But what happens when those role models begin to break the law...and don't have to pay for it?

Would someone tell me why these people manage to get out of trouble time and time again? Would you explain why exceptions to all the laws and rules that apply to "ordinary" people are made for pro athletes?

What kind of role model is a man who spits at referees and fans-who curses and throws things?

What kind of a hero is a man who takes drugs, is arrested for DWI, assault or rape?

What kind of an example is someone who flaunts their immunity, who wastes money selfishly?

We spend a lot of time talking about how impressionable young children's minds are. Shouldn't the people these kids worship be worthy of that worship?

And when those idols fail, and fall, shouldn't they be treated as any other person would be? If they aren't, what message does this send to youth? When action is delayed time after time when a sports star fails a drug test, how does that look?

The record shows that charges against sports figures are dropped, sentences are reduced, or the athletes are given special treatment.

NO ONE should be above the law. I don't care how important they are on a team. I don't care how popular they are.

Professional athletes on the whole are aware that they should set an example to the young fans that adore them. They are aware that fans are the reason that they have a sports career at all. The majority are worthy of the hero worship they receive.

But so much publicity goes to those that have a bad attitude, who cause trouble and who create disruptions.

If punishment for improper behavior was shift and sure, then the message to those youngsters who look up to them would be powerful.

Sadly, I'm afraid that the message going out to kids these days is quite the opposite.

Chili Cookoff, Egg Hunt All Set!

The Third Annual Deport American Legion and Volunteer Fire Department Chili Cookoff is rapidly approaching.

Saturday morning a free breakfast for the community and the chili cookers will be held from 6 until 9 a.m. at the Legion Building.

The Saturday schedule of events is as follows: Easter Egg Hunt, 11 a.m. at Charles Foster Park. All area children are invited to come hunt eggs and win prizes.

Booths for arts and crafts, fun and activities will go on most of the day. A concession stand will be open to provide food, drinks, custom designed chili cookoff tee shirts, and to sell

raffle tickets and duck race tickets. This year's Tee-shirt will feature a bouquet of red chili peppers and white cotton bolls. It will be a one-of-a-kind custom design, which will not be found anywhere else.

Competition among the chili cooks will be intense. There is a People's choice award, a showmanship award, a Fire Department Division, a Jack-pot Bean Competition (white beans only), and Local and CASI divisions for the chili.

The DUCK RACE will be at 2 p.m. with tickets \$5 each. Tickets are available from Fire Department members and at the concession stand. First place will be \$150; 2nd place will be \$75; third place will be \$25.

It's fun to watch the ducks sweeping along the creek, some come watch and root for YOUR duck to win!

At 2:30 p.m. there will be a bed race. Five person teams will compete for prize money. Entry fee is \$5 and the first place will be \$100. Second place will be \$50.

These bed races are a lot of fun as nightshirt clad people push an iron bedstead, complete with occupant, down the street!

Chili judging will be from 3 to 4 p.m. and awards will be given at 4.

Rivercrest Receives New Health Education Program

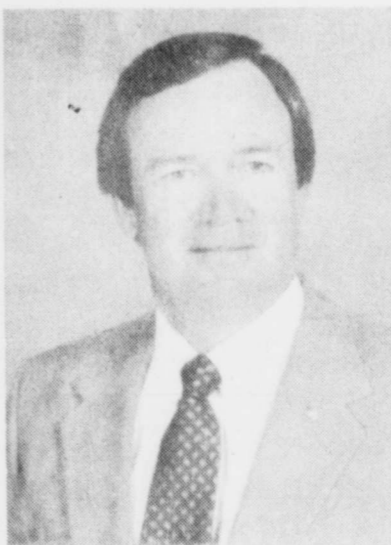
Last week Rivercrest received a new health education program about HIV and AIDS donated by the Advantage Life Company of California.

