article that very few cases of AIDS were contracted through heterosexual sex. It seems funny to me that we have six in a high school with an enrollment of 197 students.
Dallas Independent School District, Dallas Independent School District,
with an enrollment of more than with an enroilment of more than
100,000 , is only reporting 20 cases and all were contracted through IV drug use or blood transfusions.
