Spring Is Voting Season

Some Answers To Questions On Where And When

Spring is the season when the days get longer, flowers bloom and bluebirds come back to find the houses you offered them last year. And, in even-numbered years like 1992, it's the season for elections--at least three of them.

The elections can get a little confusing. We'll try to help you figure out what's going on.

PARTY PRIMARIES
If you listen to the big-city media, the Democratic and Republican primaries, scheduled for next Tuesday, March 10, are the most important. It's when you vote to determine who will be your party's nominees in next November's general elections for national, state, county and precinct offices.

You will have to decide whether to vote in the Democratic or Republican primary--you must wait for the general election in November to split your ticket and vote for "some of each". In our area, a majority of candidates for county and precinct offices such as Sheriff and Commissioner file in the Democratic primary.

In Red River County, for instance, all such candidates filed as Democrats. If you want to vote for "local" candidates in the Democratic primary, you cannot at this stage vote your preferences among the Republican candidates for state or national office. We repeat: for now, you can vote for Democratic candidates; you cannot vote in

Republican primaries. The primaries will be held on Tuesday, March 10, with the polls open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Unless you have moved since registering you will probably vote at the same location as you did last time. Democratic voting boxes are located all over Lamar, Red River and Titus Counties, but you must vote at the box in the voting precinct in which you reside. Republican boxes, by decision of the party, are less numerous. If in doubt about where to vote, telephone your County Clerk's office in advance to avoid possible inconvenience on election day.

It is too late to vote in the Primaries by mail but you may vote "absentee" by going to the County Clerk's Office at your county court house during business hours through Friday, March 6.

Regardless of when you vote, you should take your current voter registration card--that's the blue one--with you to the polls. If you are duly registered but have misplaced your card you should do your best to find it. Without it you'll be allowed to vote, but you'll waste your time and the election staff's. It's good citizenship to find that card and take it with you!

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS
Municipal or city elections, for city council seats and the office of Mayor, will be held in Bogata, Deport and Blossom on May 2. Talco

holds municipal elections every two years, and will not have one this year. Candidates may file for these offices until March 18. Write-in votes will not be counted except for "declared write-in candidates, who may file as late as April 2".

Registered voters may vote at city hall from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on election day, or may "absentee" or "early vote" from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on regular business days between April 13 and April 28. If you wish to vote by mail, you must apply for a ballot in writing and the ballot must be received at city hall by April 24.

SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS
School Board Elections are held on the same day as Municipal Elections, May 2. The same dates for filing candidacies and for absentee or early voting also apply. Polls will be open on election day from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the schools in Talco, Bogata, Deport, Blossom and Pattonville and at the community center in Cunningham.

VOTER REGISTRATION
Oh! You forgot to register? It's too late to register for the primaries, but until April 2 you can register for the municipal and school elections and for the General Election in November.

Go to your county clerk's office, or pick up a registration application at the newspaper office in Bogata or Deport.

The vote is a privilege available only to citizens of democracies--use it or lose it!

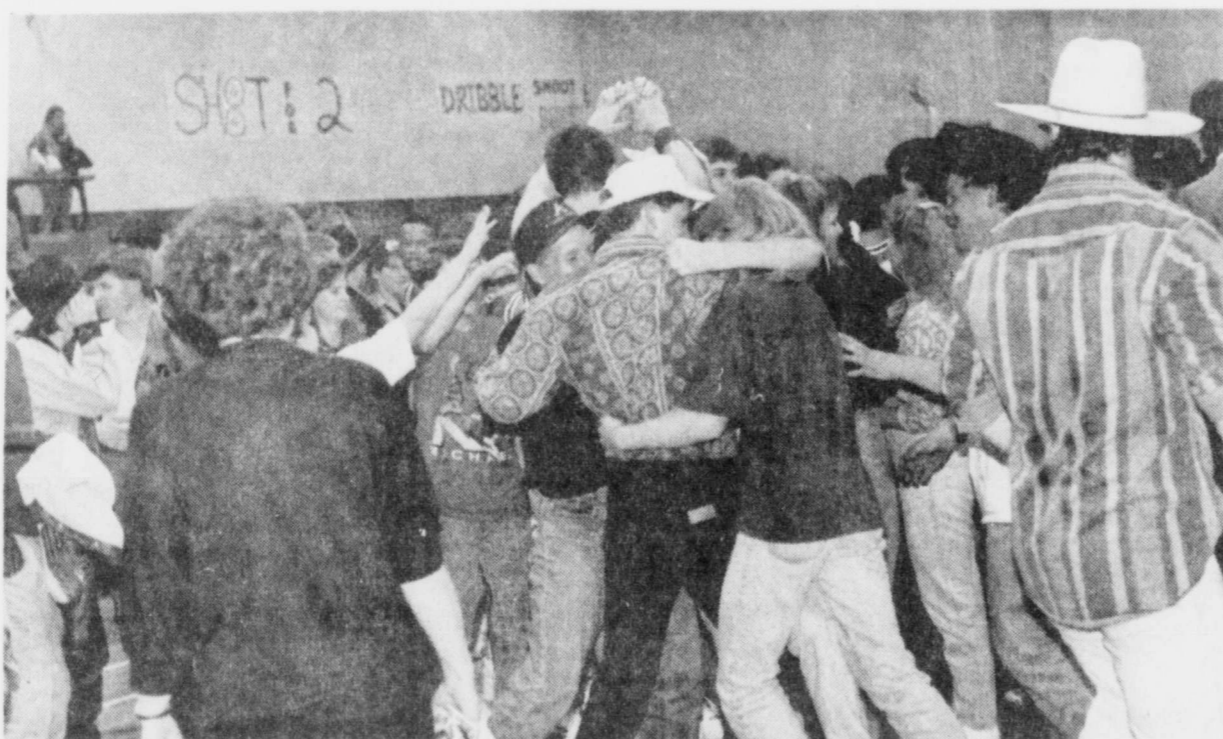
RC's Championship Hopes Dashed By Edgewood Bulldogs

