The temperatures hovered right at the freezing point, keeping roads in better shape than usual during a snow storm.

That wasn't to say that there weren't plenty of slick spots on roads and sidewalks, though.

While Paris collected about six inches of the snow, as did Blossom

and Clarksville, only a few miles further south, at Deport and Bogata, the accumulation wasn't quite as deep. Towards Talco the snowfall decreased even more, while Mt. Pleasant had virtually no snow.

Children of all ages enjoyed the snow, making snow men and women dressed in western hats, top hats, berets, sunglasses and a variety of imaginative outfits.

Their creations were doomed to a brief life-span, however, as the snow melted away more and more as Sat-

urday progressed. Sunday the snow people and expanses sheltered on the north side of buildings were almost all that survived of the winter's first snowfall.

This week's weather saw colder night temperatures, with a warming trend towards the middle of the week. Rain mid-week is expected to be replaced by another arctic front over the weekend. Will it bring more of the white stuff? Not even a weather-man knows for sure!

For the last 39 years, Hausler has lived in Red River County. He is a cattleman, does custom hay work in the summer and currently owns CH Wrecker Service and Salvage.

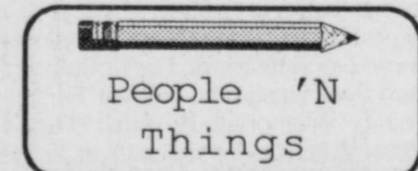
Carl has two sons, Eric 16 and Willie, 10, who are students in

## Clayton Hall Files For Re-election As Red River County Attorney

Clayton L. Hall announces his candidacy for re-election to the office of County Attorney of Red River County. Mr. Hall has served as County Attorney since January 1, 1989 and states that he is very proud of his record since taking office. Although the State allows Red River County to send only 2 prisoners per month to the penitentiary, an average of 3.5 prisoners per month has been sent to the penitentiary since he has been in office. He has sent 130 criminals to the penitentiary, 33 of them for selling or possession illegal drugs. Ninety percent of those going to the penitentiary for selling drugs have received sentences of 10 years or more with a high of 40 years. Over \$159,000 in restitution has been ordered paid to victims of crime to compensate for their losses. Hot check collections for merchants and individuals has increased by 50% since he took office, he states.

Mr. Hall was born and raised in Lampasas, TX. He and his wife, Karen, a third grade teacher in the Clarksville school system, moved to Clarksville in 1977. "I was born and raised in a small town and I love small town life. You can have the rat race of big city life." Mr. Hall graduated from Tarleton State University in Stephenville, TX where he received a Bachelor of Arts degree. He went to law school at St. Mary's School of Law in San Antonio where he received a Doctor of Jurisprudence degree.

Clayton and Karen Hall have been married for 17 years and have three

sons. Brad, who is 14, is a freshman honor student and basketball player. Blaine is 11 and is in the sixth grade. He is the outdoorsman of the family and loves to hunt and fish. Brian is 6 years old and in the first grade. He is interested in any and everything the two older boys do.

Mr. Hall has served as City Attorney of Clarksville, is a former Assistant Texas Attorney General, is President of the Red River County Bar Association, is a former chairman of the District 1-B Grievance Committee that hears complaints against attorneys, is a member of the Texas Bar Association, Texas District Attorney and County Attorney's Association and the National District and County Attorney's Association. He is a member of the Eastside Church of Christ in Clarksville.

Mr. Hall states that he is proud of the fact that the County Attorney's office in effect costs the County nothing to operate. The County Attorney's salary is paid entirely by the State, nearly all of the investigator's and secretary's salary is paid by the State and the amounts collected in fines, court costs, and fees generated by the prosecution of criminal cases by this office far exceed any other expenses.

"My policy has always been this--if you have a question about any case or how the County Attorney's Office is being run, please do not hesitate for one moment to come by and ask any question that you may have. My door is always open and you are always welcome," concluded Hall.

The Board of Directors of the Bogata Cemetery held their annual meeting recently in the home of the president, Frances R. Rozell.

