River Communications Taking Chapter 11 Bankruptcy

River Communications which provides cable service for the entire area, presented letters to area city councils informing them that the company has filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy-law protection from creditors.

River is a 41 system company serving 15,000 subscribers located primarily in Texas and Arkansas.

Chapter 11 is a reorganization proceeding (versus Chapter 7, a liquidation proceeding).

The company states that its intent

is to present a reorganization plan to the Court which will characterize the franchises as an essential contract which would be assumed and paid in full. Officials state that it is their hope that the process will be concluded quickly enough to prevent any delay past the due dates for submission of the franchise fees contained in the various franchises. They hope to emerge from Chapter 11 by mid-year.

In a letter to the various City Councils the company said that "It is one of our top priorities that the operation of the system serving your community not be negatively affected by this proceeding. This includes subscribers, the system itself and the employees who serve the subscribers. We expect and will do our best to see that there is no decrease in the quality of services provided to our subscribers."

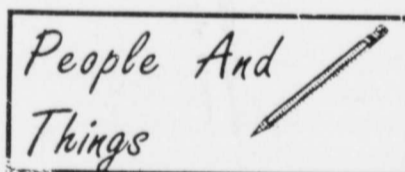
Bogata Schools Participate In P.I.E.

Bogata Elementary and Junior High Schools are participating in the Partners In Excellence, a program sponsored by World Book Encyclopedia. The program is designed to help students earn a set of World Book Encyclopedias, Childcraft, or Early World of Learning Kit for their classroom. Most classrooms do not have a set of the books. Those that do report them to be very outdated.

This is a seven week program which began January 2 and continues through February 25. Students have set a reading goal, signed up sponsors to pledge an amount of money to be paid for each book read, started reading their books, and will return to their sponsors at the end of the reading period to collect the money pledged. Kindergarten and first grade students can be read to. World Book

matches each \$2.00 earned by the students with \$1.00 toward the purchase of these books.

Each child who reads seven books with seven sponsors will receive a certificate. Those who read eight books with eight sponsors will receive a silver medal. Those who read ten books with ten sponsors will receive a gold medal, also the classroom with the greatest average number of books read per student will be presented a set of the World Book Encyclopedia of Science or the five-volume Childcraft supplement. A special awards day is being planned to present the awards to participating students. When the books arrive, a special dedication page will be placed in the first volume of each set with the names of all those students who helped earn the set.

Wilbur-Ellis Closing Out Deport Operation

Wilbur-Ellis/Tide Division of Deport will cease its Deport operation as of February 1, 1991.

Deport Store Manager Paul Keys said that although the store will not be operated under the name of Wilbur Ellis/Tide as of February the first, the store will continue to operate under

new ownership and will continue to serve area farmers.

Keys reports that he plans to continue the same type of service of fertilizeand chemicals as in the past.

Keys says negotiations are underway with other companies for those products so that by the time Wilbur Ellis is officially gone from Deport the store will be there for farmers when they need products in the spring.

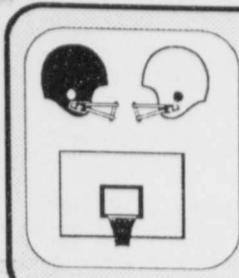

The halftime score was 50-33, Leonard, as the Rebs simply could not turn the game around.