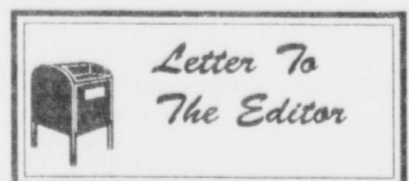
Dean Tiffie was high point scorer for the night with 18 points for the Rebels.

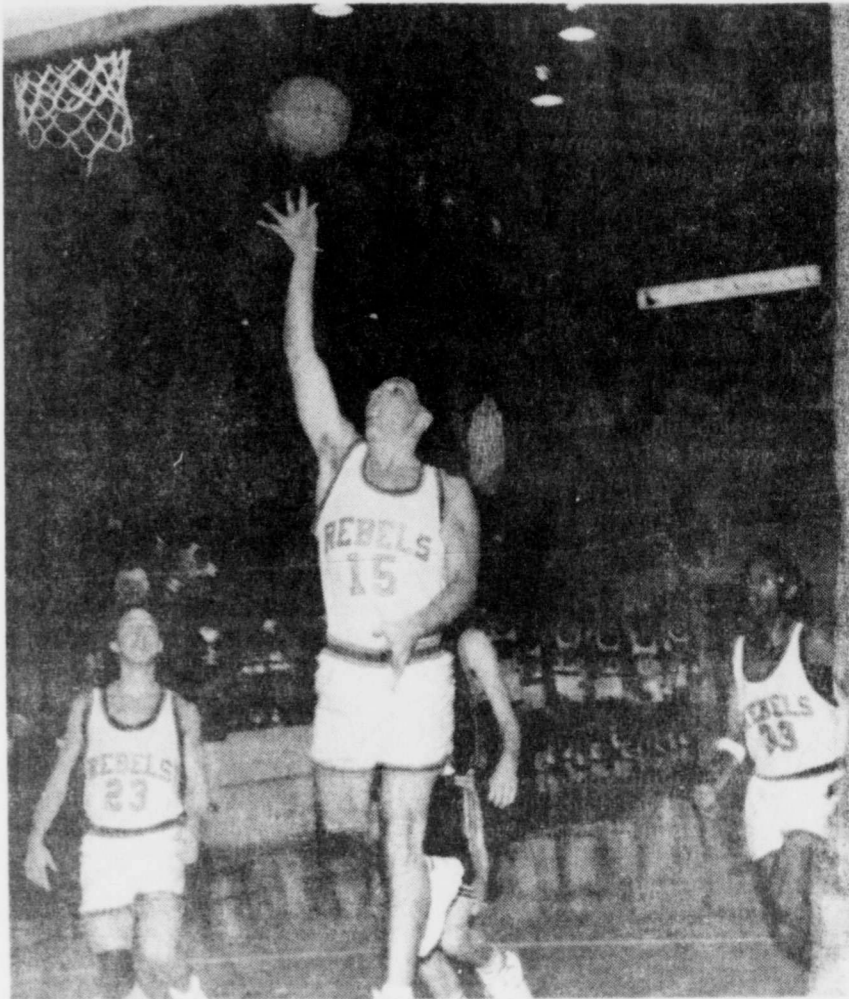

to teach students "things" they can use today as well as in the future."

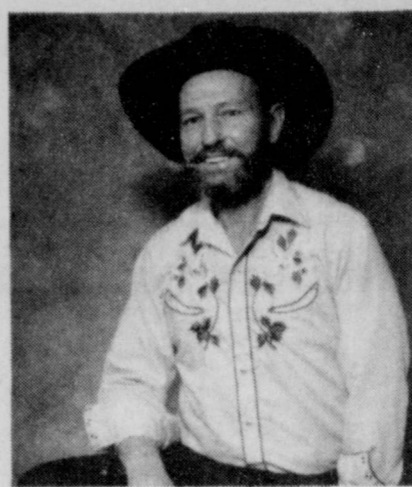

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Broccoli Cornbread
By Sandra Graves
1 box chopped broccoli
2 sticks margarine
thaw in microwave 5 min. and cool
4 eggs
1 cup cottage cheese
Mix and add to broccoli and margarine. Add 2 boxes Jiffy corn muffin mix. Bake about 30 minutes at 350 in greased 9x13 pan.

