"I think I've gotten everything together, and it's all well in hand" I said, confidently, "the only thing I don't have is a baby bed. I don't quite know what to do with a two-month-old".

One of the store employees looked at me in astonishment.

"All you have to do is empty anice big drawer out of a chest of drawers" she said, obviously amazed at my ignorance.

That's exactly what I did, too. When I got home I emptied the bottom drawer out of the guest room chest, put in a quilt, covered it with a pretty flowered pillow case, and there was a safe, secure baby bed for an infant!

It set me to thinking about all the little tricks and bits of knowledge about baby raising that must floating around out the

The commission is composed of three chiefs from fulltime paid fire departments; three firefighters, including at least one actively involved in educating the public on fire prevention; three persons who are volunteer fire chiefs or volunteer firefighters; one certified fire protection engineer; one certified arson investigator; and one fire service instructor from a college, university or junior or community college.

Dean Tiffie gained 12- yards for 16 carries and for two touchdowns. He scored in the third and fourth quarters.


Tony Sanders rushed for 50 yards and scored once for the Rebels. John Smith rushed for over 80 yards as well.




