"Rehabilitation" Of Hwy. 271 Begins

For the 3,500 motorists who drive along US 271 between Deport and Bogata every day, the wait is finally over. Rehabilitation along the roadway is expected to begin this month. In December, the Texas Transportation Commission awarded a \$2.5 million contract to Jordan Paving Construction of Irving to resurface the 7.2 miles of highway between the two cities.

"For the past five years, we've had to do a lot of patch work on 271 because the money simply wasn't there to do the full reconstruction. At

the same time, motorists still drove the road and the condition worsened with traffic. This contract will put a new face on that section of the highway," Paris District Design Engineer Ken Jones said.

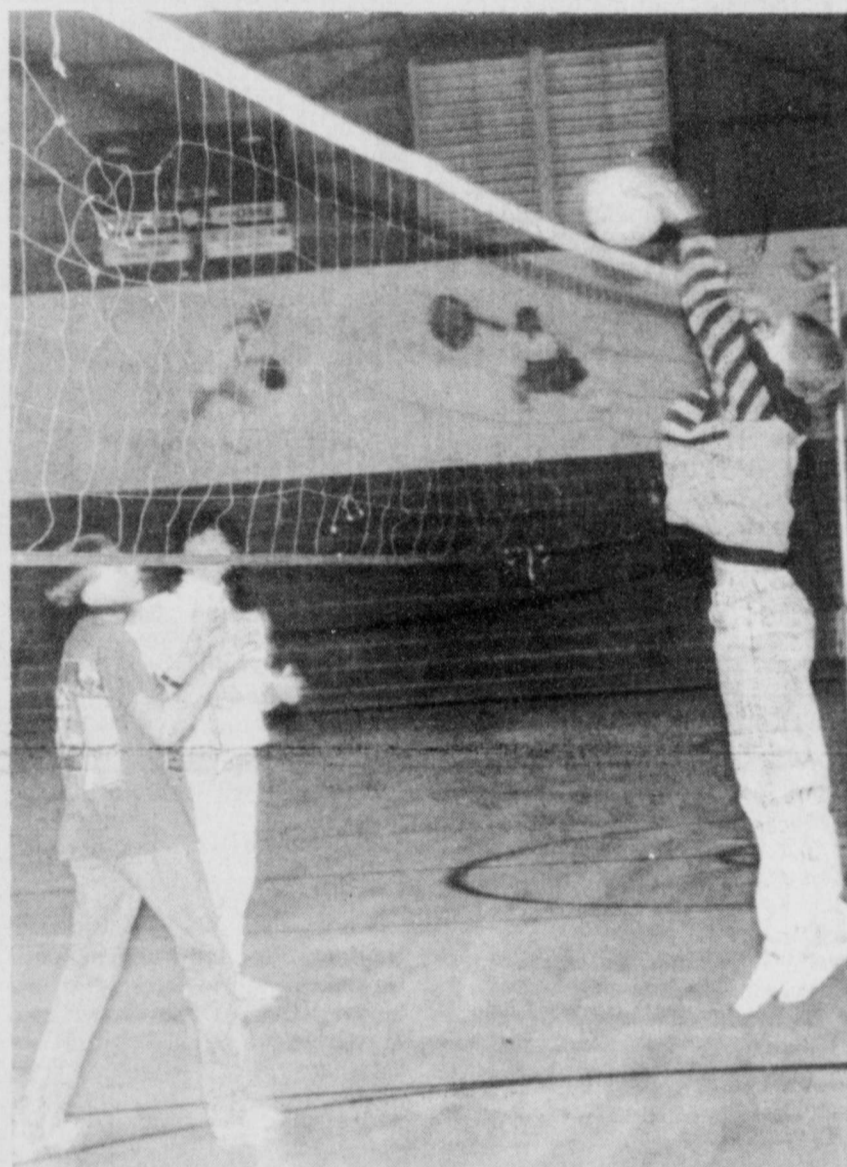
Although Red River and Lamar

County residents have been waiting for the good news, the construction does not come without a cost, in time. Lamar County Resident Engineer Jim Hall, who will oversee the project for the department, does expect some traffic slowdowns dur-

ing construction.