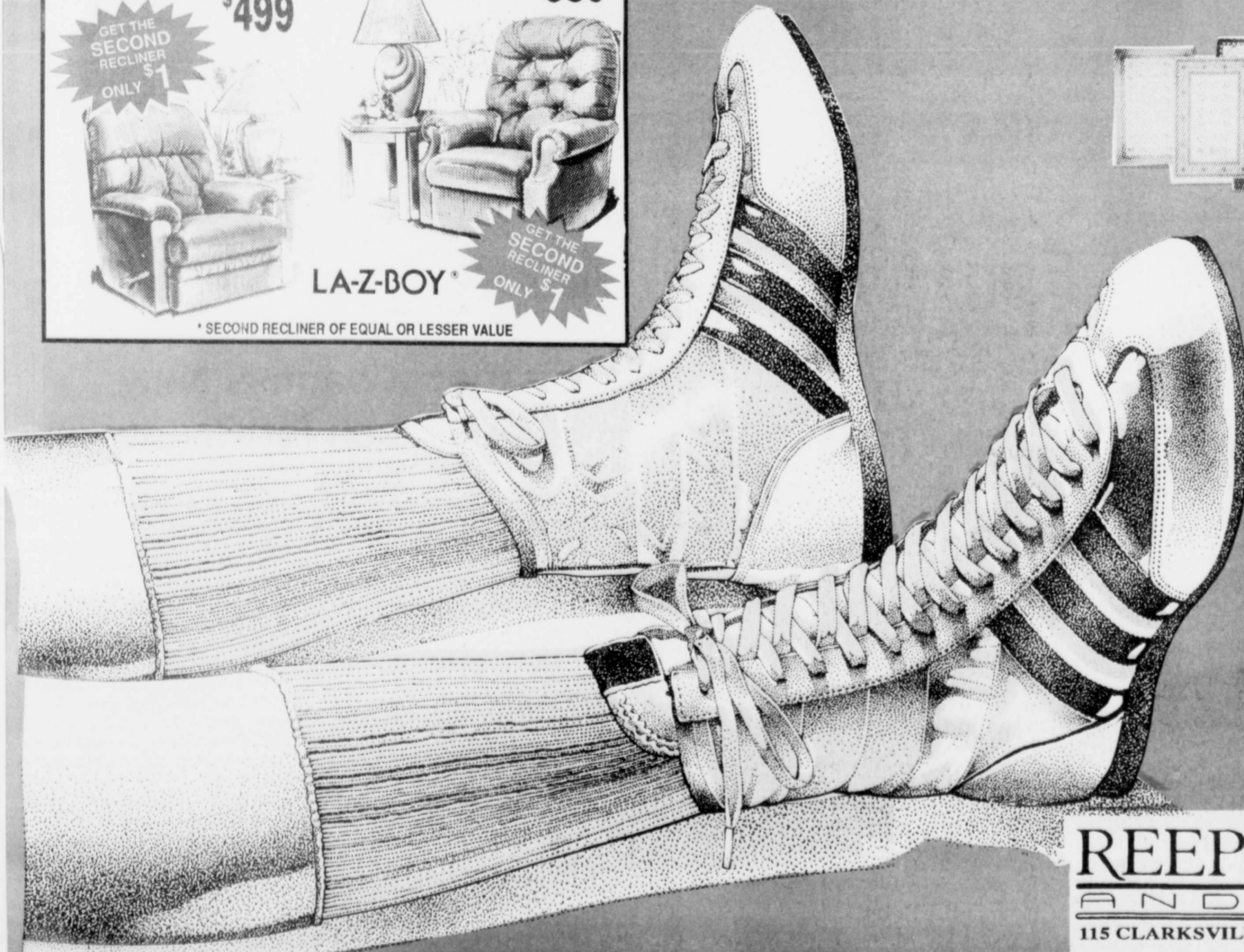

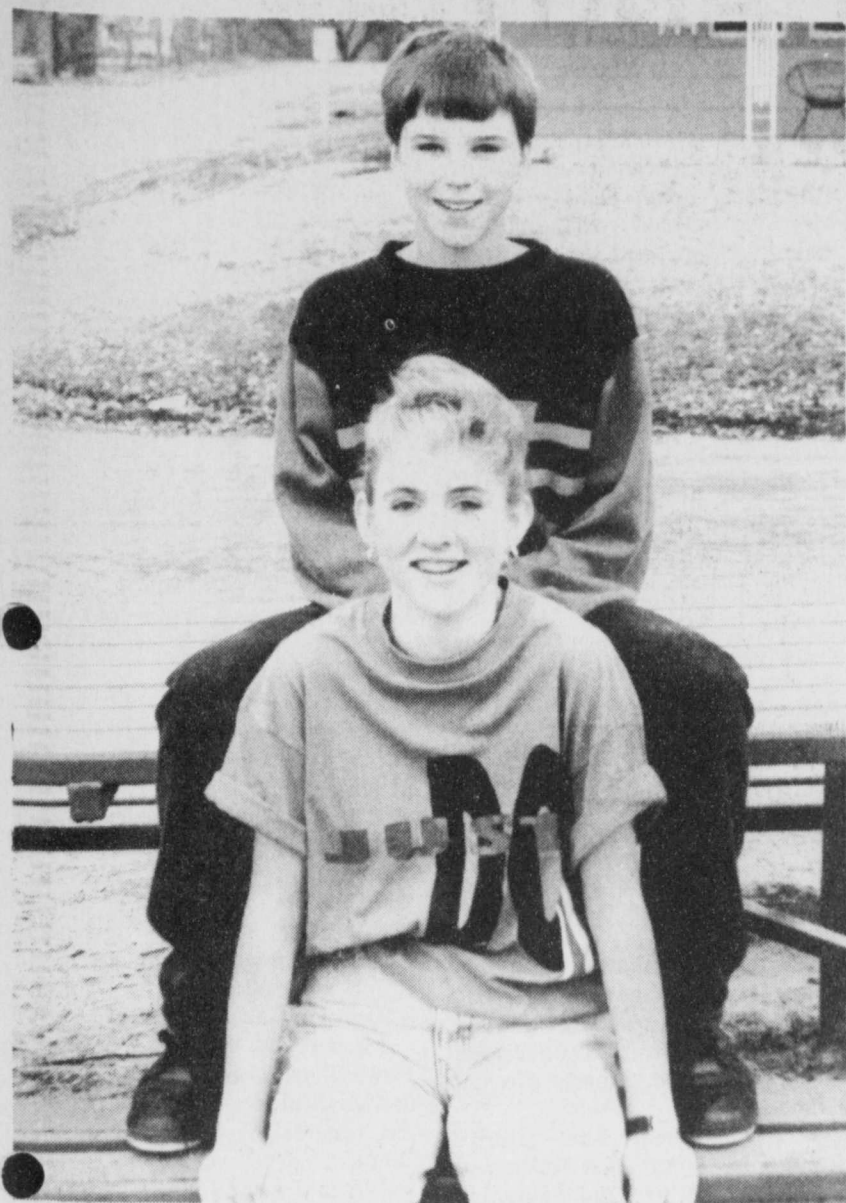

Social Security Notes

Special provisions can help people who are blind or near blind qualify for Supplemental Security Income payments. There are also other provisions to help people who are blind and already receiving SSI return to work and still receive SSI benefits or Medicaid protection.

SSI makes monthly payments to people 65 and older and to people with disabilities at any age (including children) whose income and assets are below a certain level. And people who receive SSI usually qualify for Medicaid and food stamps, too.

If local Social Security officials determine that individuals meet the eligibility standards for blindness, those individuals can receive SSI payments for up to 6 months while they wait for a formal decision by a state Disability Determination Service. If they're later found not to meet the SSI definition of blindness, they do not have to pay back any money. Other provisions within the law also help people with disabilities

receive SSI while they're working. For example, when figuring a disabled person's earnings, SSI does not count any work expenses directly related to the disability. These exclusions are important because the SSI payment is offset by other income a person has.