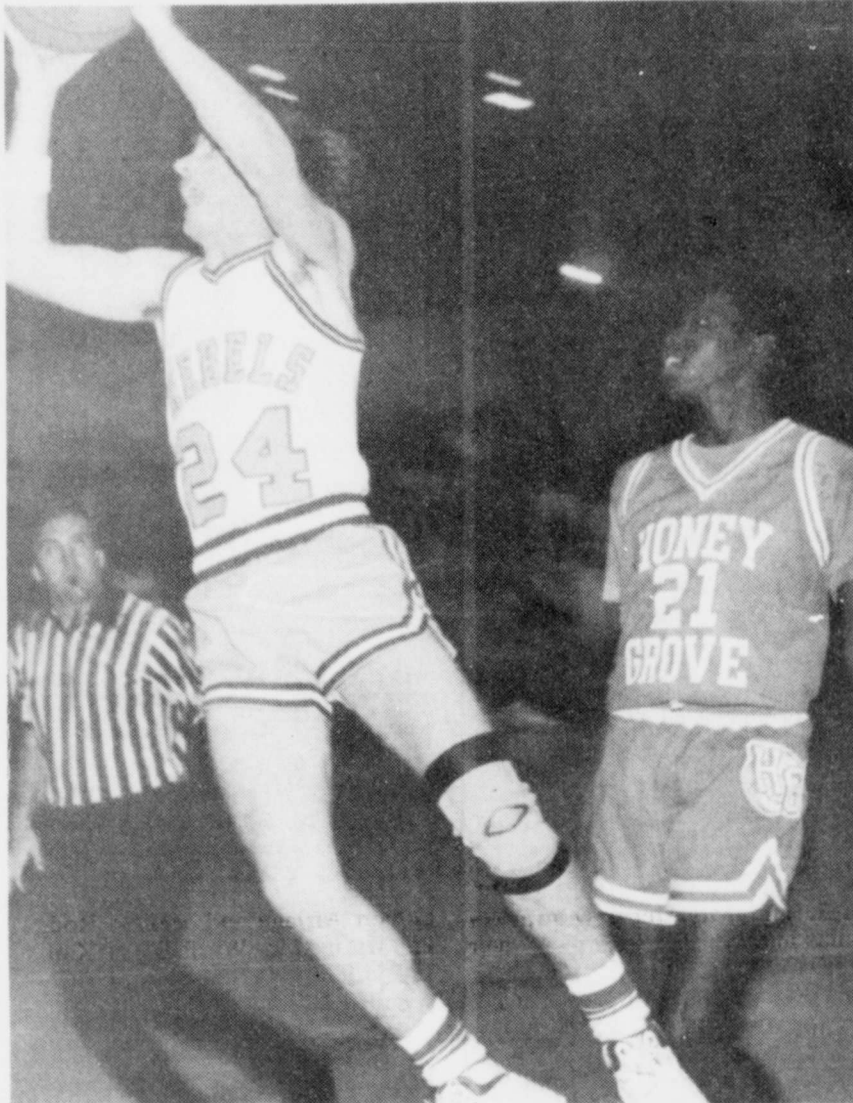

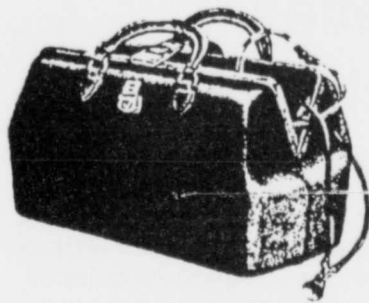

Select Fruit Varieties For Disease Resistance

One of the most important considerations when selecting a fruit variety is resistance to disease, says Dr. George Philley, extension plant pathologist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

"Although planting time is rapidly approaching, it is better to wait another year and obtain a disease resistant variety than to plant a tree that will not produce quality fruit or be weakened by disease," said Dr. Philley. "Also, various varieties are adapted to certain regions of the country and will not produce well in other regions."

Pecan varieties should have good resistance to scab disease. For East Texas, Choctaw, Cheyenne, Shawnee, Kiowa and Desirable are on the recommended list. Size of the nut and other tree characteristics should also be considered.

Attend The Church of Your Choice

"All peach varieties are susceptible to brown rot, the most destructive peach disease," Philley said. "Basically, peach varieties are recommended on fruit quality and ripening time rather than disease resistance. All peach and plum varieties should be on an root knot nematode resistant rootstock."

"Orient and Kieffer peaches have the best fire blight resistance," Philley said. "Garber and Pineapple varieties are somewhat tolerant to the disease. Moongow and Mangess are moderately susceptible, while Bartlett and LeConte are highly susceptible. Do not plant susceptible varieties."

Local county extension agents have lists available of recommended varieties. The list, produced by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is based on disease resistance, yield, quality and other factors.

