But just how many times now have we also watched as various officials, from the President of the United States on down have been literally harassed by the news media about exact figures, and what plan they intend to use

Why does any news person expect to get statements about when the air war will give way to a ground offensive, how many missiles the U.S. still has left or what the next stage of a campaign will be?

Anyone should be able to see that this information cannot be released.

Of course freedom of the press is a basic amendment, and I support it. But I also believe that while the public has a right to know, the military has a right to withold information which might jeopardize an operation.

Another common practice going on with interviewers is the tactic of "putting words in someone's mouth".

Personally, most of the officials interviewed have been more patient than I would have been with having to repeat "That is NOT what I said" or "I've already told you we cannot reveal this informationat this time".

Visual media has a major advantage over the print journalists right now. They can broadcast live every few minutes. They don't have to deal in cold hard facts the way a paper Can't you just see the scene now-a does. Instead they have the luxury of

It's easy to check facts and quotations in print. Voice inflections don't interfere with content. Action photos don't take away from concentration.


I also feel Americans have enough sense to listen to a report or speech and not require an interpretation of what was said immediately after-

Billy D. Willis

We are in no real trouble except for terrorists who may want to try to knock out this communications site. We are currently in the desert, about 80 miles from the junction of the Iraq and Kuwait border. Looks like we will be here for about two more weeks and then jump forward. No matter where we go, there isn't anything but more desert. South of here is real sand dune-type terrain and all around here is flat sandy, rocky desert. From what I've been told, this area used to be a sea bottom. The wind is blowing again today and you can only see for about a mile. Land navigation is hard during the day and very difficult at night. There are no roads out here. The closest hardtop road is 18 miles awy. All of the dirt tracks look the same and without a compass, there is no way you could find your way on a day like today.

Land and sky are all the same color right now. There is no twilight. It goes form daylight one minute to dark the next. It seems that way, anyway. It's winter here. When I got off the plane, I thought the heat (60 degrees) was unbearable. After being here for 10 days, 60 degrees is cold. I have been told that by April, the days will get up to 100 or more and

> Morale is good for the most part and we have settled into the routine fairly well. Water seems to be the biggest problem so far. We are drinking bottled water from one liter plastic containers and using the water in our five gallon containers for wash-

> ing, coffee and mess hall operations. Drinking from your canteen causes diarrhea. The neck of the canteen gets contaminated from the germs on your mouth after about two canteens of repeated drinking. The trick is to drink as little as possible from your canteen and then use a very week bleach solution of water to wipe the top off after you are through. Keeping your hands clean seems to be another big aid for keeping healthy.

> I don't really need anything. The flies are a pest when the wind doesn't blow, but completely disappear at night, so I don't need any fly dope now. They tell me that the flies will be a lot worse later when the nights are warmer. Mosquitoes don't exist and I haven't experienced sand fleas

Mother, try not to worry too much. I will be back! Except for a few hardships, this will be a piece of cake. Hang tough. I am making it OK. I'm very good at what I do and as you know, I have had quite a bit of combat experience. Not bragging, just plain facts. Time will pass and this will eventually be just another experience as we get on with our lives."

Mrs. Garrett received a letter from Bill's wife, Ida and she expressed our feelings completely.

"It seems strange that one man's obsession can affect so many lives. The Iraqui president obviously needs psychiatric help. Unfortunately, in the interim, so many of our lives are touched by his insanity. This whole thing doesn't seem right to me and I'm sure to many others but we chose the military life and therefore we must deal with our separation and stress.

It would just be easier if the media weren't so intent on publishing the demeaning things. They talk to five or six soldiers and say morale is low. They show demonstration after demonstration of those who don't support war.

Do any of us really want war? I don't think so.

But there are millions of people who want freedom and peace and know that we have to defend the United Nations decisions. WE don't see a lot of that on the media. So, as I send this, I ask for your support of what is happening in the Gulf. War is not right...it never will be, but it is a part of our lives and we can't make it disappear. So, pray for a peaceful solution, but support whatever happens because the men and women

who serve the country are doing it for us. We chose the Commander and Chief and therefore must bear the trials of such. We didn't ask for a war but we have to support it. There are hundreds of thousands of families separated because of this crisis and I feel that knowing they have the American people behind them would certainly help; so I ask this if you, my family and friends, support whatever happens and show it. They really

need us behind them." Mrs. Willis is teaching at the local Dodds School in Mannheim, Germany and awaiting the return of her husband. Their daughter, Kari Beach, whose husband, Jack, is also in Saudi

Arabia, working at the Officers Club. System at Ansbach, Germany and their son, Duane Willis, is in college: at the University of Maryland in Munich, Germany. Mrs. Garrett also has a granddaugh-

ter whose husband is also in the Gulf region, she hopes that some of you will write to any soldier.



Gather all your 1990 tax in-Typical documents that you'll need include forms such as W. 2's, 1099's, and K-1's (from partnerships, S corporations, etc.) You'll also need to check your records for alimony paid or received, unempployment or social security benefits received, rental income and expenses, retirement plan contributions, job-related expenses, estimated taxes paid and child or dependent care expenses. If you're in doubt about the relevance of any piece of information in your files, take it with you to your tax appointment and ask your accountant about it. Remember, curity numbers for any dependents you'll be claiming

Get details on items you think might apply to you (such as the earned income credit if you are a low-income working parent). Also, while you're gathering your own tax information, check the filing requirements for your children. If any of them is required to file

a return, pull together that in

formation at the same time. If you cannot gather all your tax information in time for the April 15 filing deadline, you can get an automatic four month extension to file by filing Form 4868 by April 15. This is only an extension of time to file your return, not an extension of time to pay your tax bill. You are required to estimate any tax you still owe
