B Optima Bold, Memphis, Cairo, Helvetica Narrow, are all rather strange...I can't find a reason for their names at all.

Chicago has a distinct 1930's gangsterish type of look about it.

I can't help but believe that someone with a real sense of humor named the scrambled, up and down look of the Los Angeles font.

New Century Schoolbook is a very traditional font.

Zapf Chancery is rather pretty, but the one that causes the most raised eyebrows is Zapf Dingbats.

No, Zapf Dingbats isn't a joke. Instead of letters it produces small pointing fingers, arrows, stars, dots, whirls, tiny crosses, little dogs and a rather bewildering variety of odd things...including the check marks we use in election ads, boxes and thumbs up signs!

We have about thirty fonts in our computer system.

There are literally hundreds more.

But next time you read the ads in this paper look at the different type styles used, and think about some of those strange names attached to something as simple as a style of lettering!

Bogata City Council Elections Set For May 2

Saturday, May 2 is the date set for Bogata City Council elections. Two seats for City Council will be up for election. The deadline for filing was Wednesday, March 18 at 5pm.

Mildred Eudy was the only one who filed for Mayor. Mrs. Eudy was appointed Mayor upon the resignation of W.T. Harbison last February and then was elected to a full term.

Those who filed for the two seats for City Council are Jettie Bond, Buck Ramsey and Lyle Williams. Mrs. Bond has been a Council member since 1986. Mr. Ramsey was appointed to fill the seat of Jack Troutt in the February meeting of this year. Mr. Williams is the owner of Williams Plumbing and Repair.

Rep. Russell Announces Hospital Funds

State Representative Sam W. Russell (D-Mt. Pleasant) announced recently that three hospitals within his new legislative district will receive funds within the next few days as a result of legislation which passed during the Special Session last summer. The legislation, of which he was a house co-sponsor, created a third Medicaid disproportionate share program which has resulted in some \$41 million being distributed back to

approximately 100 rural hospitals across the state.

Among the hospitals to receive monies is Red River General Hospital in Clarksville who will receive approximately \$138,000 which covers the past eight month period, and the hospital should receive about \$17,000 a month through June, 1993, when the program will expire if not reenacted.

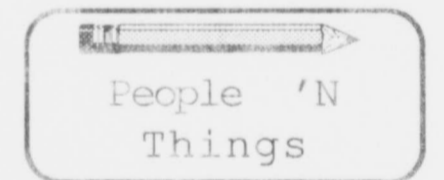

This convention will elect delegates to the State Convention.

