Hood Bomb Squad rendered pipe bombs harmless. There was a quality of unreality about the whole thing...it wasn't until I was safely in my bed that night that I really had a chance to think how strange it was to be crouching in a wet ditch just for the chance to take pictures.

Years ago I was standing talking to a law officer while a shooting suspect was holed up in a near by house.

The sudden "pop" of a .22 rifle sent me scurrying for cover...and the law officer was right alongside of me as we dove for the back side of a car.

There wasn't time to think about whether that shot was aimed at us or not...instinct took over.

Exploding paint cans, ammunition going off in burning houses, butane tanks getting hotter and hotter next to structures that were ablaze, those have become common place long ago.

My husband has been right along with me on many of these ventures...in fact, he was the one on hand when they caught the last bank robber over near Blossom.

But he says he'll pass on going to the Middle East.

Personally, I'd still like to go over there. Unfortunately, Thunder Prairie Publishing's budget doesn't extend to financing the trip.

Oh well, as usual, all the big boys get to have all the fun!

## Local Sales Taxes Up, Sharp Says Economy Improving

"This month's local sales tax rebates are positive proof that our Texas economy is steadily improving," Comptroller John Sharp said Monday.

Sharp announced today that his office this month sent checks totaling \$91 million to the cities and counties across Texas that collect sales taxes.

Blossom received \$563.95 for this

period, for a 7.73% increase while Deport received no payment this period.

Paris received \$190,206.78 for a 1.875% increase.

Bogata received \$1,637.79, for a 2.18% increase while Clarksville received \$13,911.24 for a .36% increase.

Mt. Pleasant received \$100,857.17

for a 10.20% increase.

Talco received no payment for this period, marking a 16.83% decrease.

"A good portion of that increase is due to Texas' stronger economy, but some of the rise is because more cities collect sales tax this year than did last year. A few other cities have also increased their local tax rates which makes for higher rebate checks from the state," Sharp said.

I want to preface this letter by saying that it isn't intended as a criticism of ANY rural post office...they are indispensable to those of us in the weekly newspaper business...they are always helpful in the extreme, and they do their job wonderfully well.

No, it's the big wheels of government (like those impersonal faces that made such a big deal over "The" in front of this paper's name) that this letter is directed at. I suspect smaller town post masters and employees are caught up in those slowly grinding, impersonal government wheels more than any of us.

This letter was sent in to the Texas Press Association Messengerby Dave and Q'Zella Lewis, publishers of the Celina Record, it hits many a nail square on the head, folks.

Please permit me to construct the following scenario for your consideration: You are the owner of a store that sells gasoline. Congress passes a law that requires you to buy all of your gasoline from Bob's Refinery, Inc., to be delivered by Bob's trucks, at whatever price Bob cares to charge. You have no choice, other than quitting business. Each time fuel is delivered, you pay Bob's Refinery, Inc. Sometimes the trucks are late, and your good customers get mad at you. You complain, but nobody at Bob's Refinery can really do anything about it. You're stuck since you have to use Bob's services.

One day you turn on the radio and hear a one-minute advertisement for one of your competitors' gasoline stations who does not have to buy from Bob. But the commercial is paid for by Bob's Refinery. You switch stations and there is yet another commercial for your competitor, paid for

by Bob's Refinery. You stagger home, flop down in your chair and turn on the TV. There's a high dollar commercial on national television hyping your competitor...again paid for by Bob's Refinery!

The next day you call Bob and ask him to do a plug for you.

"Sorry" Bob say "I can't do that. We only spend advertising money with those who don't have to buy our products. By the way...we need you to pay in advance before we deliver your gasoline. Oh, another thing. We're going up on the price, but don't expect better service."

By now I'm sure most people have figured out this isn't a fairy tale. It is exactly what we second-class mailers deal with every issue. Only the United States Postal Service may deliver second-class material. USPS in turn takes our money and busy radio and viewing time from media that are in direct competition with us!

