Thursday, May 31, in the First Baptist Church basement in Rule. The Bloodmobile comes to Rule from Wichita Falls for the west half of Haskell County twice a year and this includes Sagerton, Rule, Rochester and O'Brien, which are expected to give 70 pints of blood. This blood is drawn on by people living in Haskell County no matter where they go to a hospital, whether in Haskell, Stamford or elsewhere, so everyone that is able should give. The age limits are between the ages of 18 and 66, men or women. Sagerton is trying to have at least 20 donors between the time of 12:30 till 1:30, but if that is not possible, the bloodmobile will be there from 11:30 till 4:30 p. m. Volunteers should call Mrs. John Clark, Mrs. Cliff LeFevre, Mrs. Delbert LeFevre, or Pastor Aalbue.

# 35 Years As A Missionary

After completing her training at Hardin-Simmons University and waiting for over a year for an assignment, May Bell Taylor was at last on a steam ship, pulling out of New Orleans, headed down the Mississippi for Brazil.

While other passengers cried and expressed regrets at leaving, May Bell, with a smile on her face, could think of nothing except the new life which awaited her in Brazil. As the steam ship slowly pulled away from the dock, her thoughts went back to the first time she had thought of being a missionary. It was while she was still in the Sunbeams in church. Missionaries would come to the church and talk of Brazil and its people, and of the work they were doing. It was these first lectures that kindled a desire in her to be a missionary. From that time on, she studied about Brazil, read library books on Brazil and welcomed any chance to talk to people who

had come in contact with the Brazilian people. Now after 35 years of missionary work in Brazil, May Bell Taylor has returned to Haskell, Texas, her original home.

When asked how it felt to leave the missions and the people she had worked with for 35 years, Miss Taylor replied, "It was naturally hard to leave the places and people that I had trained and worked with for so long, but I felt that I had laid a good foundation and that I had done my job. I think that the new people in charge will lend new ideas and new vitality to the mission."

Miss Taylor's work included 17 years in Recife as vice-director and director of Simine of Christian Education for girls; nine years as director of a Baptist School and the last seven years, she founded and directed the Friendship center, which offered Bible classes as well as clinical facilities. She commented on the importance of the clinic, since Brazil has no welfare program.

Miss Taylor hesitated when asked what was her most memorable event while working with the missions. Finally, she stated that it would be one of about five events, in which the people of Brazil honored her.

The first when the North Baptist Brazilian Mission devoted the entire last program of their annual meeting to her, and they crowned her 'Miss Americas', pertaining to Miss North America and Miss South America. During the program she was presented with roses and crowned.

The last Friday night in Arcaju, the State Legislature met and made her an honorary citizen.

