Familiar Faces

Mrs. Lucy Holder has taught several generations of children in the Bogata area. She was in the educational system for 43 years until her retirement from Rivercrest in 1970.

Mrs. Holder was born March 14, 1903 to Dr. and Mrs. Robert Jones of Rosalie. She attended school at Rosali and graduated from Clarksville High in 1921. It was her grandmother's idea for her to go to college. At that time, a woman was very limited on the career ladder. About the only thing a woman could be then was a teacher, a nurse or a secretary. Lucily for everyone, Mrs. Holder chose to become a teacher.

Her first teaching job she was barely older than her students. To look more mature, she wore a switch in her hair. She doesn't know if the appearance of the switch worked, but she did have to use it occasionally. With the first paycheck she received, she bought a dress, a hat, a coat, and a pair of shoes, the only time she has bought a complete new outfit at one time.

In 1935 she married Sam Holder. They were married for 50 years until

his death in 1985. Together they had two sons, Dr. Bob Holder of Baytown and Dr. Sam Holder of Linden. She has five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Not only has Mrs. Holder been a teacher, but for a time she was the principal at Johntown during World War II. Of the two, Mrs. Holder likes teaching better. She enjoyed teaching teenagers above all the students she taught. Her favorite subject is Science. Of the different generations, she saw through her students, she feels that human nature doesn't change, only surroundings do.

Every fall, Mrs. Holder still has the urge to go back to school. Looking back on her career she says, "The most vivid memories are those of B.H.S. Those were happy years. I sometimes wonder how much I really taught. I hope my ex-students know that I tried, that I loved them, and that I am always interested in their lives."

Somehow I think they know what a wonderful person and teacher, Mrs. Holder, is.

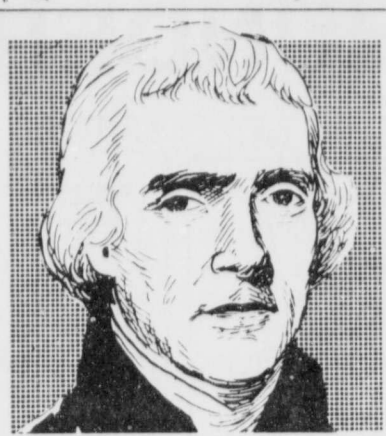
Trimm is responsible for supervising, training, coordinating and relaying both national procedure and state committee policy to ASCS county committees and county office personnel. The counties in Northeast

March Rebates Rise Moderately From 1990

"We're sending more than \$229 million in local sales tax revenue back to local government today, money that they can use to better serve the consumers who paid the money in the first place," State Comptroller John Sharp said today.

Statewide, monthly checks to city and county governments totaled \$81.9 million, 6.2% more than last March's checks. Quarterly payments to mass transit authorities added up to \$146.9 million, a 5.6% increase over the \$139 million forwarded to them last year at this time.

"While the state's economy continues to grow at a faster rate than the U.S. economy, Texas is feeling the slowing effect of the national recession," Sharp said. "That's why statewide sales tax allocations this month increased moderately."

Blossom received \$1,085.59 for this period, an increase of 32.92% over last year's payment of \$616.52.

Deport received no payment this period for a 14.47% decrease over last year's total payments to date.

Paris received \$140,126.86 for a .10% decrease.

Bogata received \$1,374.17 for this period, for a 14.03% increase over total payments for the same period last year.

Clarksville received \$11,591.29 for a 1.57% increase while Detroit received no payment for this period.

Mt. Pleasant received \$151,3512.00 for a 26.78% increase over last year's payment of \$78,248.37.

Talco received \$1,070.12 for a 9.31% decrease over last year's payment of \$1,385.28.

Houston received \$12.6 million, the largest payment in the state. Dallas received the second largest payment, \$7.2 million. San Antonio's check for \$4.2 million was the third largest in the state and Austin followed with \$3.8 million.

Voters of 105 of Texas' 254 counties have approved collection of the 1/2 percent county sales tax, while voters in Uvalde County have approved an additional 1/2 percent tax for county health services. Last March, only 100 counties collected sales tax.

GTE-Contel Merger In Telecommunications Closing

GTE and Contel today announced the closing of their \$6.6 billion merger, the largest in telecommunications history. The merged company becomes the largest and most geographically diverse U.S.-based local telephone company.

According to Kent B. Foster, president of GTE Telephone Operations, some integration plans will be implemented in the very near future and others will occur over the next two years.

The most critical element of the merger planning process was to ensure that customers of both GTE and Contel continue to enjoy excellent telephone service during this transition. Also, great effort has been taken to minimize any changes in the way customers interact with the combined company.