Cheese Soup
1 cup grated carrots
1 cup celery
Saute in 1 stick of butter with green onion tops.
1 can chicken broth
1 lb. velveeta cheese
3 cans cream of potato soup
1 1/2 cups sour cream

Crockpot Enchiladas
Brown 2 lb. ground beef with 1 chopped onion, place in crockpot. Add:
1 small can green chilies
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can golden mushroom soup
1 can Enchilada sauce, mild
1 can Cheddar Cheese Soup/sauce
Cook in crockpot 6-8 hours on low. 15-20 minutes before serving, add 1 medium package of Doritos.

Pound Cake
2 sticks butter
1 1/2 cups flour
beat 2 minutes
4 eggs
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 t. vanilla
Beat really well. Bake in loaf pan at 300 for 1 hr. 15 min.

Earthquake Cake
German chocolate cake mix, according to directions.
1 cup pecans
1 cup coconut
Mix 1 8 oz. package cream cheese
1/2 cup butter
2 cups confectioners sugar
1 t. vanilla
Grease bottom of pan. Mix pecans and coconut, spread on bottom of pan. Pour cake mixture over coconut and pecans. Spoon cream cheese mixture over cake before baking. Bake 30-40

minutes at 350.

Chocolate heet Cake
2 cups sugar
2 cups flour
1 stick margarine
1/4 cup shortening
1 cup water
4 tsp. cocoa
2 eggs
1/2 cups buttermilk
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. cinnamon
Combine sugar and flour. Cook margarine, shortening water and cocoa until it comes to a rapid boil; add while hot to sugar and flour. Add remaining ingredients; beat well. Pour into greased cookie sheet with sides. Bake at 400 for 20 minutes. Ice with warm. NOTE: If desired, two sticks margarine may be used and shortening omitted. Yield: 15 servings.

Iceing:
1 stick margarine
4 tsp. cocoa
4-6 tsp milk
1 box powdered sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup chopped pecans (optional)
Melt together margarine, cocoa and milk; remove from heat. Beat in remaining ingredients. Spread on hot cake.

Breakfast Casserole
1 lb. pork sausage
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped green pepper
1/4 cup chopped celery
1/4 cup chopped green chilies
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon dry mustard
2 cups milk
6-8 eggs, slightly beaten
6 slices white bread, cubed
1 cup sharp Cheddar Cheese, grated
Brown sausage and crumble. Drain, reserving 1 tablespoon fat. Saute vegetables in reserved fat. Mix all ingredients and place in 13x9" greased baking dish. Bake at 350 for 1 hour. Microwave: Crumble sausage into 2 qt. casserole. Microwave on high 6 minutes. Stir once during cooking.

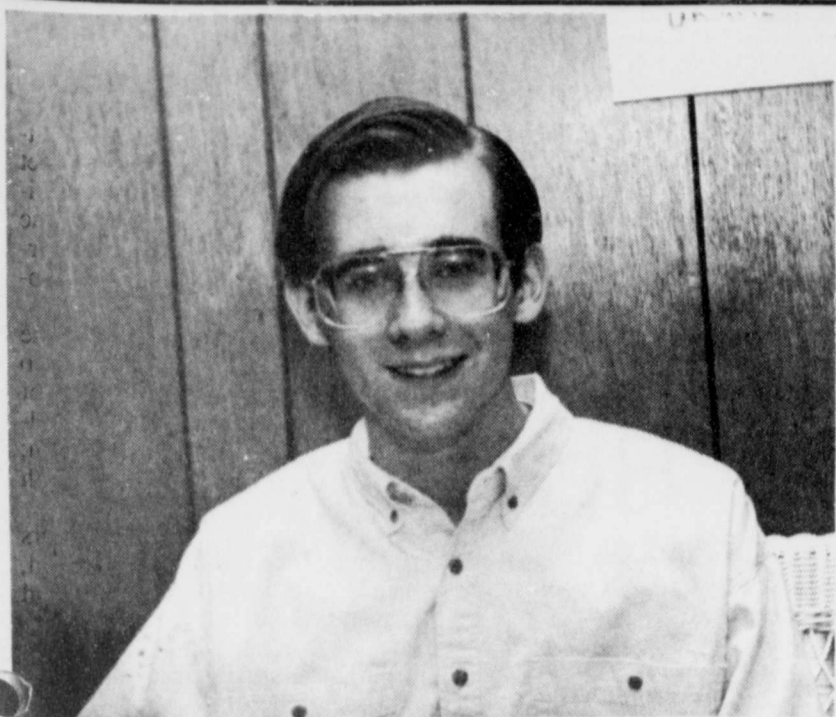

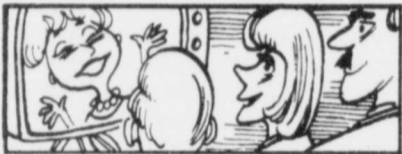

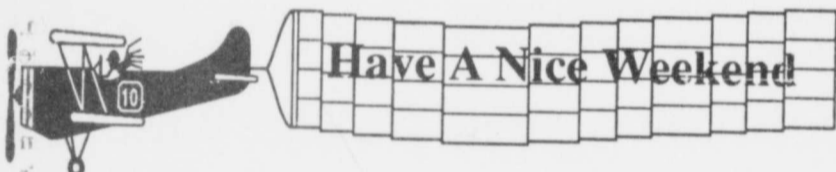

HOW TO GET A BANK LOAN

Today's more restrictive lending practices mean that business owners have to make better loan presentations than in the past to get the bank loans they need. A loan package should give the lender all the information he or she will need to approve your loan. If your loan request is properly prepared, it will stand out from the competition and testify to your financial and business competence.

