Indians please homecoming crowd with a win

The Haskell Indians made a homecoming crowd proud with the 20-14 defeat of Olney.

Dylan Hanson led the Tribe by making three touchdowns. Indian Henry

Smith made the first touchdown on an eight yard pass from Hanson. Daniel Contreras nailed the PAT.

Later in the first quarter Indian Matthew Martinez made a touchdown on a 17

yard pass from Hanson. The PAT failed.

The Indians were scoreless in the second quarter, but the third quarter brought a Hanson touchdown on a ten yard run. The Contreras kick

was good.

The Indians held Olney to two touchdowns, one in the second quarter and one in the fourth quarter, to edge the Cubs for the game win.

Head Coach Grady

Benton had these remarks about the game:

"Proud night to be a Haskell Indian. I couldn't be more proud of the entire community of Haskell. From the pep rally, to the atmosphere created at the ballgame, the hospitality the athletic booster club provided, to the effort of my kids and coaches. Great night for all Indians. This was the vision I have had since coming to Haskell. This is what championship programs look like on a daily basis."

"As far as the game, I believe my players took advantage of another week to get better as individuals and as a team. Offensively we had a total of nine drives. Of those nine drives three of those ended in points, but I believe three more of those nine should have ended in points as well. We had a chance to end hope for Olney and did not take advantage of those opportunities. I believe we relax at times and must fix that."

"We played much better on the defensive side of the ball than we have the previous four weeks. We must continue to be physical and disciplined. Defensively outside of giving up three explosive plays we were very good. We forced three and outs, had two goal line stands, and turned them over on downs twice. For us to be a playoff team this is the production defensively we are going to need."

"Again, Haskell stepped up and created a championship atmosphere and our kids responded. I want to thank all involved for their efforts. Special thanks to the athletics booster club for their hospitality for the officials and press box, Mr. Alcorn for that amazing game ball presentation, and my team for playing with great effort and refusing to lose."

The seventh grade team defeated Olney 32-14. The eighth grade team took a 57-8 win from the Cubs. The Haskell JV was in the win column 36-22.

Next Thursday the seventh grade game begins at 4 p.m. on Indian Field, followed by the eighth grade and JV games.

The varsity Indians will travel to City View and play at 7:30 p.m.

USDA reports change in FSA acreage reporting dates for 2013 crop year

Haskell County USDA Farm Service Agency Executive Director CED Glenn Brzozowski, reminds producers that the common acreage reporting dates (ARDs) between FSA and the Risk Management Agency (RMA) are in effect for the 2013 crop year.

"Last year a review team consolidated 54 ARDs for RMA and 17 ARDs for FSA into 15 common ARDs," said Brzozowski. "The common reporting dates will reduce the burden on producers and help reduce USDA operating costs by sharing data with partner agencies," he said.

The following acreage reporting dates are for both FSA and RMA purposes:

Apiculture, all grasses intended for grazing or

forage (hay), PRF, all barley, oats, rye, Triticale and wheat planted before Oct. 1, 2012 intended for grazing, all mixed forages that have grass and small grains in the mix (MSG, SSG, IGS, AGM, ASG, GMA, NSG) was Nov. 15, 2012.

Barley, rye, Triticale and wheat intended for grain, barley, rye, Triticale and wheat intended for forage (hay), all barley, oats, rye, Triticale and wheat planted on or after Oct. 2, 2012 intended for grazing, mixed forages that have small grains and legumes in the mix (LSG, LGG) was Dec. 15, 2012.

Barley, rye, Triticale and wheat intended for grain was Dec. 31, 2012.

Honey was Jan. 2, 2013.

Barley, oats, rye, Triticale and wheat intended for grain, barley, oats, rye, Triticale and wheat intended for forage (hay), mixed forages that have small grains and legumes in the mix (LSG, LGG), clover, citrus trees IV, grapefruit, grapes, oranges and peaches was Jan. 15, 2013.

