Last week we went down to Port Isabel to visit with my cousins and my aunt and uncle. They become "winter Texans" fleeing the ice and snow of northern Oklahoma each year for the palm trees and good fishing of the Texas coast.

On Saturday we trooped, along with six of their friends, across the international bridge to Progresso in Mexico to do some serious shopping.

Some years ago someone named Arturo built a bridge and then a Mexican restaurant in the middle of now where. Now an entire town has grown up around the restaurant.

Street vendors hawk fresh steamed corn on the cob, balloons, tacos, dulce (sweets) and a bewildering variety of other items from push carts.

At small card tables boys sell beautiful ironwood carvings of dolphins, eagles, shells and much more. They patiently bring the items to a flossy finish by rubbing them with shoe polish and soft cloths.

Women sell lace tablecloths, eucalyptus branches, and pencils with hand-woven names on them.

Tourists and natives alike wander back and forth up the narrow sidewalks gawking, shopping and attending to daily business.

Barber shops and beauty parlors flourish, while "dentists" offer dentures for as little as \$75.

Sadly, small beggars and the very old sit on curbs and benches, reaching out a hand in supplication.

It creates a medley of color, sound and smell that either fascinates (our reaction) or repulses.

"Why", you may ask at this point, "did her aunt want her to write this column?"

Well, because last week I wrote about mud...and she says I hadn't seen mud until Progresso.

You see, it was coming a light rain while we wandered the streets of Progresso, Mexico.

And in Progresso only one street is paved, the main street. And all the cars and trucks bring mud onto that one main street. Within an hour the main street was an inch deep in slick brown slime. The sidewalks weren't quite as deep, but were as slick.

Carefully we would link arms and venture across the street, dodging ancient vehicles spinning their wheels and slipping around.

We would pick our way down the tile sidewalks and try to get soe of the grainy stuff off our feet before entering a store.

Puddles several inches deep would bar the way.

But, the main difference between our sticky mud and theirs was the degree of cleanliness.

Mud up here is just mud. Mud down there, I'm convinced, might be fatal. It has to be germ-laden!

So, I counted yself lucky to have fallen in "clean" mud instead of the stuff down there. I don't need "Montezuma's Revenge", I don't, I don't!

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TDT Contract Let On Hwy. 271 Road Construction

The Texas Department of Transportation has recently let a contract to Jordan Paving Corporation, Irving, for construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing.

Construction operations will begin January 16 with placement of

barricades.

The project has an estimated cost of \$2,514,808.05. The number of working days for completion of this project is 130 days. The limits of the project are from Loop 167 in Deport to 0.14 miles west of S.H. 37 (or

Highway 271 between Deport and Bogata).

Motorists are urged to be extremely careful and observe all warning signs and speed zones while traveling in the construction area.

Bob Storey Seeking Re-Election As Red River County Sheriff

Sheriff Bob Storey has announced his intention to seek his fourth term as Sheriff of Red River County. Storey was initially appointed sheriff in 1979 by the Red River County Commissioner's Court to fill the unexpired term of former Sheriff Avret Vaughan. Storey was subsequently elected Sheriff in 1980 and re-elected in 1984 and 1988.

Sheriff Storey is a native of Red River County and a career law enforcement officer; having a totla of 30+ consecutive years in the profession; first with the Midland Police Department and then with the Bowie and Red River County Sheriff's Departments.

Storey was born in the English community in 1931, a son of Joe and Bennie Storey. He graduated from Annona High School in 1949 and shortly thereafter married Annie Pearl Burrow of Annona. They have four children: Rhonda Reed of Odessa, Sandra Brown of Midland, Lisa Hadley of Midland and Tony Bob Storey, also of Midland.

Aside from his years of experience, Storey says he has regularly attended law enforcement training

schools throughout his career, which has allowed him to keep abreast of the many advances in law enforcement. Storey has received the Basic, Intermediate and Advanced Certifications (the highest level of certification possible) from the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education, the law enforcement licensing agency of the State. "The advances in technology and changes in our law must be incorporated into any law enforcement agency which hopes to be effective," Storey says.

