Texas Cities And Counties Receive \$91.6 Million In March Rebates

State Comptroller John Sharp today sent checks totaling \$82.1 million to 931 cities, a 12% increase over the \$73.3 million received by cities last March.

Checks to 106 Texas counties totaled another \$9.4 million, up 10.4% over last March's rebate of \$8.5 million.

Quarterly rebates sent to mass transit authorities included: Austin, \$11.2 million; Corpus Christi, \$3.1 million; Dallas, \$51.7 million; Ft. Worth, \$5 million; Houston, \$58.1 million

and San Antonio, \$19.5 million.

"Payments to Texas cities and counties overall this year are up a little over 5%," said Sharp. "That reflects a gradual overall improvement and a continued slow growth in consumer confidence."

Local payments received are: Blossom: \$1,860.29 for this period, compared to \$1,085.59 for last year, an increase of 2.58%.

In Deport, \$863.47 was received, showing a 17.32% increase.

Paris received \$143,054.96 for a

9.44% decrease.

Bogata received \$2,334.35 for a 2.01% decrease over last year's payments to date while Clarksville received \$16,590.63 for a .75% increase.

Detroit received \$976.37 for an 8.85% increase.

Mt. Pleasant received \$94,176.10 for a 17.48% decrease.

Talco received \$1,414.19, marking a 4.28% increase over last year's payments to date.

You could say that Rene LaClare's life is like a best-seller novel. The things that he and his family has overcome utterly amazing.

The saga begins back in Nicaragua where Rene was born and raised with his three sisters by his parents, Justavo and Soledad. His parents owned and operated a seed store. After high school, Rene attended a Baptist college in Nicaragua and for four years at University of Chile.

At the age of thirty-five, Rene started his business. He owned a motel, Las Marias (The Merries) as well as a ranch of 500 acres with cattle. For fifteen years he was a successful businessman.

Rene married Hazel Reed who he has been married to for twenty-five years. Hazel's father was a Navy officer who was stationed in Nicaragua. They have a son, Carlos who is fourteen.

In 1979, the LaClare's life would forever change. The FSLN Revolution started and Nicaragua would never be the same. The government made Rene give up everything he owned in less than twenty-four hours. Today it's still hard for Rene to think about what he gave up. For the next five years, Rene still worked the ranch. One night a dangerous battle broke out too close to home. The bullets were actually going over their house! That's when Rene decided to move his family to the United States.

What makes Rene's story even more interesting is how he managed to get to the United States. Years before he and his wife had brought his mother to Houston for medical treatments. While in Houston they met a man who was a

rancher and developed a friendship with him. When the Revolution took place, Rene's wife wrote the rancher and explained what was taking place. The rancher got them in contact with a woman who was needing a foreman for a ranch in Cuthand.

So the LaClare family made their way to Dallas in 1984. All the money they had was \$800. The first week Rene bought a car for \$700. What a beginning! Rene didn't even know how to speak English. For years Hazel had tried to get him to learn the language, but he was convinced that he would never have to use it. He was wrong.

For the next three years, Rene worked as a foreman in Cuthand. In the last few years, he and Hazel have bought five acres of land and have built themselves a house. Things are looking better.

Rene has worked at True Value Hardware in Bogata for the last four years. Last year the store owner, Bud Pyron, sent Rene to North East Texas Community College for small engine courses. The plans Rene has for the future includes his work at True Value. He wants his son Carlos to grow up with safety and with freedom.

But everything that Rene has gone through over the last few years has not destroyed his charming personality. He is a gentle man who works hard for what he has. Rene said that the Revolution took everything he had but his faith. That has remained firm throughout...which makes the La Claires very lucky in spite of their difficult times!

German Chocolate Cake

2 cups sugar
1 cup Crisco
4 eggs, separated
1 cup buttermilk
2 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
2 tsp. vanilla
1 pkg. Sweet German's Chocolate, dissolved in 1/2 cup boiling water
Cream sugar and Crisco. Add beaten egg yolks; add 3/4 cups buttermilk alternately with flour. Dissolve soda in other 1/4 cup buttermilk; add to mixture. Add other ingredients. Fold in beaten egg whites. Bake at 350 for 35 minutes in 3 layers.

