Armed Forces Recruitment Slightly Up In Spite Of War

The ribbons of yellow or red, white and blue flutter in the breezes. Flags fly on pole and porch.

Most people want to show their support for U.S. Troops in the Persian Gulf War in some way. Others want to become U.S. Troops!

Calls to local recruiters revealed that on a local level recruitment is up very slightly.

Calls to the Dallas area branches of the service revealed that on a Nation-Wide level recruitment was up slightly.

Major Tracy of the U.S. Marines reported that "Nation wide we exceeded our goal for enlistments for the month of January."

The major continued that "generally January is a very good month to recruit."

"Many people have expressed the Gulf War is a primary motivation to their enlistment. Many others simply see the Marines as a means to advancing themselves and achieving goals."

Major Tracy also said that according to these figures people "certainly weren't avoiding enlistment because

of the fighting".

Petty Officer Alan Baribeau of the Dallas Navy Recruiting Office did not have national figures available. He did have figures for Northeast Texas, however.

He stated that in August through December of 1989 the Navy signed up 873, 103% of their goal for that time period. In the same time frame for 1990 they signed up 684 in the Northeast Texa area...114% of their goal. Although the numbers were down, the percentage was up. This was because Navy recruitment figures depend on how retention is going in the fleet. "If more are staying in we need to recruit less" Officer Baribeau said.

"Also", he said, "we recruited a higher quality of people. Our aptitude scores and number of high school graduates was way up."

As a "sidebar" to his statements he said that Pety Officer James Patterson, who is in the Paris Navy Recruiting office, was "one of our best people and we are lucky to have

him".

In January, he continued, the Navy's goal for this area was set at 107 and they actually recruited 108, so once more the Gulf War is not deterring people from joining up.

Mary Ann Phillips, Public Affairs officer for Army Recruiting in North and Central Texas, says that from October through December of 1990 enlistments are down from the previous year about 12%. However, she continues that inquiries are up.

"Many of these are people with prior military experience who because of one reason or another (age, etc.) aren't qualified". She also continued that there was a definite feeling of patriotism causing many to inquire. No figures were available for the month of January..

Sgt. William Perry of the Air Force reported that the Gulf crisis hasn't made much difference in their recruiting. "We are getting about a 200% upswing in inquiries" he did say. Perry continued that a feeling of intense patriotism was evident in these inquiries.

Dodd, Russell Win In Essay Contest

On Monday, February 11, Melissa Dodd attended the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District's board meeting at City Hall in Clarksville. A portion of that meeting was devoted to announcing Soil and Water Conservation essay winners.

High school students from Red River County schools submitted essays up to 300 words in length on the subject "Soil and Water Conserva-

tion".

Students from Rivercrest who were invited to attend were Melissa Dodd, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sim Edd Dodd of Johntown and Jerilyn Russell of Talco, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Russell.

Melissa was named first place winner and was awarded \$25.00 and Jerilyn received an Honorable Mention Certificate.

Pictures depicting scenes from the book and a replica of a covered wagon were displayed on a quilt-covered table as Mrs. Liles related several interesting events from the book. The book is about a 700-mile trip in an ox drawn covered wagon which the widowed

Rebecca made in 1851 with her six children from Tennessee to Blossom Prairie between Rugby and Detroit.

Mrs. Liles introduced Mrs. Betty Denison and her grandson, Dru, a sixth grade student of Bogata Junior High, who are descendants of Rebecca Walpole Garner. Mrs. Liles was accompanied by her husband, Dr. John Liles.

