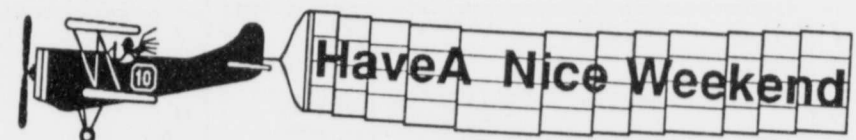

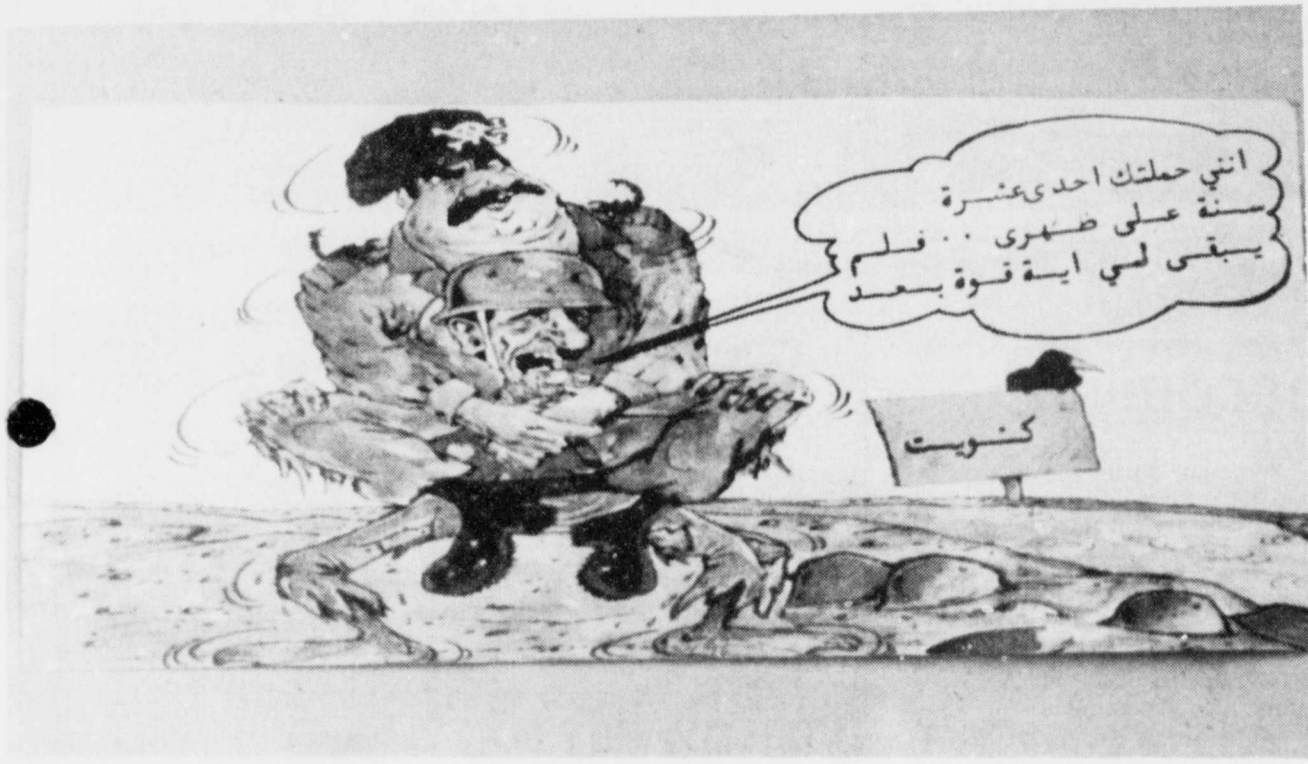

Joan Weatherall. Three boys, three girls and one alternate boy and girl will be chosen.

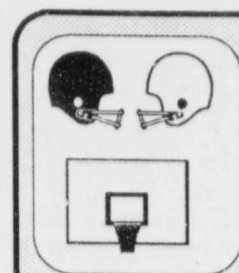
The club will begin meeting next year on August 5.

Soybean Planting Tips

By Paul D. Payne

Early maturing soybean varieties need to be planted by April 15 if possible. The timing of soybean planting is critical to the success of the Group III and IV varieties. Perhaps the spring of 1991 will be kinder to us than the 1990 flooding season and we will be able to get the seed in the ground in early April.

There is no best early maturing soybean variety for our area. Most of the seed companies have productive varieties. Williams 82 continues to be a reliable Group III mature variety. Williams was about the first Group III variety planted in Lamar County about 10 years ago and has consistently made acceptable yields.

The 1990 Farm Bill contains a number of new provisions that previous farm legislation did not cover.

One of these new terms is flexibility. There is normal flex acres and optional flex acres. Farmers would be advised to have a good understanding of these two terms prior to signing up for the program in the ASCS office.

Planting flexibility was one of the primary objectives for both the administration and Congress when drafting the 1990 Farm Bill. As a result of the Budget Reconciliation Act, the 25% planting flexibility was divided into two parts; 15% known as normal flex acres and the remaining 10% called optional flex acres.

The 1990 Farm Bill is a complicated document and farmers are encouraged to study and understand the program options prior to signing up.