Oats planted on or after Dec. 16, 2012 intended for grazing was March 15, 2013.

Oats intended for grain, oats intended for forage (hay) was May 15, 2013.

Producers who file accurate and timely reports for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage can prevent the potential loss of FSA program benefits.

"I encourage all producers to visit the Haskell County FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the applicable deadline in order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements," said Brzozowski.

Producers are also reminded to report crop losses insured through Federal Crop Insurance and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) within 15 days of the disaster or as soon as the loss is apparent.

Food training course set

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, one in six Americans will become sick, 128,000 will become hospitalized, and 3,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

If under the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) jurisdiction each food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Taylor,

Jones and Runnels counties, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. This program will be offered for \$125 on Oct. 21 and Oct. 28 at the Taylor County Extension Office in Abilene. Cost includes training, materials, and a national food manager certification examination. The food manager's certification will be valid for five years. The deadline for registration is Oct. 14.

This program is designed to not only prepare foodservice managers to pass the certification examination, but also to provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied.

Foodborne illnesses are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance, and medical bills. With these statistics, knowledge of how to prevent foodborne illness is essential. The benefits of improved food safety include:

- Increased customer satisfaction
 - Improved relationships with health officials
 - Prevention of bad publicity and law suits due to foodborne illness
- By attending the course, foodservice managers will learn about:
- identifying potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling
 - preventing contamination and cross-contamination of food
 - teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for employees
 - complying with government regulations
 - maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings
 - controlling pests

Foodborne illnesses can be prevented by following simple food safety practices. Graveside services for Roy Rebus Guess, 89, of Haskell were held Sat., Sept. 28 at Willow Cemetery under the direction of Smith Family Funeral Home. Immediately following, a memorial service was held in his honor at Cornerstone Fellowship Baptist Church in Haskell with Rev. Brian Burgess and Rev. Morris Johnson officiating.

Mr. Guess passed away Wednesday morning, Sept. 25 at his home in Haskell.

One of eleven children, Rebus was born Jan. 20, 1924 in Mattson, the son of Emily Belle (Weaver) and Rebus B. Guess. As a boy, Rebus, often called June, enjoyed the usual activities of rural life including his little gray mare that he rode up and down Miller Creek looking after cows and sheep, plus the school activities of the Mattson School. He said that the first thing he could remember was climbing a ladder to save his cat. He was 4 years old and he fell from half way down, breaking his collar bone.

He married Leora Stiewert

in the home of Baptist pastor, Brother Whatley, Dec. 31, 1942. The couple lived on the Guess farm in Mattson until World War II took Rebus to Germany in 1944. With the 42nd Rainbow Division on the Third Army in Germany, 1945, Pfc. Guess, a member of the famed Rainbow Division was awarded the Combat Infantry Badge in recognition of his exemplary performance of duty in ground combat against the enemy. Rebus spoke of the war only in recent years and said he always knew he would return home to his Leora.

After the war, the Guesses lived in Weinert, Sunset, Goree and Munday. In 1952, Rebus began working as a rural route 2 carrier for Goree, and in 1959, he began delivery of rural route 2 in Munday. He retired from the Postal Service in 1982 and moved to Haskell to be near their grandkids.

Rebus enjoyed playing dominoes, raising cattle, singing, watching his children and later, his grandchildren in their activities. But his favorite activity may have been the art of conversation. After retiring, his routine included the important business that occurred daily at the DQ around the coffee pot. In recent years, he spent those mornings at Double A where he shared in sausage and biscuits with another group of friends. On the return drive from doctor visits, he enjoyed re-enacting the conversations he had struck

up with all the other patients in the waiting room. He loved to tell jokes but struggled to deliver the punch line due to his own uncontrolled laughing which began as a suppressed "cough" but grew quickly, impeding his ability to speak.