First, include a written explanation of your business, its product line, major competition, market niche, key personnel and any other pertinent facts that will help your banker get to know your company. Your banker will be looking for evidence that you can manage your business well and plan for its future.

Next, clearly state your loan request. Include the loan amount, the collateral, repayment terms, and the interest rate.

Then, justify your need for the loan. Show the bank how you plan to use the loan proceeds, how the loan will be repaid, and why making the loan is a good investment for the bank. Include current and prior years' financial statements and cash flow projections for at least the next two years. These documents should be prepared with the assistance of your accountant.

If Lightning Strikes

Experts agree that the most important thing you can do to protect yourself is to stay inside a large building or inside an automobile or other covered vehicle. Even if struck, the car allows the current to be discharged harmlessly into the ground. If you are inside a house, don't use the telephone unless absolutely necessary for an emergency. Stay away from a television with an outdoor antenna. If practical, unplug the television.

If you are caught outside and don't have time to reach a safe building or an automobile, experts offer these suggestions:

Do not stand underneath a natural lightning rod such as a large tree in an open area.

Avoid projecting above the surrounding landscape, as you would if you were standing on a hilltop, in an open field, on the beach or fishing from a small boat.

In a forest, seek shelter in a low area under a thick growth of small trees. In open areas, go to a low place such as a ravine or valley.

If you are hopelessly isolated in a level field or prairie and you feel your hair stand on end—indicating that lightning is about to strike—drop to your knees. In this position, if lightning strikes near you, the chances of it using your body as a conductor are minimized.

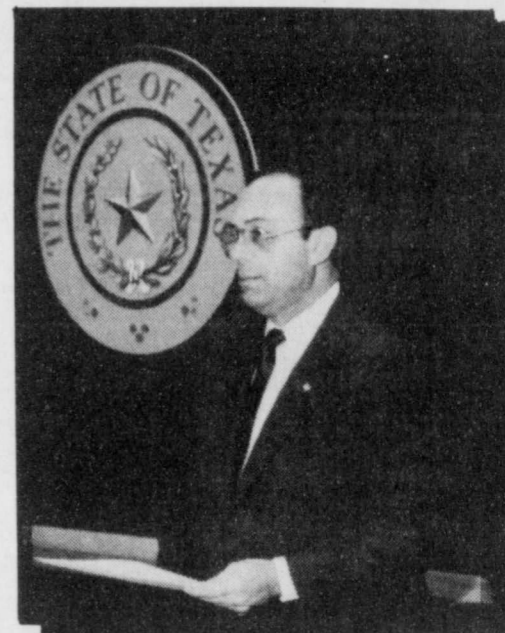



10 I have already sent **10 criminals to the penitentiary in 1992.**

So I try the cases that should be tried to set the standard in cases where the defendant pleads guilty. In this way criminals are convicted and punished with a minimum of expense to the county.

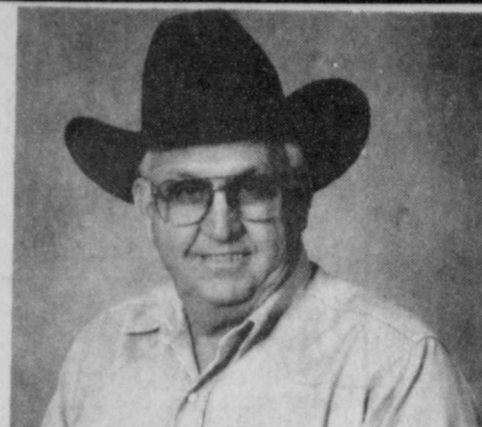

"With both the Clarksville and New Boston FmHA offices, the hundreds of farmers, ranchers and homeowners in the area will continue to receive positive service from their offices," Chapman concluded.

Ratliff Honored By Civil Justice League

The Texas Civil Justice League recently honored Senator Bill Ratliff as its East Texas Tort Reformer of the Year. The TCJL, a non-profit organization, is the largest state civil justice reform association in the country. Its 2,500 members include businesses, governmental entities, chambers of commerce, and individuals from

across Texas.

During the last session of the Texas legislature, the TCJL advocated a package of legislation aimed at reforming the legal system and reducing the cost of the legal system to Texas business and taxpayers. Although the package passed the House

of Representatives by an overwhelming majority, it was killed in the Senate by special interest personal injury lawyers who benefit from the current

lawsuit lottery. In fact, the influence of the personal injury lawyers is so strong that the Senate was never even given the opportunity to vote on the legislation.

In addition to the TCJL honor, Senator Ratliff has recently received the Texas Chamber of Commerce's Legislative Leadership Award, and been named as one of the Ten Best Legislators by Texas Monthly, and top seven legislators in the state by the Dallas Morning News.

