In much of the U.S. mothers are "Mommy"

Of course, "Paw" isn't that unusual in the western portion of the United States, even today.

"Pappy" has, for the most part, been relagated to moview about hill billys.

In England one hears youngsters in the streets of London, or the narrow ways of a small village calling to their "Mum" . But, in the traiditon of a father figure that is a sterner disciplinarian than his American counterpart, Father is just that.. "Father", seldom "Daddy" although somtimes "Dad".






buys an extra paper in order to send the Country Cooking recipes to her dear friend, Emma Lou Pendergrass, in Alaska.