Rebus and Leora were members of Cornerstone Baptist Fellowship Church in Haskell where, at its conception, Rebus was honored to lead the singing. He spent the week looking at the song book, contemplating which songs to plan for the next Sunday.

He was preceded in his arrival to Heaven by his parents; two brothers, Bailey Guess and Bob Guess; seven sisters, Mabel Derr, Otie Bell Mayfield, Rita Hughes, LaVerne Mayfield, LaVera Hummel, Jeannie Brown and R.B. Guess.

Rebus believed himself a most blessed man. He will be missed by his wife of 70 years, Leora of Haskell; his daughters, Jennifer Burgess and husband Brian of Haskell and Kimberlee Bassett and husband Tom of Haskell; six grandchildren, Casey Burgess, Bree Shaw and husband Tyler, Ryan Burgess, Aubrey Bassett, Crissy Bassett and Cash Bassett; one great grandson, Luke Shaw; brother, H.L. Guess of Weinert; and a slew of nieces, nephews and cousins.

The couple plans a Tues., Dec. 31 wedding in Amarillo at Today's Memories.

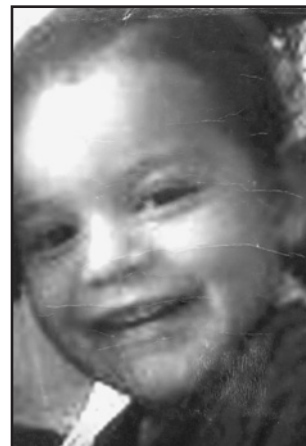
Walk to remember Castillo set Oct. 4



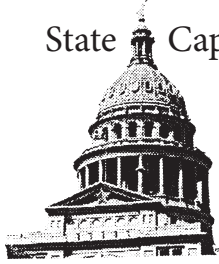

Davis sets decision date on candidacy

AUSTIN—Wendy Davis in mid-September said she would publicly announce on Oct. 3 her decision to run, or not to run, for governor in 2014.

Sen. Davis, a Fort Worth Democrat now in her second term in the state Senate, gained acclaim in June when she filibustered for 11 hours to prevent a vote on legislation that was crafted to rechannel state-supported women's health care programs and greatly reduce access to abortion services. Her action brought the first special session of the 83rd Texas Legislature to an end and prompted Gov. Rick Perry to call a second special session for the Republican-controlled House and Senate to pass the legislation Davis and a cohort of Democrats successfully but only temporarily managed to block.

Should Davis declare her candidacy, she almost certainly will face Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott, who months ago announced his intention to seek the Republican party's nomination for governor. Abbott made his announcement to seek the governorship soon after Gov. Perry said he would not seek another term. Perry has been the state's chief executive since 2000, when as lieutenant governor he succeeded Gov. George W. Bush, who as president-elect left Texas for Washington, D.C.

Davis, 50, is a mother and an attorney. She earned her law degree from Harvard University.

Obamacare sign-up begins

With Oct. 1 marked as the open enrollment launch under the federal Affordable Care Act of 2010, the governor's office, the Texas Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of State Health Services have had little to offer in the way of information for citizens concerned about access to health care coverage and the cost of it.

Meanwhile, however, the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services has been urging all Americans to visit the web site healthcare.gov to learn about the federal health care law and to enroll for coverage scheduled to begin Jan. 1. Nearly 5 million uninsured Texans reportedly will be able to get coverage under the Affordable Care Act, the federal health agency said.

Gov. Perry, an opponent of the Affordable Care Act, recently suggested that instead of "Obamacare" the federal government issue Medicaid block grants to states so Texas and other states could manage their own health care.

Brown named to high court

Gov. Perry on Sept. 26 appointed Jeff Brown of Houston to fill the Texas Supreme Court seat vacated in September by Justice Nathan Hecht, who the

governor appointed as chief justice of the court following the resignation of Chief Justice Wallace Jefferson.

