Drue Pirtle Files For Re-Election

H. Drue Pirtle announces he has filed for a place on the Democratic Party 1992 Primary Ballot for re-election to the office of County Commissioner, Precinct 1 of Red River County.

Pirtle stated, "We have made a lot of progress in county government in the last four years and I hope to continue to serve you for the next four years."

In reviewing the last four years, some of the accomplishments made by the county to the courthouse include: a new roof, cleaning the outside of the building, installing central heat and air conditioning in the hallways; new rest rooms, a concrete ramp and an elevator to make the building handicapped accessible, an automatic sprinkling system for the lawn and new landscaping. A concrete parking lot was built on the North side of the building and new sidewalks were built on the East side. Additional improvements are planned for the future.

Within the last years, the county has also purchased a larger computer system and the Red River Bank build-

ing which has been renovated and is being used as the courthouse annex.

During the last four years, the working equipment in Precinct 1 has been up-graded to include: new motor grader, used track loader, used dump truck, new pickup truck, and a new Ford tractor. Also, fifteen steel railroad tank cars were installed to replace bridges that had to be removed. Additionally, twelve large bridges have been rebuilt. Several miles of roads have been re-oiled and two miles of roads have been paved.

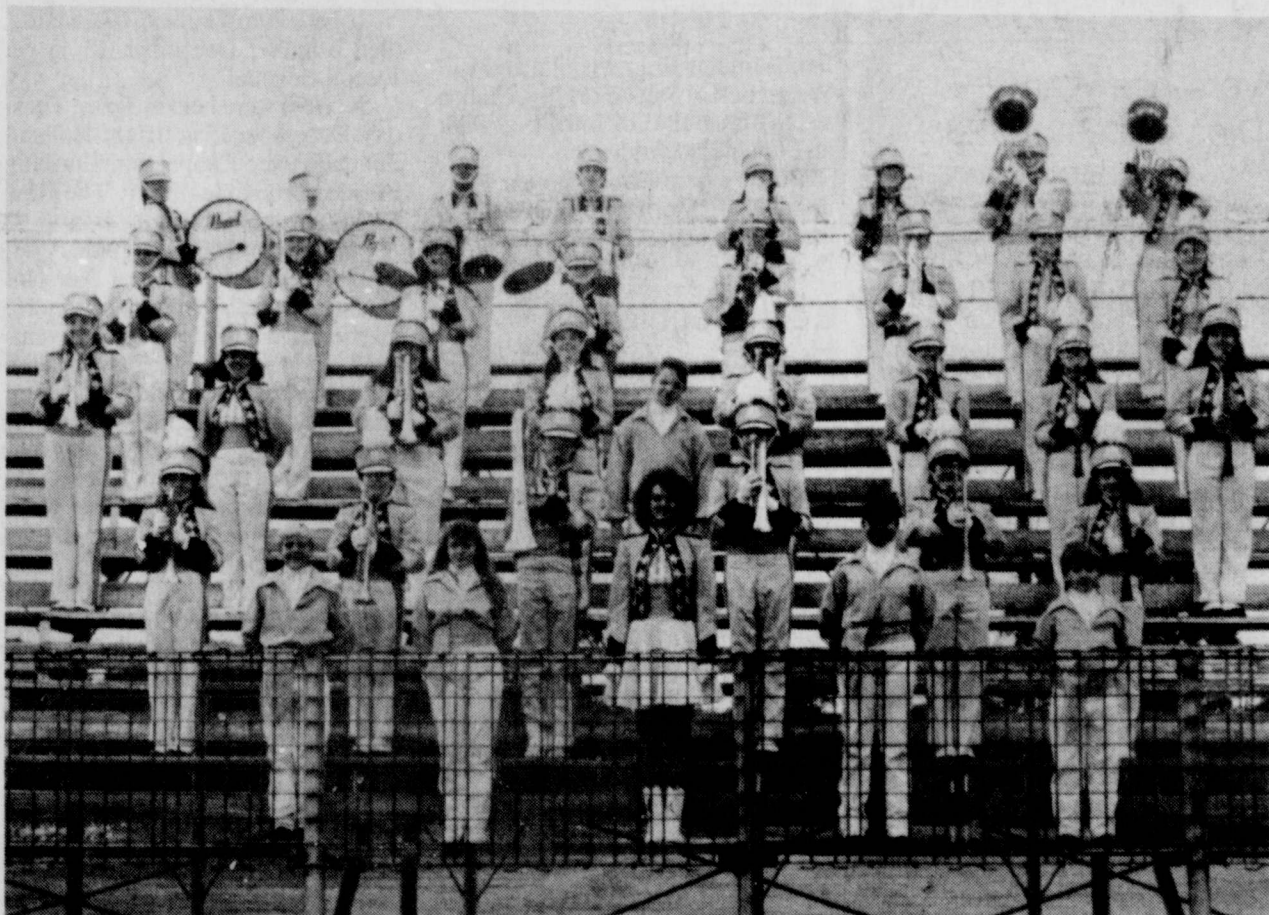
Pirtle stated, "All of the above improvements have been made in the last four years with a tax rate decrease. The county tax rate four years ago was 61.350 and the current tax rate is 57.490 cents per hundred."

