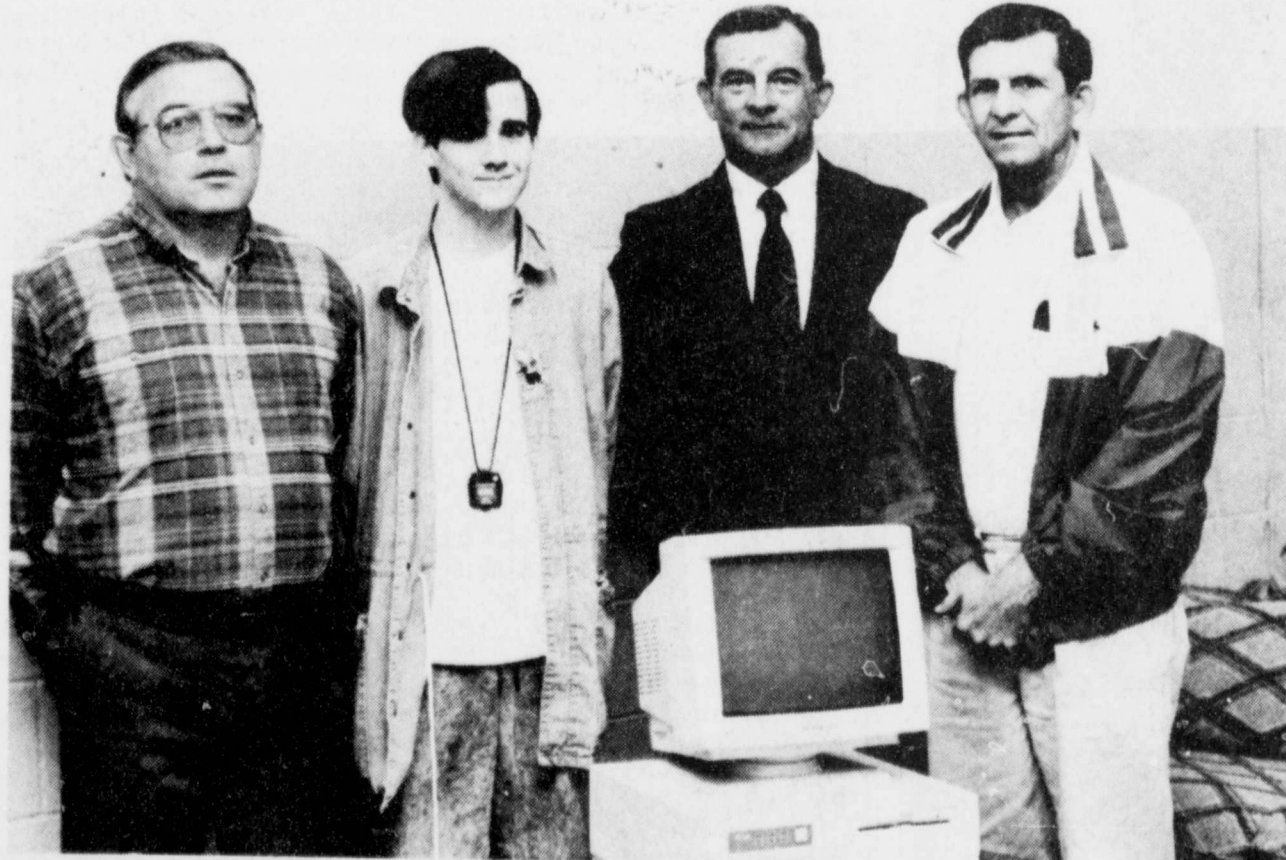

Rivercrest Announces New Academic Honor Roll

Ray Miller, Rivercrest principal, announce this week the new academic honor roll in the Talco-Bogata Schools newsletter.

