



# President Proclaimed Oct. 20-26 National Business Women's Week

October 20-26 has been proclaimed as National Business Women's Week by President Lyndon B. Johnson. National Business Women's Week is sponsored annually by the public-spirited members of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs. B&PW was organized in July 1919 for the purpose of promoting the interests of business and professional women. Today the Federation is composed of 3,800 clubs with a membership of approximately 178,000 women throughout the 50 states, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and Virgin Islands.

Baird Business and Professional Women's Club has 22 members and is affiliated with the Texas Federation and the National Federation.

## Higher Parcel Post Rates Effective Oct. 19

Postmaster John Towler reminded postal customers today that higher parcel post and catalog rates will go into effect Saturday, Oct. 19, 1968. The rate increase will average 10.5 per cent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents postage per parcel. The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July of this year.

Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50 cents to 60 cents.

Almost all parcels that presently cost the patron \$1.10 will go up 10 cents under the new rates. This category accounts for more than 80 per cent of all parcel post, the Postmaster pointed out.

There will be a 15-cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4.00, and a 20-cent increase on parcels now charged over \$4.00.

Parcel Post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four per cent of operating costs, as required by law, Postmaster Towler explained. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth-class mail, on a break-even basis.

Additional revenue is needed from parcel post and catalogs to offset higher costs resulting from pay increases approved last year for postal employees.

## CALLAHAN COUNTY HAS TWO WILDCATS SCHEDULED

Two wildcat projects have been announced for Callahan County.

W. H. Martin and G. C. Roberts of Abilene staked No. 1 E. R. Compton one mile southeast of the Denton community.

Having a proposed depth of 1,800 feet with rotary to test the Cook Sand, it is on a 240 acre lease.

Drillsite is 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of Section 345, G. W. Denton Survey.

E. C. Johnson Co. of Longview filed application to plug back to 2,800 feet to test the Cisco lime, wildcat depth, at a project seven miles east of Abilene.

It is No. 5 J. B. Davenport, located on a 300 acre lease. Site is 330 feet from the north and 1,263 feet from the west lines of Section 3, Block 8, SP Survey.

The project was originally completed as the same operator from perforations at 3,258-66 feet and prorated in the Elm-dale Field.

C. B. Edgar of Abilene staked No. 2 Guy Caldwell, et al. in the Marge, East (4,040) Field, 9 1/2 miles southeast of Baird.

Having a proposed depth of 4,200 feet with rotary to test the Lake Sand, it spots 1,980 feet from the south and 511 feet from the west lines of Section 13, Block 5, SP Survey.

Location is 1,469 feet west of Edgar No. 1 Caldwell, et al. a re-entry which has been abandoned.

Davis Brothers of Abilene staked No. 1-G B. A. & Ray Elliott in the regular field.

Location is four miles southwest of Moran on a 240 acre lease. Drillsite is 330 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the east lines of Section 1, D&DAL Survey.

Permit depth applied for is 2,500 feet with rotary to test the Moran Sand.

A regular field well was completed two miles northeast of the Denton community at Marvin Lewis of Abilene No. 8 Blain Odum.

Location is 2,750 feet from the south and 1,240 feet from the west lines of Section 15, BBB&C Survey.

No. 8 Odum had a daily potential of 24 barrels of 40 gravity oil. It is pumping from perforations from 1,261 to 1,310 feet. The pay was fractured with 12 sacks of sand and 175 barrels of lease crude.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 1,321 feet. Total depth was 1,322 feet, plugged back to 1,321 feet.

H. L. Albaugh of Abilene completed four water injection wells in the regular field 7 1/2 miles northwest of Putnam. All are on the J. S. Hart 81 acre lease.

No. 2-WIW Hart is located 450 feet from the north and 225 feet from the east lines of the northwest quarter of Section 6, D&DAL Survey.

Perforations were made at 401 to 412 feet with the 4 1/2-inch casing set at 435 feet. Total depth was 446 feet, plugged back to 423 feet.

Location for No. 11-WIW Hart is 856 feet from the north and 225 feet from the east lines of the northwest quarter of Section 6.

The 4 1/2-inch casing set at 435 feet was perforated at 407 to 412 feet. Total depth was 506 feet, plugged back to 417 feet.

Site for No. 13-WIW Hart is 300 feet from the north and 600 feet from the east lines of the northwest quarter of Section 6.

Perforations were made at 406 to 411 feet with the 5 1/2-inch casing set at 434 feet. Total depth was 450 feet, plugged back to 427 feet.

Other well is No. 18-WIW Hart, 600 feet from the north and 930 feet from the east lines of the northwest quarter of Section 6.

The 5 1/2-inch casing set at 445 feet was perforated at 412 to 418 feet. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 450 feet and plugged back to 433 feet.