Hall added that motorists should exercise caution through the construction areas and observe warning signs.

Reconstruction on the remaining 13 mile stretch of the highway from Deport to Paris is still in the planning process. The Transportation Commission and Texas Department of Transportation must approve funding for the second stage of the reconstruction plan which may cost an additional \$6.5 million.

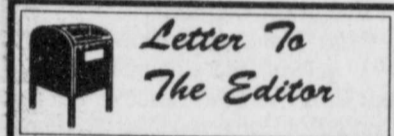
Organizational Meeting Scheduled For Little Dribblers

Note: MaryLou Clements, M.D., M.P.H., Professor at Johns Hopkins University Schools of Medicine and Public Health, Baltimore, MD wrote a recent letter to the editor of the Longview News-Journal concerning AIDS, dismayed by a letter in the December 22 issue which the writer stated "no public and/or congressional funding should be forthcoming for AIDS research." Clements points out a few foibles in the letter in question, namely that AIDS is not caused by promiscuity, rather by a virus, the Human Immunodeficiency Virus, that is transmitted to humans by three routes of contact: via infected blood, sexual intercourse and perinatally. She goes on to point out that last week the World Health Organization announced that over 10 million people are now infected with HIV, and by the year 2000, over 30 million people will be infected worldwide. No country in the world has been spared.

Clements further stated that "if the epidemic continues at the current rate, we will have to add the teenage populations to the groups at risk for AIDS because of the occupation of the mate(s) they chose. Public funding for AIDS vaccine research has already paid off, in that we now anticipate having the vaccines to prevent AIDS by the year 2000. But the only way to assure that we succeed is to continue to obtain sufficient research funding globally for this purpose from all sectors, public and private."

Tommie Corbell Running For Pct. 1 Commissioner

Tommie R. Corbell, a retired Southwestern Bell Telephone Company employee and a native of Bogata announced his candidacy for County Commissioner of Precinct 1.

He is a Bogata High School graduate and attended Odessa College where he majored in business administration. He served in the U.S. Navy during the Korean War aboard the U.S.S. Los Angeles. He spent 36 months in overseas duty with 24 months combat time. After his discharge, he returned to work for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. He has many years of experience in preparing budgets. He has assisted in figuring budgets for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., the City of Bogata, and the Talco-Bogata C.I.S. D.

He is now serving on the Board of

Bogata Housing Authority, and is a member of the Bogata Lions Club. He is Vice-President of the Bogata Cemetery Association and past Council President of Telephone Pioneers of America. He is currently serving as Member-at-Large, Director of Retired Employees.

"It is my desire to improve the roads all over Precinct 1 and assist the County Judge and the other Commissioners in conducting better county government at the least possible cost. I will oppose any raise in salary for the position I am serving.

"I will make an effort to contact every voter in the precinct before the March election. I would like to have everyone's vote and support."

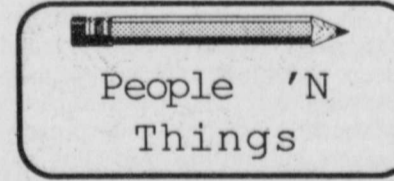

Please voice your opinion on the project to Lion Jack Crane at the Bogata Post Office at your convenience.

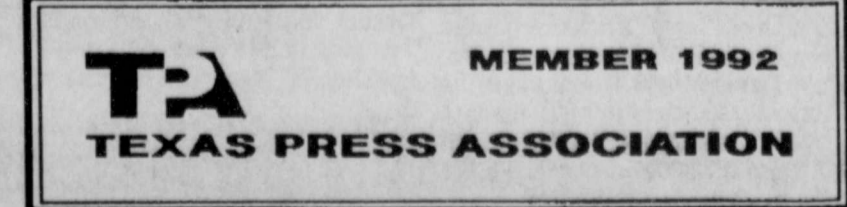

Country Cooking

Well, the holidays have swiftly come and gone and a lot of food was cooked and enjoyed. I'm sure a lot of the readers have said, "I'm not cooking or eating for 'X' number of days again." However, go ahead and read this article, cut out the recipes, because like most all resolutions, you will want to eat again.

