Fire Fanned The Flames Of Fear In Past History

Everyone fears losing their home to fire. Fire is non-discriminatory. Wealthy or poor, insured or uninsured, when the flames lay claim to a structure it knows no difference.

But the fears about fire that people today have are nothing to compare to those of long ago.

Fire from the past were fearsome, indeed. When one structure burned it almost certainly took another, or even several others, with it.

The earliest attempts at fire fighting were bucket brigades. Anyone who has ever watched flames roaring and consuming a building even under the deluge of water from several fire trucks can imagine how futile lines of people drawing water from a well bucket by bucket and throwing it on the flames would be!

Whole business districts were wiped out because of a fire that began in some single location.

A street of houses might be destroyed, while whole miles of countryside would be ravaged by grass fires.

Around the turn of the century local communities began to get Fire Wagons, which were copper tanks holding chemicals to smother a fire with.

These wagons were pulled by horses or mules, and the tanks were fixed on pivots. When inverted they mixed soda, water and acid, creating

a foam. Two or three hundred feet of hose enabled firemen to reach the flames.

The horses or mules were always harnessed, and usually belonged to someone with a livery or transfer business.

In larger towns the fire department actually owned their own animals.

Although primitive by today's standards, the chemical wagon prevented many a conflagration.

Larger towns frequently could afford steam pumper wagons, which replaced the chemical wagons. Most volunteer departments never owned a steam pumper.

In the late 20's and early 30's fire departments began purchasing pumper trucks. These became practical when water systems were installed in towns.

While the pumper trucks have become larger, the equipment more "high-tech" and the skills required of volunteers more demanding, one thing hasn't changed.

The volunteer fire department is constantly raising money to keep their equipment functioning and at its best.

Without updating their equipment, and training, fire fighting would never have progressed beyond the bucket brigade.

Through the years they have made real progress against the ravages of fire. While the newspaper clippings from long ago record home after home

lost, it is a fairly rare occurrence now.

No longer does a structure fire automatically mean that several other houses will catch and be destroyed. Indeed, buildings that are only a few feet away from a blaze can now be saved from damage.

When electricity replaced kerosene, and ovens and stoves replaced wood cook stoves the number of fires reduced, too.

Grass fires used to ignite wooden houses, while that is a rare occurrence these days. Almost any grass fire can be extinguished by the fire department before it claims a home.

Certified fire departments keep home owners and business owner's insurance rates down, too, a fact seldom considered.

One thing is certain. A volunteer fire department is no better than the people who man the equipment.

No matter how modern the truck, or how much water it can pump per minute, without those volunteers who man the hoses and handle the equipment, no fire would ever be put out!