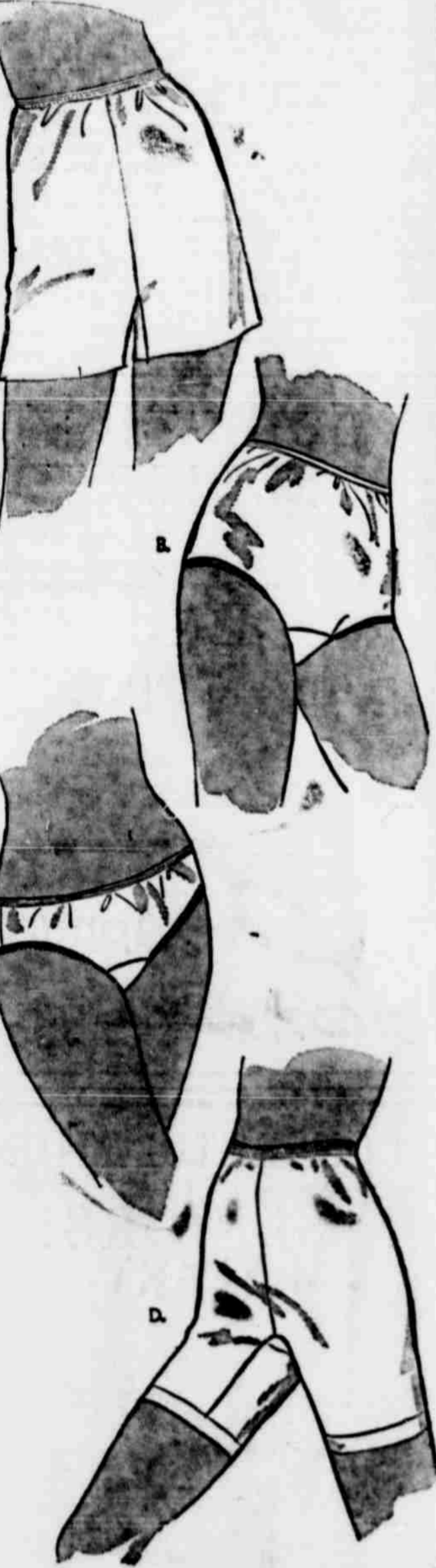

In this setting, the great new challenge to those concerned about the stewardship of resources, is first, to join in an open mind, recognizing that growing numbers of Americans in the Seventies are honestly skeptical if not downright opposed to earlier judgments about the true course to success. Second, the challenge is to accept the probability that human aspirations for dignity and peace of mind may weigh as heavily in resource decisions of the future as financial gains and other economic considerations.

Not all of our standards are perfect. Nor can it be said that all we do is the best we can do. There is always a margin for improvement; always a need for re-thinking and re-statement. As the children of God, we are called on to be activists in His service and be forever conscientious in our responsibility to expand the quality of life in His domain.

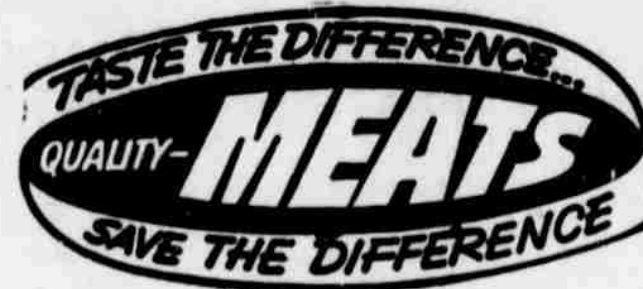

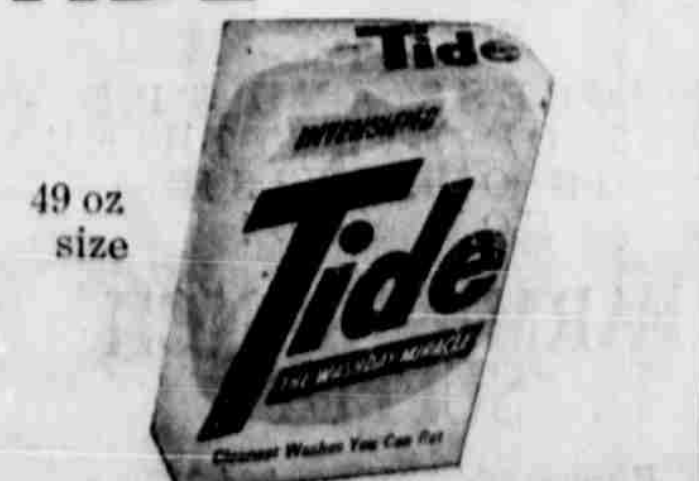

Changing challenges come at us from all directions, yet as stewards of resources and values we must respond responsibly.