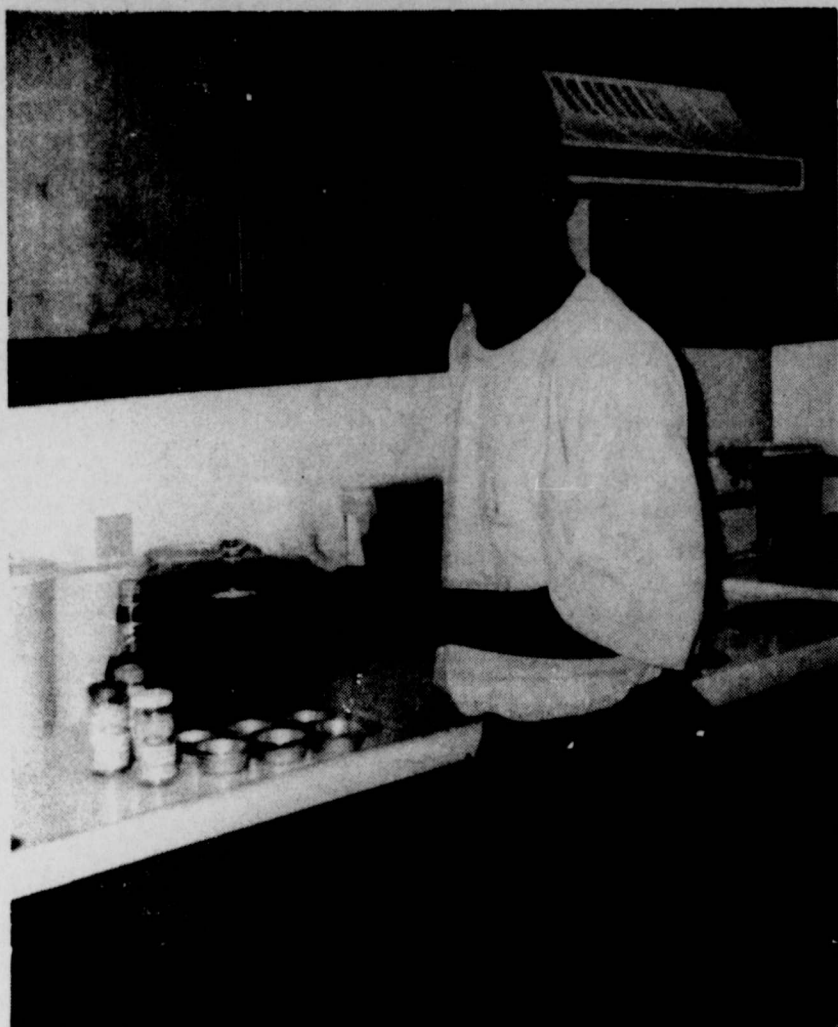

He has been a cook at the Italian Pantry in Paris for two years. James is the son of James H. Ethridge and Betty Mason. His hobbies include basketball, dancing, gymnastics and music. After graduation he plans to attend PJC and become a paramedic. Cooking Italian food is James' favorite food. He says "Homemaking has been a very rewarding experience. By taking this course, I have learned a great deal about self-sufficiency and independence. Responsibility is also a big part of the lesson learned in homemaking. I have had the experience of making alot of good friends, as well as becoming a friend to others. It is because of these reasons that I will always be thankful

Mississippi Mud Cake

1 cup butter
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup cocoa
4 large eggs
1 1/2 cups all purpose flour
1 tablespoon vanilla extract
1 1/2 cups chopped pecans
Frosting:
2 cups confectioners sugar
3 tablespoons cocoa
1/2 cup melted butter
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1-2 tablespoons milk
Preheat oven to 350. Line 13x9 pan with aluminum foil. Grease and flour pan. In medium saucepan, melt one cup butter, 1 1/2 cups sugar and 1/2 cup cocoa powder. Remove from heat. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Stir in flour, vanilla and pecans. Bake 25 minutes. Cool. Frosting: Combine confectioners sugar and cocoa; beat in butter and vanilla. Beat in enough milk to make fluffy and spreadable. Spread on frosting, sprinkle pecans. Cut into squares. Makes 15 servings.

Buttermilk Pancakes

1 1/4 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
3/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
1 whole egg
1 1/4 cup buttermilk
3 tablespoons cooking oil
Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt and sugar in one bowl. In another bowl, beat egg and add buttermilk and shortening. Add in liquid ingredients to dry and stir until blended. Batter will be a little lumpy. Heat griddle or skillet until a drop of water will dance on it. Pour batter 1/4 cup for each pancake on hot skillet. Bake on one side until full of bubbles. Turn.

Lemon Meritue Pie

1 baked 9" pie shell
1/4 cup cornstarch
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cup water
Mix in top of double broiler slowly adding water. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until thick enough to mound slightly. Cover, cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.
3 eggs separated
1/2 cup sugar
Beat egg yolks and sugar. Blend a little hot mixture into yolks, then stir all into remaining hot mixture. Cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from boiling water.
Gently stir in:
2 tablespoons margarine
1/2 teaspoons grated lemon rind
1/3 cup lemon juice
Cool to room temperature, turn into

pie shell. Whip egg whites until foamy. Add 6 T. sugar, 1T at a time, continue beating until stiff peaks form when beater is raised. Spread some meringue around edge of pie first. Touching crust all around, then fill the center. Bake at 350 for 10 minutes until meringue is lightly browned.

Pound Cake Brownies

3/4 cup butter or margarine, softened
1 cup sugar
3 eggs
2-1 oz. squares unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/4 cup all purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup chopped nuts
Cream butter and sugar; beat in eggs. Blend in chocolate and vanilla. Stir flour with baking powder and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Add to creamed mixture; mix well. Stir in nuts. Spread in greased 9x9x2" baking pan. Bake at 350 for 25-30 minutes. Cool. If desired, sift powdered sugar over top. Cut into bars. Makes 24.

Chocolate Chippers
By James Ethridge, Jr.