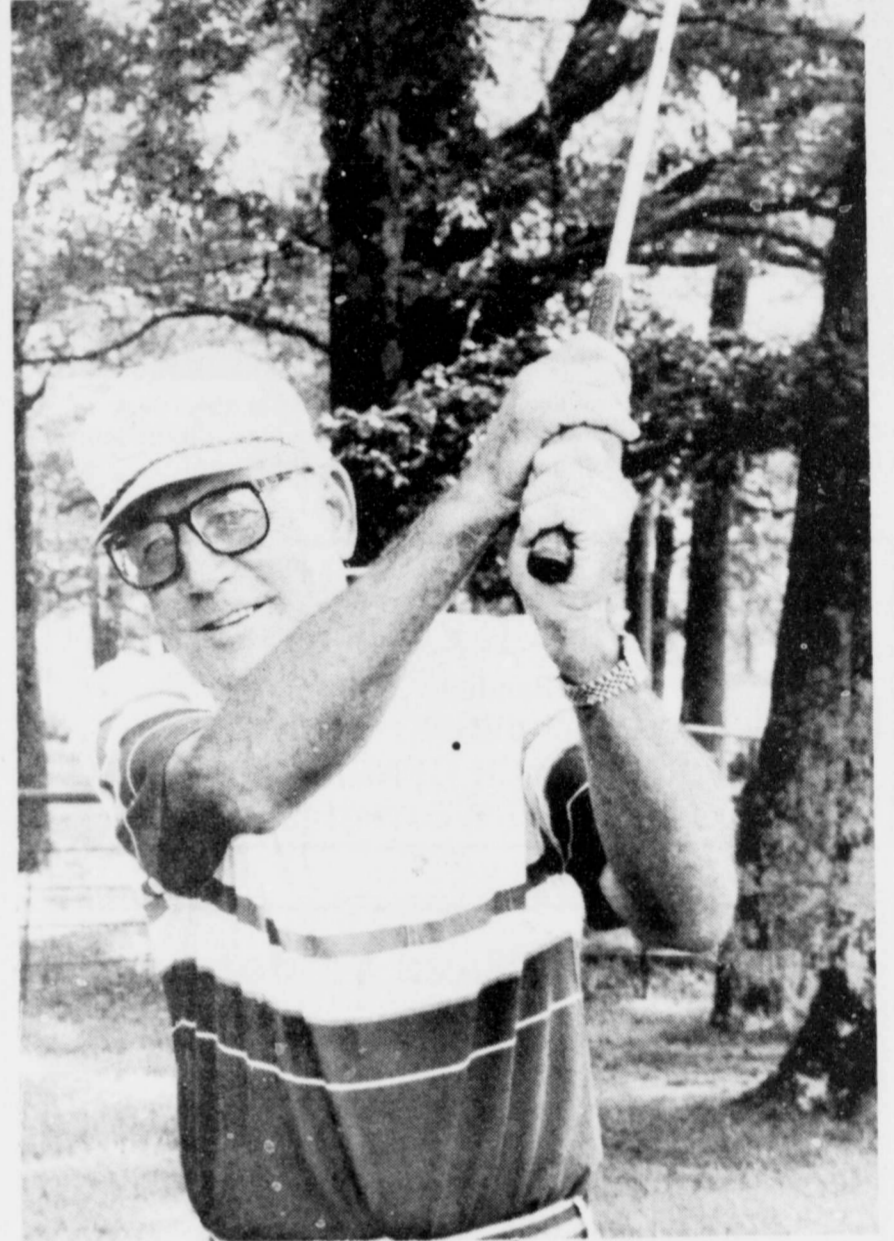
Yes, fire fighting has changed.

Homes have changed.

Insurance rates have sky rocketed.

But one thing hasn't. That's the quality of dedication that each and every volunteer fireman has to have to serve.

Fire no longer inspires the sheer horror of by gone days. And that is largely because of the volunteer fire department.

New rules for the art show are as follows:

Nothing will be accepted without proper hanger. Pencil, pen and ink drawing, etc. must be matted on a type backing with hanger for each of hanging the picture.

Class 1 Landscape, Class 2 Floral and Class 3 in Still Life will be held in all the following mediums: Oil, Acrylic, Watercolor, Charcoal/Pencil, Marks A Lot, Pastel

There will be Class 19, Professional Display Only and will not be judged.

Photography Division: Entries: Divisions will be Photos;

2-5x7's and 3-8x10's in each of the following classes. Photographs can be black and white or color. All photographs must be framed and/or matted and must be hangable.

Class 1-Portrait/People; Class 2-Portrait/Animal; Class 3-Action/People or animals or both; Class 4-Flowers, scenic, landscape, seascape; Class 5-Special effects; Class 6-Open Class, everything else; Class 7-Professional Display Only.

Judging for the art show and photography will be done on a classification basis. There will be only one first, second and third place in each class. Youth entries not placing will receive participation ribbons, with no prize money awarded. Best of Show will be awarded for overall winner in Art and Photography.