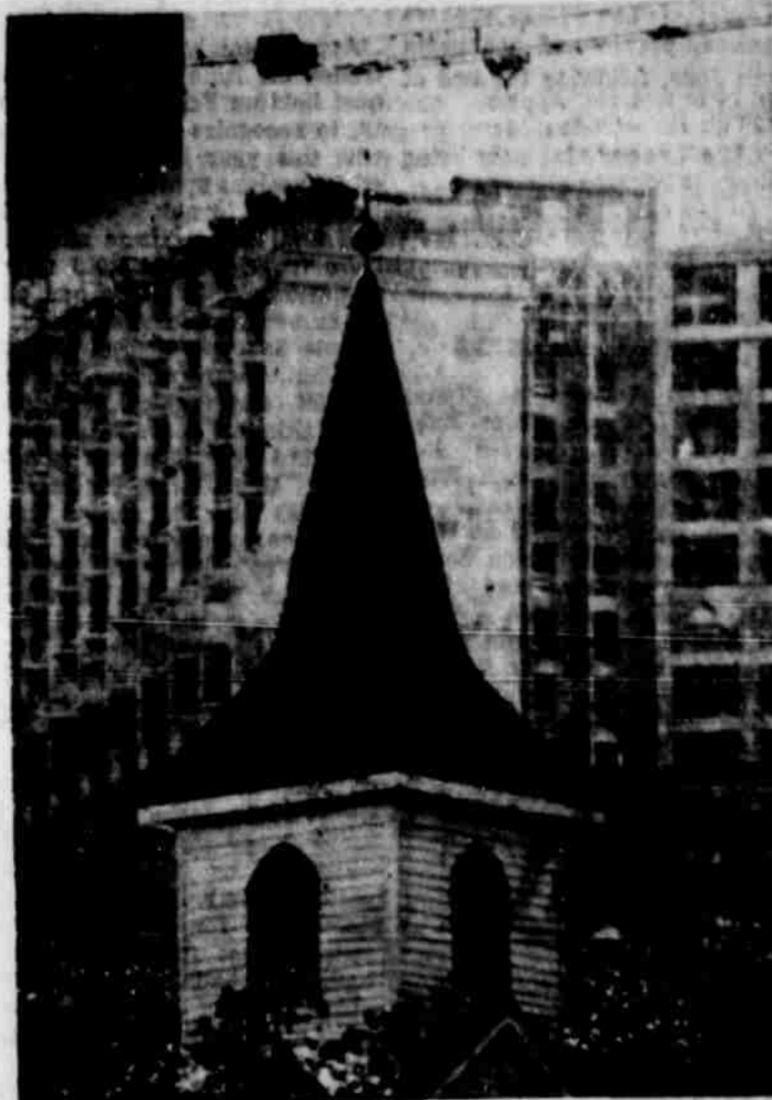
The use of our God-given re-