Byron Washington was found guilty of theft and the jury assessed a two year sentence in the penitentiary. Mr. Hall has also filed a motion to revoke a five year felony that Mr. Washington is currently serving. Mr. Hall states that he will ask the judge to revoke Mr. Washington's probation and stack that five years on top of the two years the jury assessed so that

his sentence will effectively be seven years.

Also tried by a jury and found guilty of felony D.W.I. was Charlie Henry. The jury assessed the maximum punishment of five years in the penitentiary. In the third jury trial, Lafonda Monkhouse was convicted of delivery of a controlled substance and sentenced by the jury to fifteen years in the penitentiary. The next week of jury trials is set for the week of March 16. Mr. Hall invites everyone to come by and watch the jury trials during that week.

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

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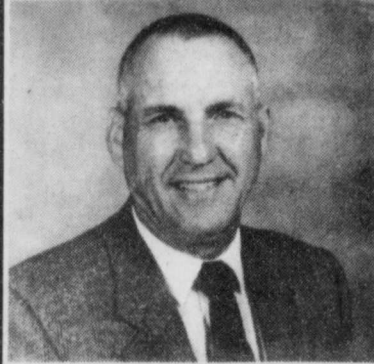

HERRINGTON FACT SHEET VERIFIED

My fact sheet, which many of you have seen, has been verified by a signed statement dated February 28, 1992, issued by our Red River County District Clerk as follows:

CLERK: "281-CR-8-90 Burglary

The above case was tried before a jury on January 21, 1991 which resulted in a hung jury. On April 1, 1991 the charge was reduced to a misdemeanor and the defendant plead guilty. I may add that the reason the above case was not on my monthly report to Office of Court Administration is because the report deals with cases filed and cases disposed of. When the case resulted in a hung jury the case folder went back into the active drawer and was not a final disposition."

FACT SHEET --- *A jury was picked in April of 1991 on a Burglary of a Vehicle case. It resulted in a hung jury. The case was then reduced to a misdemeanor and plea bargained away for 1 year misdemeanor probation.

CLERK: "204 Aggravated Assault

This case was tried before a jury on September 3, 1991. This is a juvenile case."

CLERK: "219-CR-6-90 Aggravated Assault

This case was not tried before a 12 man jury. It was tried before the Judge and was taken under advisement. As of this day a decision has not been filed in my office. This case is now in my active draw pending an order."

Area Cities Show Decrease In Rebates From Comptroller For Current Period

State Comptroller John Sharp said today the office mailed checks totaling \$163.4 million to 1,066 Texas cities, a 1.8 percent increase above last February's \$160.5 million. Checks to 106 Texas counties totaled another \$17.7 million, 4.7% more than last February's rebate of \$16.9 million. This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected by yearly, quarterly and monthly taxpayers. "Texas retail sales were better than

the nation's as a whole during 1991 but the year was sluggish and the Christmas season just brought us more of the same," Sharp said. The city of Houston received the state's largest payment for February, \$26.3 million, a decrease of 1.5% below last February's payment of \$26.7 million. Blossom received \$2,901.92 for a 12.42% decrease in total payments to date.

Deport received \$2,561.98 for a 12.25% decrease. Paris received \$305,750.31 for a 12.40% decrease. Talco received \$2,677.16 for a 3.15% decrease while Mt. Pleasant received \$148,524.421 for a 5.27% decrease. Bogata received \$4,370.64 marking a 16.98% decrease and Clarksville received \$25,348.219 for a 10.70% decrease.



