Winners Named In Red River-Titus County Runoff

Tommie Corbell and Bob Edrington were the winners in Tuesday's run-off election for Red River County Sheriff and Commissioner positions.

Corbell, who was seeking the position of Commissioner Precinct I, gathered 534 votes to James Meredith's 491.

Edrington, who was running against incumbent Bob Storey for Red River County Sheriff, won the

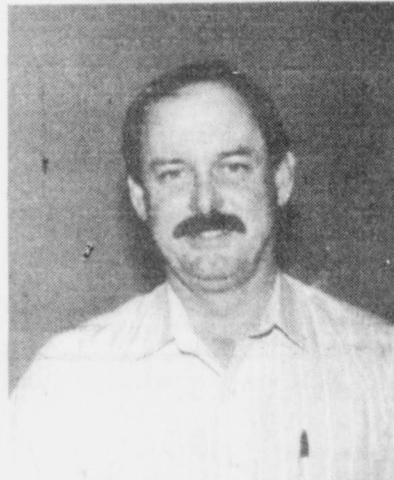
run-off with 1,637 votes to Storey's 1,311.

In Titus County's Constable 1-3-4 race, Chris Durant received 1,096 votes to win the run-off over Rex Marr's 733 votes.

Commissioner Precinct 3 in Titus County found J.W. Terrell, Jr. winning that place with 525 votes over Johnny Mack Brown's 432 votes.

Rivercrest Board of Trustees Makes Changes

The Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees held their regular monthly meeting Monday, April 13 at the Bogata Cafeteria. The trustees were given a tour of the campus from 6:45pm to the beginning of the meeting at 7pm.

First item on the agenda was a request regarding a change in policy limiting participation in social activities to only Rivercrest students. The board reviewed the policy after the request and voted a change in the policy. The Rivercrest juniors and seniors will now be allowed to invite dates to the Prom if approved by the high school principal.

The board accepted a three year audit contract with the accounting firm of Oakerson, Arnold and Walker of Mt. Pleasant.

In general action the board approved minutes and agreed to pay this months bills. They also accepted the tax report and adjustments.

The board also had a discussion on

athletic equipment bids and accepted the bids as presented.

The board adopted a resolution on CED delinquent tax penalty.

Meetings set for May will be the following: May 5- for canvassing votes; and May 12- for regular May meeting at Talco school. A tour of the campus will begin at 6:45pm and the meeting will start at 7:30 pm.

A motion was made to take bids for resurfacing of the Rivercrest track.

Supt. Freddy Wade reported a loss of State revenue for this current year of \$99,000 due to the loss of enrollment due to the state proration formula.

The resignation of Sandra Southern, teachers aide at Talco, was accepted. The board interviewed and hired Roy Stone as the 1992-1993 Rivercrest girls coach. Coach Stone is currently coaching at Hawkins; but he has coached previously at North Lamar and PJC.