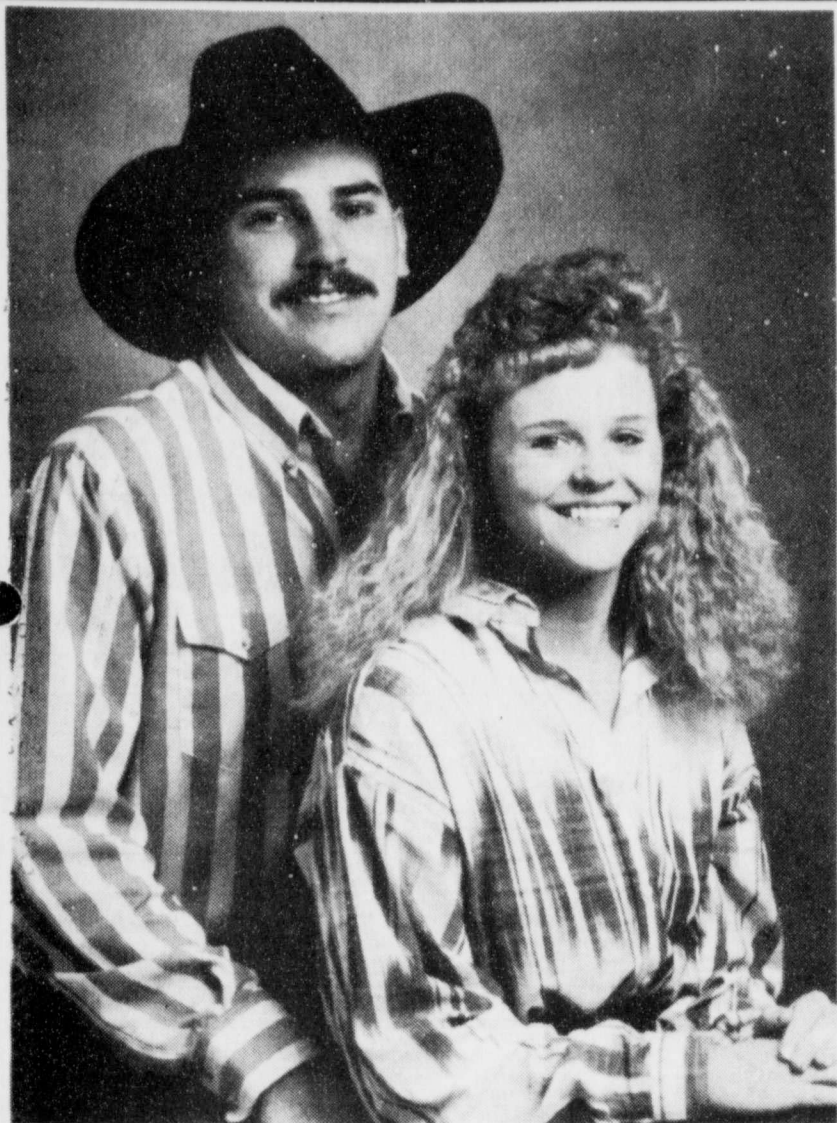

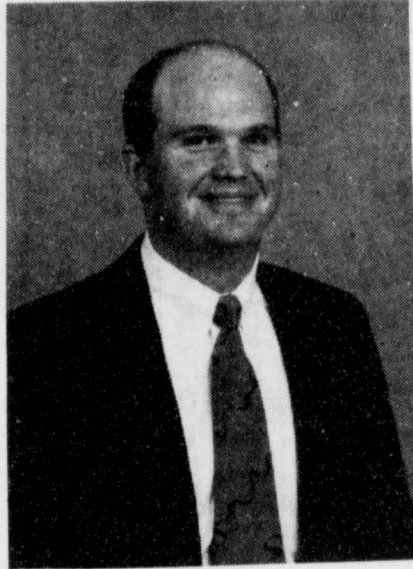
Latimers Celebrate 50th Anniversary

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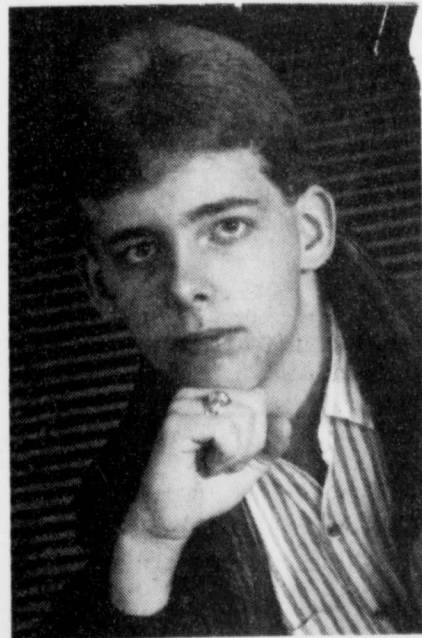