The Lewis' letter continues to Texas Press about what should be done about this. But I agree with them. If you think your stamps are going up...you should see our postage! And, as is to often the case in today's world, the only price breaks are structured by the postal service to benefit those companies and papers with HUGE mailing amounts...the little fellows are suffering the most.

That's bad enough, but every time I see those ads on TV I think about the fact that it's MY money (and yours, too, by the way) going to pay for those ads...on media that puts nothing back into our local communities.

Thanks for listening while I got that off my chest!

The Dean's honor list recognizes the scholastic achievement of students with a grade point average between 3.5 and 3.9.

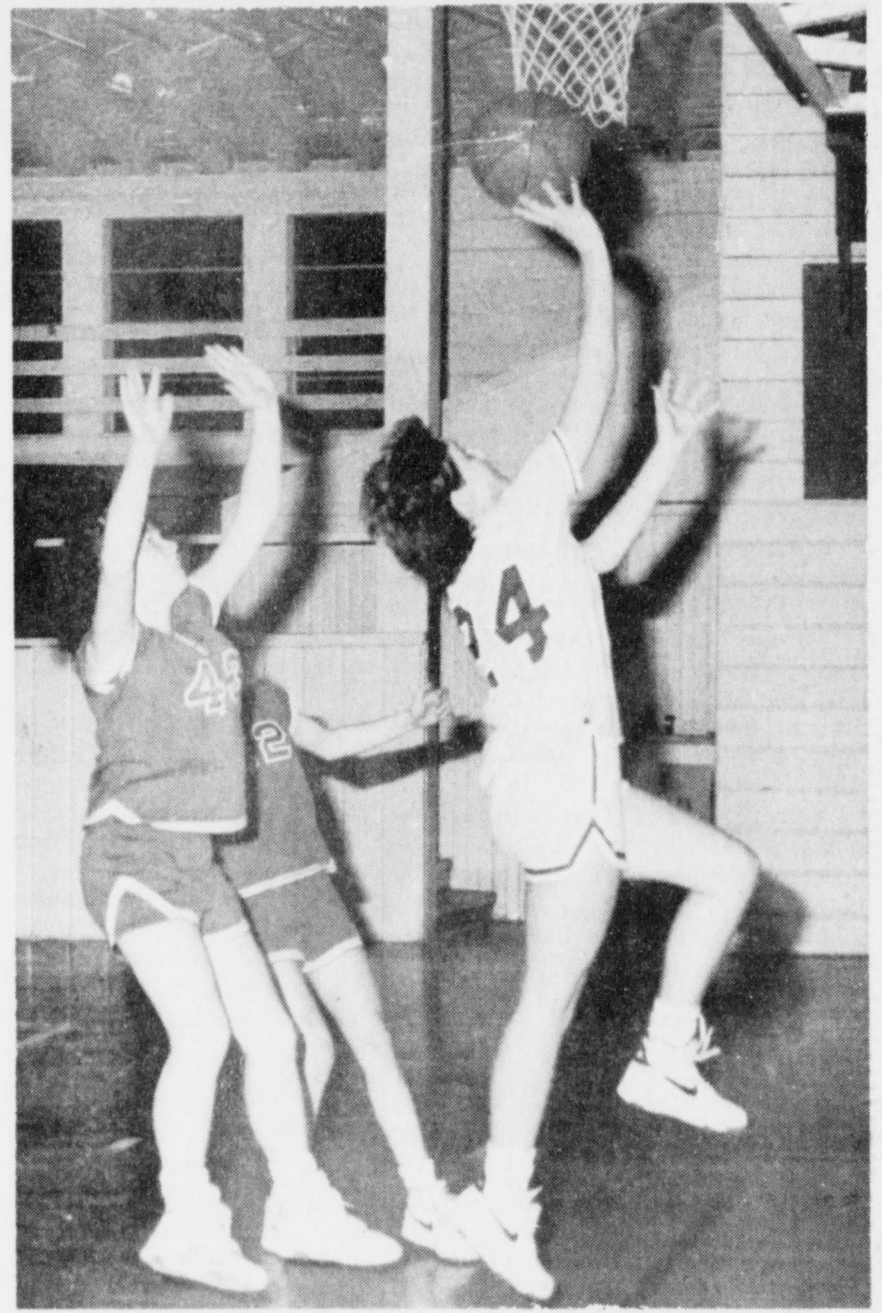

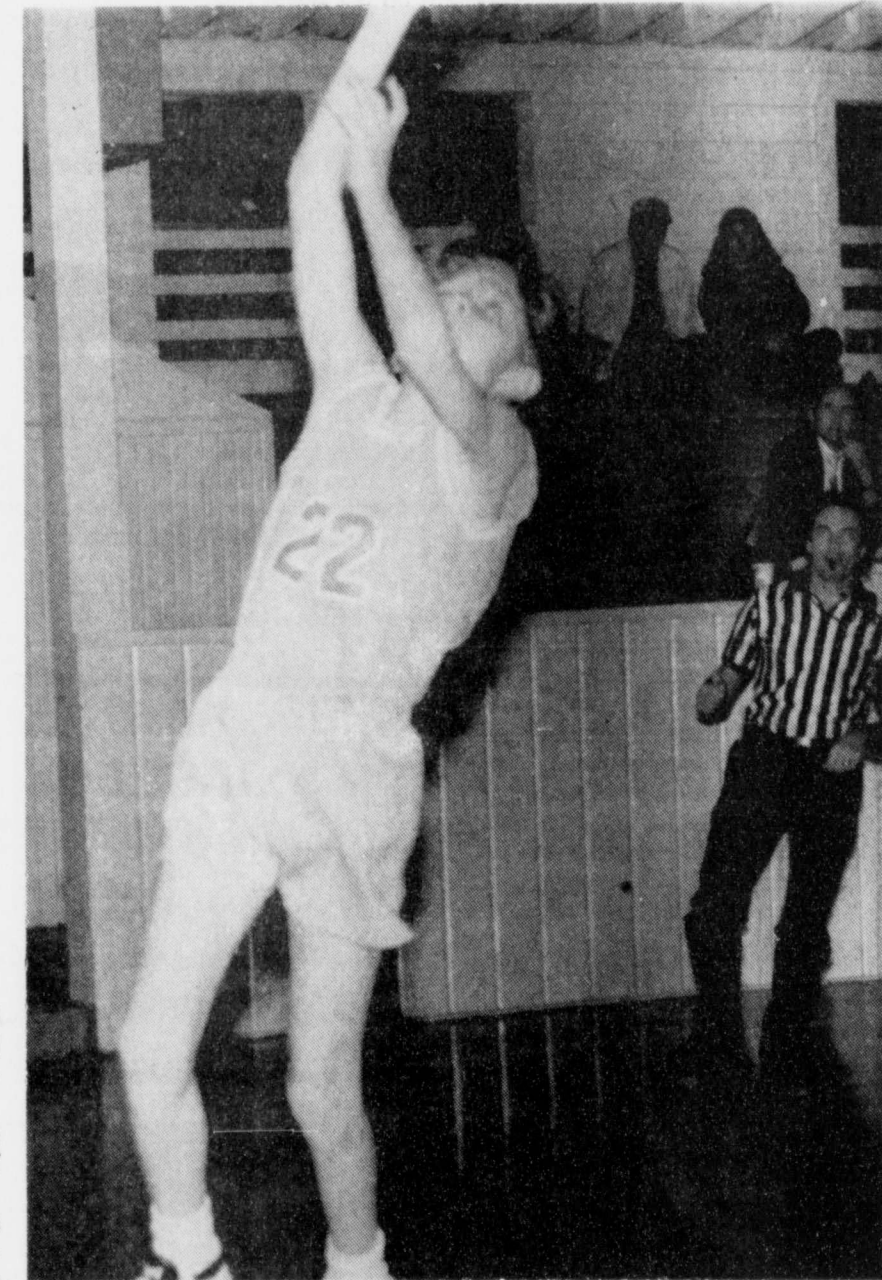

Country Cooking is being shared this week from the kitchen of Marlin and Billie Foster of Deport. Being married 40 years, Marlin and Billie have lived these years in the Deport area. They have one son, Morris, daughter-in-law, Ginger and two grandchildren, Jill, age 9 and Alison, age 5, of Bogata. Both Marlin and Billie are active members of the First Baptist Church in Deport.

Billie's occupation carries her to the cafeteria at Deport Elementary School each morning where she helps prepare meals for the children and staff. She has worked there for 15 years and enjoys every minute of it.

