to meet the patients' needs. if Lone Star Gas Files Application For Increase In City Gate Rate

DALLAS, TEX - Lone Star Gas Company recently announced that it had filed an application with the Texas Railroad Commission Friday (May 11) rate for gas delivered to each town served by the company in

in Lone Star's application relate to the cost of maintaining an adequate gas supply for customers, and contracting for new supplies to meet growing consumer demands. The individual items included in the company's rate increase proposal are: (1) the right to recover costs and return of \$7.2 million associated with the firm's West Texas Gas Supply System, an approximate 400 mile largediameter pipeline system from West Texas to the Dallas-Fort Worth area; (2) the right to recover costs and return of \$0.8 million on approximately \$9.6 million in advance payments and pre-payments the company thus far has made to producers as a part of new gas purchase agreements; (3) to bring the company's weighted average cost of gas used in the Commission's calculation of Lone Star's base city gate rate up from the 16.29-cents per thousand cubic feet to the present level of 20.53-cents per thousand; -(4) to allow Lone Star to "pass on" 100% of its increased cost of purchased gas on a monthly basis, rather than the presently allowed 65% every six months.

The cost adjustments would mean an 81-cent per thousand cubic feet increase in the city gate rate, and an increase of \$10.5 million in Lone Star's annual revenues when costs are flowed through to customers, based on a 1972 volume of approximately 130 billion cubic

The company further noted that all proposed rate increases are cost justified and within nationally established price control guidelines for utilities established last year.

To egg whites add pimentoes which have been well drained. Dissolve gelatin in hot stock. Put dark meat mixture in oblong casserole, pat down well and pour 1 cup gelatin over it. Put egg yolk mixture over this, pour 1 cup gelatin over egg yolk and then put light meat mixture in dish above mixtures and pat down firmly. Pour 1 cup gelatin over light meat.

Lastly put egg white mixture in casserole, pat down and pour 1 cup gelatin over it. Cover tightly and refrigerate until ready to serve. Should set for several hours at least. When ready to serve invert onto large tray and garnish with lettuce leaves and stuffed olives.

This is a large dish and serves 12 to 14 persons heartily. This dish is high in protein and has a good supply of vitamin C.