This year, Rivercrest is using grade point averages (GPA) to determine the honor roll for each six weeks grading period. The system used at RHS is a weighted grade point system whereby more weight is given for more advanced courses such as trig, physics, chemistry, etc. than for regular courses. Also, more weight is given for grade level courses than for courses below grade level. Therefore, it could be possible for a student to make a "C" in a course and still be

on the honor roll and another student could make all "A's" and "B's" and not be on the honor roll. It all depends on the academic level of the students class schedule. Hopefully, students will be encouraged to take the more demanding academic courses which will better prepare them for college or careers. In order to be on the academic honor roll, students must have a GPA of 5.95 or higher. This is equivalent to a grade average of 90 or better on all grade level subjects. This method of determining the honor roll will be used in grades 9-12 and will also be used to determine the valedictorian and salutatorian of the graduating class.

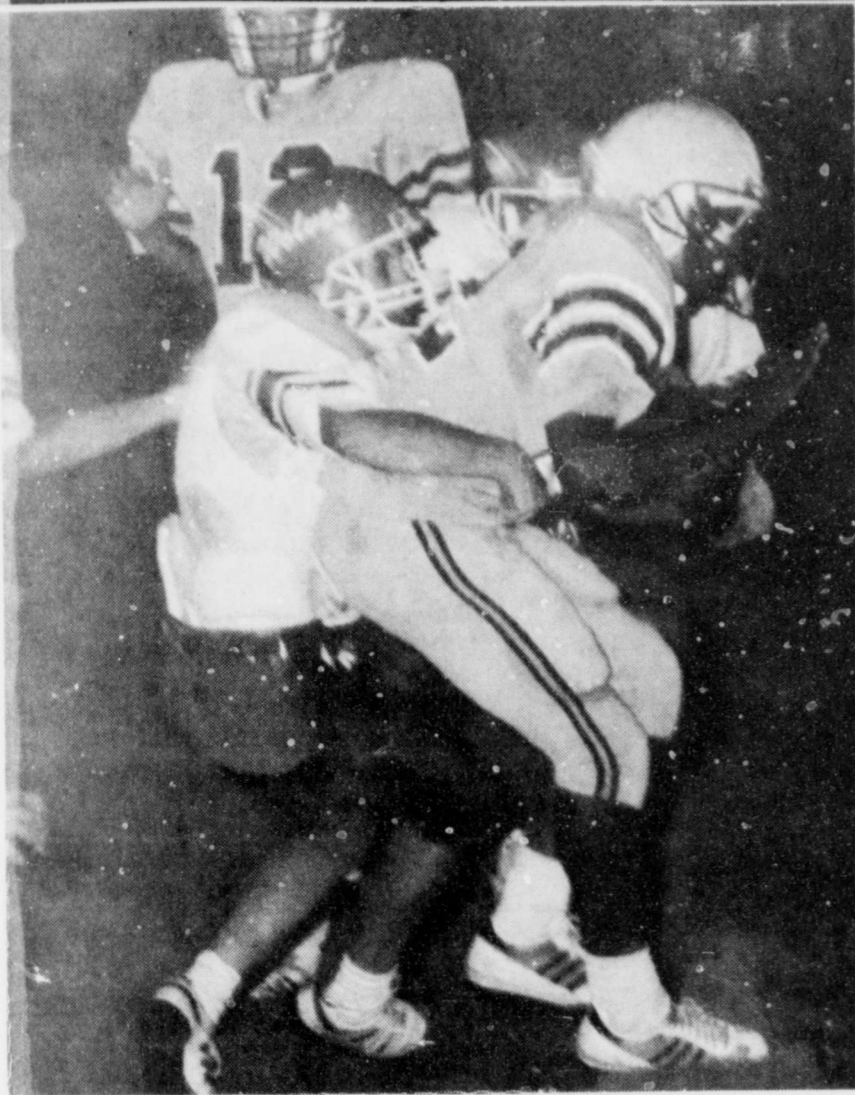

Rivercrest Rebels Overcome By Wolves

The Rivercrest Rebels were defeated by the Wolfe City Wolves last Friday night 31-15. The Rebs can't seem to grasp what they want. A victory.

Wolfe City scored on their first possession but missed the extra point. The Wolves kicked off to the Rebs and RHS moved up the field 65 yards. The Rebs scored on an 11 yard pass from John Smith to Corey Gable. Jeremy Belyeu kicked the extra point.

Dean Tiffie recovered the fumble on the ensuing kickoff. The offense drove the ball down to the 20-yard line where they ran out of downs and tried a 37-yard field goal, where they were short.