Mr. and Mrs. David Craddock were awarded the "farthest distance trav-

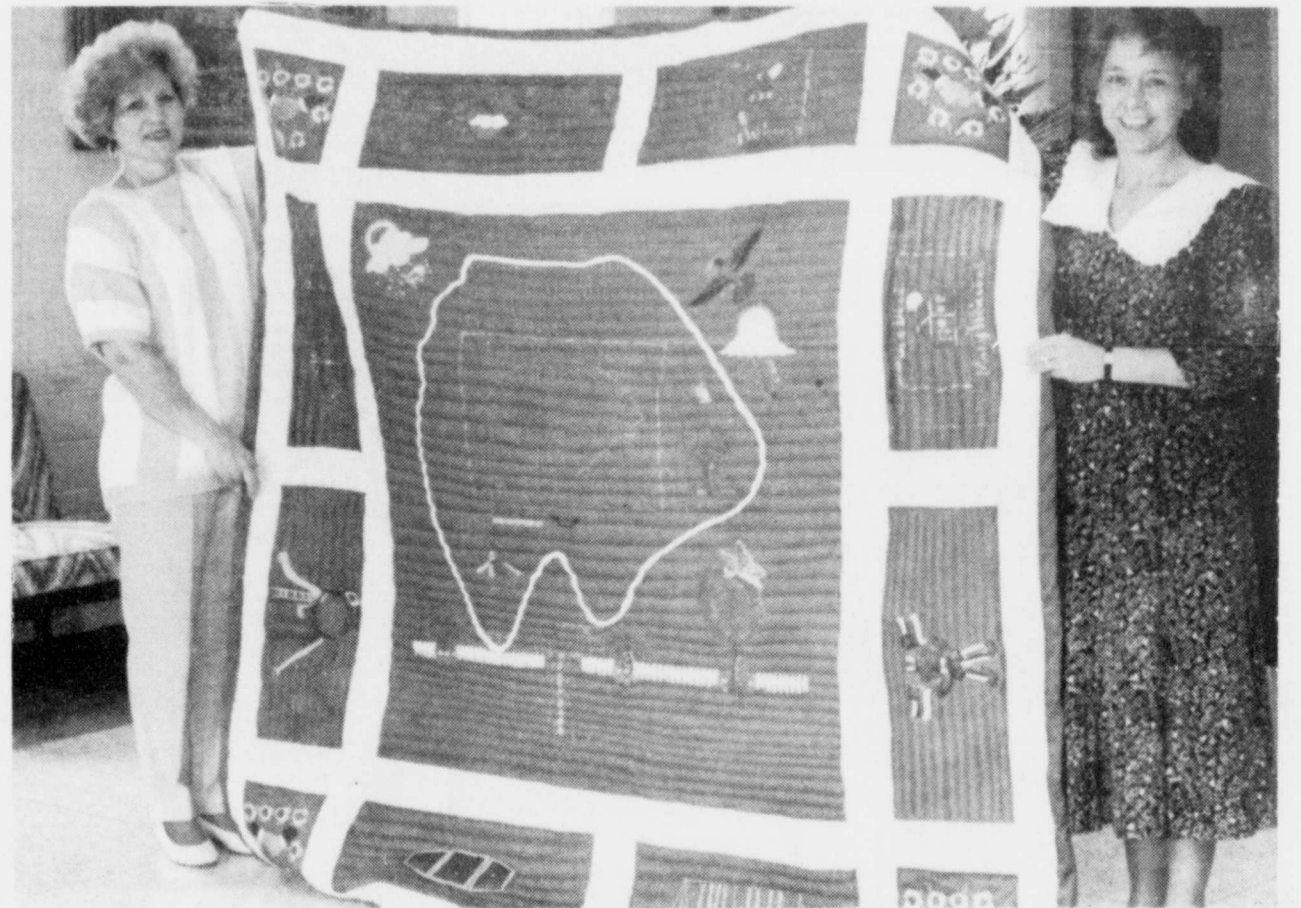
eled to attend" honors. Special recognition was given to the classes who held reunions during the day including classes of 1950, 1952, 1957, 1958 and 1962.

Anna Myrtle Trout Dies March 31

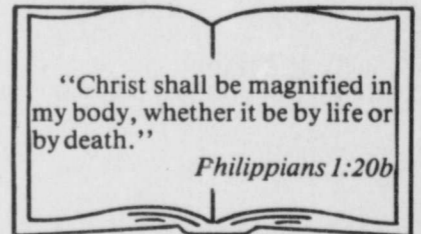

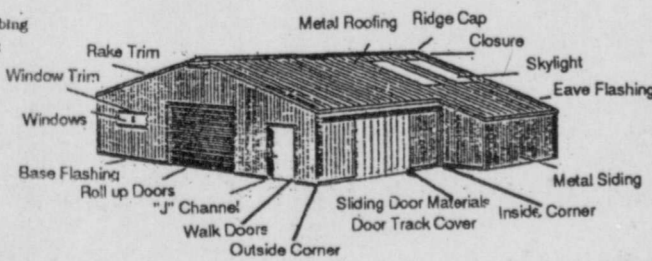

The Foot Specialist

A BURNING PROBLEM

The most common foot injury is not necessarily a sprain or jammed toe—it is a burn. Fire is only one of the causes. Serious burns are often self-inflicted by people using acid preparations to treat themselves. Electrical shock and radiation can also cause severe damage. Burns from hot liquid are among the more prevalent home-based injuries. Whatever the cause, the foot is categorized by the American Burn Association as one of the primary, or most critical, areas of the body. As such, a foot burn should always be taken extremely seriously in order to avoid long-term disability. Depending on the degree of the burn, prescribed treatment can vary from mild creams to skin grafts.

P.S. Never apply butter or grease to a burn. Besides not being sterile, they can actually promote bacterial infection.