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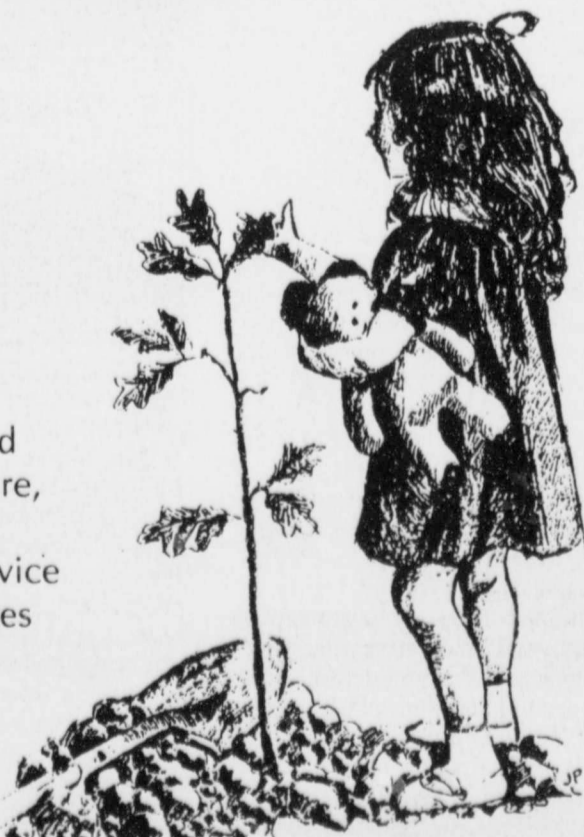
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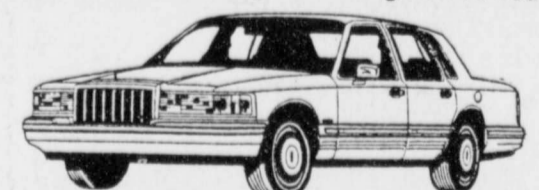
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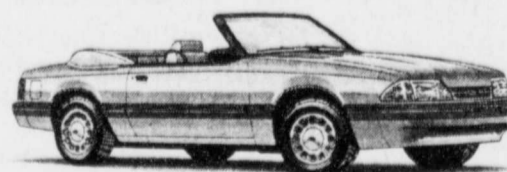
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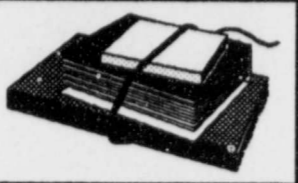
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"Castrophe"

The first game, in fact, both games we attended were played in Mt. Vernon. This part I hate to write about. Our grandson's team lost 21-8.

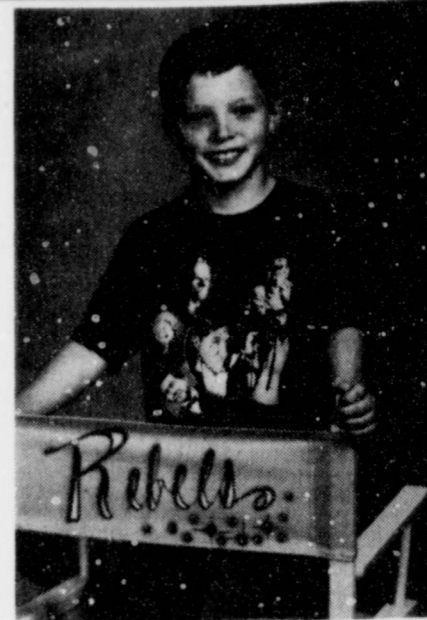
Both granddads agreed on our way home it sure wasn't our grandson's fault, but we would win the next one.

1991 Property Tax Rates in Talco-Bogata CISD

This notice concerns 1991 property tax rates for Talco-Bogata CISD. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB1) the tax rate for last year provides \$4,361.00 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB351) that same rate now provides \$4,247.00 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax of \$.72 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of \$1.00 that will provide \$4,247.00 per student in state and local revenues.

