We received our Christmas gifts from England last week.

Included was a small card for my parents, addressed to my mother and "Daddy Hugh".

The reason for this is that our British friends thought grown people calling their father "Daddy" was quaint, sweet and quite unusual! Soon they were calling him daddy too, even though they are about the same age as he is!

All of this set me to thinking about the different terms we use for our parents. They tend to be quite regional.

Around here most children refer to their mother as "Mama" and their father as "Daddy" or "Dad". We have a friend who was horrified to hear her nieces and nephews (who had been living up north for years) refer to their maternal parent as "Mother" instead of Mom or Mama.

In much of the U.S. mothers are "Mommy".

In the southern portion fathers are "Pop" or "Papa" as well as "Dad" or "Daddy".

In areas which have had some French or Italian influence children call for their "Pa Pah" with the emphasis on the last "Pah".

Of course, "Paw" isn't that unusual in the western portion of the United States, even today.

"Pappy" has, for the most part, been relegated to movie about hill billies.

In England one hears youngsters in the streets of London, or the narrow ways of a small village calling to their "Mum".

But, in the tradition of a father figure that is a sterner disciplinarian than his American counterpart, Father is just that... "Father", seldom "Daddy" although sometimes "Dad".

Sometimes "Mummy" becomes a term of endearment.

Here in North-East Texas any child can count on knowing they are deep trouble when they hear "your Father will talk to you when he gets home"...or "What did your Mother tell you".

Those two terms, reserved for "being in the dog house" can be said with extreme emphasis. Coupled with the use of a child's full name (including the dreaded middle name) almost any kid knows that they have overstepped the bounds of good sense.

But it really doesn't matter whether it's "Pop" or "Dad", "Mom" or "Mama"...it's the thought that counts.

And those abbreviations of the rather formal "Mother" and "Father" may well be the sweetest words any parent ever hears!

## Talco - Bogata CISD Poll Released

The Talco-Bogata CISD released an opinion poll this week for the purpose of collecting input from the residents of the district concerning the future arrangement of our campuses and facilities.

"We want to involve our community in the initial phase of planning so that our final plans for restructuring will reflect the indicated concerns of our communities as a whole. If the Administration and Board of Trustees formulate a plan that doesn't reflect the will of our voters and taxpayers then all the effort and expense that goes into such detailed work is wasted," said Superintendent Freddy Wade.

Opinion Polls were mailed to all households of registered voters in the Talco-Bogata CISD on Wednesday.

The pamphlet includes a letter explaining why the district needs to make some changes in campus organization. It also reviews four options for residents to consider. All four options have one common factor, combining seventh and eighth graders on one campus. The issues in the poll are (1) On what campus do we combine seventh and eighth graders, and (2) How do we organize our K-6 campuses.

The pamphlet is designed to allow the recipient to detach the opinion poll from the text and mail back to the district. It is already stamped and addressed for return. All the recipient has to do is study the four options and indicate their preference by checking the corresponding option. Then place

it back in the mail box for return to the school district.

The district encourages every resident to express their opinion and assist in the planning of the educational needs of our district.

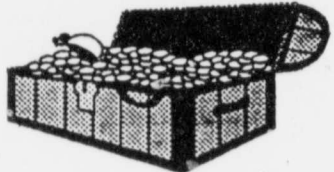

### Yankee Layer Cake By Jettie Bond

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup butter
- 4 egg yolks
- 3 1/2 cups flour
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 cup of wine or fruit juice
- 1 cup chopped raisins
- 1 cup each-nuts, dates, jam (blackberry)
- 2 apples, chopped
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 tsp each-nutmeg, cinnamon, cloves and allspice

Fold in egg white that have been beaten. Mix all ingredients. Bake in layers at 350 until done.

### Chess Pie

- 5 egg yolks
- 1/3 cup flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup butter
- 1/2 cup milk

Cream butter and sugar until light. Add egg yolks one at a time. Add milk and flour. Use the whites of eggs for your icing if you wish. Bake in 2 un-baked pie crusts for 45 minutes at 325.

### Cranberry Date Bars

- 16 oz. can whole berry cranberry sauce
- 1 cup chopped dates
- 1 1/4 cups all purpose flour
- 1 cup quick cooking rolled oats
- 2/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 cup margarine or butter, softened

Heat oven to 350. Grease 9" square pan. In medium saucepan, combine cranberry sauce and dates. Bring to boil. Simmer 5 minutes, cool slightly. Lightly spoon flour into measuring cup; level off. In medium bowl, combine: flour, oats, brown sugar and cinnamon, cut in margarine, mixing until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Press half of mixture firmly in bottom of pan. Spread evenly with remaining crumbs, pat lightly. Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes or until golden brown. Cool completely. Cut into bars. Makes 24.

### Stir Drop Sugar Cookies

- 2 eggs
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2/3 cup of cooking oil
- 2 cups all purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2/3 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 teaspoons baking powder

Drop with teaspoon 2" apart on un-greased cookie sheet. Flatten with

greased glass dipped in sugar. Bake at 400 for 8-10 minutes.