Filling:
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 tbsp. flour
1 1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 sticks oleo
2 tsp. vanilla
2 cup chopped nuts
1 can coconut
Mix sugar and flour. Add milk and oleo. Bring to boil slowly for 7 minutes. Add vanilla, nuts and coconut; cool. Spread between layers.

Icing:
1 lb. sifted powdered sugar
1 stick oleo
1 cup chocolate chips
2 beaten egg whites
Cream sugar and oleo; melt chips and add. Fold in beaten whites and spread on cake.

Chicken Casserole

3 cups milk
Mix two packages instant vanilla pudding with 3 cups milk. Fold in 12 oz. Cool Whip. Layer bottom of 9x13 pan with graham crackers. Pour half pudding mixture over graham crackers. Add layer of graham crackers over pudding mixture. Pour on remainder of pudding mixture. Add another layer of graham crackers. Mix 2 tbsp. hot water to frosting using electric mixer. Pour over last layer of graham crackers. Let set in fridge overnight.

Chocolate Pizza

1-12 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate pieces
1 lb. white almond bark
1 cup crisp rice cereal
1 cup peanuts
2 cups miniature marshmallows
1-6 oz. jar red maraschino cherries, drained, cut in half
2 tsp. green maraschino cherries, drained, quartered
1/3 cup flaked coconut
1 tsp. oil
Melt chocolate pieces with 14 oz. almond bark over low heat, stirring until smooth. Remove from heat; stir in cereal and peanuts. Add marshmallows; mix well. Pour into greased 12-inch pizza pan. Top with cherries; sprinkle with coconut. Melt remaining almond bark with oil over low heat, stirring until smooth. Drizzle over coconut; chill until firm. Store at room temperature.

The 10-minute demonstration was given by the hostess, showing sev-

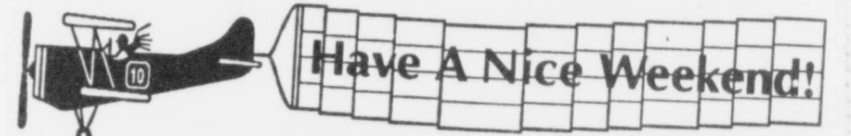
eral baby books made from cloth squares and some pillows.

Plan For Severe Weather

Although tornadoes, severe thunderstorms and floods can strike virtually any part of Texas at any time, spring seems to bring an increase in violent weather.

You can take precautions to assist yourself and your family in the event of a tornado.

Periodically hold a tornado drill so that family members know what to do and where to go if the national weather service issues a tornado warning. The safest part of a house during a tornado traditionally is the basement, but be aware of the potential for flooding if there is heavy rain in the area. Interior bathrooms, hallways and closets on the ground floor also offer protection from tornadic winds. Avoid windows and outside walls. Take along blankets or sleeping bags to protect yourself from falling debris and shattering glass, which are frequently cause of death and injury during a tornado.

Make certain you have a portable radio and several flashlights as well as bottled water, extra prescription medications and a first aid kit in your shelter area.

Remember, if a tornado

strikes, electricity, gas, water and sewer service may be disrupted for several days.

Mobile homes and automobiles are dangerous places to be during a tornado. If you live in a mobile home, make sure all family members know where the nearest substantial shelter is. If you are in your mobile home or car and can't get to a better shelter; go outside, lie down in the nearest ravine, ditch or culvert and cover your head with your hands. Be aware of the possibility of flooding in low-lying areas. Do not hide under your mobile home or car because both can easily be picked up and carried away by a tornado.

Your local emergency management office can provide you with additional information on severe weather precautions. The Governor's Division of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service, the Texas Insurance Advisory Association and the Federal Emergency Management Agency are sources of information and publications on various weather phenomena and related information.