Training for his deputies is also of high priority for Sheriff Storey. He goes on to say that he believes he has a good department of investigators and patrol deputies.

Storey says he has been honored to have served the people of Red River County for the past nine years and is looking forward to his fourth term with a view toward continuing service with the most effective department possible.

He looks forward to serving the citizens of Red River County for another four years.

Jack Herrington Announces Candidacy For County Attorney

Jack Herrington says, "Drugs, burglaries and other crimes are a serious problem in Red River County. Our schools are fighting the drug problem through drug education and drug counseling. The Cub Scout book has 28 pages dealing with drug abuse."

Herrington believes the time has come for the criminal--the one who sells drugs, and the one who burglarizes your homes and businesses and steals from you--to pay the price.

Herrington wants to have jury trials for these criminals and send them to prison. No longer will plea bargaining in over 96% of the cases be the order of the day. Herrington says, "We all work hard, respect the law, raise our families and live decent lives. If criminals choose to break the law, I intend to prosecute them through a consistent policy of regular jury trials."

"Our tax dollars pay all of the salaries and expenses of the County Attorney's office. I intend to see that you get your money's worth by providing real hard-nosed prosecution of criminals."

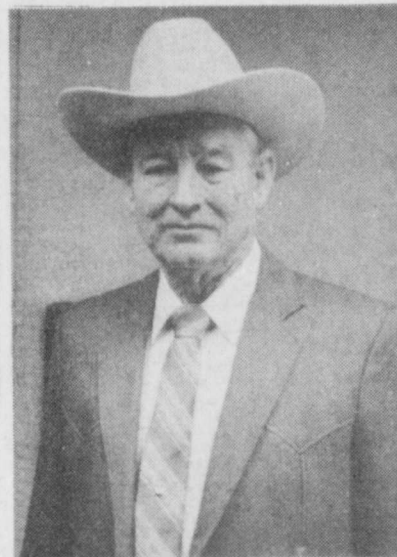
Jack was born and raised in Red

"I will prosecute and punish all criminals and make plea bargaining in over 96% of the cases a thing of the past in Red River County," promised Herrington.



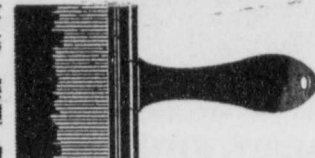

Winners In TP Drawing Announced

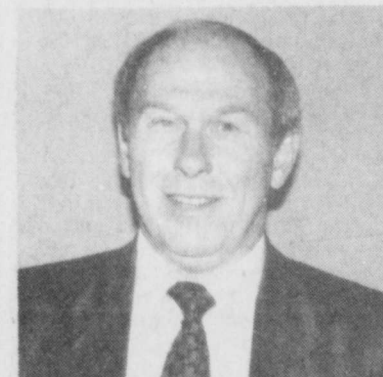

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Fine Sugar Cookies Sammie McConnell

- 1 c. oleo or butter
- 1/2 c. powdered sugar
- 1/2 c. granulated sugar
- 1/8 tsp salt
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 egg
- 2 1/2 c flour
- 1/2 tsp soda
- 1/2 tsp cream of tartar
- 1/2 tsp + 1/4 cup sugar-butter or oleo

Beat together oleo, powdered sugar and granulated sugar until well blended. Add eggs and vanilla, beat til fluffy. Sift flour, salt, soda and cream of tartar together. Add to creamed mixture and blend well. Chill for at least 2 hours. Shape in 3/4" balls, place 2" apart on ungreased cookie sheet. To flatten, use glass dipped in melted oleo and then in nutmeg and sugar mixture. Bake about 8-10" in oven preheated to 350 (43 calories per cookie)

Chocolate Cake

- 2 c flour
- 2 c sugar
- 1 stick oleo
- 1/2 c shortening
- 1 c water
- 3 1/2 T. cocoa
- 1/2 c buttermilk
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp soda
- 1 tsp vanilla