Not only does Billie love to cook, but she always enjoys working in her yard, canning fruits and vegetables and growing a big garden. Since Marlin has retired from Uarco, he now has time to help with the yard, the garden, help cook breakfast at the church for the community occasionally, and keep the dishes washed for Billie. He showed his dishwasher hands, something I rarely see.

Billie gets enjoying from baking goodies and taking them to friends and family. She also enjoys baking

cakes for her family birthdays and special holidays during the year.

Her friends especially enjoy her picante sauce, green tomato pickles and cucumber pickles. Morris always asks for three gallons of pickles to take to the deer camp every year. Among these favorites, she also cans chow-chow, kraut, beets, pepper sauce, all kinds of jellies and pickled okra. Billie will be happy to share any of these recipes with you if you will call her. The beets are the favorite of Marlin's mother and roommate at the nursing home. Billie sent a jar of the picante sauce and pickled tomatoes home with me.

Billie also enjoys collecting recipes. She cuts out every recipe from the newspapers and tries each one at least one time.

Billie chose to share her own original arrangement of Strawberry Pie, her pickle recipe, barbeque sauce recipe, the scalloped ham and potatoes and her Mexican cornbread.

### Strawberry Pie

8 oz. pkg cream cheese (room temp.)  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 1/2 c powdered sugar  
Whip cheese; add sugar and vanilla, continuing to whip until fluffy. Pour into a baked pie shell (I use graham cracker crust). Let set for a while, then blend the following and pour over cheese mixture.

1/2 pint whipping cream, whipped  
1/3 cup powdered sugar (or granulated)  
1 c or more of sliced, drained strawberries  
1/2 cup pecans, chopped  
Chill before serving.

### Kosher Dill Pickles

Wash and clean cucumbers really good. Use a vegetable brush. To each quart jar, add:  
1 head of dill  
2 or 3 cloves of garlic  
1 pod hot pepper  
fresh firm cucumbers  
Bring to a boil:  
2 quarts water  
1 quart white distilled vinegar  
1 cup canning salt (non-iodized)  
Pour hot solution over pickles and seal. Pickles will be ready in 3 to 4 weeks.

### Scalloped Ham & Potatoes

6 serving sliced ham 1/2" thick  
6 or 8 medium potatoes peeled and thinly sliced  
1 cup chopped onion  
salt and pepper  
1 cup grated cheddar cheese (or 1 can cheddar cheese soup)  
1 can 10 1/2 oz. cream of celery soup  
Put half the ham, potatoes and onions

in slow cooker, sprinkle with salt and pepper, then half of grated cheese. Repeat layers. Spread undiluted soup evenly over top so air does not reach potatoes, sprinkle with paprika and cook on low for eight hours (or on high for four hours) or until tender. You can also cook in oven at 375 for 45 minutes to an hour or until done.