Since this article is the first article published in 1992, I thought it appropriate to interview the editor of our paper. So, this week the Country Cooking Column is coming to you from the dining room of Thomas and Nanalee Nichols of Deport.

Thomas and Nanalee have been married for 22 years and both were born and reared in the Deport area. Both attend the First Presbyterian Church of Deport. Nanalee has been an employee of the Thunder Prairie paper for 15 years and has been the publisher since December of 1982. She also has a part time job at Paris Travel Consultants in Paris, she has worked there for the past six years. This job finances all their trips to far away places which is Nanalee's number one hobby. She also enjoys gardening, cooking, reading, crafts, color photography, woodcrafting and painting. Nanalee enjoys competing in color photography contests. She has come away with many ribbons for her outstanding artwork. Of all the traveling, Nanalee enjoys Europe most of all. She also enjoys reading science fiction books most of all.

Both Thomas and Nanalee enjoy entertaining family and friends on special occasions. Thomas helps a lot in the kitchen when expecting guests. She says he also gets the urge some-

times to make fudge which is delicious.

Nanalee also enjoys growing beautiful yard flowers in the spring and summer.

She has chosen some special recipes that they have enjoyed around the world and have made many times for guests in their own home. She is sharing two separate recipes and then a complete Indian dinner which they serve and enjoy a lot. The first recipe is called Roast Beef and Yorkshire Pudding. This is not a dessert. It is an English Pudding which is not sweet. She compares these two items to our Pinto beans and Cornbread. They are almost inseparable.

Nanalee has served this recipe for the past six years every Christmas. She got the recipe from a friend in Yorkshire, England.

The Spaghetti Sauce is an authentic type of sauce. She got this recipe about 21 years ago. Nanalee says this is the best sauce she has ever eaten anywhere. She ordered spaghetti during the past summer in Italy and it was this very recipe. This has made Nanalee like it even more.

The East Indian dinner, which includes Tandoori Chicken, Curried Rice and Poori recipes all go together to make a complete meal. This recipe came from a cookbook. They had eaten East Indian food in Dallas once, looked for a recipe for it, and finally found one about three years ago. This is a very spicy dinner.

Roast Beef and Yorkshire Pudding

Remember, English pudding is not a sweet!!
1 rib roast or other good roast
2 eggs
1 cup milk
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup flour
(Yorkshire pudding can be doubled or tripled easily.)

Cook roast to desired stage. Preferably a little pink in center. 30 minutes before roast is done, beat eggs in bowl until foaming. Gradually beat in salt and flour with whisk until smooth. Let stand at room temperature. Remove roast to platter. Set oven up to 400. Generously grease a muffin pan (12 muffin cups). Heat muffin pan for 5 minutes. Fill cups to 1/2 full and bake 30 minutes or until golden brown. Loosen puddings immediately. They will be rather hollow. Make gravy with pan drippings and serve roast, pudding and gravy.

Authentic Italian Spaghetti Sauce

3/4 cup chopped onion
2 cloves fresh garlic or 3/4 tsp. garlic powder
2 cans stewed tomatoes
12 oz. can tomato paste
2 cans tomato sauce
1 1/2 tsp. salt
1 1/2 tsp. oregano
1 tsp. sugar
large pinch of Italian seasonings
1 lb. good hamburger meat
fresh mushrooms if desired

Cook onions, garlic and meat until brown. Drain well. Add all other ingredients, except mushrooms, stirring well. Add about 2 cups water. Simmer at least 30 minutes, but the more it simmers, the better it will get! Add chopped mushrooms about 15 minutes before finished simmering. Serve over spaghetti with grated cheese.

