## NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB1) the tax rate for last year provides \$4,361.00 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB351) that same rate now provides $\$ 4,247.00$ per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax of $\$ .72$ for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of $\$ 1.00$ that will provide $\$ 4,247.00$ per student in state and local revenues.
