
Finally, I felt clean enough to crawl back to bed. It wasn't until full day light that I caught sight of the mud under my toenails. Disgusting!

Two Bogata 4-H'ers will compete in the 1992 Houston Rodeo calf scramble on February 16 in the Astrodome.

Tina Smith, 15, daughter of Roger and Bonnie Smith and Dorie Smith, 14, daughter of Donnie and Shirley Smith will travel to Houston to participate in the calf scramble, an excit-

ing part of Houston rodeo action. The Highwaymen will appear at

that twilight performance. The youngsters will compete for one of 252 calves to be awarded at the

1992 show. The calf scramble event involves 28 energetic youngsters pitted against 14 vigorous calves. Each youngster is committed to capturing a calf, haltering and bringing it to the finish line, but only the successful ones receive \$1,000 calf purchase certifi-

The certificate, donated by a generous firm or individual, is used to purchase a purebred registered beef or dairy heifer. This year, several companies have strengthened their commitment to the calf scramble program by donating a calf for each of the 18 rodeo performances.

The calf is raised by the winner for special showring competition in the Astrohall at the following year's show. The yearlong project is closely supervised by the appropriate county extension agent or agricultural science tgeacher.

The winners are required to submit financial records, photographs and a scrapbook to the calf scramble office to detail the progress of the venture. The youngsters are encouraged to provide updated reports to their do-


TIFFANY PARISH- scores for the Rivercrest Lady Rebels against the Chisum Lady Mus-







Search for a low interest rate if you pay only part of your bill each month. Annual rates are as low as 9% on some cards and as high as 19.8% on others. Since personal interest expense is no longer tax deductible, keep interest expense to a minimum.

Some cards levy a cash advance fee in addition to other charges. If you expect to rely on your card for money, find out exactly what you'll pay for this convenience.

Annual fees range from about \$20 to \$50. A premium card may offer automatic rental car insurance, roadside assistance for your family car, and buyer protection for theft or damage to goods purchased with the card. Don't pay extra for features you won't use. Often, you can get a premium cards higher credit limit by

asking for it on your standard card. The cards with the lowest annual fee often have the highest interest charges. 



Paris District Gets Reprieve From Consolidation

Texas Department of Transportation In its monthly meeting recently, the Texas Transportation Commission voted to suspend district reorganization activities. The move gives the Paris District of the Texas Depatment of Transportation a reprieve from its consolidation with the Tyler District. The Paris office, along with a neighboring office in Atlanta, were scheduled to combine operations with the Tyler office effective September

The Legislature made its intent clear durin the third-called special session and we will comply with that," said Transportation Commissioner Ray Stoker, Jr.

Since November, the Texas Department of Transportation had been reorganizing its 24 districts to com-

ply with a legislative mandate to consolidate into no more than 18 districts. The Commission, which is the department's governing body, decided to table reorganization plans after legislators passed a Joint Resolution requiring the department to postpone further district realignment activities until next year.


The Commission also directed the department to research and develop ways to enhance the operating efficiency of the department.