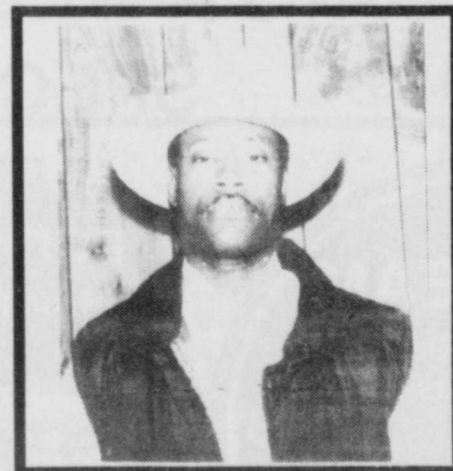

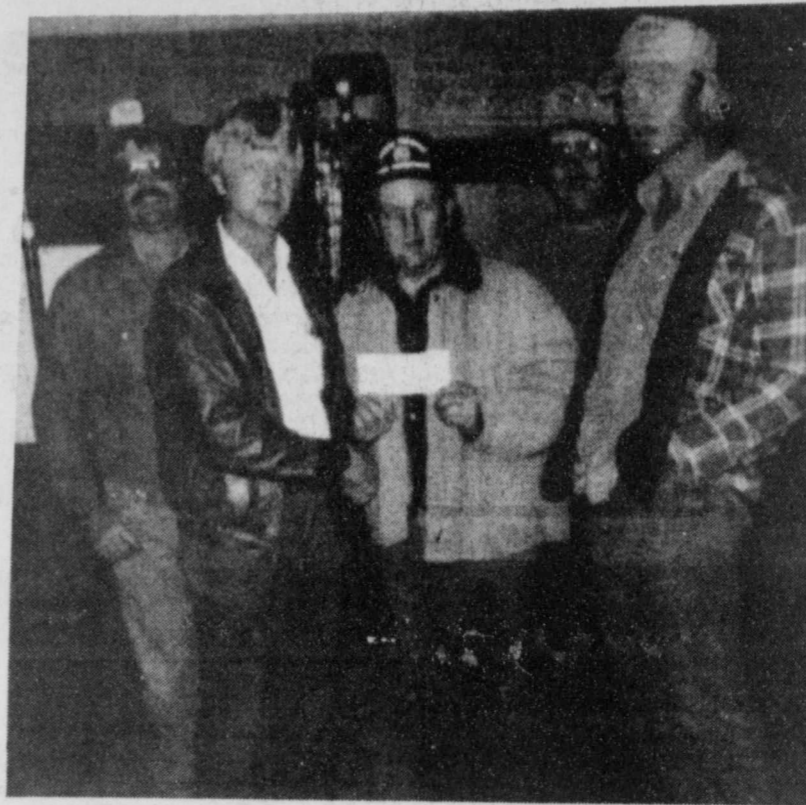

Are Your Tax Forms in Order?

Taxpayers who will be filing the long Form 1040, "U.S. Individual Income Tax Return," should look in the upper right corner of each schedule and form to be attached to the back of the Form 1040. By following the "attachment sequence" number there, you can put your return in the best order for the Internal Revenue Service to process those forms. For example, sequence number "07" (Schedule A, "Itemized Deductions") would go before "23" (Form 2441, "Child and Dependent Care Expenses"), which would be followed by "54" (Form 2106, "Employee Business Expenses"). Sequence numbers should go from lowest to highest in order. Forms without an attachment sequence number should be attached at the end of the return.

ORDINANCE NO. 1-T-92

An ordinance establishing regulations covering the cleaning up of all property within the city limits of the City of Talco, Texas and making each person who owns property within the city limits of Talco, Texas responsible for the cleaning of their own property, and providing a penalty for all persons who violate this ordinance and repealing all conflicting ordinances and containing a severability clause, "approving authority" means the Mayor or his duly authorized representative or the City Council of the City of Talco, Texas: WHEREAS, the City Council and Mayor of the City of Talco, Texas has a responsibility to the health, safety and well being of the citizens of the City of Talco, Texas;

AND WHEREAS, the fact that there is both business and residential property within the City Limits of the City of Talco, Texas, that is both a safety and health hazard because the property is never cleaned and is filthy, unsightly and a fire hazard. NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TALCO, TEXAS, SECTION 1. THIS ORDINANCE requires that any person who owns property within the city limits of Talco, Texas will be responsible to see to it that the property owned by them is kept cleaned up and mowed to make the City of Talco a more clean and healthy place to live and to look at. Some places at present time are unsightly and unhealthy as well as a fire hazard.

SECTION 2. THIS ORDINANCE requires that there will be no garbage or trash of any kind dumped on vacant lots or in streets, road ditches or anywhere other than a state approved land fill or City approved Waste Disposal Company. SECTION 3. THIS ORDINANCE requires that all trash such as garbage, furniture, appliances, etc., old wire, cans, bottles, old scrap lumber, paper, brush or trash of any kind be kept cleaned from your City property and also requires that property be mowed as often as needed to keep property in a present condition to prevent a fire hazard. SECTION 4. THIS ORDINANCE REQUIRES A PENALTY OF TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) for every day of violation. When a property owner in the City limits of the City of Talco, Texas violates this ordinance, the property owner will be notified by the Mayor, City personnel, or appointee one time in writing and within thirty (30) days to get in compliance with this ordinance. The property owner will be told when notified in what way he is in violation of this ordinance, and after the time limit given by the City of Talco, or the notice has expired, and property owner has not made any effort to get in compliance with this ordinance, then upon conviction, the City of Talco, shall charge the property owner a penalty of \$200.00 for the first violation and \$200.00 a day for every day in violation; and may also refuse City services, such as water and sewer if repeated violation occurs. If at any time the City of Talco's services are used to dispose of and clean up waste found in Section 3 of this Ordinance, then same City shall recover cost of services thru the company leasing, company owning, or individuals responsible for land or equipment involved.

SECTION 5. THIS ORDINANCE REPEALS ALL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES. SECTION 6. POWER TO ENTER by the Mayor and other authorized employees of the City bearing proper credentials and identification are entitled to enter any public or private property at any reasonable time for the purpose of enforcing this Ordinance. SECTION 7. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application; and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. SECTION 8. THIS ORDINANCE shall be in full force and take effect from and after approval of the Mayor and the City Council of the City of Talco, Texas. Passed, approved and adopted this 24th day of February, 1992, by the City Council of the City of Talco, Texas.