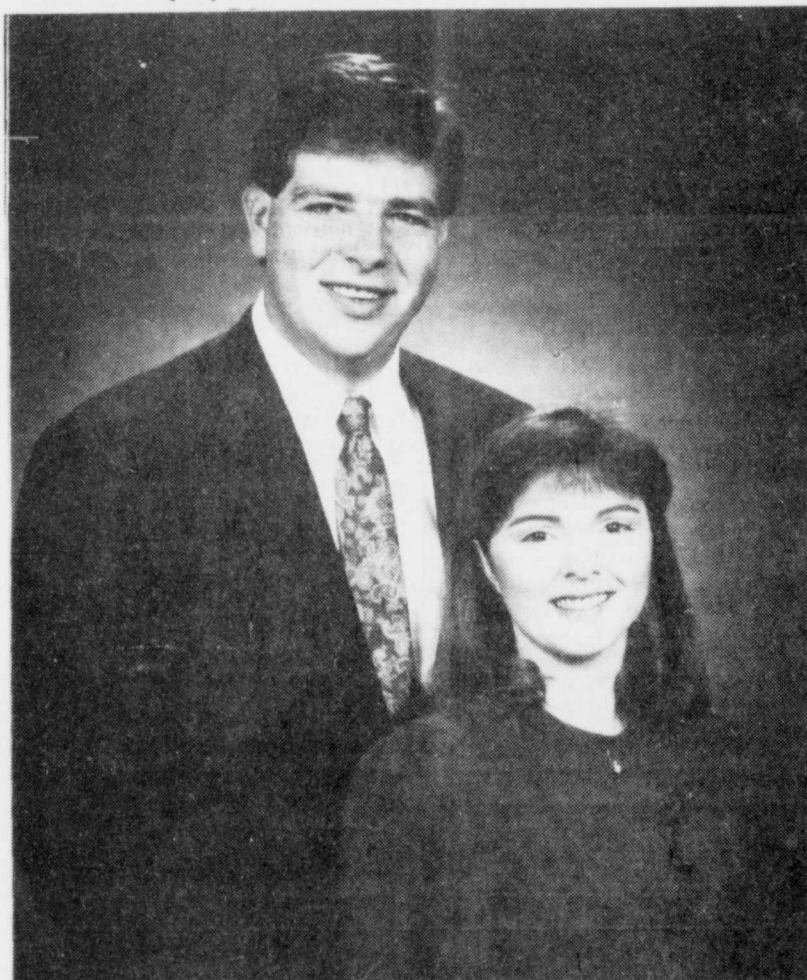
Dodd Nominated For Award

Going into the third quarter play junior Lana Pirtle could not miss. The Lady Rebels held Cooper to only four points with Rivercrest leading 39-26.

