This week the Country Cooking Column is being shared from the kitchen of Billie and Don Nolan of the McCrury-Talco area. They have been married for 44 years and have lived in this community since 1974.

Billie and Don have one son: Donald and his wife, Janie and they have two children, Marvin, age 20 and Cassie, age 16. They live in Smithville.

Some of the hobbies Billie enjoys are oil painting, crafts, quilting, helping retired husband with taking care of the cattle, and such chores as fencing, etc. Billie spends a large portion of every day helping her mother in the nursing home.

Both Billie and Don share the cooking. Since most of the time, the cooking is for only two people, the cooking is very simple. Don does all the grilling of foods and Billie's specialties are cakes and ice cream. Billie shared that she never did any cooking as a youngster at home, so she had to learn everything after she married.

Billie has been painting with oils about four years. She enjoys painting landscapes most of all. She likes to find old pictures of sentimental value to paint. She also enjoys spending hours just looking at antiques.

Another hobby Billie really gets into is quilting. She shared that her mom always quilted while she was growing up and it just grew on her. A friend, Jackie Lewis, really helped her a lot before she passed away.

Billie and Don enjoy playing dominoes, cards and really enjoy the community homecoming held each year in October. They enjoy opening their home up to their friends on the weekends and enjoy their visits and fellowship.

Among the recipes Billie is sharing, I asked her for her homemade ice cream recipe because I had heard it was delicious. Sure enough, Billie had made a big freezer of it and it was delicious. Billie has used this recipe for over 20 years. You can take this basic recipe and add strawberries, cherries, peaches, bananas or whatever flavor you prefer. You can also crush six Butterfinger bars or melt six Milky Ways and add to it. A good tip for homemade ice cream is to place Saran Wrap on top before you put the lid on so ice crystals do not form. Billie keeps a lot of fresh fruits frozen to use with recipes such as this.

Billie thinks the Jam Cake is the best cake she has ever tasted. It has a lot of ingredients but is well worth it. It stays moist a long time and the longer it sits, the better it gets. This is a substitute for fruit cake and is especially good during the winter months holidays. She has used this recipe since 1977.

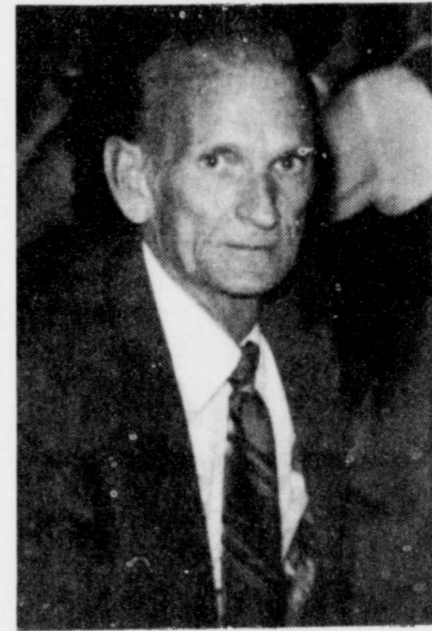
Charles Don Abbott Dies July 21

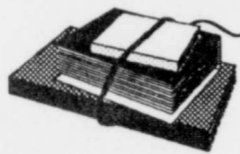

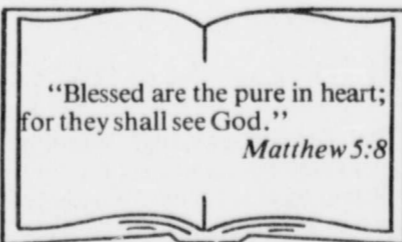

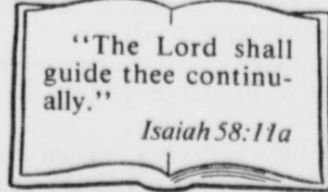

He personally makes an effort to visit each patient and see if they feel they are getting proper care and attention while they are there.

The county's four full time physicians, all of whom are general practitioners, support the hospital and admit their patients to Red River General.

In addition, two physicians who are now retired are available to consultation services, with one of them serving on the hospital's board of directors.

The doctors are assisted by a large group of physicians from Mt. Pleasant and Paris as well as Oklahoma, in advisory capacities, some of whom make weekly visits to Red River General to assist in whatever capacity they are summoned.

The hospital is governed by a medical staff and a board of directors, made up of civic leaders and community supporters from surrounding towns in the county as well as Clarksville.

The ICU unit is fully staffed and equipped with modern equipment

and certified people to handle most any situation. The emergency room is operated 24 hours a day with competent nurses with years of experience in traumas or accidents.

The x-ray department is second to none in this area. Ultra modern equipment is within reach of the hands of the certified operators of this department. A mammogram is available for the detection of breast cancer in women. A CAT scan machine is being installed and should be operable in the very near future. Modern heart sensing monitors are available and stress tests are given on a regular basis.

Day surgery and emergency surgery are available as well as any and all types of laboratory tests and analysis.

Red River General Hospital is one of the biggest employes in the county.

It likes to say that it has something going for it that all hospitals can't brag about...that one thing is service...a caring staff of nurses, doctors and aides and office personnel that offers more personal, caring attention that can't be beat.

First Aid Station? If that's all you need, but if you need a first class hospital they are certainly that too!

They need the support of the county to continue this level of services, of course.

While no one wants to have to be hospitalized, isn't it a blessing to know that Red River County has such a facility in case we do need it? Truly, Red River General is an asset to the county, and to the citizens of the area.

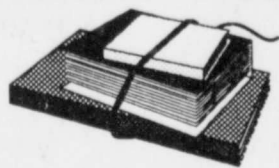