Brown, a Republican, has been serving as a judge on the Houston-based Fourteenth Court of Appeals since 2007. He earned his law degree from the University of Houston Law Center and he served as a clerk to Texas Supreme Court Justices Jack Hightower and Greg Abbott.

Unemployment rate improves

Texas Workforce Commission on Sept. 20 announced that in August the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased slightly to 6.4 percent, down from 6.5 percent in July.

From August 2012 to August 2013, Texas added 274,700 jobs. The trend line reveals slow but steady improvement, as state's unemployment rate was 6.8 percent a year ago.

The U.S. Department of Labor Statistics tabulated the national unemployment rate for August at 7.3 percent.

More students take SAT, AP

Public school student participation rates for the College Board SAT and Advanced Placement exams increased over the previous school year, the Texas Education Agency reported on Sept. 26.

Some 156,877 Texas public school students took the SAT college entrance exam in 2012-2013, reflecting an increase of 0.2 percent from 2011-2012. Test takers in the Class of 2013 represent 56 percent of the state's public high school graduates and 62 percent of the test takers identified themselves as minority students.

For the first time in state history, more Hispanic students (59,294) than white students (58,307) took the SAT in Texas public schools, the state education agency reported, adding that the 204,795 Texas public school students who took Advanced Placement exams in 2012-2013 represent an increase of 5.4 percent from 2011-2012 and a 37.6 percent jump over the past five school years.

Mobile voter ID stations roll

Texans who don't have photo identification that is acceptable for voting in Texas may apply for a state-issued election identification certificate at 25 mobile stations, beginning Oct. 1.

In a joint announcement on Sept. 24, Texas Public Safety Commission Chair Cynthia Leon and Texas Secretary of State John Steen said the mobile stations are part of an ongoing effort to provide election ID certificates to Texans in need of photo identification now required to vote in elections in Texas.