### Barbeque sauce

1 cup catsup  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire  
1 teaspoon red pepper or paprika  
1 tablespoon brown sugar  
1 tablespoon liquid smoke  
1/2 cup water and salt

Mix all together and pour over meat and cook until done. If you use cooked roast, cook the sauce on top of stove for about 30 minutes before pouring over it, then cook in oven for 30 or 45 minutes.

### Mexican Cornbread

1 1/2 cups meal  
1/2 cup flour  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1 1/4 cups sweet milk  
1 egg  
1/4 cup oil  
1 cup shredded cheese  
1 cup corn  
1 can 4 1/2 oz. chopped green chilies, drained  
1 teaspoon salt

Combine dry ingredients, add milk, egg and oil. Mix just until dry ingredients are moist. Stir in cheese, chilies and corn and spread into greased 8 or 9 inch pan and bake at 425 for 20 to 25 minutes.

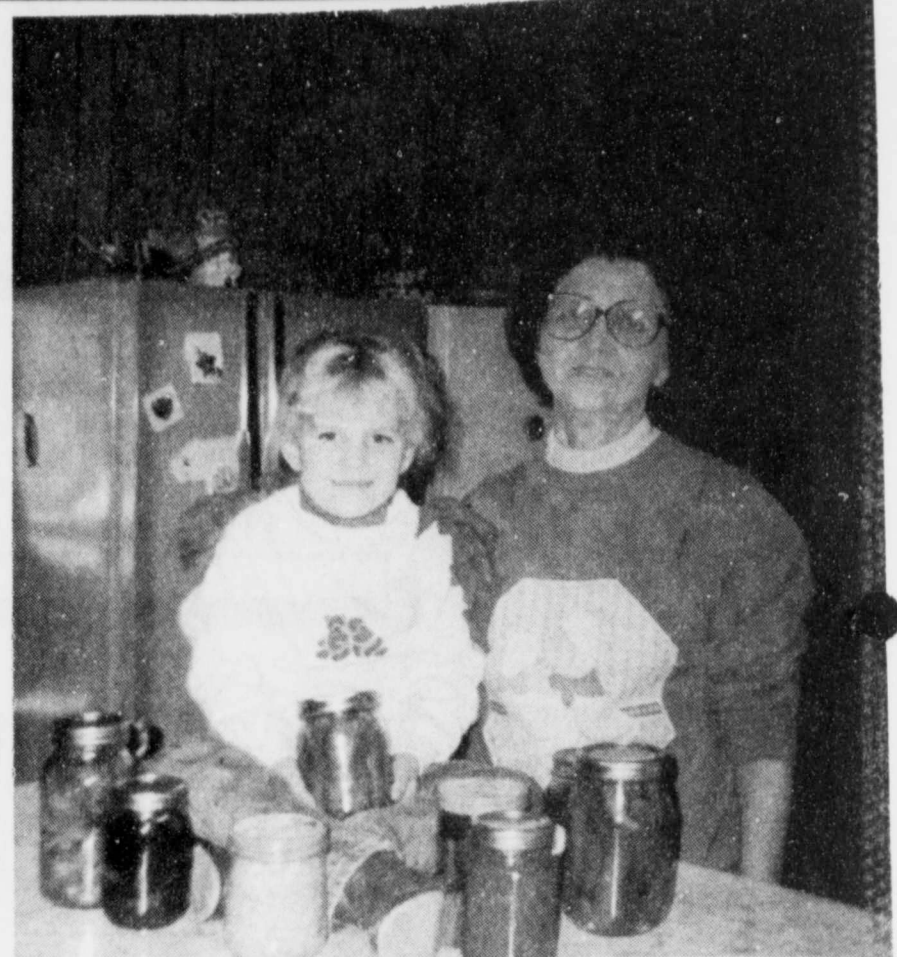

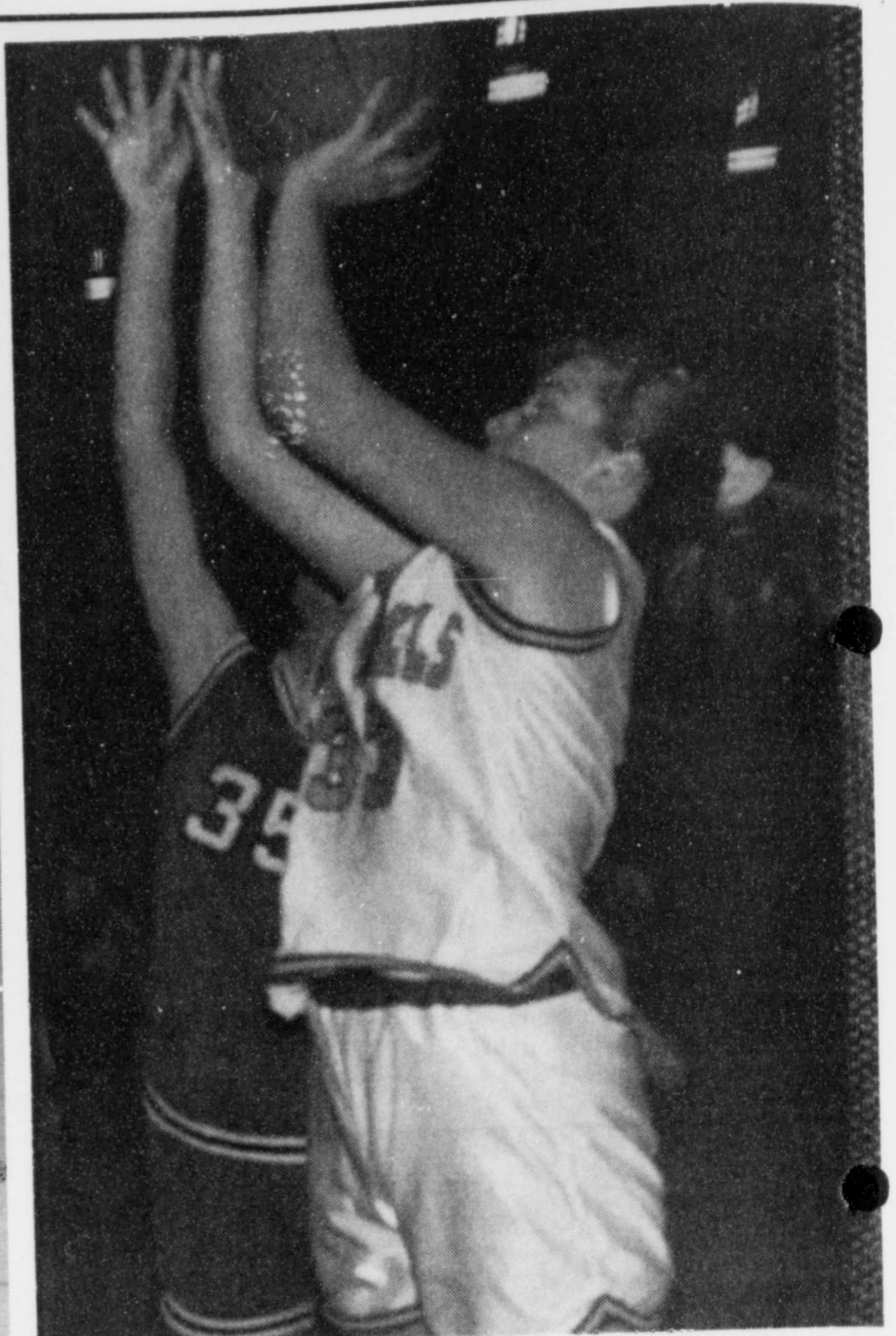

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# Couple Braves Cold Weather, To Ride Trails

Five years ago, before Murl and Johnny Hawks took up trail riding, about the only thing they had in common was that she was a good cook and he liked to eat.