Do not use mixer. Combine flour and sugar in large bowl. In saucepan combine and bring to a boil oleo, water, cocoa and shortening. Pour hot mixture over flour and sugar. Combine buttermilk, eggs, soda and vanilla. Add to other mixture and stir well. Pour into 9x13 greased pan and bake 20" at 400. Frosting:

- 1 stick oleo
- 3 1/2 T cocoa
- 1 c milk
- 1 cup chopped pecans

When cake has been baking 18", combine (in saucepan used before) 1 stick oleo, 1/3 c milk, 3 1/2 T cocoa. Bring to a boil, remove from stove and add 1# powdered sugar and 1 cup chopped pecans. Spread on warm cake.

Sour Dough Biscuits

- 1 pkg dry yeast
- 1 c warm water
- 2 c buttermilk
- 1/4 c sugar
- 3/4 c Wesson oil
- 1/2 tsp soda
- 4 tsp baking powder
- 1 1/2 tsp salt

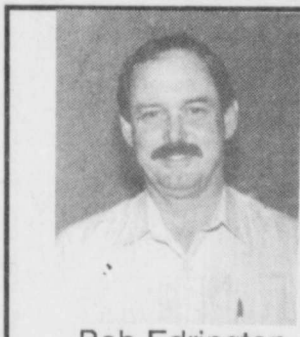

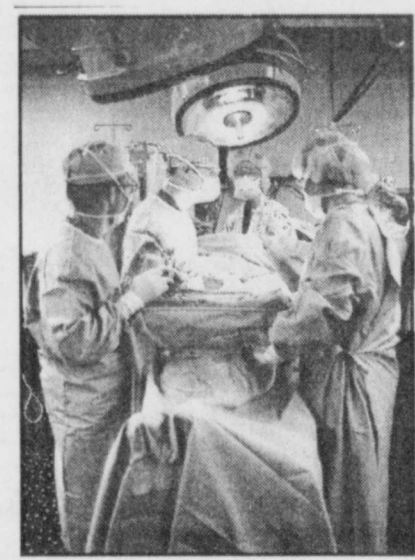

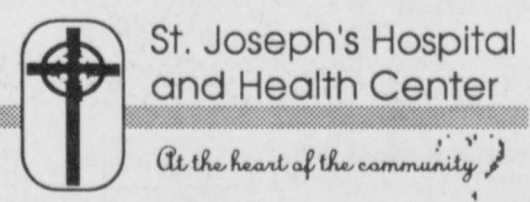

GETTING A TAX DEDUCTION FOR BAD DEBTS

Tight economic conditions require businesses to make hard choices in allocating their cash flow. Usually, available cash is first channeled to those creditors whose continued support is required for business operations. Sometimes, the funds used for these purposes include payroll taxes withheld from employees (trust fund taxes). This is a bad policy. Once a business begins using these funds, the peril accelerates with a speed that is often fatal. In addition to the unpaid taxes, penalties and interest will accrue and compound rapidly. "Borrowing" from the IRS by using payroll taxes for a business's other cash needs is the most expensive loan possible. Even the demise of a business does not absolve the owner (manager) of the requirement to remit the withheld taxes plus penalties and interest.

The IRS is allowed to pursue collection of withholding taxes from any "responsible person". Responsible persons include partners, corporate officers and employees who can direct payment of business funds. Besides being responsible for unremitted taxes, such persons may be liable for a penalty equal to the amount of unpaid withholding taxes (100% penalty).

Troubled businesses should make every possible attempt to keep current with their payroll tax deposits. If the complete deposit cannot be made, at least deposit the trust fund taxes (withheld FICA and federal income tax) and designate payment as trust fund taxes. This will mitigate exposure to the 100% penalty and reduce the penalty and interest applicable to the unpaid tax. Realistically assess the business's prospects. If you're using the IRS for financing, your business is probably near the end. It may be better to close the doors than to accumulate an increasing personal liability.