People who are blind receive additional exclusions. SSI excludes most of their work expenses (not just those related to their disability). Some examples include Federal, State and Social Security taxes; routine transportation costs to and from work; and

union dues. People who are blind also can ask for special handling of any letters sent by Social Security about changes in their SSI. At their request, we can either telephone them or send the letters by certified mail. Anyone who wants more information about SSI or who wants to apply for benefits should call their local Social Security office.

Highway Improvements In Progress On Hwy. 271

Plans to add shoulders to a section of U.S. Highway 271 and level up a section of U.S. 67 near Mt. Pleasant have been approved by the Texas Department of Transportation. According to construction plans on U.S. 271, a four-mile section of the highway from 3.6 miles south of FM 1896 to Business U.S. 271 will have part of the old pavement removed, shoulders leveled up, and the entire surface repaved. Once completed the existing 12-foot traffic lanes will have four-foot paved shoulders on each side. All drainage structures along the route will also be widened and safety features improved on all culverts. Duinick Brothers, Inc. of Grape-

vine was awarded the contract for construction with a low bid of \$912,313.

The roadway on U.S. 67 between Winfield and Mt. Pleasant is also scheduled for improvement. About a two-mile section of the highway from 0.4 miles east of FM 1734 near Winfield to 2.8 miles west of Interstate 30 will be leveled up and repaved to improve its rideability.

Buster Paving Company of Sulphur Springs was awarded the contract for this project with a low bid of \$433,889.

Work on both projects should begin in April and be completed by August of this year.

1 lb. hot sausage
1 can Cream Mushroom Soup
1-2 lb. box Velveta cheese
1 box frozen broccoli

Fry sausage until done. Cook broccoli according to directions. Put ingredients in crock pot and simmer until cheese is melted.

Fresh Broccoli and Cauliflower Salad

1 bunch broccoli
1 head cauliflower
1 cup seedless grapes, cut in half
1/2 cup purple onion, chopped
6-10 strips crisp fried bacon, drained and crumbled

Dressing for above:
2 Tbs. Red Wine vinegar
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup sugar

Mix dressing ingredients and combine with vegetables just before serving.

Broccoli Casserole

1 large package frozen broccoli
1 stick butter
8 oz. Velveta cheese
1 package Ritz crackers

Cook broccoli as directed. Melt 1/2 stick butter and cheese. Pour over cooked broccoli. Melt remaining 1/2 stick butter and add to crumbled Ritz crackers. Add this to top of broccoli in long Pyrex dish and bake until crackers are brown.

Cracker Salad

1 bell pepper, diced
1 bunch green onions, chooped
3 sticks celery, chopped
1/4 box saline crackers, crumbled
1 cup salad dressing

Mix all ingredients

Praline Ice Cream Dessert

1 cup melted butter
1/2 cup oatmeal
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 cups flour

Mix and put on cookie sheet and bake at 350 for 20 minutes or until brown, stir every 5 min. After this browns, put 1/2 of this crumb mixture in bottom of 9x13" pan. Spread evenly. Pour 1/2 jar of caramel or butterscotch ice cream topping over top of crumb mixture. Put 1/2 gallon ice cream over this. Add rest of ice cream topping over ice cream, add rest of crumb mixture and freeze until ready to serve.

3-4 chicken breasts, cooked and cut up in small pieces
1 small onion, chopped
1 can Rotel tomatoes
1 can Cream of Mushroom soup
1 can Cream of Chicken soup
flour or corn tortillas

Cook onions until done, add tomatoes and soups and heat, add 1-2 tsp. chili powder. Put layer of the above in Pyrex dish. Add a layer of tortillas, which have been softened in hot chicken broth. Add chicken. Add another layer of tortillas. Pour the remaining soup mixture over this. Add grated or sliced cheese over top and bake at 350 for 20-30 minutes.