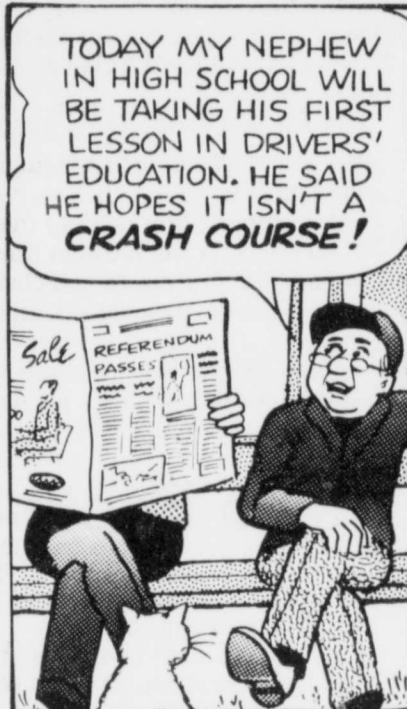

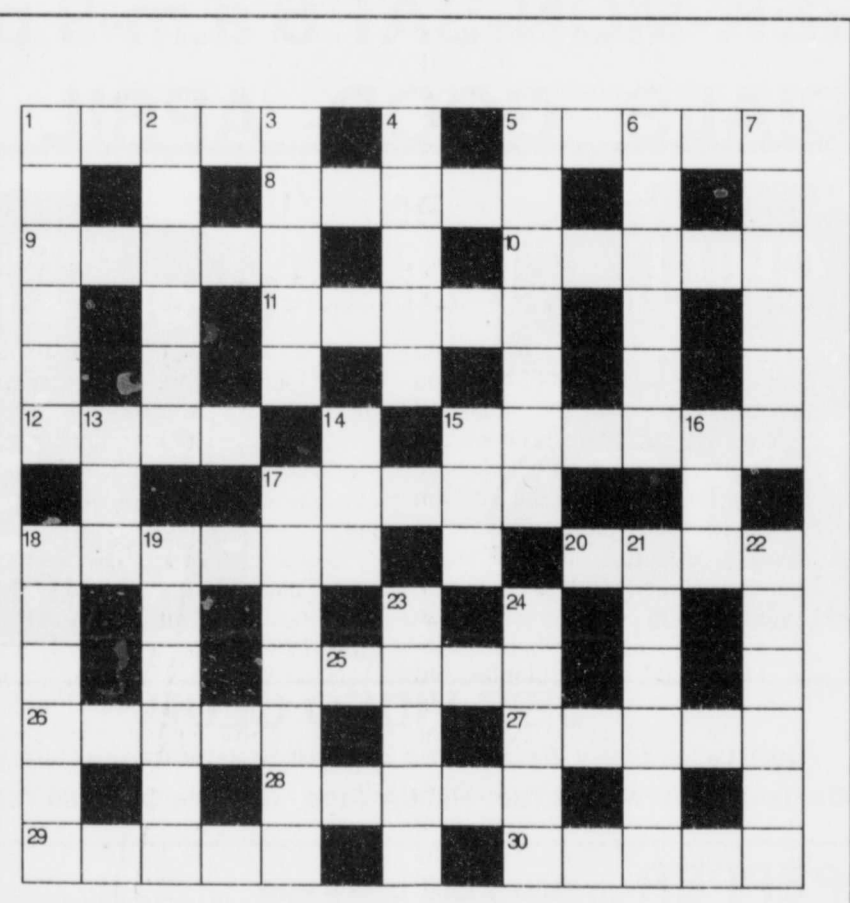
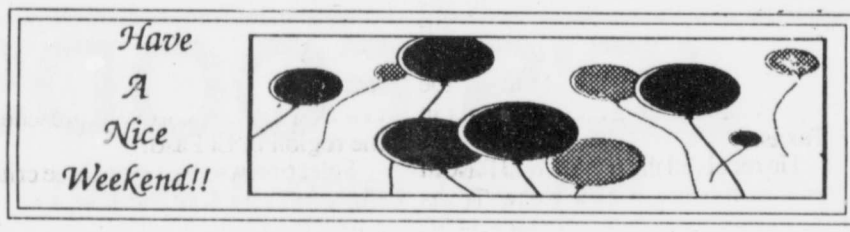

Social Security Notes

Social Security and Supplemental Security Income beneficiaries must report any changes in mailing address or risk having their checks suspended.

This is especially true of those who use direct deposit, because they are not using a mailing address to receive monthly checks. However, notices of changes and reminders of reporting requirements cannot be sent to a bank, so having a correct mailing address on file is extremely important.

In addition, in January of each year, Social Security sends each beneficiary a Form SSA-1099, the Social Security Benefit Statement. If the U.S. Postal Service returns a Form 1099 as undeliverable, that person's benefit may be suspended for lack of a good address, even if the beneficiary is using direct deposit.

First, however, Social Security will double check for a recent change of

address. If none is found, and the benefit is paid by direct deposit, Social Security will ask the financial institution for a correct address. The post office is asked to check its change of address records, and local telephone directory assistance is contacted.

Using the best available address, Social Security sends a first-class notice that benefits will be suspended unless the beneficiary contacts Social Security. If no response is made, benefits are suspended until the agency hears from the person.

Avoiding this procedure is very simple. A person should be sure to let Social Security know whenever his or her mailing address changes. A simple phone call will get it done.