Now, with their equestrian avocation, they spend quality time together every weekend or on week-long excursions. They also make friends with other trail riders.

The Hawks ride Missouri Foxtrot-

ters, horses that are known for their smooth gait and fox-like walking pattern. Like the fox, the horses place their hind hooves into the same grooves that their front hooves make, leaving only two hoof prints.

"You can ride Foxotters for a long time. They don't wear out easily, and because of their smooth gait, you don't bounce around," Murl said.

Before taking up riding, Murl didn't

know much about horses. She began riding only five years ago, after she and Johnny married. "I was from Arlington and moving out here and learning to ride a horse was quite a change for me," she said. "My kids are still in awe that I actually ride a horse, regardless of the weather. It's like I'm always saying "chalk one up for old Grandma" to them.

Deciding to saddle up, it didn't take the couple long to acquire their string of horses.

"The first time we rode, I got a horse I kept for the grandkids and

borrowed one from my son to ride. We rode out around Plum Creek and after that," he said, "we went off to Missouri for some Foxotters, where I bought her a mare. After that we went to Big Bend and just graduated up," he said.

"We'd see a horse we liked and get it. Then we'd see another horse and get it. We now have 14 horses. We've sold some but we still have 14."

From Big Bend to Taos, NM to Casper, Wyoming and Mountain View, AR, the two ride their fancy stepping Foxotters. Of all their rides, they said Big Bend was the most difficult.

"It was cold and rocky. It was also the first week-long ride I had been on, so I had a lot of butterflies. We went on top of a mountain where it was cold, cold. Then, Johnny's horse broke down and we had to go back to get another. After that, a norther blew in, brrrr! On top of that, everything at Big Bend has a thorn in it!" she said.

Regardless of the cold, rain or wind they say the riding is worth the wrath of Mother Nature.

"The best thing about trail riding is that you get off the highways," Johnny said. "You see beautiful country you can't see from highways. There are beautiful streams, rivers and waterfalls. You just can't imagine how pretty it is, unless you backpack or

ride a horse, you can't get back into these places," he said.

"It's good having a husband and wife can do together. So many people go on trail rides. We see them and it's like a reunion each time. We become close friends," she said.

The Hawks would like to see more Foxotter interest develop in the area.

"The horses are not real common in this area. Mostly quarter horses are around here. It's hard to trail ride with quarter horses because Foxotters have a faster gait," she said.

The average week-long ride costs around \$135 per person, which includes hook-ups, a barn for the horse, an meals. Equestrians ride during the day, then come back into a centrally located camp at night.

"We don't like to camp out. We bring our camper," he said.

The Hawks belong to several organizations that plan and give out trail ride information. They belong to the Southwest Chapter of the Missouri Foxotter Organization, the Oklahoma Equestrians, the Central Texas Riders, and Trail Riders as well as many local riding clubs.

Johnny is the son of the late Mrs. Hattie Hawks. His wife, Murl, is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Hancock of Bogata. He is a nephew of Mrs. Vera Craddock of Bogata.

