D-FY-It Hears Speaker

On November 12 at 9 a.m at Rivercrest Talco and Bogata D-FY-It members heard Lt. Pete Collins of Mississippi speak. Mr. Ray Miller began the program with a welcome and introduced Lt. Collins. The program was titled "So You Think You'll Live Forever". Mr. Collins quickly drew the student's attention with lots of laughter. He used senior Jesse Woods as an example of the use of crowd control (abilly club), and restraining devices (hand cuffs). Lt. Collins proved beyond a shadow of a doubt that he could control a boy the size of Jesse with ease, all to the student's enjoyment and the embarrassment of Jesse who took it all in stride. This was Lt. Collin's way of showing the group what a strong control drugs and alcohol can have on a person's life. He then turned to the serious side by pointing from corner to corner of the room and saying "one of you will die in a car accident, drug or alcohol related, from yourself or another person". This past year in Mississippi

101 high school students died in accidents due to drugs or alcohol. Thirteen were high school seniors, 7 were coming from the Junior-Senior prom. Seventeen freshmen died the first two weeks of school this year in Mississippi. It took twelve hours to identify some of these children, he reported, because of the false ID cards on their bodies. Lt. Collins said that he personally had knocked on 168 doors to tell parents of their child's death in a drug or alcohol related accident. He stated that "I've seen enough people die to last me a million years, all because of cute commercials on TV sponsoring beer!". He had the students full attention when he told of an accident that led him to D-Fy-It and the work he does for it. Three students from one family left home to go to a local football game, he said. Two grown men, brothers, had been at a local bar, drinking and arguing about who had the fastest pickup truck. The brothers, he said, left to prove their

point. One had a wife and child in the truck with him. In a drag race down the highway they hit the students on their way to the football game head on. The 17 year old boy driving the student's car, was 13 feet off the road in an attempt to avoid the headon collision. All their students died, while the brothers and their families were uninjured. Lt. Collins said he had to tell the parents of three children that all of their family had been killed.

He ended the program with "Remember what Pete Collins Says" I want the Senior, Junior, Sophomore and Freshman class president to write me and tell me you all made it...that Pete Collins wasn't right, no one from Rivercrest High or Talco-Bogata Junior high was killed due to drugs or alcohol.

Lastly he encouraged students to Thank God for the country they lived in and the support they receive from parents and community. Don't lose control of your life... with drugs or alcohol you don't make decisions!

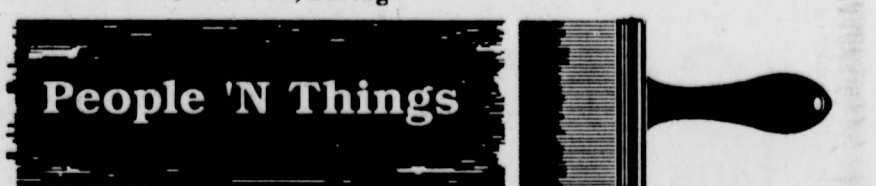

Country Cooking

"Country Cooking" comes from the home of Pete and L'Wanda McKnight, married for 39 years. They have lived in Cunningham most of their lives and have two daughters, Connie McKnight and Fran Patterson, a son-in-law, Johnny Patterson and two granddaughters, Johnna Shea, 4, and Jenna Rhea, 3 weeks old.

L'Wanda shares a delicious chicken/dressing recipe and Pete shares his country breakfast with us. Since Pete's heart attack, he has had to cut down on this type of diet, but cheats every once in a while and prepares his country breakfast.

Pete also shares a goulash recipe, that is quick and easy to make. L'Wanda says Pete's cooking is out of this world and is rated a definite "10".

Pete and L'Wanda attend Life Tabernacle Church where they are very active. L'Wanda has owned and operated L'Wanda's Beauty Shop in Cunningham for 25 years.

They enjoy eating out a lot, but on Sundays she cooks a huge meal and invites her family to join them for lunch. She tries to have everything cooked by 9 a.m. so she can go to church and while she's gone, Pete cleans up her mess she made. She says that having Pete help her in the kitchen is better than two women

because he knows what to do and where everything goes.

L'Wanda says there are a couple of secrets about her dressing recipe. She mixes the onions and celery with the cornbread mixture and cooks it all together. She just heats it thoroughly and doesn't have to bake it very long. She says cooking the dressing the day before you serve it makes a lot of difference. She makes the dressing a little thinner than normal, because it will thicken as it refrigerates overnight. Her dressing is never dry, it is always juicy.

Her other recipe is her Banana Nut Cake, that she makes at Thanksgiving and Christmas. She came across the recipe from a lady she worked with at Westinghouse in 1957 and has used it ever since.

Cornbread

1 1/2 cups meal
1/2 cup flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1 tablespoon corn oil
3/4 cup diced onion
3/4 cup finely chopped celery
Mix all ingredients and pour into 9-inch greased and heated skillet.

Pete's Goulash

Brown in a large skillet one pound ground beef, onion and salt and pepper to taste. Drain.

Add approximately 12 oz. boiled and drained macaroni. Add 1 can of tomato paste. Add 1 small can of chopped green chilies.

Grate cheese and spread on top. Put in oven long enough to melt cheese.

Toasted Coconut Pie

3 beaten eggs
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup melted butter
4 teaspoons lemon juice (2 tsp. lemon extract)
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 can (1 1/3 cups) flaked coconut
1 9-inch unbaked pie crust

Combine eggs, sugar, margarine, lemon juice, vanilla. Stir in coconut. Bake in moderate oven 350 for 40-45 minutes. Cool before serving. Freezes well.

Banana Nut Cake

1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup pecans
1/2 cup Crisco
4 tablespoons buttermilk
1 teaspoon baking powder
3 bananas
Pinch of salt

Cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs and buttermilk. Then into the flour add baking powder and soda. Chop bananas into mixture and add vanilla, salt and nuts.

Chicken

1 hen
6 chicken breasts
1 tablespoon salt

Boil hen and chicken breasts until meat falls from bone. Season well with salt.

Dressing

2 9-inch skillets of cornbread
4 slices light bread
3 hard boiled eggs
Black pepper, sage and poultry seasoning to taste, chicken broth.

Crumble bread in large roasting pan. Pour enough chicken broth over bread for a thin consistency. Season to taste with black pepper, sage and poultry seasoning. Mix ingredients with mixer. Add chicken and 3 chopped boiled eggs. Stir. Refrigerate overnight. Bake at 350, approximately 1 hour or until hot through out.
