

Girl Scout Cookie Sale Begins

If you want to order your Girl Scout cookies this year, it should be fairly easy to spot a Girl Scout. She'll be wearing a button that says "I Love Girl Scout Cookies," with a big read heart on it.

The annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale will begin January 11, with girls taking orders through January 15. You can expect delivery of your favorite cookies between February 22 and March 6.

Seven varieties will be offered at \$2.25 per box. Golden Yangles, a sugar-free snack cracker introduced last year, will be available again this year, as well as the old favorites: Caramel DeLites, Thin Mints, Peanut Butter Sandwiches, Shortbread, Lemon Pastry Cremes and Peanut Butter Patties.

Betsy Mills, coordinator of the cookie sale for Red River Valley Girl Scout Council, states that proceeds from the sale will help fund the many programs and activities of the Girl Scouts, including their new national service project, "Right to Read". A portion fo the proceeds stays with the troop, she says, to help pay for their

projects and activities, while the council's portion pays for services to the troops, and helps maintain Camp Gambill and operate the council office.

Mrs. Mills stressed that the cookie sale is also an important part of the Girl Scout program, as it teaches girls some of the basic skills they need in life. Learning to make decisions, setting goals and making plans to reach those goals, accepting responsibility and managing money are all skills that can be learned through participation in the cookie sale, she said.

An incentive program offered by the council allows girls to earn awards based on the number of boxes they well. They can also earn credit toward camp or program event fees, as well as Girl Scout sponsored national or international events.



"Country Cooking" this week comes from the kitchen of Carlos and Betty Denison of Deport.

Carlos and Betty have been married for 46 years and have lived in the Deport area most of their married life. They have one son, John, and his wife, Larann, and one grandson, Dru, age 12. They are active members of the First Presbyterian Church of Deport.

Betty has two main hobbies, cooking and growing plants. She loves to cook daily meals for her children and to entertain family and friends. Betty contributes all her cooking traits to her late mother, Mrs. Druary Guest.

One specialty is baking homemade yeast breads. At Christmas she averages about 25 loaves that she bakes as Christmas gifts. She bakes breads for John and Larann to give as gifts to their co-workers as well. Betty keeps a starter of the Sourdough Bread in her refrigerator at all times.

Betty also likes to collect and share recipes with friends. She has a huge quilt box full of recipes she has collected and is always getting calls from friends, sharing a new recipe with her. The recipe boxes she has on display are all organized and separated into different food groups.

Betty is not the only cook at her house, Carlos cooks too. She says he can turn out a delicious pot roast dinner or chicken fried steak dinner. He also helps a lot in the kitchen. If Betty is cooking, he keeps the diswasher going.