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

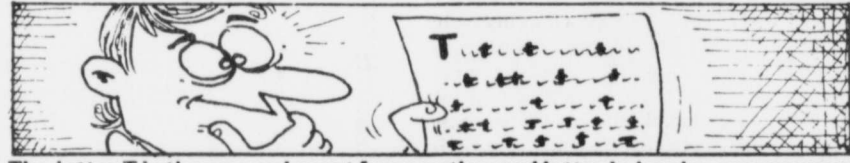

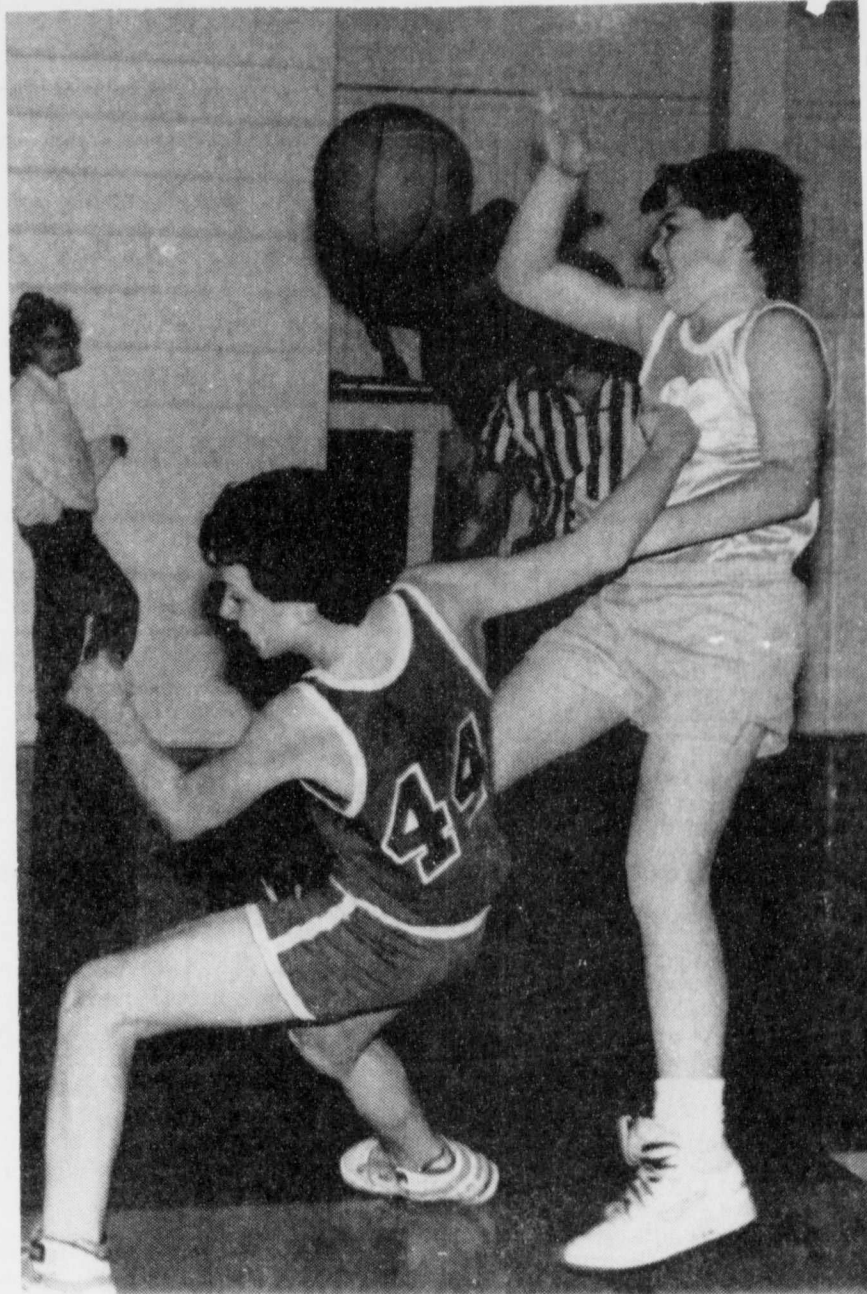

### Now Is The Time To Control Garden Soil Insects

Insects such as cutworms, white grubs and wireworms can destroy garden transplants, seeds or seedlings as they begin to grow, says an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Garden sites should be treated now to control these soil insects," said Dr. James Robinson. "It is important to treat the soil in advance of planting to allow the insecticide sufficient time to dissipate and work prior to planting."

"The primary insecticide used for soil treatment in gardens is diazinon," Robinson said. "It can be applied as a wettable powder, granules or liquid. Label directions should be closely followed for application rates. After application, the material should be incorporated three to six inches into the soil."

"This application of insecticide should also help suppress fire ants in the garden site," Robinson said.
