I had already plunked down in front of my terminal three times without inspiration.

Than Jimmie Sparks of Deport came in and handed me something he thought might be of interest. It was.

What Jimmie handed me was a tabloid style newspaper published on April 7, 1977. It was called a "Cooper Dam Special".

It chronicled the conception of Cooper lake, and mentioned that the original bill was signed by Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1955. The tabloid said that "the lake seems no closer to being constructed than in the late '50's, yet the need is much greater now. (remember this was nearly 14 years ago).

It ran an editorial written in 1961 and commented that "it could be written today"

It mentioned that in 1957 Lyndon B. Johnson, then a senator, had informed the Cooper Review that the \$275,000 for construction and \$225,000 needed for planning of the Cooper Dam and Reservoir had been passed in the Senate, and that it would go before a conference committee to adjust difference between Senate and House versions.

Sometime later the House and Senate announced that the money was "Almost Assured".

Twenty years after that, this special tabloid reprinted article after article, as support for the Cooper Lake project was boosted, received blows, and continued to be kicked around in Washington like a football.

In 1961 it was announce dthat "The Cooper Dam is NOT

Reprinted in the tabloid was an ariticle published in 1968 from Congressman Wright Patman who announced that the contracts necessary for the further development of the Cooper Reservoir project had been cleared. He made available the entire contents of the letter from the Army Corp of Engineers he had received that stated

By 1970 it was announced that only \$500,000 had been appropriated but the total cost of the project was estimated at 30,033,000!

In 71 an injunction was brought against the project. In 1976 the water districts were

"bargaining" and the cost was set at \$63,710,000!

A former Cooper resident tells me that during 1977, when the tabloid came out, drinking water had to be obtained in Cooper from a big tank truck parked downtown. Every day people had to go down and fill up containers with cooking and drinking water because the tap water was only fit for laundry, etc. Another words, there was a real need for this lake in

Cooper. Within the past few days the Cooper Lake project was finished, and special ceremonies were held. Dignitaries from all over attended the official "closing" of the valve to begin the lake filling process. The project took only a little less than 36 years!

cost....\$141,000,000! Are you beginning to get the picture here?

What possible excuse can there be for a project being handled for that length of time?

How can Congress, the Corps of Engineers and the people involved in this project possible justify what it took to make a simple lake a reality?

We all hear about the colossil amount of mis- management on various government projects...such as \$600 toilet seats for the air force and high priced hammers just like those at discount stores. But here, within a few miles of us, is an even greater,

more classic example. It really makes you wonder,

doesn't it?

Talco-Bogata CISD School Board Meets

The Talco-Bogata School Board tem. held their scheduled monthly meeting on Tuesday, October 1.

Prior to the regular meeting an Appreciation Plaque was presented to Tommy Corbell who had served 5 and one half years on the board before rsigning in July.

The board approved previous minutes, paid September bills, and approved the 1991 Tax Roll and accepted the tax report and adjustments for September.

Alvin Scooter Parish was nominated to Red River County Appraisal Review Board, replacing retiring Frank Slaon.

Frank Stubblefield was nominated to replace Johnny Ragsdill on the Red River Appraisal District Board of Directors. Ragsdill's term expires in December.

The Board accepted the superintendant and high school principal's recommendation of a policy change regarding Junior Varsity Cheerleaders. The old policy of three from Talco and three from Bogata was changed to state "No Quotas" with each cheerleader being selected by judges soley on thier ability irregardless of what town they lived in or school they went to within the sys-

The board approved a new teacher inservice caldendar for 1991-92 year to enable staff development mandated by the State and discussed shortening some school dates for teacher in-

The board approved an option of repairing of roof at Rivercrest in lieu of a complete new roof. The cost of repairs were set at \$6,800 and a new roof would cost \$85,000.

The board let bids on school insurance, rescheduled January board meeting to January 14 and approved various comittees for the school dis-

They approved a new policy concerning personal business days for certified personnel in the district.

The board in keeping with the new state laws, approved giving teachers two days of personal business leave as part of state sick leave policy.