Swiss Vegetable Medley

1 bag -16 oz. frozen broccoli, carrots and cauliflower combination, thawed and drained
1 can Cream of Mushroom soup
1 cup shredded cheese
1/4 tsp. black pepper
1 jar chopped pimiento drained, optional
1 can Durkee french fried onions

Combine vegetables, soup, 1/2 cheese, sour cream, pepper, pimiento and 1/2 can fried onions. Pour into casserole dish. Bake covered at 350 for 30 minutes. Top with remaining cheese and fried onions, bake, uncovered 5 minutes longer.

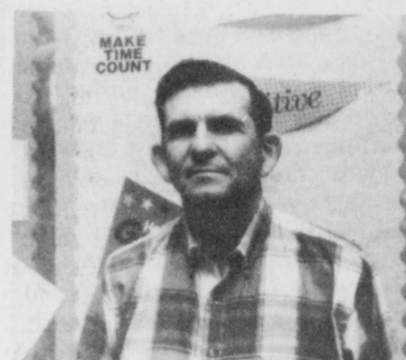

Medication

The average eighty-year-old American takes five different medications every day. Some are prescribed, others are strictly over-the-counter drugs. When this much medicine is taken daily, the chances of drugs interacting with other drugs increase proportionately.

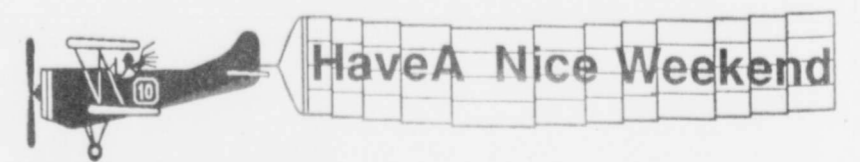
Most of the time, your doctor is extremely careful to make sure interaction doesn't happen. But when you take something as common as an antacid tablet, you run the risk of negating your prescribed medicine or, even worse, suffering harmful side effects. For example, if you are taking an anti-coagulant drug to prevent blood clotting, the antacid changes the gastric secretions in your stomach so the drug may never be absorbed to serve its purpose.

Even certain foods can prohibit prescribed medications from doing their job. Milk and milk products can stop the antibiotic tetracycline from warding off infection. Mineral oil laxatives can stop your body from absorbing that Vitamin D that it needs to keep healthy. When a doctor is prescribing medication for you and asks you if you are taking anything else, don't forget to tell him everything, including your diet. Medicine is one thing you can't afford to be lackadaisical with.

Unclaimed Cash List

The Texas Treasury Publication contains names of over 100,000 people, businesses and organizations reported to the treasury this year.

Owners listed may be due stock, safe deposit box contents or cash of \$50 or more, such as account balances, utility deposits, oil and gas royalty payments and much more. The names have been reported by banks or businesses who lost contact with the owner three years ago or more.

There is no deadline or cut-off date for claiming money.

Call 1-800-654-3463 within Texas only, or 512-444-7891 outside Texas for information about claiming money from names listed on this list.

Operators are standing by to take your call.

Your name may be listed if the bank or business still has your money, and the operator will give you instructions along with a telephone number, address and name of the person with the reporting company to contact about your funds.

If the treasury has your money and your information matches the owner information on record, the operator will mail you a claim form to complete.

Mail the completed form and the information you are providing to the address listed on the claim form. If the information you provide matches records, your claim will be approved by the Treasury. If there is a question or additional information is required, you will be contacted by a Treasury Claims Officer.

All claims require approval by both the Treasurer's Office and the Attorney General's office. The Comptroller of Public Accounts will produce the check.

For claims that have no legal complications, the process takes less than 90 days from the date the claim form is received.

There are no charges or fees assessed by the Treasury to process and pay your claim. Returning your property is considered a public service. If you are contacted or sign a contract with an outside "Search/Heirfinder Firm" to assist you in claiming, their charges may not exceed 10% of the claim amount.