Foster also announced that the 40 states where GTE now operates following the merger will be divided into four operating areas, west, north, south and central, and 18 regions. The Central Area is in Irving, which will also continue to be the site of GTE Telephone Operations' national headquarters. Announcements on senior management positions for the headquarters staff and four operating areas will be made within the next week.

GTE Telephone Operations is the largest of GTE's three business groups and, with the addition of the Contel properties, now provides service to more than 18 million access lines in 40 states and two foreign countries. GTE Telephone Operations has 115,000 employees and had revenues of \$15.1 billion in 1990.

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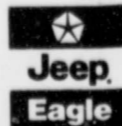
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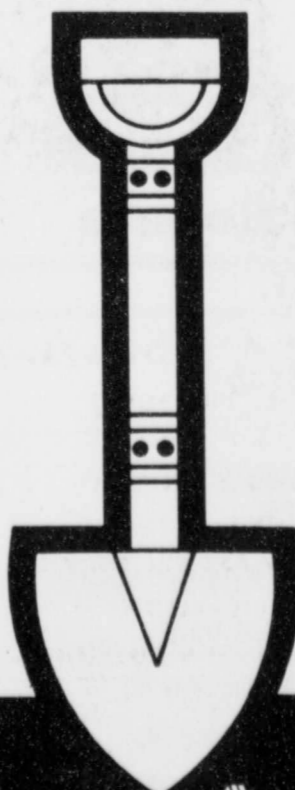
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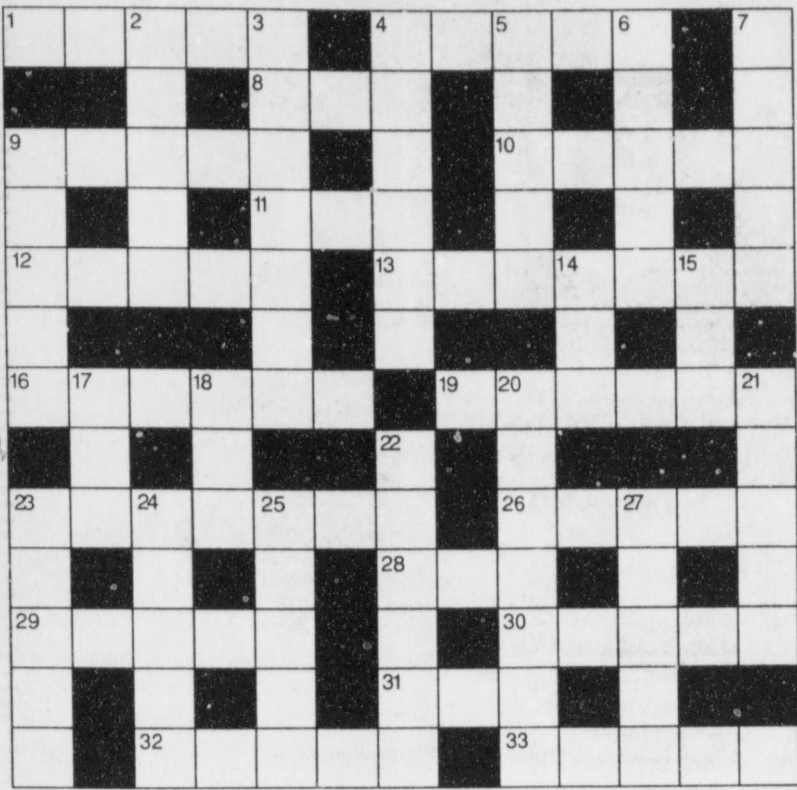

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Social Security Notes

January has always seemed to me to be a serious time of the year. Maybe it's the winter landscape or the long hours of darkness that put me in a serious mood. Probably it's just thinking about my income taxes that does it.

Certainly W-2 forms deserve sober thinking. All those tax entries, Federal taxes, state taxes and what's this one, Social Security taxes? Enough already.

Well, I won't try to explain any of your other taxes, but I can help you understand what your Social Security taxes do for you.

Today, you're working and paying Social security taxes. But tomorrow may be a different story. Some people plan for their retirement, but not very many of us give enough thought to what would happen if we become

disabled. Or what would happen to our family if we should die.

That's why it's important for you to know that your Social Security taxes are paying for a lot more than just retirement benefits. In fact, you could think of your Social security taxes a premium on a potentially valuable

insurance plan. Besides retirement, Social Security also pays Medicare, survivors benefits and disability benefits.

You can get details with a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement from Social Security. It will provide an estimate of what you've paid in. Your statement will have a year-by-year breakout of your earnings under Social Security, and you will also get estimates of the Social Security benefits due you or your survivors.

To get your personal statement, call your local Social Security office and ask for Form 7004. You will need to complete the form and mail it back. In a few weeks, you will have your own statement. From it, you'll be able to get a good picture of what part Social Security will play in your financial future. Remember, this is a free service.