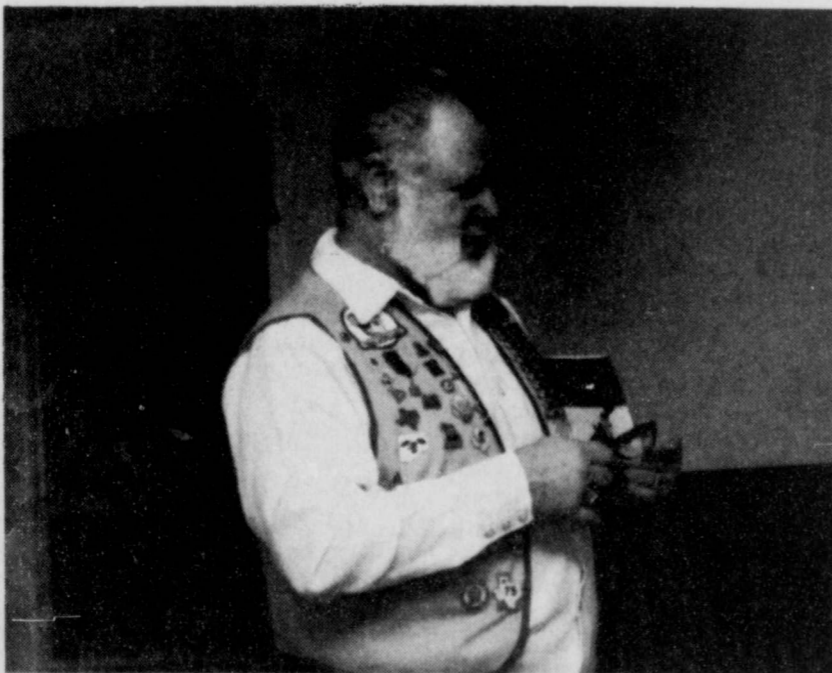
It was reported that clearing of the newly purchased land the Eula Carter Addition was progressing as fast as

She was born November 6, 1916 in Lamar County and was a longtime resident of Robert Lee. She was homemaker and a Baptist.

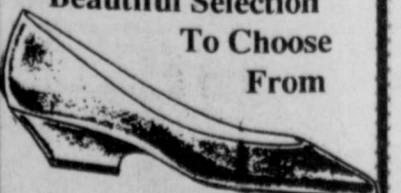

# Varsity Reb Teams Meet Honey Grove

The Varsity girls went into the game with a 1-0 district record and Honey Grove was 0-1 in district play, but was one of the tough teams to beat. The Lady Rebels proved to be a tough team to be reckoned with in the upcoming district play.

Honey Grove controlled the tip to start the game and scored the first bucket. Both teams started out cold, the score was only 8-6, RHS with a 1:59 left in the first quarter. The Lady Warriors and the Lady Rebels both were playing zone defense and both were trying to work the ball inside on offense. The quarter ended with the score RHS 10, Honey Grove 8.

The second quarter began with the Lady Rebels controlling the pace and holding a lead until right before the half ended, when the shooting of Knel Fogelberg gave the LW a one point advantage, 25-24.

HG came out just as hot as they went in at the half scoring a total of 16 points in the quarter. The LR hung in the game by scoring when they needed to, but never could get the momentum away from Honey Grove. The period ended with Honey Grove the lead 41-38.

The last quarter was somewhat like the first, except everything that happened now could be costly. The Lady Rebels played hard on defense but couldn't shake the jinks of the cold offense of earlier games and that seemed to be in the cold air this night. Krista Weatherall hit a three pointer to pull within two points, 43-41. Honey Grove scored a basket and made one of two free throws to up their lead 46-41. Weatherall blocked a Fogelberg shot and got an assist from Lana Pirtle to make her fifth three point shot of the game, pulling RHS to within two points again, 46-44. Tiffany Parish, who plays tough inside, usually against bigger players, grabbed down a rebound and scored to tie the game at 46-all with

2:29 left. Honey Grove took the lead back with a free throw and Coach Arbuckle called a time out with 1:45 left to set up a play to score, but the Lady Rebs were unsuccessful. Rivercrest fouled, hoping to get the ball back off a missed free throw, but Honey Grove made both, running their lead up three points, 49-46.

The Lady Rebs got two more chances but were unable to come up with a bucket. They were tagged with another foul and Honey Grove converted only one of two, giving Rivercrest the final score, 50-46, Honey Grove.

The scoring was led by Krista Weatherall with 23; Tiffany Parish 12; Lana Pirtle 6; B.J. Thompson 3 and Patches Raines 2. The Lady Rebels have no reason to hang their heads, they hustled and never quit. They showed great potential to be a team to be reckoned with in the district.

The boys' teams both came in with 1-0 district records and both seemed anxious to get things started. The first quarter began with the Rebels hot, not only on the scoring side of things but on offense and defense boards. The Rebs were running a 1-3-1 zone defense and it seemed to confuse Honey Grove in the first quarter.