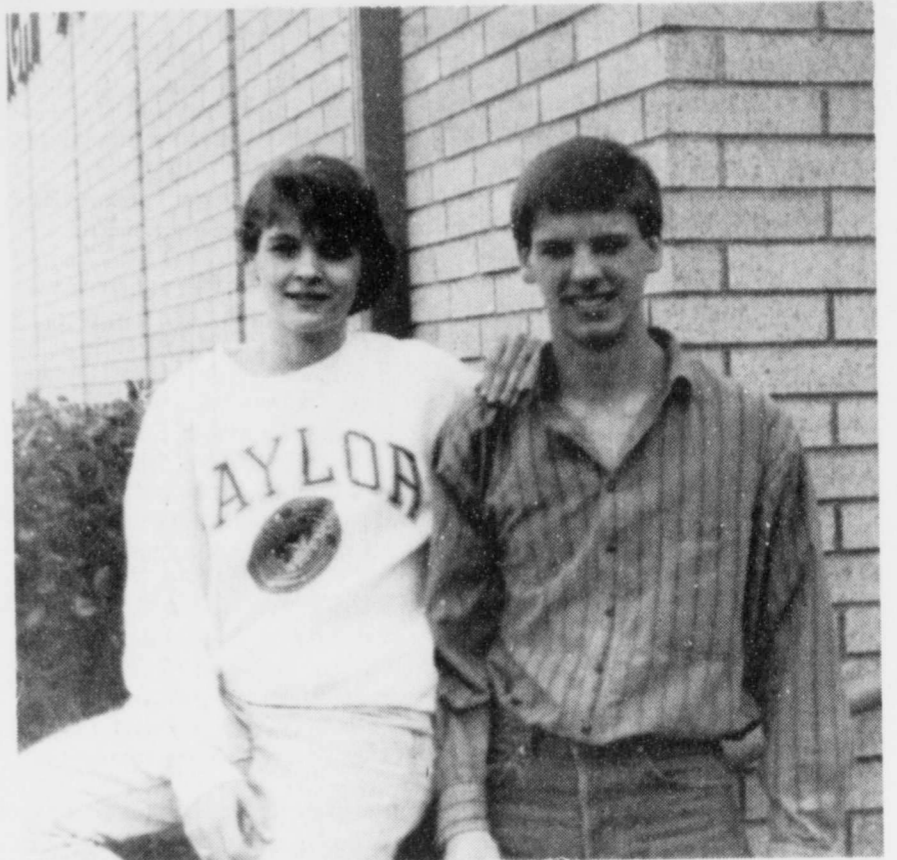

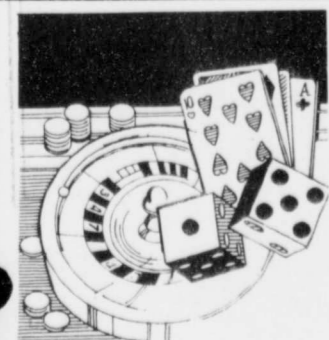
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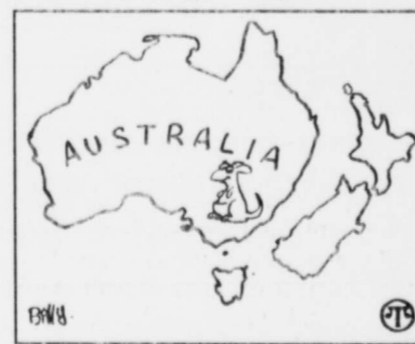

The land "Down Under" may be the site for the centenary Olympic Games.

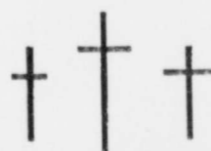

Ranch Near Bogata Certified Brucellosis-Free

Harold Grisham, owner of the BO-G Ranch near Bogata, recently had his crossbred cattle herd certified brucellosis-free by the Texas Animal Health Commission. Brucellosis, an incurable bacterial disease often called "bangs" is highly contagious among cows during pregnancy and calving, and can cause heavy losses due to abortions or weak calves.

The BO-G Ranch herd is one of 2,432 certid in the state.

Producers with certified herds have the advantage of shipping or selling cattle with fewer restrictions. Also, certified cows sold as breeding stock may command a higher price.

To have a herd certified, a producer enters into an agreement with the TAHC and has the herd's blood tested to ensure none of the animals are infected with brucellosis. If follow-up tests 10 to 14 months later also show no evidence of the disease, the herd is certified jointly by the

TAHC and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. To remain certified, the herd must be tested yearly and be free of brucellosis.

The TAHC and producers are working to eliminate brucellosis infection through a program that includes testing at ranches and livestock markets, removing infected cows, quarantining exposed herds, practicing management techniques to prevent spread of disease and vaccinating calves.

Texas and four other southern states, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Florida and Louisiana, still are the most highly infected states. Twenty-nine states have no known brucellosis infection, and 16 states have a very low infection rate. Reducing brucellosis infection the national livestock industry more than \$12 million a year in lost calves and reduced milk production.

Red River Haven Nursing Home Has "42" Tournament

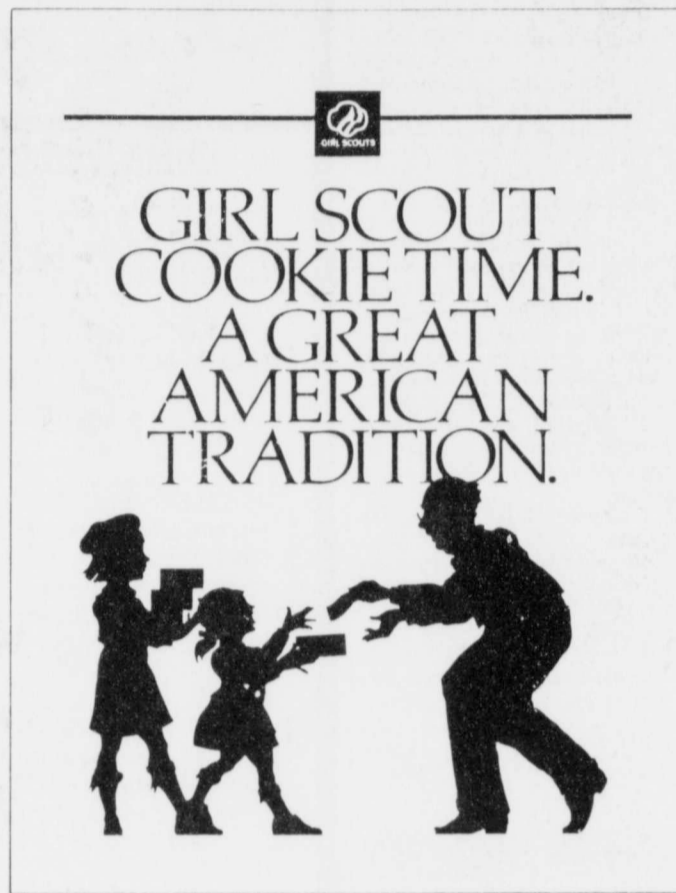
On Saturday, January 12, 16 residents and volunteers participated in the first "42" tournament for the new year.