Plans for the future include a new bridge across Sulphur River. If the bridge is built by the State Highway Department, the county will apply for a new Farm to Market road from Cuthand to Sulphur River.

"I hope to visit with as many of you as I can before the election on March 10, 1992," Pirtle said.

Egg Custard

- 4 slightly beaten eggs
- 2 1/2 cups milk, scalded
- 1 9" unbaked pastry shell
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup sugar

Thoroughly mix eggs, sugar, salt and vanilla. Slowly stir in hot milk. At once, pour into unbaked pastry shell. Dash top with nutmeg. Bake in very hot oven, 475, for five minutes. Reduce heat to 425 and bake until custard sets.

Creamy Pralines

- 3 cups sugar
- 3/4 cup white Karo syrup
- 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 2 1/2 cups pecans
- 1 1/2 cups homogenized milk
- 1 pinch soda
- 3/4 stick Parkay margarine or butter

Cook sugar, milk and soda and karo over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture reaches soft ball stage. Test in cold water, even if you use a candy thermometer and remove from heat as soon as a small amount forms a soft ball in cold water. After removing mixture from heat source, add vanilla and margarine or butter. Stir until candy begins to hold its shape, then stir in pecans and drop onto buttered cookie sheet. Cooking time is extremely important. Cook too long and mixture will be too hard—for too short a time and the candy will not hold its shape.

Crock Pot Mexican Dinner

- 2 lbs. ground meat
 - 1 can cream of mushroom soup
 - 1 can Ro-Tel tomatoes
 - tortilla chips or nacho chips
 - 1 medium onion, chopped
 - 1 can enchilada sauce
 - 1 lb. American cheese, grated
- Brown ground meat with chopped onion. Place in crock pot on low setting. Heat soup, tomatoes and enchilada sauce and add to crock pot, along with cheese. Let cook several hours or all day. About 20 minutes before serving, mix in desired amount of chips. This makes a complete meal when served with green salad.

Brown Sugar Delites

- 2 sticks margarine
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 6-12 oz. hocolate chips
- 2 large eggs
- 4 cups flour
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 cups brown sugar, packed
- 1 cup nuts, chopped

Cream sugar and margarine together. Add eggs and vanilla and mix well. Add flour, soda and salt and mix well. Stir in nuts and chocolate chips. Form into small balls on lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 325 to 350 until lightly browned.

Cheese Cake

- Crust and topping:
- 2 pkgs. from a box of graham crackers,

- rolled fine
- 1/4 lb. margarine, melted

Mix together and line bottom of 9x13x2" pan with 1/2 of the mixture. Press down firmly.

Filling:
Chill one large can of pet milk in freezer until very cold. Beat to the consistency of whipped cream. Set aside.

- Beat together:
- 8 oz. pkg. Philadelphia Cream Cheese
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Combine the cream cheese mixture with whipped milk. Set aside.

Mix on pkg. lemon jello in 1/2 cup boiling water and place in bowl of ice water to thicken. As soon as the mixture begins to thicken, beat it until foamy and add to cream cheese/whipped milk mixture. Pour mixture over graham cracker mixture in the pan. Top with remaining graham cracker mixture. Chill.

Easy Chocolate Ice Cream

- 1/2 gallon chocolate milk
- 1 can Eagle Brand milk
- 1-12 oz. carton Cool Whip

Pour in one gallon ice cream freezer and finish filling with homogenized milk. Freeze.

Lemon Bars

- 1 cup soft margarine
- 2 1/4 cups flour, divided
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 2 cups sugar
- dash of salt
- 1/3 cup lemon juice
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar
- 1 tsp. baking powder

Combine margarine, 2 cups flour, 1/2 cup powdered sugar; blend until smooth. Press into greased 13x9x2 baking dish, forming 1/2" sides around the pan. Bake at 300 about 30 minutes or until lightly browned.

Combine beaten eggs, sugar and lemon juice and mix well. Add 1/4 cup flour, salt and baking powder. Beat well and pour over pastry. Bake at 300 for 30-40 minutes. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Buttermilk Cake
1 cup Crisco
3 cups flour
1 cup buttermilk
3 cups sugar
1/4 tsp. soda
2 tsp. vanilla
6 eggs
1/2 tsp. salt
Cream sugar and shortening. Separate eggs; add one egg yolk at a time to sugar and shortening, beating after each addition. Sift dry ingredients together. Add to first mixture alternately with buttermilk. Beat egg whites and fold in. Bake in greased and floured tube pan at 325 for about one hour and 10 minutes.