I can't promise that you'll learn to like paying Social Security taxes, but I think you'll mind paying them a bit less. That's doing some serious thinking.

What do children and taxes have in common? You will have them both for the rest of your life.
In past years, parents could shift some of their income to their children, and that income would be taxed at lower rates if the children were in lower tax brackets than the parents. But, alas, the IRS caught on and the passage of the "kiddie tax" curtailed the practice of transferring income-producing assets to utilize the children's lower brackets. If a child's investment income in 1991 exceeds \$1,000, the excess will be taxed at the parent's highest tax rate.
Your child must file a 1990 tax return if his total income (earned and unearned) is more than \$500. If your child has only earned income (wages), he or she will not have to file if wages did not exceed \$3,250. These amounts increase to \$550 and \$3,400 for 1991. Of course, a return should be filed if a refund is due the child.
Your child is responsible for filing his own return. If he can't file for any reason (such as age), it is your responsibility to file a return on your child's behalf.
If you can claim your child as a dependent on your tax return, your child cannot claim himself on his tax return. However, the child is still entitled to his own standard deduction. This amount varies depending on the nature of the child's income.
In cases of divorce, the custodial parent may elect his claim to a child's exemption by signing a release form. This form must be attached to the return of the noncustodial parent claiming the exemption. Finally, remember that you must have a social security number for any child age two or older if you claim the child as an exemption on your 1990 return. Effective for your 1991 tax return, a social security number is necessary for children age one or older.

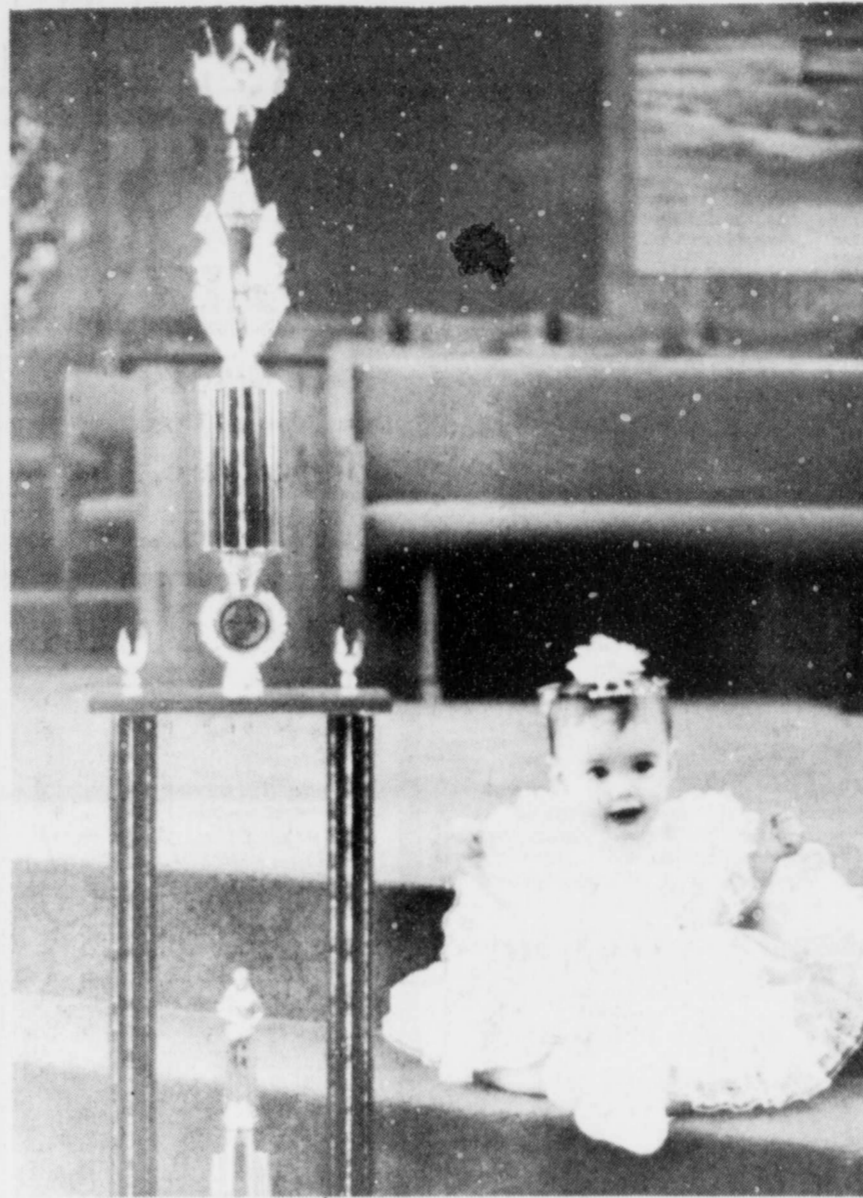