The teachers will receive two days pesonal leave that would be deducted from state sick leave as long as it was one day per semester. The new police also gives two days of local sick leave that may be used yearly or accumulated up to a total of 10 days.

The board adjourned at 11:50 p.m. and scheduled thier next regular meeting on November 5.



Plan Now to Enjoy Fall in Your Garden

The leaves are changing colors, the air is getting cold and crisp and the excitement of a new season is in the air. Fall is the perfect time to enjoy your lawn or garden, says the American Association of Nurserymen (AAN).

There are a variety of reasons to plant in the fall. Many gardeners like to take advantage of the cooler weather and more comfortable temperatures to exercise that last bit of creativity before the chill of winter sets in.

You can prepare for fall planting by laying the groundwork in late summer, recommends AAN. Remove plants which are no longer producing or fruiting. If they are left in the garden, they continue to take up water and nutrients that could be utilized by your upcoming fall crops.

Remember to put all of your pullings through a shredder to remove organic matter or simply break them into smaller pieces yourself. This can be the start of a healthy compost or

mulch. Mulching is one of the best ways to protect your fall plants for the winter that lies

Fall can be a great time for lanting shrubs, trees, bulbs and all-flowering plants, thanks in

part to the soil's enhanced ability to retain moisture.

If you're not sure what types of plants you should use for fall, you might consider a fall vegetable garden or another "fast crop." Talk to the professionals at your local garden center about a fall garden well-suited to your temperature and climatic conditions during the autumn season.

Good choices for many areas include bush bean, beet, broccoli, spinach and turnips. Think in terms of planting hardy plants that don't need a lot of care. Other winners for a fall garden, suggests AAN, include hollies, conifers, deciduous plants, azaleas, rhododendron and several species of juniper.

Even though fall brings cooler temperatures, you should continue to water your plants through the season in the absence of rain. In fact, you may need to water year-round, as long as the ground is not frozen.

Part of fall gardening includes looking ahead to winter and thinking of ways to protect your garden from frigid temperatures and drying winds. One triedand-true way of protecting your sensitive plants is to use garden windbreaks.

To protect your plants, place three or four stakes around the plants and wrap burlap, old

sheets, old blankets or darkcolored plastic around them. This special covering provides protection from early frost and freeze damage, and it also helps ward off that extreme winter cold and wind.

If your outdoor activities in fall usually consist of barbecues and touch football games, why not add something new to the agenda? As many gardeners can attest, fall planting is a rich and rewarding way to enjoy one final burst of colorful growth before the chill of winter sets in.

Growing Out Lightweight Calves Can Add Profit To Cow-Calf Business

By Herb Brevard

Selling the calf crop for a profit is the ultimate goal of every cow-calf producer, but weaning the calves and taking them to market does not guarantee a profit, says Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extensin Service.

"Even with the good prices being received for calves today, many calves will not pay the cost of maintaining the mothe cow," said Dr. Grooms. To make th cow herd more efficient, the wise producer will cull the poor milking, late calving mothers of light-

weight calves. "Cow-calf producers still have a chance to make a profit from these lightweight calves if they will keep these calves and add another 300 pounds to their weight," Groom said. "Even if a producer can sell a calf for \$300 to \$400, there is a real profit in ation," Groms said. taking that calf to a feedlot weight of

650 or 750 pounds.

Many producers have designed feeding programs or small grain winter pastures that can put the gain on these lightweight calves for 40 to 45 cents per pound, Grooms said.

To make the plan work, Grooms has several tips for maintaining these lightweight calves:

Have calves on a good plane of nutrition at weaning.

Give recommended innoculations for disease prevention prior to wean-

Use a growth promoting implant. Provide adequate nutrition to gain

1 1/4 to 2 pounds per day per head. The cow-calf producer deserves a larger profit and has earned the opportunity for such a profit if he only takes advantage of the current situ-

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service will conduct a re-certification training on Thursday, October 3 at the Texas A&M Research & Extension Center in Overton at 8:30