ORDINANCE NO. 1-L92
AN ORDINANCE of the City of Talco, Texas making it unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to permit weeds, brush or any objectionable or unsightly matter to grow to a height greater than twelve (12) inches within one hundred fifty feet (150) of any property line which abuts street right-of-ways, alleys, utility easements, subdivided additions, developed property or any buildings or other structures; prohibiting the growth of cultivated crops within the right-of-way of any public street or easement; making it the duty of any person to cut and

remove all such weeds, et cetera; providing that the cutting and removing of the weeds, et cetera, every thirty (30) days constitute compliance with this ordinance; providing for notices to owners or other persons violating the terms of this ordinance authorizing the City to cut such weeds, et cetera, and charge the costs to the owners of the property; making the charges for the cuttings of the weeds, et cetera. A lien against the property upon filing a statement with the County Clerk; providing a savings clause; making and providing for a penalty not to exceed two hundred (\$200.00) dollars for each offense and declaring an emergency. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TALCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation owning, claiming, occupying or having supervision or control of any real property, occupied or unoccupied within the corporate limits of the City of Talco, to permit weeds, brush or any objectionable or unsightly matter to grow up to a greater height than twelve (12) inches upon any real property within one hundred fifty (150) feet of any property line which abuts street right-of-ways, alleys, utility easements, subdivided additions, developed property or any buildings or other structures. It shall be the duty of such person, firm or corporation to keep the area from the line of his property to the curb line next adjacent to it, if there be a curb line, or if not, then within ten (10) feet outside that property line, free and clear of the matter referred to above. All vegetation regularly cultivated and which exceeds twelve (12) inches in height shall be presumed to be objectionable and unsightly, except that regularly cultivated crops shall not be allowed to grow within the right-of-way of any public street or easement but shall be kept mowed the same as provided above.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of any person, firm or corporation owning, claiming, occupying or having supervision or control of any real property, occupied or unoccupied within the corporate limits of the City of Talco, to fail to comply with the provisions of Section 1 and 2 hereof, it shall be the duty of the City personnel to give ten (10) days notice in writing to such person, firm or corporation, violating the terms of this ordinance, or be letter addressed to such person, firm or corporation, at its post office address or by publication two (two) times within ten (10) consecutive days in the City's official newspaper. If such person, firm or corporation fails or refuses to comply with the provisions of Section 1 and 2 hereof within ten (10) days after date of notification in writing or by letter or date of second publication of notice in the City's official newspaper, the City may go upon such property and do or cause to be done the work necessary to obtain compliance with this ordinance.

SECTION 3. The expense incurred pursuant to Section 3 above in correcting the condition of such property, and the cost of publishing notice in the newspaper shall be paid by the City and charged to the owner of such property. In the event the owner fails or refuses to pay such expense within thirty (30) days after the first day of the month following the one in which the work was done, the City shall file with the County Clerk a statement of the expenses incurred in correcting the condition on the property. When such statement is filed, the City shall have a privileged lien on such property, second only to tax liens and liens for street improvements, to secure the payment of the amount so expended. Such amount shall bear interest at the rate of ten percent per annum from the date of City incurs the expense. For any such expenditures and interest, suit may be instituted and recovery and foreclosure had by the City. The statement of expense filed with the County Clerk or a certified copy thereof shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended in such work; improvement or correction of the property, all as more particularly specified in Art. 4436, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes, which is hereby adopted.

SECTION 4. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of the ordinance, shall be subject to a fine, upon conviction in the Justice of the Peace Court, of not more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each and every day that the premises shall remain in a condition in violation of the terms of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense. This section shall be in addition to and cumulative of the provisions for the abatement of the said nuisance and charging the cost of same against the owner of the premises by the City.

SECTION 5. Should any word, phrase, sentence, clause or paragraph or section of this ordinance be declared or held to be illegal or unconstitutional the same shall not affect the remaining words, phrases, sentences, clause, paragraph or section of the ordinance which shall remain in full force and effect. SECTION 7. WHEREAS, the fact that there is no ordinance of the City of Talco, Texas adequately controlling or providing for the cutting and removal of weeds, brush or objectionable or unsightly matter, creates an emergency and an emergency and in the preservation of the public health, safety and welfare, requires that this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage as the law in such cases provides. ORDINANCE 1-JV-92
An ordinance of the City of Talco, Texas, making it unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to convert a motor vehicle into processed scrap or scrap metal, or otherwise to wreck or dismantle motor vehicles without proper storage and removal of said vehicles; whether on private or corporate lands within the City of Talco; hereby does set rules and regulations stating proper storage, dismantling or abandonment of such vehicle and regulations stating removal of said vehicles by the City of Talco and charge of cost to owners of operations. This ordinance is to repeal all conflicting ordinances.

SECTION 1. Definitions. As used in this section, the following terms shall have the respective meanings ascribed to them: Demolisher: Any person whose business is to convert a motor vehicle into processed scrap or scrap metal, or otherwise to wreck or dismantle motor vehicles. Junked vehicle: Any motor vehicle as defined in section 2 of Article 6701d, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, as amended, which is inoperative and which does not have lawfully affixed thereto both an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid motor vehicle safety inspection certificate, and which is wrecked, dismantled, partially dismantled or discarded or remains inoperable for a continuous period of more than one hundred twenty (120) days.