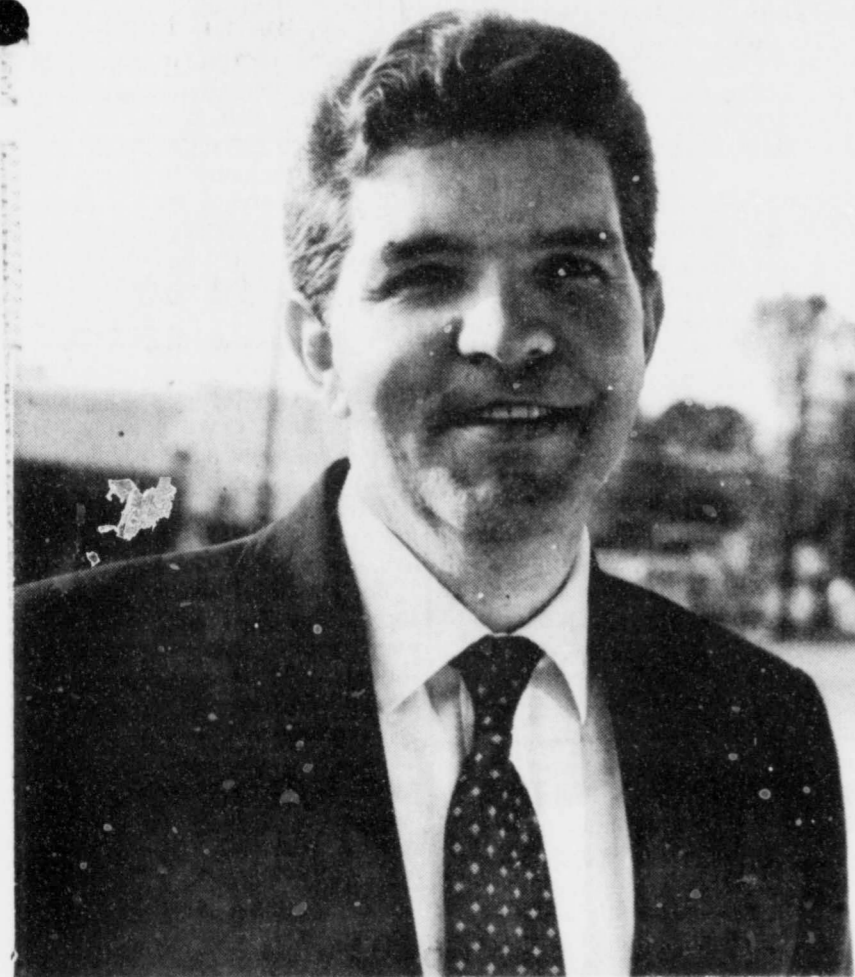

Sophomores will register August 21.

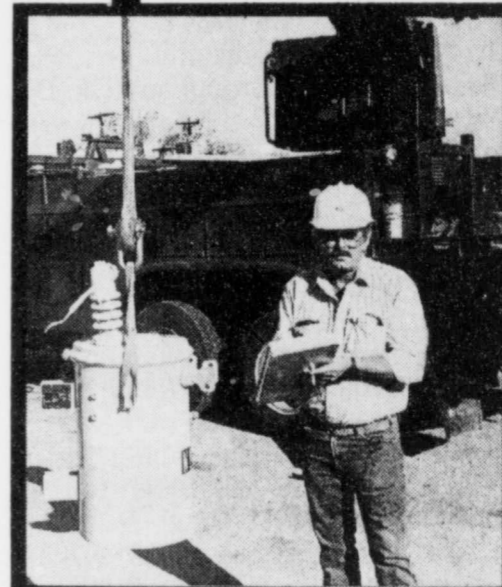

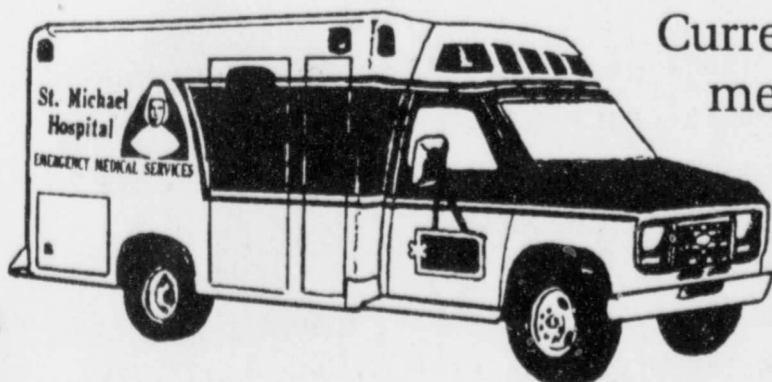

BROMHIDROSIS

You might prefer to call it by its medical name, Bromhidrosis. It certainly sounds better than the common name for this condition, which is "smelly feet". Foot odor is common, so common that there are dozens of over-the-counter remedies, ranging from pine scented innersoles to little plastic balls containing activated charcoal or baking soda which will supposedly absorb the odors from your sneakers. If your feet are more than usually sweaty or smelly, these gimmicks will do no good whatsoever. The problem is often caused by bacteria, which decompose the sloughed-off layers of skin, and by localized fungus infections. These need medical treatment from the podiatrist. Obviously, keeping your feet clean and dry will help prevent the problem. Wash and dry the feet carefully, using a wash cloth to remove dead skin cells. Don't forget to wash and dry between the toes.

For health concerns as well as social considerations, such unwanted "aromatic" conditions should be promptly brought to the attention of your podiatrist. In this fashion corrective measures can be taken which will address and correct the problem. Your feet will be healthier, you will be happier and your shoes will breathe a sign of relief.
