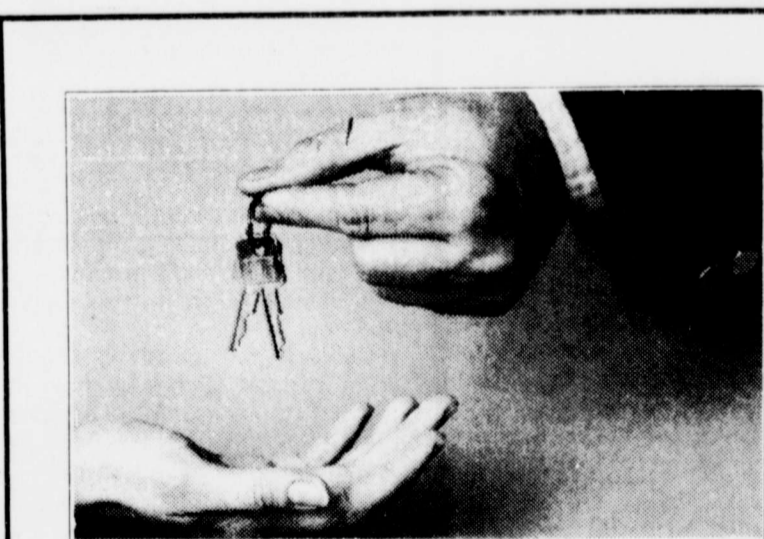

Bogata Cemetery Board Meets

The Board of Directors of the Bogata Cemetery met to approve resolutions to the respect on the death of William Clifford Barnard. Mr. Barnard was a member of the board from August 1972 until his death, serving as vice-president and then president for seven years.

The board recognized Mrs. Sue Hudson is the only charter member serving on the board. The board of directors was organized December 16, 1946 with Curtis Wilkinson as the first president. Mrs. Hudson was elected to serve as secretary-treasurer, at this organizational meeting.

The purpose of the board of directors was to see to the maintenance and care of the Bogata Cemetery. The directors who are currently serving try to carry out this purpose and as funds are available, improvements are made in the cemetery.

The board acted upon the request of Mrs. Hudson to be placed on the inactive membership list. Gaston Puckett and Neil Rozell were elected to the board as new members to fill the vacancies of Mr. Barnard and Mrs. Hudson.

New SSI Rules For Disabled Children

There have been a couple of recent changes in the Supplemental Security Income law that affect SSI payments paid to disabled children.

One of the changes allows for the continued payment of a \$30 personal needs allowance to disabled children who leave a medical institution to receive care at home. The children will then also keep their Medicaid eligibility.

Under the old law, children often became ineligible for SSI and Medicaid when they went home from an institution because of their parents' income and resources.

Another change continues eligibility for disabled children of Armed Forces personnel who live with their parents while on permanent duty assignments outside the United States. The children must be U.S. citizens and must have been eligible for SSI in the month before their parents reported for overseas duty.

This change will help Armed Forces personnel keep their families together. Prior to this, their disabled children had to be in the U.S. or give up SSI benefits.

The SSI program pays monthly checks to people with little income and few resources who are 65 and older and to people of any age who are blind or disabled. And most people who get SSI are also eligible for Medicaid which helps pay health care expenses.

For SSI purposes, a child is under 18 and neither married or head of a household, or under 22 and a student regularly pursuing a course of study in an educational or vocational training institution expected to result in gainful employment.

If you know a blind or disabled child who may qualify for SSI, refer the child, parents or guardian to any Social Security office.

Greenville. He and his wife reside in Garland. They have two children and two grandchildren.



1. False. Most burglaries occur weekdays, between 9:00 A.M. and 4:00 P.M.
2. False. Most burglars dress in business or service-type clothing so as not to attract a neighbor's attention.
3. True. Most burglars enter casually, by way of a door, so that an observing neighbor would assume nothing was amiss.
4. True, normally they are not. Unlike armed robbers, who steal by threats and violence, burglars generally fear people. However, when surprised, burglars can be threatening.
5. False. There was a time when only the very wealthy had home security systems. But thanks to technological advances, the cost of home security systems has been substantially reduced. This has allowed many more people to purchase affordable home security systems to help prevent burglaries and to help increase "peace of mind."
6. False. Unlike some commercial systems, ADT believes a loud noise that scares burglars away is your first defense. This noise is one of the most effective ways to avoid confrontation with an intruder. If you have special concerns about audible versus silent alarms, you should discuss them with a security company representative.
7. False. Today, because of the increased number of false alarms, many local police departments make it a policy not to allow transmission of alarm signals directly from home security systems. Most police departments respond to calls from security companies monitoring their customers' alarm systems.
8. True. To help the number of insurance claims due to burglaries and fires in homes, insurance companies often offer lower rates to homeowners with security alarm systems monitored by security companies with central monitoring stations, such as ADT's.

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Area Code 214 Changes To 903 In Northeast Texas

On November 4, the 214 area code changes to 903 in all areas of Northeast Texas except those around Dallas south to Waxahachie. Dallas and the immediate area remains in area code 214, while the rest of Northeast Texas acquires the 903 area code, similar to the 713-409 conversion several years ago in the Houston area. The new area code was established due to an almost-exhausted supply of phone numbers available in the 214 area.

The change won't affect long-distance rates, although there may be

some changes in the long-distance dialing. Also, any phone numbers programmed into the telephone such as speed calling numbers, fax numbers, PBX and PABX numbers, pay phones and cellular phones may need to be reprogrammed.

Until May, 1991, callers automatically will be switched to the correct area code and number. Beginning in May of 1991, recorded messages will remind those who dial the incorrect area code that they must use the new 903 area code when placing calls to that number. Although

these transition periods have been established to help callers who forget to dial the 903 area code, callers should begin using the 903 number for all numbers in the new area on November 4.

Winterizing Equipment And Supplies Pays Dividends

Winterizing equipment and supplies on the farm and around the home can pay big dividends by preventing costly repairs and replacement.

"Spray systems, including the pump, lines and tank are very susceptible to freezing," said Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Freezing equipment is a chore easily delayed. This can result in extensive losses of equipment and time.

"All equipment water systems should be drained and adequate antifreeze added to protect the equipment below the lowest temperature expected for the particular region,"

Robinson said. "If plain water is left in the system, damage can be costly."

Around the home and barns, hoses should be disconnected from faucets and the faucets and above ground pipes protected from freezing.

All pesticides should be properly stored out of reach of children and to prevent freezing. Granular or powdered material should be sealed in airtight containers to protect against moisture.

Robinson says to repair or replace worn parts on equipment before the equipment is stored for the winter. If the equipment is subject to caustic materials such as fertilizer, it should be cleaned and oiled to prevent rusting and deterioration.

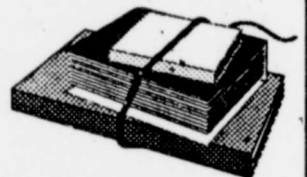