SECTION 2. Any motor vehicle as defined in section 2 of the Certificate of Title Act (Vernon's Texas Civil Statute, Article 6687-A, SECTION 2. Junked, etc. vehicles on private property. Definition. For the purposes of this article, a motor vehicle shall be deemed wrecked, junked, dismantled or inoperative when the same does not have lawfully affixed thereto both an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid current motor vehicle inspection sticker, and the condition of which is one or more of the following:
(1) Wrecked.
(2) Dismantled.
(3) Partially dismantled.
(4) Not in condition to be legally driven upon public streets.
(5) Abandoned.
(6) Discarded.

SECTION 3. Same-Prohibition; declaration of nuisance. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to park, place, store or leave, for a period of time in excess of thirty (30) days, upon any lot, tract of land or other private property within the city, any motor vehicle of any kind, or parts thereof, which is in a wrecked, junked, dismantled or inoperative condition. (b) It shall be unlawful for any person who is the owner, occupant or in charge of any real property within the city to suffer, permit or allow any motor vehicle of any kind, or parts thereof, which is in a wrecked, junked, dismantled or inoperative condition, to be parked, placed, stored or left upon such real property for a period of time in excess of thirty (30) days.

(c) The parking, placing, storing or leaving of any wrecked, junked, dismantled or inoperative motor vehicle or parts thereof upon any lot, tract of land or other private property within the city in violation of this section shall constitute a nuisance, detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the city, and it shall be the duty of the owner, occupant or person in control of such lot, tract of land or other private property upon which such vehicle or parts are located to remove the same from such real property or effect compliance with the provisions of this section. SECTION 4. Same-Exceptions. The provisions of section 3 shall not apply to:
(1) Any motor vehicle or parts thereof situated within a completely enclosed building or structure.
(2) Any motor vehicle or parts thereof situated wholly within the backyard area of a lot or building site which is completely enclosed by a solid fence not less than five (5) feet in height.
(3) Any motor vehicle or parts thereof situated on the premises of a business enterprise which is necessary in the operation of such business enterprise and when such business enterprise is located and conducted in an area authorized by the zoning ordinance of the city. SECTION 5. Abatement procedure established. The city council hereby estab-

lished the following procedures for the abatement of the public nuisance defined in section 3, as authorized by Article 6687-9, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, as amended, as set forth in this section. SECTION 6. Administration. This section shall be administered by the Constable of Precinct 3 or other designated officers and employees of said City, except for removal of vehicles or parts thereof from property, which may be performed by any other person designated in writing by such officer, upon a form to be prepared by such officer; such officer and employees hereinafter referred to as "enforcing officer." SECTION 7. Notice to the owner. The enforcing officer shall provide for the removal of any public nuisance, as herein defined, from private property, provided that such officer shall give notice by certified or registered mail with a five (5) day return requested, to the owner or occupant of the premises whereupon such public nuisance exists, which notice shall set forth:
(1) The nature of the public nuisance;
(2) That it must be removed and abated within ten (10) days; and
(3) That a public hearing before the Justice of the Peace court may be requested, provided that such request is filed in the office of the city secretary prior to the expiration of such ten (10) day period.

If any notice to an owner or occupant, as above authorized is returned undelivered by the United States postal service, official action to abate such public nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than ten (10) days from the date of such return. SECTION 8. Public hearing. When an owner or occupant, upon receipt of a notice under section 7, files a request for public hearing within the time and in the manner therein specified, the city secretary shall proceed to set a public hearing before the Justice of the Peace court and shall post notice of the time, place and subject of said hearing on the city hall bulletin board and, also, shall mail a copy of said notice to the party requesting such hearing not less than three (3) days prior to such hearing.

SECTION 9. Order. At the conclusion of the public hearing, the Justice of the Peace court shall, by order, require the removal of such junked vehicle or part thereof, and shall include a description of the vehicle and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle, if such identification and license number are available at the site. If the foregoing order is not made, or if no action is taken by the judge of the court, the proceedings shall be abated and no further action shall be taken by the enforcing officer with regard to the abatement of such public nuisance. SECTION 10. Removal. When the owner or occupant has failed to abate a nuisance within the time hereinabove specified, or upon the making of an order pursuant to section 7, the enforcing officer shall arrange for the removal of the junked vehicle; or part thereof, by either such enforcing officer or any other duly authorized person, to the location as such enforcing officer may designate; provided, that any junked vehicle or parts which have been removed under the terms of this section shall not be reconstructed or made operable at the owners expense. SECTION 11. Notice to state department. The enforcing office shall give notice to the state department of highways and public transportation within five (5) days after removal of a junked vehicle, or part thereof, citing this section, setting forth all identification numbers and such other description as may be available at the site, and requesting cancellation of the certificate of title to such vehicle, pursuant to Article 6687-1, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, as amended.

SECTION 12. Disposal. The enforcing officer shall arrange for the disposal of junked vehicles or parts thereof, in accordance with section 11 of Article 6687-9, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, as amended. SECTION 13. Repeal. This Ordinance repeals all previous conflicting ordinances. Passed, approved and adopted this 24th day of February, 1992, by the City Council of Talco, Texas.