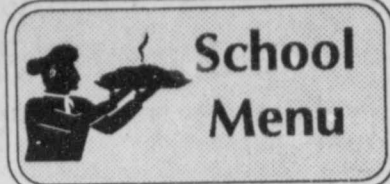
Paris Wildcats, Lady Wildcats Defeat Rivercrest

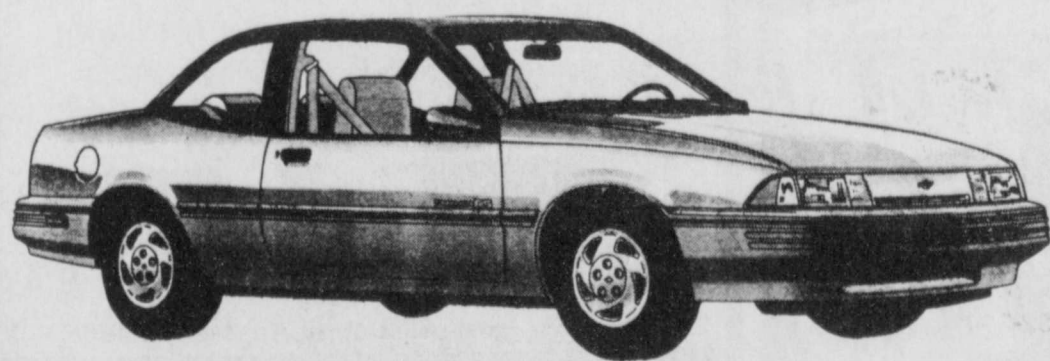

How To Understand Your Child's Development

Reprinted with permission, National Education Association of the United States, Copyright 1987.

Just as important as how to talk with your child is how to listen as he or she talks with you. The most valuable thing you can give your child is your time and attention. Communication is a two way process. With a child it requires more listening than talking on your part, for it often takes a great deal of time to grasp his problems and concerns between the lines of what he says. Giving your child time each day for her alone to talk with you indicates you really care about your child's concerns.

The basic ingredients of your relationship should be love and warmth, liberally laced with respect and understanding. The child who drinks in the security of these attitudes from a parent is more able to develop a healthy personality and to grow ever outward into the world. To your child, the most crucial words in your vocabulary may well be, "I understand how you feel."

Every child needs his or her parents to impose some limits on freedom. Otherwise, the world is too big and disorganized for the child to adjust to it. But it doesn't matter very much whether a home is "permissive" or "strict" about the number or kinds of limits enforced. More crucial to a child's development is how the parents place the limits, how they discipline, and how well they understand their child's special needs.

Some generalizations about children at the various stages of their lives can help you understand your children and communicate with them more meaningfully. To use these clues effectively, you must recognize the individuality of your children, love and respect them for the individuals they are, and adapt what you say to your own situation.

Living Wills

This is not one of my favorite subjects, but one which I believe needs to be considered, so here goes.

What would you want done to keep you alive? Recent court rulings on the "right to die" have a lot of people thinking about that.

The U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that there must be proof of a patient's wish to die rather than be kept alive in a vegetative condition. To provide that proof, a living will is essential say lawyers, doctors, and others who counsel individuals on patients' rights.

An estimated 15-20 percent of Americans have written living wills already, but many are not specific enough to assure that the patient's wishes will be followed.

If you're interested in more information, you can contact the Society for the Right to Die. Write them at 250 West 57th Street, New York, NY 10107.

Living-will forms are also available for \$1 and a self-addressed, stamped envelope from The Medical Directive, Harvard Medical School Health Letter, 164 Longwood Ave., 4th floor, Boston, MA 02115.

After completing a living will, one copy should be given to your doctor and one copy to your next of kin. A living will should be reviewed periodically, as you might not feel the same in years to come.

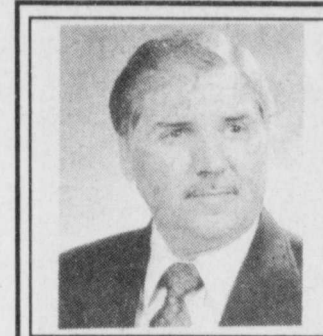

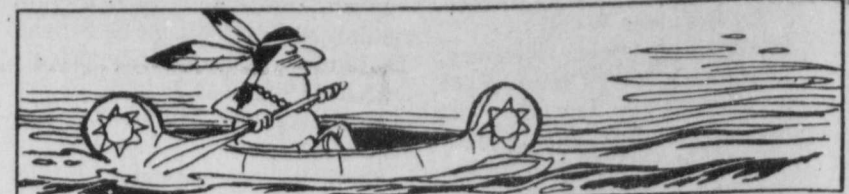