Such foot problems demand prompt attention. Your podiatrist offers the expert attention that will deal effectively with this and other threatening foot ailments. All foot problems should be taken seriously and prompt and immediate call for professional help so that treatment and correction can be started at the earliest possible moment. 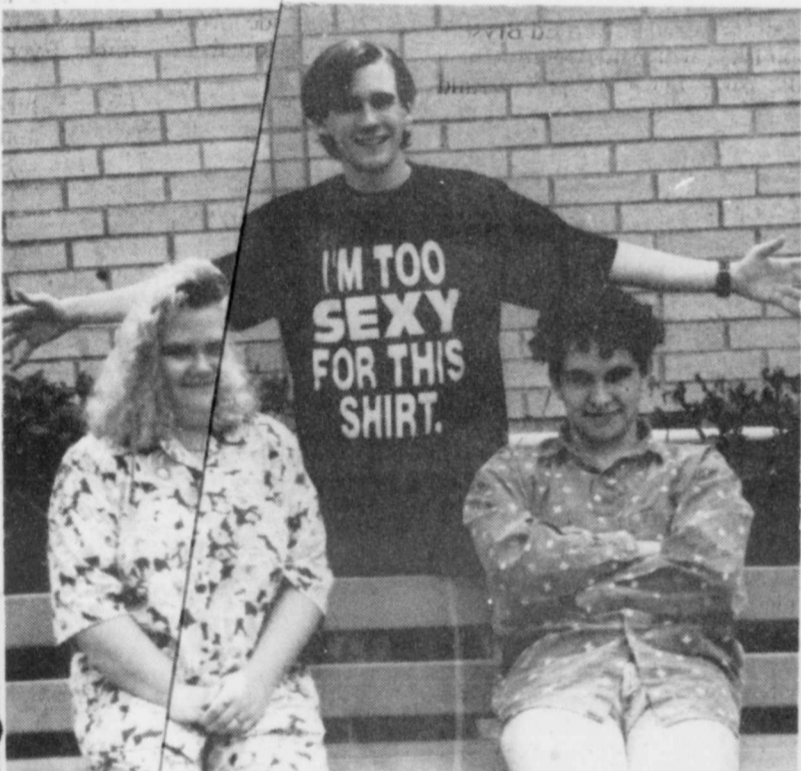

Wade White is still living out his dreams of being a successful musician. Things keep getting better for him.

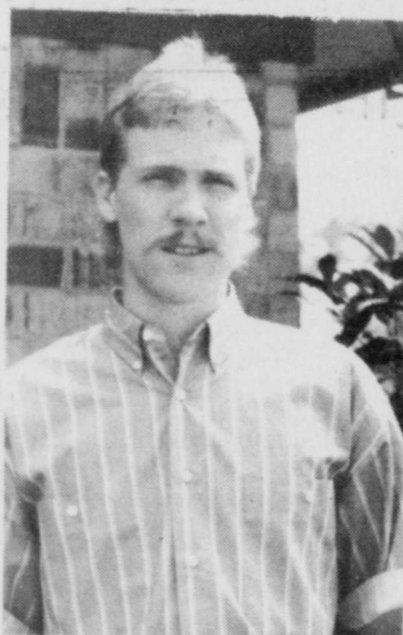

Keeping Healthy

Depression

This kind of grief reaction is also not considered a medical problem unless it persists.

Depression becomes a medical problem when it immobilizes a person, leaving him or her unable to carry on normal activities or to derive pleasure from any source.

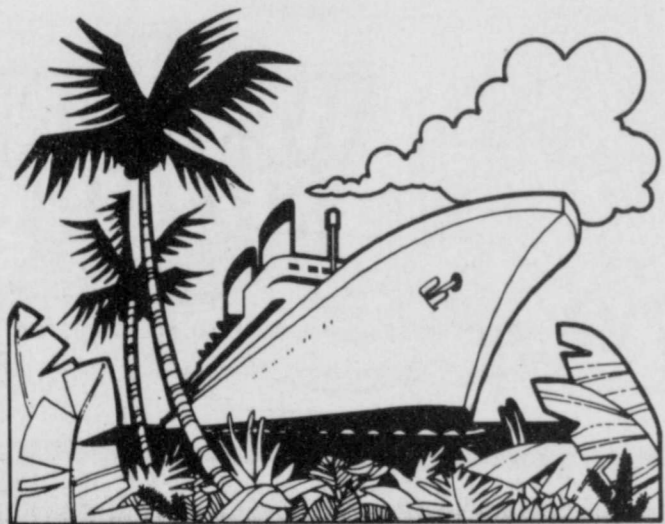

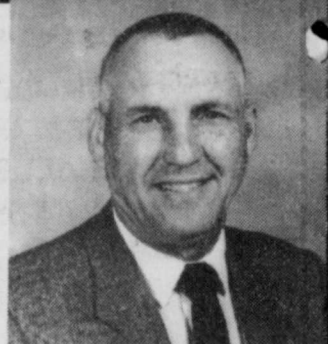