Indian Dinner

Tandoori Chicken:
1 diced onion
1 clove garlic
3 Tbl. salad oil
2 Tbl. lemon juice
1 Tbl. curry powder
1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper (if you like it spicy)
1 cut up chicken or chicken breasts
1/2 cup plain yogurt

Combine all ingredients except chicken and yogurt in blender. Blend until pureed. Pour into glass casserole dish, stir until blended. Make shallow, diagonal slashes in chicken. Add chicken to yogurt mix, coat well and refrigerate overnight. Grill until done on outdoor barbeque grill OR broil in oven until done. Baste often with yogurt mix. Serve with curried rice and poori bread.

Curried Rice:
Saute chopped onion in a little butter. When tender mix with 1/2 cup frozen green peas. Cook your favorite rice, long-cooking or "minute" rice. Stir in from 1 tsp. to 3 tsp. curry powder and onion-pea mix. Amount of curry powder depends on how spicy you like it.

Poori:
1 cup all purpose flour
1 cup whole wheat flour
1 tsp. salt
1/2 cup water

oil
In medium bowl, stir flours, water and salt and 1 1/2 tsp. salad oil until well blended. Mixture will be very dry. Knead until it holds together and is smooth (about 10 minutes). Shape into ball, place in greased bowl and grease top. Cover in plastic wrap, let rest 10 minutes. Heat 1" salad oil in electric skillet to 400 or use a medium saucepan. Meanwhile roll dough into 20 small balls. On lightly floured board, roll each ball into paper thin circle. Edges will be ragged. Drop circle one at a time into oil. With slotted spoon, gently hold circle under surface until it puffs, about 10 seconds. Fry 20 seconds more, turn once, remove and drain on paper

Detroit last Thursday night. The Rebs won 44-33. (Staff Photo by Nancy Brown)

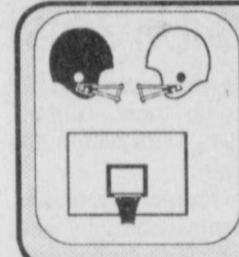

RRC Genealogical Society To Meet

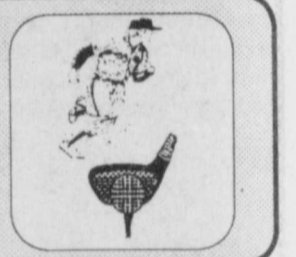

Tigers Squeeze By Struggling Rebels, 40-35

The Rivercrest Lady Rebels were given a break last Friday as the Rebel men were the only ones scheduled for basketball action.

In varsity play, Rivercrest dominated the first period with an 11-4 lead over Mt. Vernon. Junior guard Dean Tiffie connected on two consecutive three-pointers followed by senior forward, Eric Curties addition of an 18-foot jumper for 2.

Strong defense and pressure by the Rebs prevented Mt. Vernon's scoring until the clock read 2:34 in the first.

At this point, the Tigers busted their first two of the night. A Rebel foul then gained Mt. Vernon possession, making it good for two more. Tiffie again met this play with another three.

The second quarter saw a slower pace of play for the Rebs. However, the Tigers came back in a rage as they knotted the score at 14-14 with 2:11 remaining in the second.

Senior post Corey Gable controlled the second period with 5 points for the Rebel side, ending it 18-14 in Rebel favor.

Straight from the halftime intermission, the Tigers were determined to make a crowd-pleasing comeback, and so they did.

Assists by Curties and Eddie Williams contributed only eight Rebel points for the third stanza.

Moreover, the Tigers did benefit from the last 2:00 of the third.

Two 3-point shots as well as 2 free

shots put the Mt. Vernon Tigers 28-26 over the Rebels going into the final stanza.

The final eight minutes were filled with Rebel foul trouble in addition to various missed shots.

The Tigers stayed on top of the situation as they ripped 10 of 14 free throws in the final quarter.

The final score on the board read 40-35, with the visiting Mt. Vernon Tigers victorious.

Overall scorer for the night was Tiger Dustin Carr with 16, followed by Rebel Tiffie with 12. Jason Reynolds added 11 to Tiger efforts.

In JV ball, the Rebels eased by with a 44-42 victory. Mike McGee was the leading scorer with 14 points.

