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Rue Anna Bell Appointed To Talco-Bogata School Board

of Trustees met in regular session Tuesday evening, July 9, in the Talco School Library.

Prior to the meeting, the annual tour of campus was conducted by Supt. Freddy Wade, with the assistance of the new Talco Principal, Ben Tyler. Board members Eddie Brown, Jerry Russell, Kip Stansell, Buford Hervey, Mollie Williams and Ricky Franks, along with new Bogata Junior High School Principal Jimmy Lee and Rivercrest High School Principal Ray Miller, participated in the

The regular scheduled Board meeting convened at 7:30 p.m. with the approval of the previous meeting's minutes.

Financial reports and cafeteria reports were routinely handled and in the tax report, Mr. Wade reported that 93.48% of 1991 taxes had been collected to date. This is, according to Wade, a 1% increase over last year's receipts collected.

The Board went into executive session and re-convened at 8:45 p.m.

nominations for the Board position vacated by Tommy Corbell's recent resignation were accepted. Eddie Brown nominated Rue Anna Bell and Buford Hervey nominated A.D. Stephenson. Brown, Russell, Stansell and Franks voted for Bell and Buford Hervey voted for Stephenson. Williams abstained.

A report was given by Supt. Wade concerning the makeup of the newly created County Education District, of which Russell is a member. Since the administration building of Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. is in Red River County, the entire district is considered to be a part of Red River County District.

Mr. Wade gave an update on approximate cost of the Rivercrest track being resurfaced. The first estimate of approximately \$80,000.00 has been upgraded to somewhere near \$95,000.00. In addition, a core sample will be necessary to finalize a bid proposal. The Board agreed to take bids as has been previously voted upon and make a decision as to when

The Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. Board into open session. Upon convening, in the future the track project could be financially possible.

The Board postponed discussion of a proposal on the baseball field until the August meeting. Talco State Bank's bid was accepted and will be the school district's depository for 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years.

Budget study meetings were scheduled for July 25, 1991 and August 12, 1991, following the special called meeting to canvass the results of the August 10 election results. A correction on the new salary schedule for auxiliary personnel was acepted by the board and the amended 1991-92 calendar was adopted with the school year scheduled to begin on August 16 for teachers and August 19 for stu-

The Board officially accepted the resignation of Talco Principal, Gary Wuest, and hired Ben Tyler of Dallas Highland Park as his replacement. The Board also accepted Bogata Principal Jimmy Lee's recommendation to hire Mrs. Ginger Jordan as an elementary teacher as it's final action of the night.

Controversy Over Road Settled

After lengthy litigation, accusations and waiting, the "Moon Ranch Road " controversy was ended as District Judge K. Baker ruled the Johntown-area road to be a "public neighborhood road" and that Dan Kelley's criminal and arrest charges stemming from the controversy be expunged from the county records.

Red River County Pct. 1 Commissioner Drue Pirtle, named as the defendant individually and for the county in the lawsuit, was also ordered to drop his slander suit against the Dodd brothers.

The case was brought to court before the visiting district judge on LApril 30, for trial, but during the Voir Dire examinations of the jury it was announced to the court that a tentative settlement had been reached by the attorneys for both parties.

A copy of the judgement states that the road going across "certain property" belonging to D.L. Kelley and his wife, Barbara Kelley, commonly known as Moon Ranch Road, was declared a "public neighborhood road" and would be the responsibility of Red River County to maintain. The county was also ordered to maintain a cattle guard at the north entrance to the Kelley property and if requested by the Kelley's, "put in a second cattle guard at the north entrance so as to constitute a double-

wide cattle guard." This second guard, if requested, would be put in at county expense.

The judgement also ruled that Kelley will not be required to fence the sides of the right-of-way and that he may not place a gate across the roadway. However, Kelley, his successors or assigns may build a fence up to the side of the cattle guards if a walk-through gate is put to the side of the guard, with said gate to be "at least 10 feet in width and remain unlocedk".

All of this was decreed to consititue a covenant running with the land described in the deed Kelley purchased in 1968 and will be binding upon Kelley, his wife, their heirs and successors.

Also ordered in the judgement was the dismissal of all criminal and arrest charges against Kelley arising from the controversy so that the charges will not appear in the records of Red River County.

Pirtle was also ordered to file a notice of non-suit in the personal slander suit by him against W.T. and M.J. Dodd unless the "Defendants file a cross-action therein or utter words of slander subsequent hereto against Pirtle.

Both parties were ordered responsible for their own legal expenses in the matter.










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Geneva, A Fascinating City

Editor's Note: For those interested in hearing about a trip to Switzerland, here's your chance. If you aren't, feel free to read something else....this article is definitely for those with travel in their hearts! (P.S. thanks for all the nice compliments on these articles)

As our bus decended from the high mountains down into the French speaking portion of Switzerland the houses began to change too.

The style became less that of a mountain chaulet and more that of a ench wine province. Slate or red an tyle roofs still prevailed, but the homes held less ornate carving or etching, and the hillsides became completely covered with vinyards.

Wine making is serious, and big, business in the French area.

While we are used to having iced tea or coffee with meals, everyone has wine or beer with their meals.

The wine making industry is labor-intensive. All up and down the terraced hillsides men and women could be seen, tying up the vines on their wires, carefully trimming or pruning, poisoning for insects or just inspecting the crops.

The vinyards are weed free, and e huts sit at the end of the fields. These are actually tool sheds and storage buildings.

Early in the afternoon we arrived in Lucerne, our final stop on the trip, but what a wonderful ending to the tour it proved to be!



This is good news for rural East