Honey Grove's run-n-shoot offense just was not clicking and the defense was why. Eddie Williams, sophomore, blocked three shots in the period for the Rebels. Corey Gable and Reggie Alford both had six points in the quarter which ended 21-12, RHS.

The second quarter began cooling off for RHS. The Rebels only scored six points the whole period, and two of them came in the last five seconds of the half by Jerry Francis. Honey Grove scored only nine for the period.

One might say the second quarter was a defensive battle that ended with Rivercrest on top 27-21.

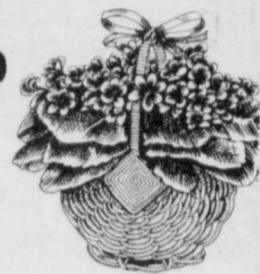

#### GETTING A TAX DEDUCTION

**FOR BAD DEBTS**  
Tough economic times and restrictive bank lending practices have made loans, between individuals, more common. If you are considering making a loan, these tips on documenting personal debts can help preserve a tax deduction in the event the loan can't be repaid.

First, you need to clearly identify whether the loan is for personal or business purposes. Generally, business bad debts arise directly from the lender's business activity and are deductible as a normal cost of doing business. Personal bad debts (also called nonbusiness bad debts) are deductible as short-term capital losses. The losses are first used to offset up to \$3,000 per year of salary and other income.

Next, you need to document that you intend to be repaid and are not making a gift (especially when making loans to family members). A written agreement between the parties should be made, showing how much is owed, that a market interest rate is being charged, and that a definite due date has been set. Caution: loan guarantees made as a favor for a friend or relative don't qualify for a bad debt deduction. You must be able to provide a profit intent.

Finally, document your collection efforts. Nonbusiness bad debts are deductible only in the year that the debt becomes completely worthless. You must show that there is no chance of the loan being repaid and that you made reasonable efforts to collect the debt. Keep copies of letters you send demanding payment, and log the results of telephone calls you make. If the loan amount is substantial, using an attorney or collection agency will help prove that you made "reasonable" collection efforts.

### Local Sales Tax Rebates Show Modest Start For 1992

January's local sales tax rebates showed a modest start for 1992 with today's payments to 933 cities totaling \$85.5 million, or 5% more than last January's payments of \$81.4 million," State Comptroller John Sharp said today.

January payments to 106 Texas counties totaled \$9.7 million, virtually identical to last January's payments.

"We have projected slow but steady economic growth for 1992 in Texas, despite the national recession, and retail sales should continue to show

moderate improvement," Sharp said.

Bogata received \$2,108.98 for this period, for a 28.77% increase over last year's payment of \$1,637.79.

Clarksville received \$12,984.63 for a 6.66% decrease.

Detroit received \$604.54 for this period, marking a 5.61% decrease over last year's payment of \$640.46.

Mt. Pleasant received \$89,686.33 for an 11.08% decrease while Talco received \$1,211.60 for a 16.01% decrease over last year's payment.

Blossom received \$1,459.01 for a

158.71% increase over last year's payment of \$563.95.

Deport received no payment for this period, as compared to no payment for the same period last year.

Paris received \$170,000.02, marking a 10.62% decrease.

Houston received the state's largest payment for January, \$13.5 million, an increase of 1.1% above last January's payment of \$13.3 million.

Dallas received the state's second largest payment, \$8.3 million, an increase of almost 3%.

### Aviation Is Bright Spot In Texas Economy

An increase in aviation activity in the third quarter of 1991 was a positive sign in the Texas economy, the Texas Department of Transportation reported.

"In spite of difficult economic times across the state, aviation activity continues to make gains," said C.A. Wilkins, director of TxDOT's Division of Aviation.

The Quarterly Aviation Activity Report shows third quarter increases over the first half of the year in number of passengers and airline passenger flights. While the number of flights was down from a year earlier, the number of passengers was about the same.

"Economic benefits that aviation generates in Texas are direct results of these two activities," Wilkins said.

The Division of Aviation is responsible for directing federal and state resources to develop the state's aviation infrastructure.

The quarterly report, first published in October, is produced in cooperation with the Federal Aviation Administration and air carrier airports in the state.

It is published to provide access to these indicators of economic activity.

### Tax Guide Just for Students

High school and college students can take a look at our federal tax system through a publication from the Internal Revenue Service. Publication 4, *Student's Guide to Federal Income Tax*, gives students an overview of the tax system, a brief background of taxation and an explanation of withholding of income tax, types of income and expenses, and filing requirements for students.