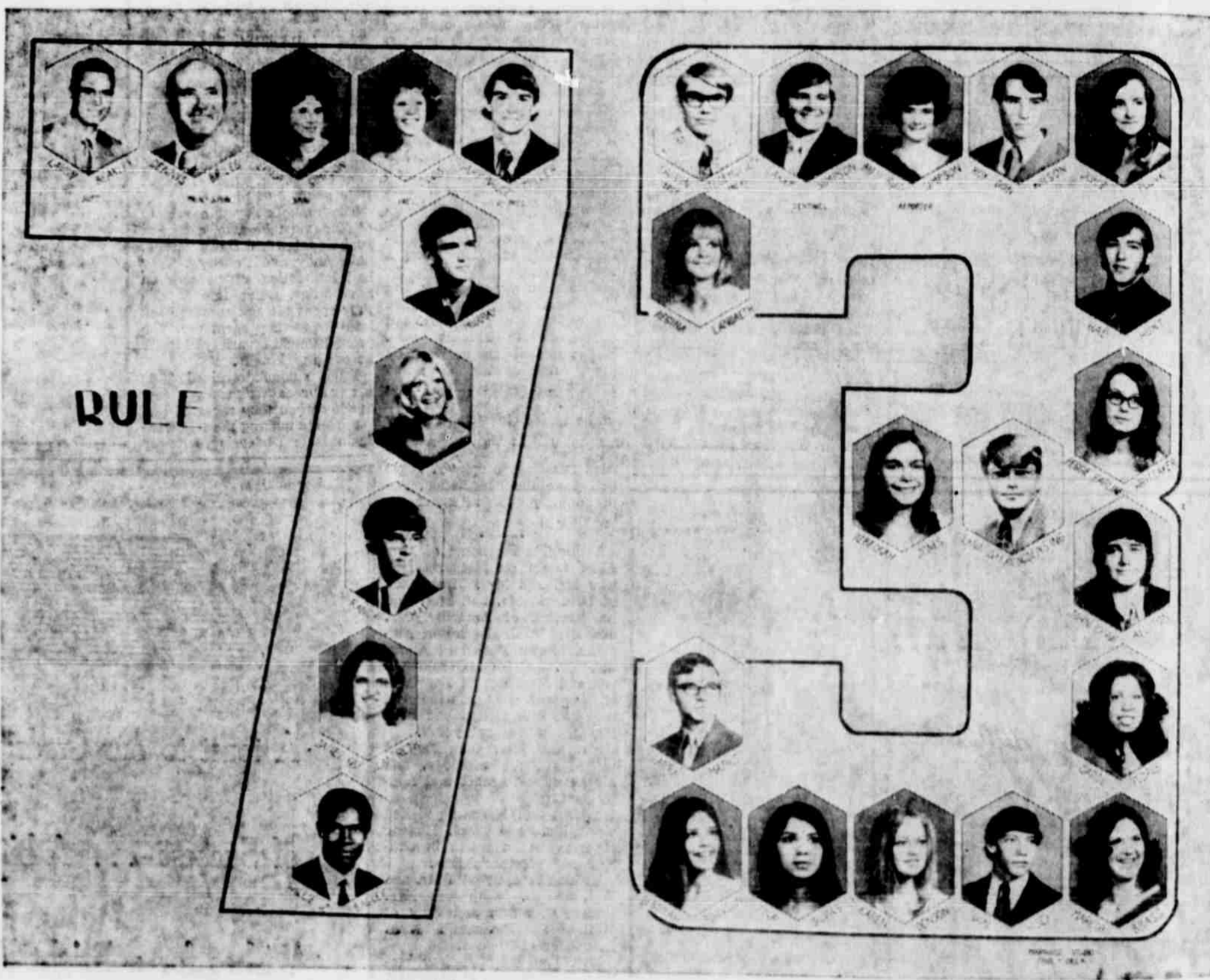

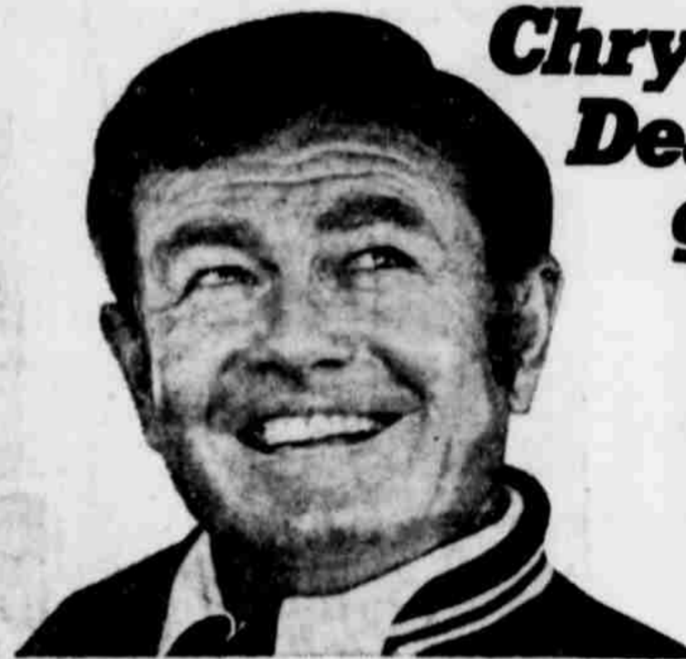