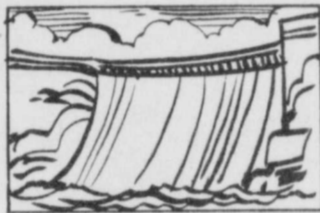
Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, Hwy. 37 North in Clarksville. The next clinic will be held April 9. Future clinics will be held on the first Wednesday, second Thursday and fourth Monday of each month.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

 Ordinance/Rules Establishing Property Addressing Standards to include naming streets, numbering property, notification, and enforcement.
 Section 1: There is hereby established the following addressing standards for numbering property and naming public streets/roads within the incorporated areas of the City of Talco (and any other areas by joint agreement of municipalities). Structures within this area are subject to addressing in accordance with this Ordinance.
 Section 2: Street naming and property numbering procedures shall be established in conjunction with the platting and subdivision requirements of the City of Talco.
 a. A survey and inventory of all public street names within the City boundaries shall be prepared by the City within three (3) months for use with addressing procedures. Property needing street naming or property assignment on public roads will be identified. Duplicate names or similar sounding names will be repealed and renamed on the recommendation of staff and the approval by the commissioners' court.
 b. Street Name Criteria: Non-duplicative of existing names, limited to thirty (30) characters, no similar-sounding names. Directionals are spelled out (North). Dead-ends roads may not be designated streets but cul-de-sacs, cove, or court. Other road types may be classified (boulevard must include median or be a minimum 150 feet in width) as appropriate by the City. Name changes are considered for historical or clarification purposes and are limited to reconsideration three (3) years hence. Name changes must meet same criteria establishing for new street names. Petition for change must be presented with signatures from 3/4 of property owners

abutting street. Development along street and traffic volume may be considered as additional criteria.
 c. Property Numbering Criteria: Number assignments is based on a grid system: center point within the community, with axis forming base lines, north-south line being 6th and east-west line being Broad. Block assignments will be consist of 300 feet per block where possible. Number assignment progresses from the center point outward each direction, with the interval distance of 50 feet allowed for each number. Traveling from the center point, odd numbers assigned to the left and even numbers to the right street side.
 d. Final approval of new street names and name change requests resides with City of Talco (examples: Commissioner's Court, county engineer, review committee, emergency services personnel, or other). Street name adoption or changes must comply with criteria established under these standards.
 Section 3: Addressing standards shall include requirements of property owners and inhabitants to post assigned property number at structure. Number must be visible from the street and not be obscured. Residential posting may be no less than 3" high; business structure posting may be no less than 6" and, when located adjacent to roads with speed limits above 45 m.p.h., no less than 24". Grace periods for incorporating this requirement are within 3 months of new address notification.
 Section 4: Street naming and property numbering procedures are standards as authorized in the County Road and Bridge Act (Art. 67 02-1, Texas Civil Statutes). These procedures will include:
 a. A plat book containing public roads with proper numbering assigned shall be kept on file for public use. Property undergoing subdivision, development, or building permits issued in areas without street addresses must comply with the addressing procedures.
 b. Notification in written form must be presented to the property owner and/or tenant when final assignment of addresses occurs. Notification also should be made to the U.S. Postal Service. Once notified, the address becomes effective within thirty (30) days.
 c. Within 60 days of notification, proper address number signage should be posted. After 90 days, if no number sign is posted, the enforcement shall consist of the property authority posting such number and to apply applicable charges to the resident or property owner.
 d. Maintenance of the City's addressing procedure will reside in the City Hall.
 Section 5: Street signs should be erected at all intersections of public roads regardless of current route markings from state, federal or local designation. For new property development, the signage will be required at the expense of the developer. Signs must conform to guidelines established by the City public works office.

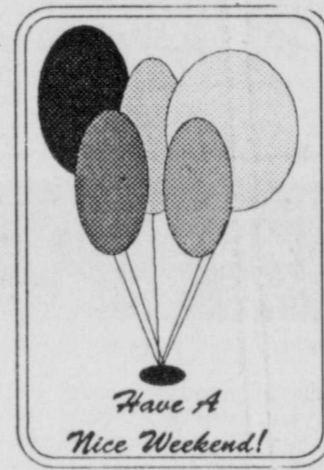