### Chicken or Turkey Hash

- 1/2 stick (2 oz.) butter or margarine
- 3 cups onions, diced
- 3 cups red or green peppers, diced
- 5 cups cooked chicken or turkey, diced
- 4 cups potatoes, diced
- 1 can cream of celery soup
- pepper and salt to taste
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/3 cup grated parmesan cheese

Saute onion in butter in dutch oven until onions are soft. Add next 6 ingredients. Stir and cook to heat thoroughly. Spoon mixture into large baking dish. Brush egg over top of mixture, sprinkle with cheese. Bake in 400 oven for 10 minutes or longer until top is golden brown. This is great for any omelette or turkey, during the holidays. If no left over, I'll sometime buy pre-cooked chicken or turkey.

### Delicious Chicken

- vegetable oil for greasing pan
- 5 lbs. chicken thighs or chicken pieces
- Sauce:
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 cup frozen orange juice (concentrate)
- 1/3 cup butter or margarine, melted
- 2 teaspoons ground ginger
- 4 teaspoons soy sauce

Combine salt, pepper, orange juice, butter, ginger and soy sauce. Grease 2 11x17" baking pans well with vegetable oil, place chicken in single layers in pans. Baste well with sauce, cover and refrigerate overnight. Bake uncovered at 350 for about 60 minutes, basting with sauce once during cooking.

### Fat Rascals

- Potato Cheese Puffs
- 1 cup mashed potatoes
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 2 cups (8 oz.) shredded American or Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- salt, pepper to taste
- salad oil for frying

Combine ingredients except oil, mix well. Pour about 2" of salad oil into frying pan and heat to 375. Drop batter by tablespoons, 4 or 5 at a time into hot oil. Fry 3-4 minutes or until golden brown. Serve immediately. Makes about 24 puffs.

### Cottage Cheese Salad

- 1 (1 lb. 8 oz.) carton small curd cottage cheese
- 1 small jar pimentos
- 2 sweet bell peppers, chopped

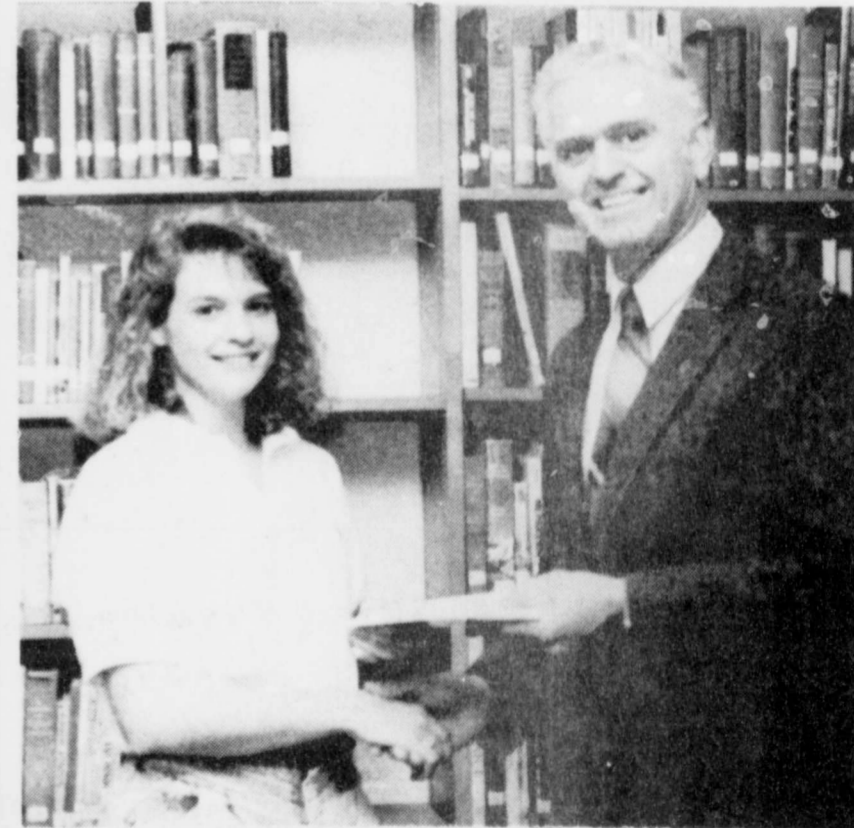

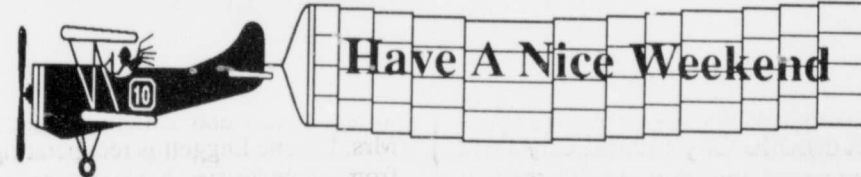

Friday, November 22, Rivercrest takes on school rival Prairiland, beginning at 4 p.m.

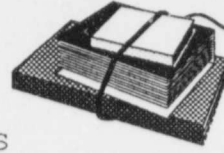

The unclassified receiving waters of Mustang Creek have no significant aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 0303 are contact recreation and high quality aquatic habitat. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing in stream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revisions.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will enforce more stringent effluent limitations in order to meet existing applicable rules and regulations. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application specifically requests a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and daytime phone number of the person making the request; (2) the statement "...request a public hearing"; and (3) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the application, or that a public hearing, would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.