Other topics include estimated tax, types of information and tax returns and filling out Form W-4, "Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate." Also included are filled-in samples of Form W-4 and Form 1040EZ, "Income Tax Return for Single Filers with No Dependents."

Rules explained in Publication 4 apply to students who are U.S. citizens and unmarried (single). Foreign students studying in the United States should see Publication 519, *U.S. Tax Guide for Aliens*.

Lyden has lived in Talco for fifty-seven years. He and his wife, Erma Jo, have been married for thirty-

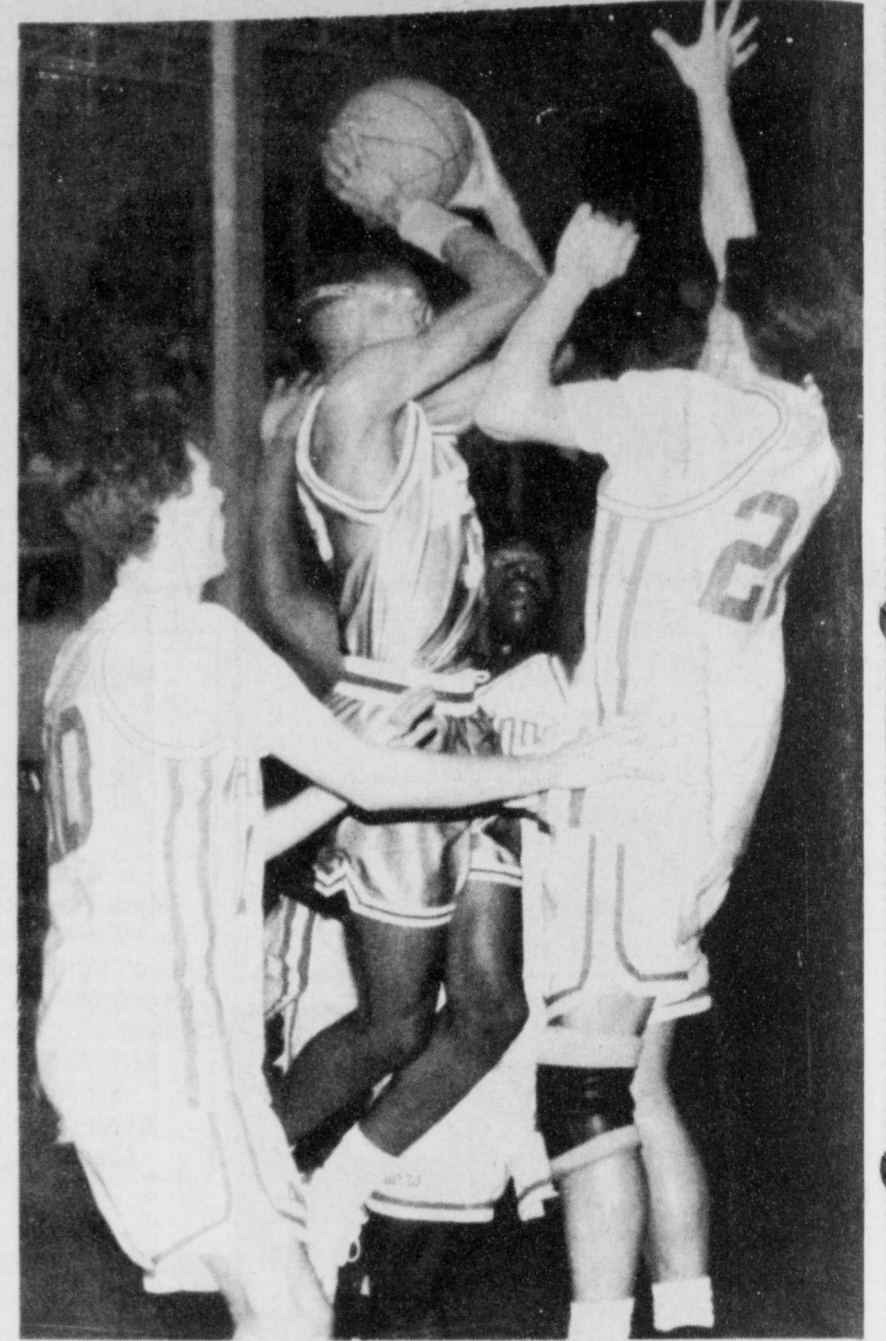