After swapping punts the Rebels again mounted an offensive threat. But a motion penalty and holding penalty pushed them back to a third and long situation from their own 49-yard line, where Wolfe City intercepted the middle screen and went 51

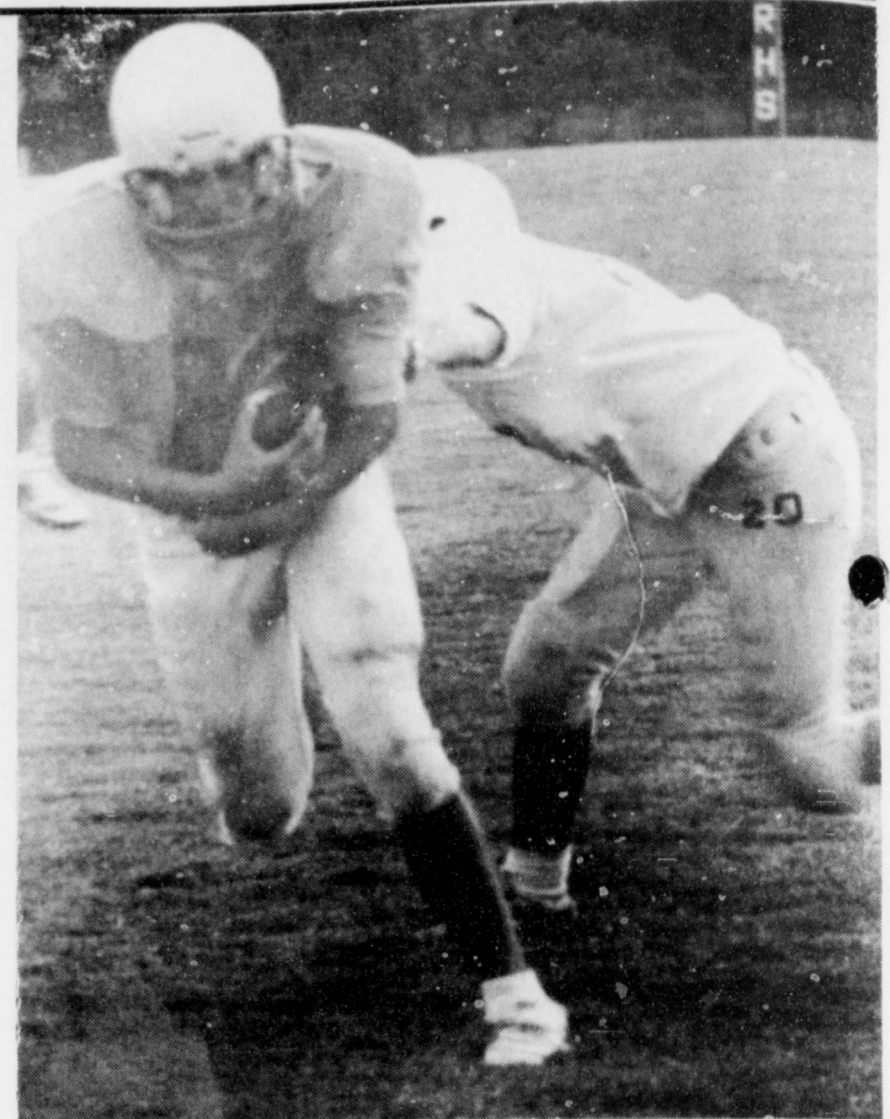

Wolfe City controlled the clock and the ball during the last half, in which they scored 12 points, and the Rebs managed a touchdown by Dean Tiffie and a 2-point conversion by John Smith, making the final score Wolfe City 31 and Rivercrest 15.

The JV Rebels dropped the game to the Wolfe City Wolves 58-6. While the Junior High Rebels lost a heart-breaker to the undefeated, unscathed Wolfe City Junior High, 20-8.

The RHS varsity will have a home game this Friday night against Chisum at 7:30 p.m. at Rebel Stadium.

The JV and Junior High will go to Chisum. The Junior High game will start at 5:30 and the JV game will follow.