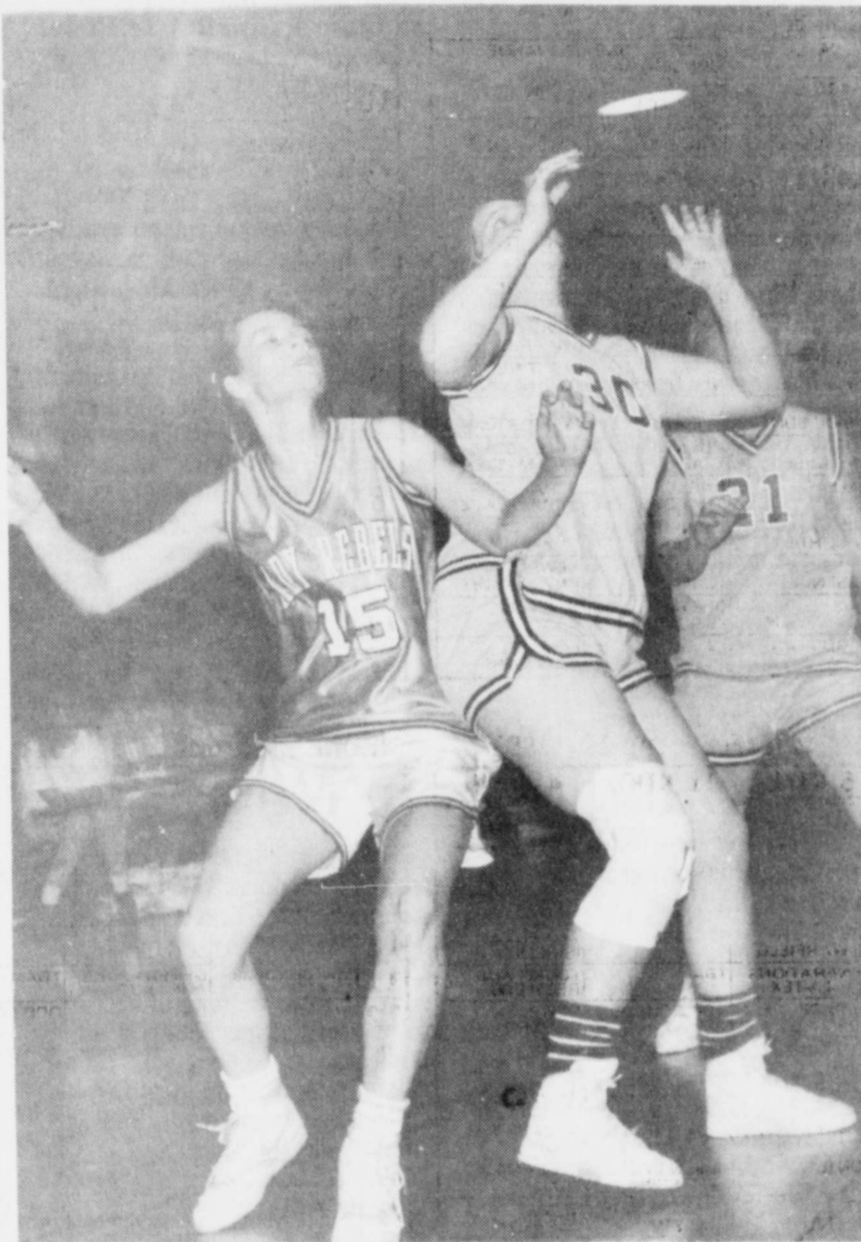

The last time the girls were in the Area play offs was in 1984-85 according to Coach Wake Wood.