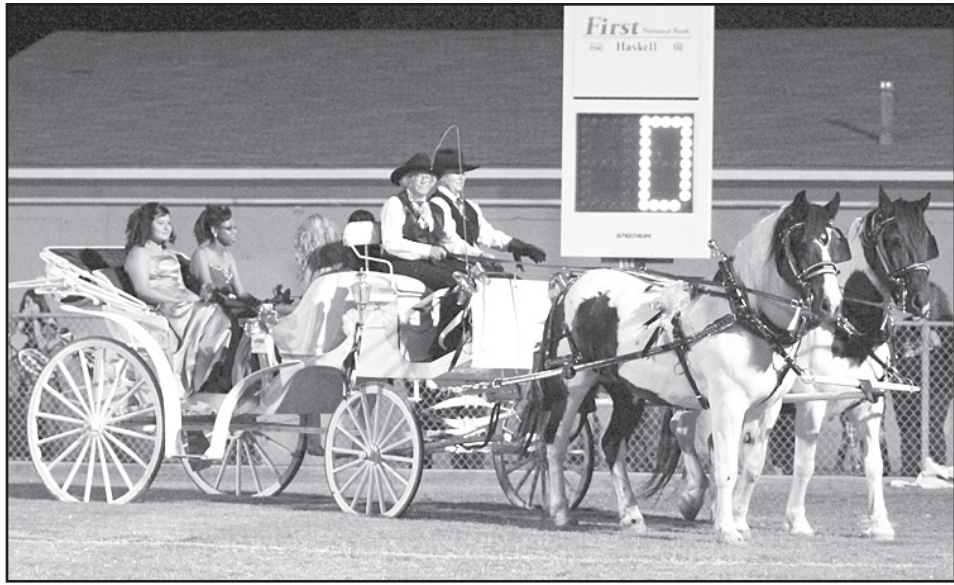

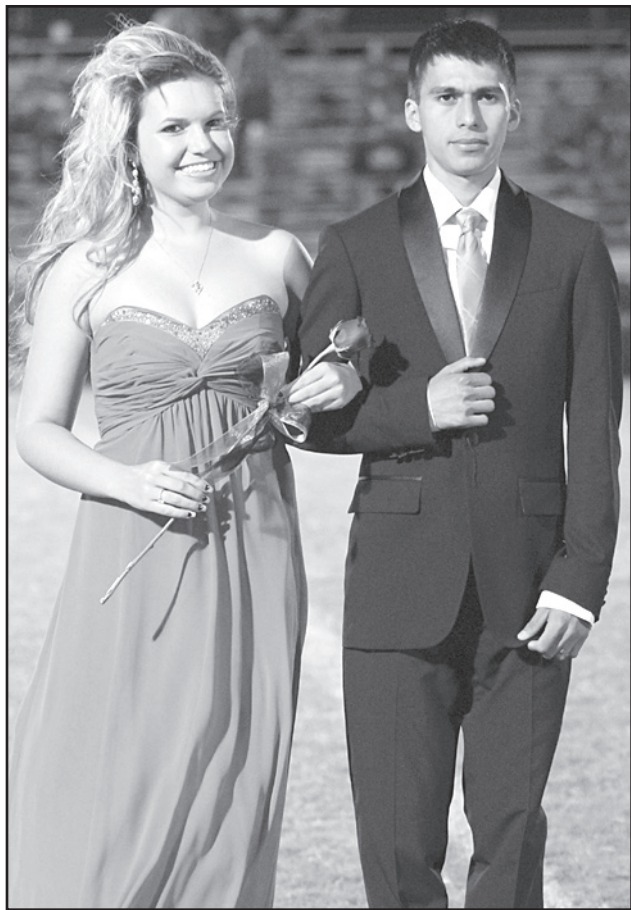

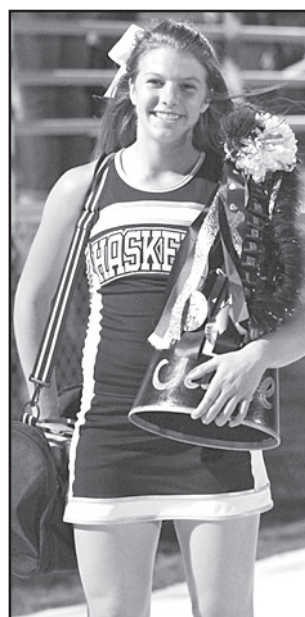

White grubs do damage to wheat

Some irrigated wheat fields located near the Bailey/Palmer County line are heavily infested with white grubs and causing severe feeding damage. According to Monti Vandiver, IPM Extension Agent—Bailey/Palmer counties, the grubs killing the wheat were 80% June beetle larvae, *Phyllophaga crinita*, and 20% masked chafer beetle larvae, *Cyclocephala* sp. The c-shaped larvae are identified by comparing the pattern of stout hairs on the underside of the “tail end” (referred to as the rastral pattern). The June beetle larvae have two parallel rows of hairs (zipper) on the raster while hairs on the chafer larvae are in a more random pattern and lack the zipper pattern. The grubs feeding on the wheat now will eventually burrow deeper into the soil and overwinter as soil temperatures become colder. Until then they will continue to eat on the developing roots.

Unfortunately, there are no insecticides labels for use against white grubs in wheat and depending on grub size seed treatments of Gaucho® or Cruiser® may or may not suppress the grub larvae. In times past, Lorsban® was once registered for grub control when chemigated, but it now only has a label for greenbug, Russian wheat aphid, army cutworms, armyworms, and a few other pests of wheat.

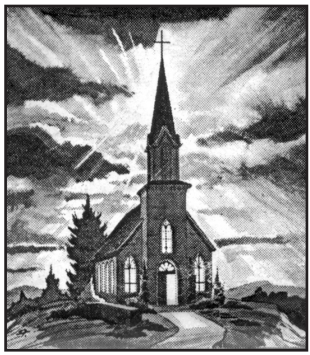