1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/4 cup packed brown sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup all purpose flour
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1-6 oz. package semisweet chocolate pieces (1 cup)
1/2 cup broken nuts
Cream together shortening, sugars, egg and vanilla till light and fluffy. Thoroughly stir together flour, salt and baking soda; stir into creamed mixture. Blend well. Stir in chocolate and nuts. Drop from teaspoon 2" apart on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 for 10-12 minutes. Immediately remove from cookie sheet to cool. Makes 3 dozen.

Sweet Chocolate Chip Cookies

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened
1/3 cup granulated sugar
1/3 cup packed brown sugar
1 egg
1 tablespoon water
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/4 cups all purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
2-4 oz. packages sweet cooking chocolate, coarsely chipped
Thoroughly cream together butter and sugars. Add egg, water and vanilla; beat well. Stir together flour, soda and salt; blend into creamed mixture. By hand, stir in chocolate. Drop from teaspoon 2" apart on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 about 15 minutes. Cool. Makes 3 1/2 dozen.

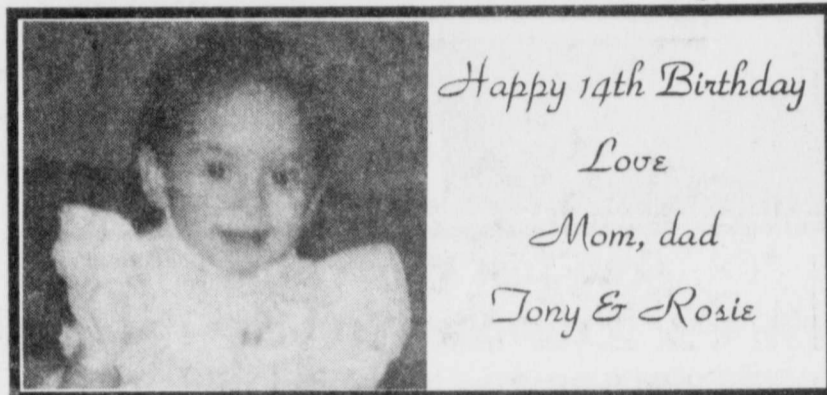

Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to

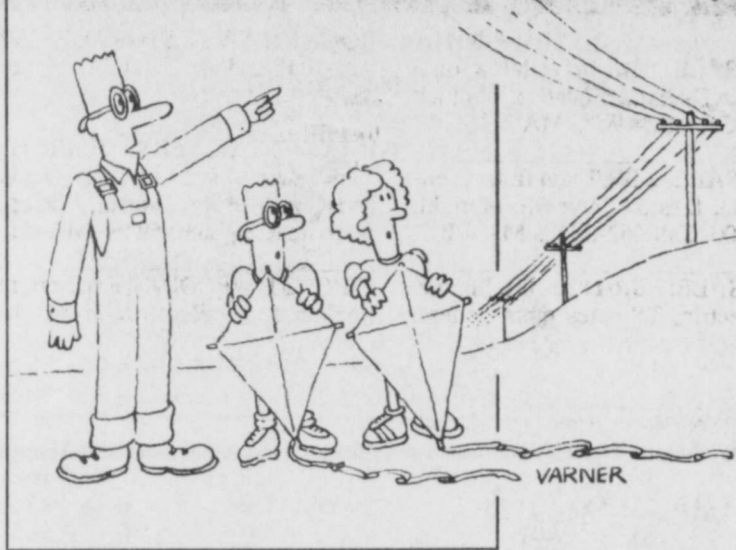

Mammography Cancer Exams Being Offered

Mammography breast cancer examinations are being offered to eligible women through a screening program provided by the Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7.

If you are forty years of age or older and interested in obtaining a mammogram, contact the Public Health Region 7 field office clinic nearest to you for an eligibility determination.

Mammography screening, an x-ray procedure, has become vital in early detection and diagnosis of breast cancer, which is "currently the number two killer of American women", according to The American Cancer Society. "In the United States, one out of every nine women will develop breast cancer at some time during her life."

The mammography project, which is funded by the Texas Cancer Council and the Centers for Disease Control, is aimed at detection of breast cancer at the earliest possible stage. It can detect extremely small breast cancers too small to be felt by breast self-exam techniques.

Mammography also shows other changes in breast tissue that could represent a sign of very early cancer. A baseline mammogram is of value because it can be referred to for later comparison.

Medical authorities emphasize that the earlier breast cancer is discovered--and the smaller it is at the time of discovery--the better the chance for cure.