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1300 Hwy 37 North in Clarksville. The next clinic will be held January 9 from 9 until 11:30 a.m. and from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Future clinics will be held on the first Wednesday, second Thursday and fourth Monday of each month.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guide-

lines, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

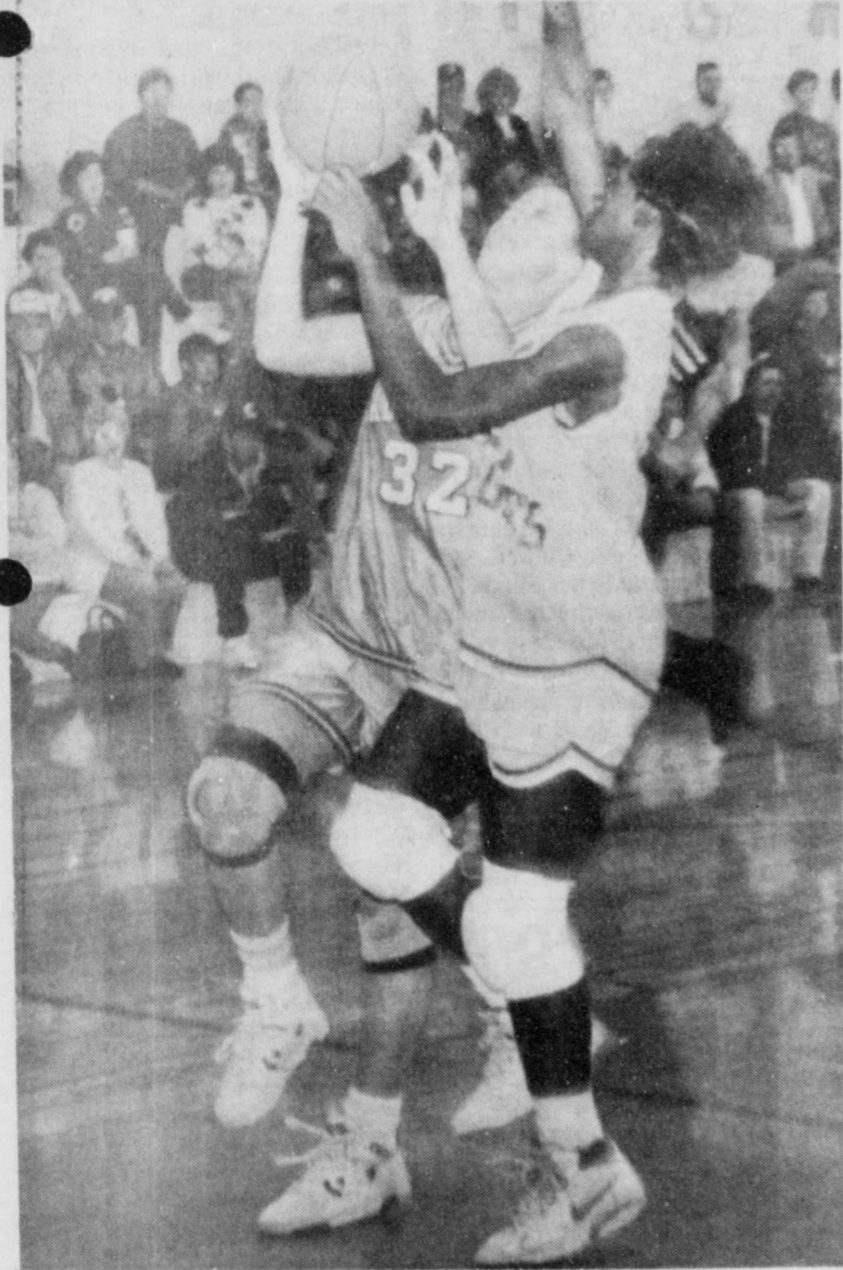

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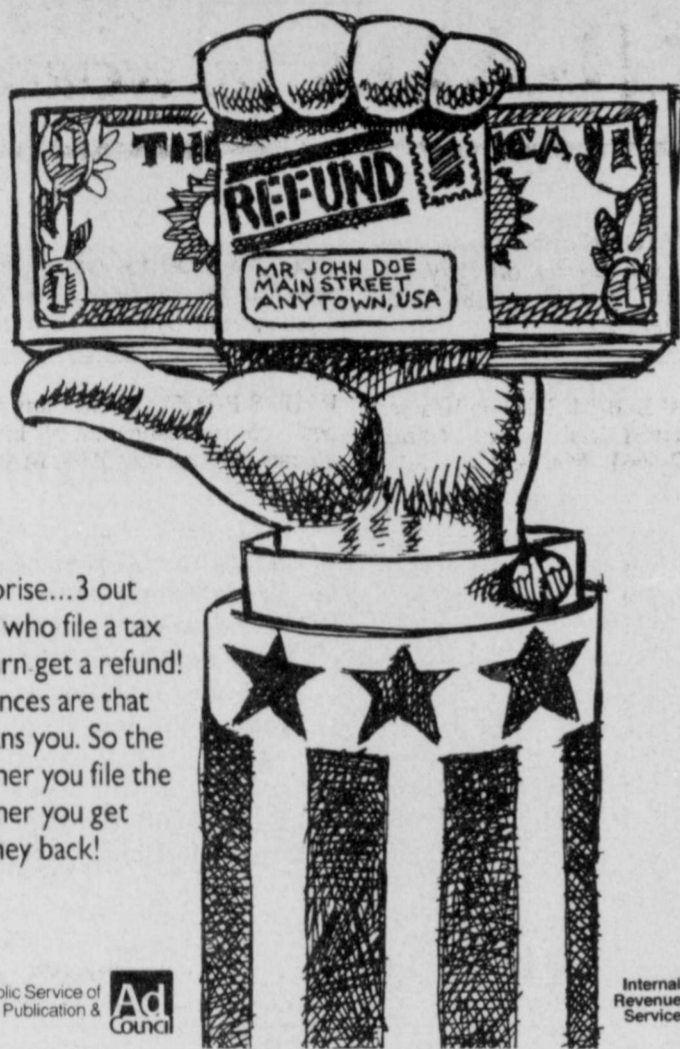
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Encouraging Progress Against Parkinson's Disease

Here's good news for a change: People with Parkinson's disease—a disorder of the nervous system that leads to loss of muscular control—have a better chance of living longer and better, thanks to progress in medical research. Some of the latest developments:



New medications, some delivered through skin patches, are improving life for many with Parkinson's disease.

• Scientists can now measure the extent of nerve damage to the dopamine-producing neurons in the brain through a process called PET scan.

• A new medication called Eldepryl appears to slow the progression of the illness in the early stages.

• Scientists are working to develop improved methods of diagnosis. If diagnosed early, treatment for the disease could begin much earlier and could be much more successful.

• Scientists are working on different methods of delivering anti-Parkinson medication—injection pumps, transdermal skin patches and slow-release forms of Sinemet, which contains levodopa. Sen. Bill Ratliff Working To Save Highway Dept. Offices

State Senator Bill Ratliff of Mt. Pleasant joined with Senator Bill Haley of Center and Senator Kenneth Armbrister of Victoria in filing a Senate bill which would increase the number of district highway offices of the Texas Department of Transportation to the original number of twenty-four.

Senator Ratliff agreed to co-sponsor the bill after new information from the Texas Department of Transportation implied that the closing of the six offices as a result of legislation passed during the regular session may not be the cost saving tool that the Department originally assumed.

"Should the state verify that the closing of the highways offices in Atlanta and Paris would not actually

save the state of Texas additional revenue, I would naturally want to see to it that those offices are restored. It is important to keep these offices open and operating to serve the people of Northeast Texas", said Ratliff.

The bill has been filed with the hopes that Governor Richards will include it in her call during his third called special session of the Legislature.

There has been much concern from the citizens of Northeast Texas about the closing of the Paris and Atlanta offices. I certainly hope the Governor's office will include this subject in the call during the current special session in order that we may have the time to determine the reality of alleged cost savings," said Ratliff.
