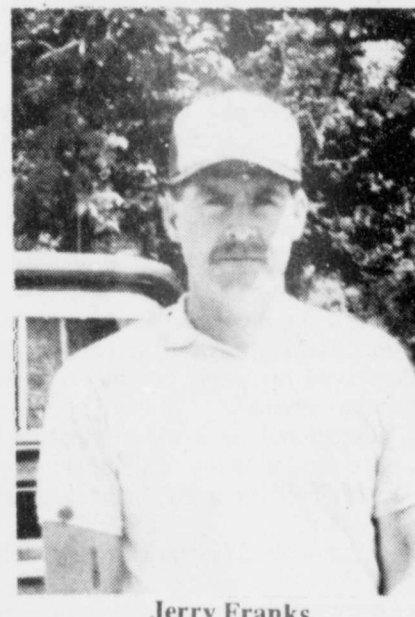

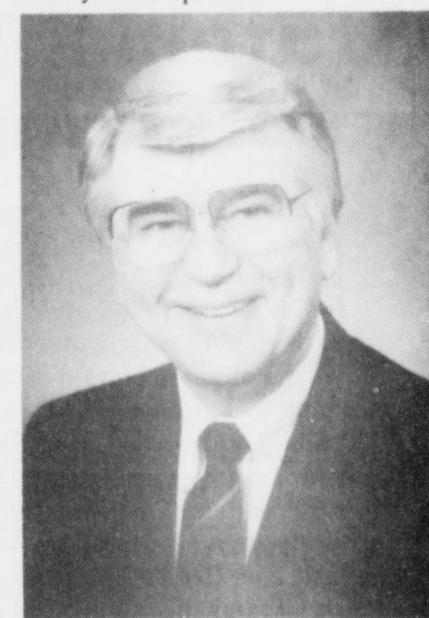

Mexican Cornbread

1 cup meal
1 t. salt
3 eggs
1 c. milk
3/4 t. soda
1/4 c. bacon drippings
1 c. cream style corn

Mix well and set aside. Reserve part of the drippings to coat your skillet. Mix together 1/2 pound ground beef, cook and drained, 1 large chopped onion, 2 jalapeno peppers, 1/2 cup grated cheese and 4 chopped jalapeno peppers. Mix thoroughly. Heat skillet that has been coated with drippings and pour half of the mixture in hot skillet. Next, spoon meat mixture over batter and top with remaining batter. Bake for 1 hour at 350.

Sunday's Pot Roast

1-3 to 4# chuck roast
1/2 bag of carrots
3 or 4 medium potatoes
1 medium onion
salt, pepper, garlic

First, brown your roast on both sides. Cut up all other vegetables and put around roast. Let cook in oven on 375 for two hours.

Good and Quick English Pea Salad

2-16 oz. cans sweet peas, drained
1-4 oz. jar chopped pimientos
1 small onion chopped
2/3 c. Velveeta cheese, chopped
3 Tbsp. mayonnaise or salad dressing
Combine all and toss lightly to coat. Chill.

Banana Split Salad

1 large carton Cool Whip
1 can sweetened condensed milk
1 can cherry pie filling
1-8 oz. crushed pineapple, well drained
3 bananas, chopped
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Combine Cool Whip and milk in bowl, beating well. Fold in remaining ingredients. Chill until ready to serve.

Jeff Davis Pie by Dorothy Ritchey

Cream until fluffy: 1 1/2 c. sugar, 1/2 c. butter.
Add: 1 1/2 t. flour, 1/2 t. vanilla, dash of salt, 2 eggs

Beat well, add 1/2 c. milk, pour into 9" unbaked pastry shell, bake at 450 for 10 minutes, reduce to 350, continue baking for 30 minutes.

Mama's Vinegar Pie by Regina Webb

6 medium size biscuits, cut in half
2 cups sugar
Generous amount of butter
1 1/2 cups vinegar diluted with enough water to suit your taste

Bring vinegar, water and sugar to a boil. Spread biscuits in bottom of baking pan and pour liquid over them. Top with butter. Bake in hot oven, 400 degrees, until biscuits are brown.

Jeff Davis Pie by Regina Webb

1/2 cup butter
4 egg yolks
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 cup cream
1/2 cup raisins
2 cups brown sugar
2 T. flour
1/2 t. nutmeg
1/2 cup chopped dates
1/2 cup pecans, broken

Cream butter and sugar, beat in yolks one at a time. Sift flour and spices; blend into egg mixture until smooth. Gradually blend in cream. Stir in fruit and nuts. Bake in a crust for 40 minutes at 300. Top with meringue made from 4 egg whites and 1/2 cup sugar. Brown meringue.

Texas-New Mexico Safety Fair Is May 2

An electric arcing demonstration that has received favorable comments throughout Texas-New Mexico Power Company's service area will come to Bogata May 2 during the company's safety fair.

The safety fair is free and open to the public and will be held from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. at TNP's Bogata Construction Center on Highway 271.

The electric arcing demonstration will be presented at 10 a.m., at noon and at 2 p.m., using live electricity to dramatically demonstrate the dangers of electricity.

TNP has presented the demonstration in various towns it serves and has received favorable comments from those attending. "Excellent" and "educational" are two words that have been used in many of the thank you letters TNP received concerning the program.

Although the electric arcing dem-

onstrations will be one of the most vivid reminders of the need for safety during the fair, it certainly won't be the only one. Exhibits at the fair will also provide information about high-way safety, hunting and fishing safety, fire protection and other ways to prevent accidents and injuries.

In addition to TNP, exhibitors include Contel, Deport Fire Department, American Red Cross, Red River County Extension Agency, St. Joseph's Hospital, Texas Department of Public Safety, Texas Parks and Wildlife and St. Michael's Hospital.

The fair will also feature an exhibit of the winners of a safety poster contest sponsored for students in first through fifth grades at five area elementary schools. The school winners will be on display at the fair, and a grand champion will be selected from the five school winners. The grand champion will receive a bicycle.

Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 17, 1991. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and weather and annualization of test year rate increases of \$35,836,827, or 9.63%. TNP is proposing an alternative rate base treatment for Unit 2 of TNP One, the second unit of the Company's generating facility located in Robertson County, Texas. Under this alternative, sale-leaseback treatment will be given to Unit 2, thereby including a lease payment in the cost of service, as opposed to traditional rate base treatment. If adopted, the sale-leaseback plan results in an increase in gross revenues of \$31,210,197, or an 8.38% increase over adjusted test year revenues during the first year of the plan. Child Protective Services Supports Projects To Meet Needs

The Child Protective Services is a division of Texas Department of Human Resources, organized in 1932 to meet the needs of children. Child welfare came under the State Department of Public Welfare when it was created in 1939.

Local boards are established through a contract between a county's Commissioners Court and the Texas Department of Human Services, with board members appointed by the Commissioners Court, usually from different areas of the county, to represent the county. The board is responsible to the Court for a budget for the use of federal, state and local funds.

The board members help develop policies to meet the needs of the county. These policies involve payment to foster parents, clothing and transportation for foster children, fund raising and use of local funds.

The local board tries to see to the needs of abused and neglected children in this county. Most people are greatly surprised to learn how many children in Red River County are abused in some way. In most investigated cases, children are able to be left in the home, under supervision of the Child Protective Services. Sometimes the abuse is so severe the child must be removed from the home for their protection and because of this, foster homes are approved where these children can find love and care until final placement can be made.

Your local board is very appreciative of the financial support given to help these children. The recent annual fish fry in Clarksville succeeded because you care and you showed that you care.