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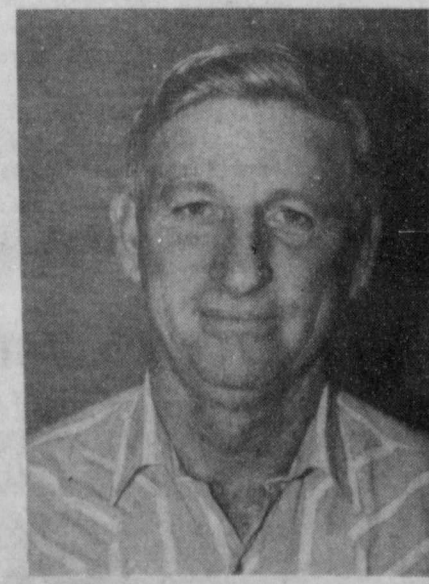
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Vengeful Rebels & Lady Rebels Take Two From High Ranked Leonard

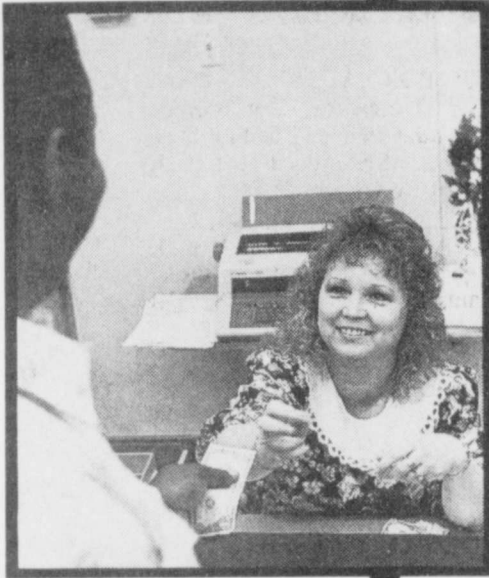

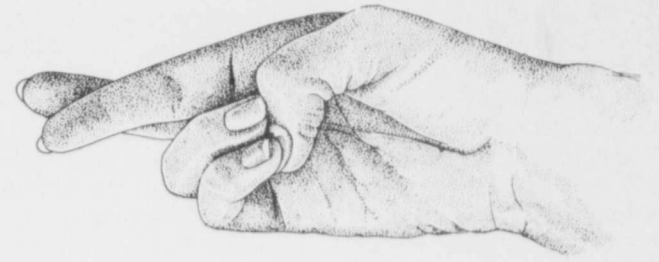
Eldon and Elma Chaloner Celebrate 50th Anniversary

Social Security Notes

Here's an important reminder to parents who do not yet have Social Security numbers for their children: this year, when you file your 1991 federal income tax return, you must have a number assigned to each child age 1 or over in order to claim him or her as a dependent. Previously, federal law required a Social Security number for any dependent age 2 or older.

Parents will be pleased to know how convenient it is to get a Social Security number for their children. Simply call the toll free number, 1-800-772-1213, any weekday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. The Social Security Administration will send you an

application form and instructions. You can mail the completed form and required documents to Social Security in the pre-addressed envelope that is provided with the application. The documents will be returned promptly, and a Social Security card usually will be issued within two weeks.

The application and card are provided free of charge by Social Security, and they also provide free help in completing the form for those who need it.

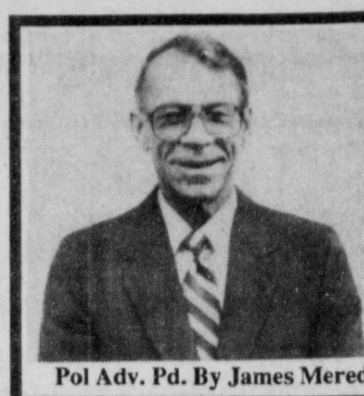
We urge all parents to get SSNs for their children early so they will have them when they are ready to file their 1991 tax returns.

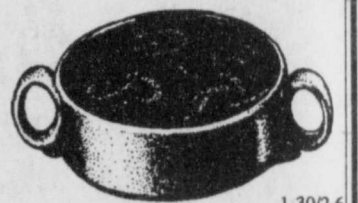