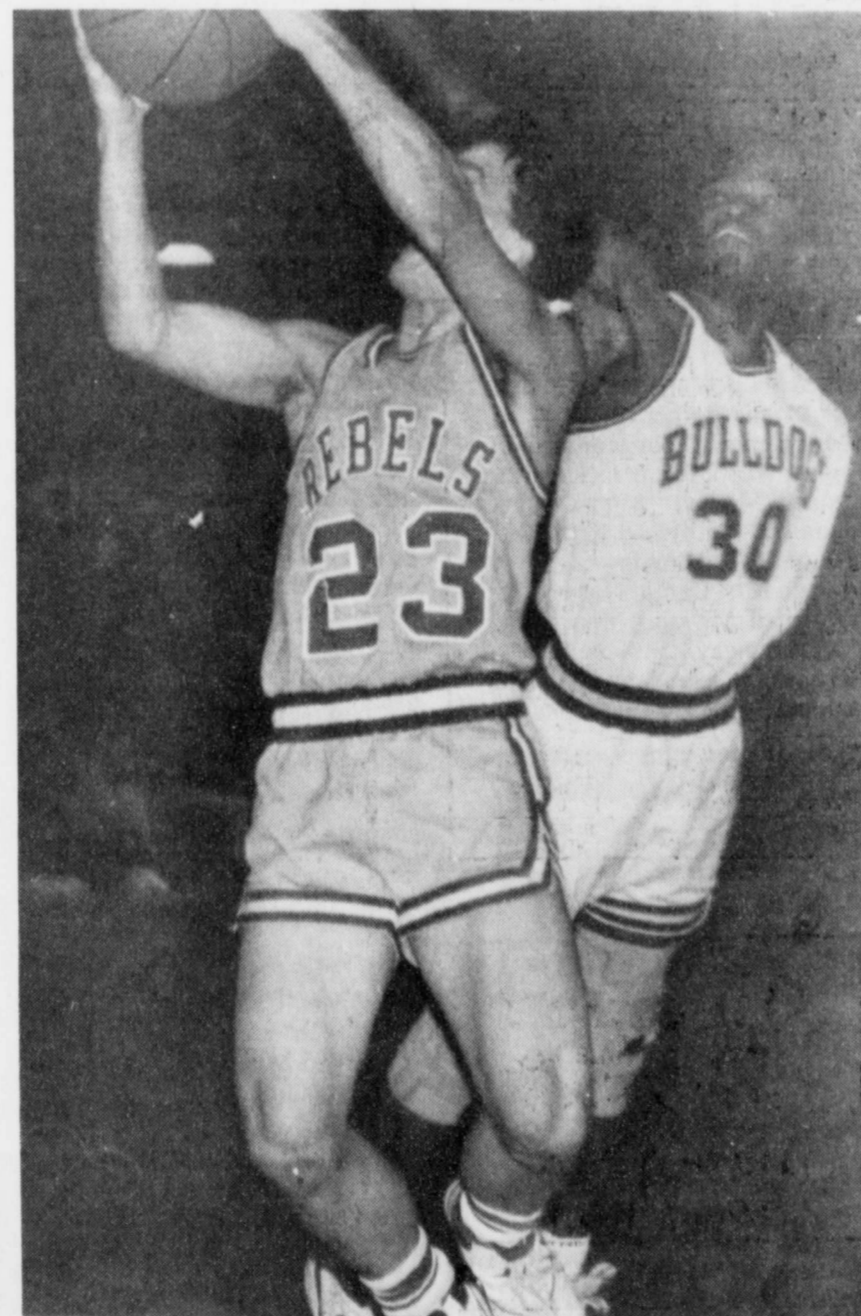

Epsilon Mu Chapter, Delta Kappa Gamma Meets

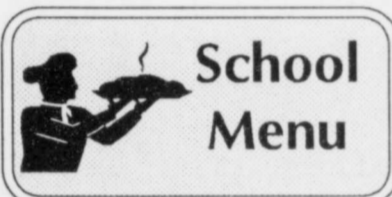
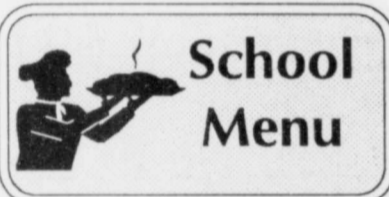

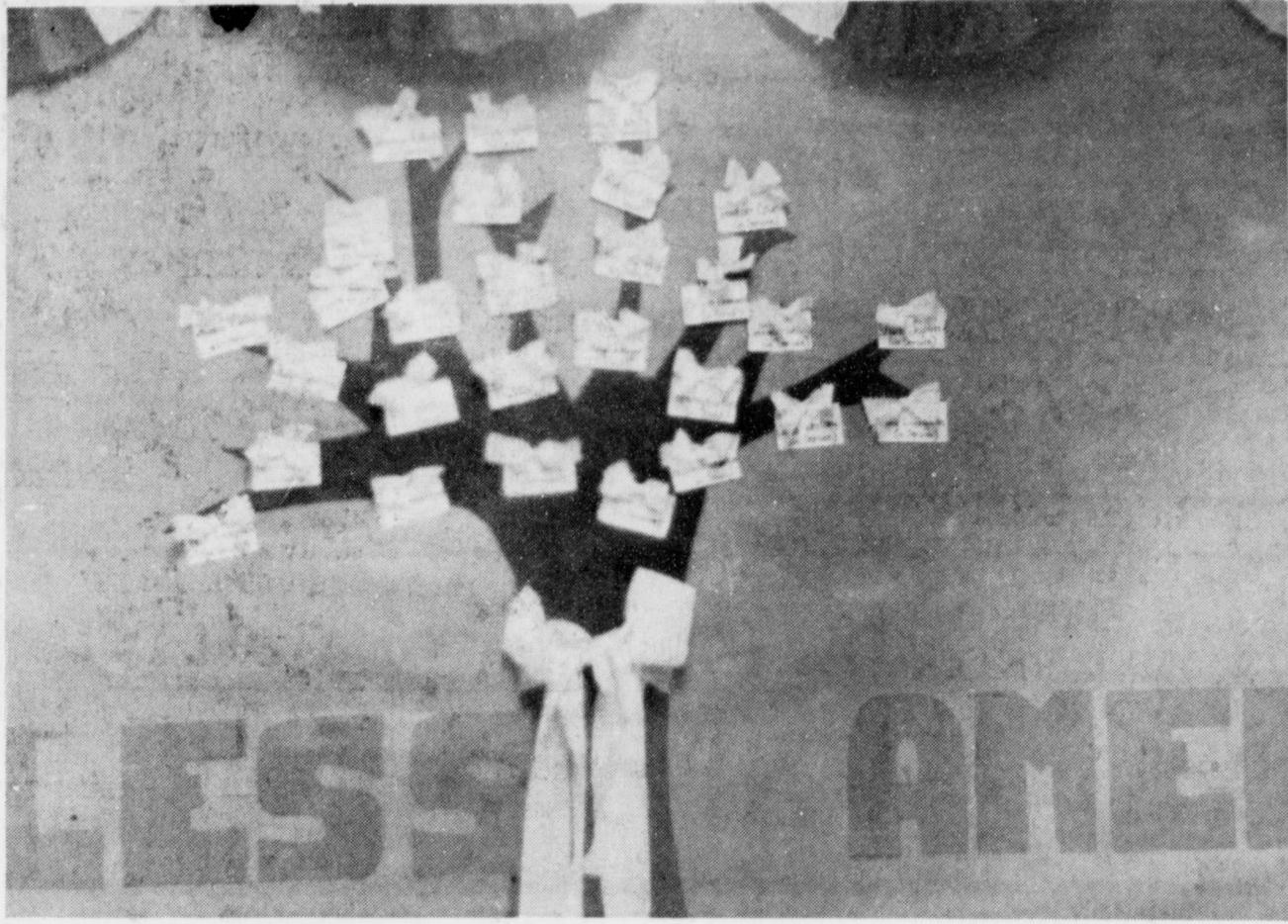
