Saturday, May 2 the polls will be open from 7am-7pm. Two important elections will take place in the community. Positions for the Bogata City Council and Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees are up for grabs.

Two seats for the Bogata City Council are up for election. Those who filed for City Council are Jettie Bond, who has been a Council member since 1986; Buck Ramsey, who was appointed to fill the seat of Jack Trout in the February meeting of this year; and Lyle Williams.

Mildred Eudy is the only one who filed for Mayor. After W.T. Harbison

reigned last February, Mrs. Eudy was appointed Mayor. She was then elected to a full term.

Rue Anna Bell and Frank Stubblefield both filed for Position #5 of the Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees. Mrs. Bell was appointed to Tommie Corbell's seat earlier this year. Mr. Stubblefield retired as Bogata Elementary and Jr. High Principal in 1988.

Kip Stansell will run unopposed for Position #2 which he currently holds. The position is a three year term.

Proclamation

WHEREAS, from 1933 to 1945, six million Jews were murdered in the Nazi Holocaust as part of a systematic program of genocide, and tens of thousands of Gypsies as well as millions of other people perished as victims of Nazism;

WHEREAS, the people of the City of Bogata should remember the atrocities committed by the Nazis;

WHEREAS, the people of the City of Bogata should rededicate themselves to the principle of equal justice for all people;

WHEREAS, the people of the City of Bogata should remain eternally vigilant against all tyranny, and recognize that hatred and bigotry provide a breeding ground for tyranny to flourish;

WHEREAS, April 30, 1992, has been designated pursuant to an Act of Congress as a Day of Remembrance of the Victims of the Hazi Holocaust, known internationally as Yom Hashoah; and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate for the people of the City of Bogata to join with the United States Holocaust Memorial Council in the commemoration:

Now, therefore, I, as Mayor of the City of Bogata proclaim that, in memory of the victims of the Holocaust, and in the hope that we will strive always to overcome prejudice and inhumanity through education, vigilance and resistance, proclaim that the week of Sunday, April 26 through Sunday, May 3, 1992 is hereby designated as the Days of Remembrance of the Victims of the Holocaust.

Baked Onions
By Thelma Warren
Choose round, squatty onions. Peel and cut into eights. First cut in halves, then quarters, then eights. Hold it carefully as you cut, do not cut all the way through. Place in baking dish close enough together to prop each one up. Salt and pepper to taste. Pour melted butter or margarine over onions. Add two cups water. Bake at 350 until tender. The size of onions will determine baking time. Fresh onions from garden are very good.

Squash Enchiladas
6-8 yellow squash
1 lb. hot pepper cheese
1 pkg. 10 oz. sharp cheddar cheese
1 kg. (10 count) flour tortillas
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 carton (8 oz.) sour cream
Cook squash until tender with seasonings to taste of chopped onion, garlic powder, accent, salt and pepper. Soften tortillas in oil. On each tortilla, place a heaping tablespoon cooked squash, 1 piece of hot pepper cheese, and tablespoon of shredded cheddar cheese. Roll and place seam side down in slightly oiled 13x9x2 baking dish (may spray baking dish with Pam).
Mix 1 can mushroom soup, 1/2 can water and 8 oz. sour cream. Blend well. Pour over tortillas. Sprinkle more cheddar cheese on top. Bake in preheated 350 oven until bubbly.

Pop-Up Bread
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup (scant) vegetable oil
3 cups sifted all purpose flour
1 pkg. dry yeast
1/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 egg, beaten
In saucepan, scald milk, water and oil. Do not boil. In mixing bowl, mix 1 1/2 cups flour, yeast, sugar, salt and egg. Add heated liquid mixture and beat 2 minutes. Add remaining 1 1/2 cups flour and mix well with wooden spoon. Pour into 2 well-greased 1 lb. coffee can. Cover with lids and let rise. Remove lids when dough almost reaches the tops. Let rise uncovered until cans are full. Bake in pre-heated 350 oven for 30 minutes. Let partially cool in cans.

Small Quiche
3 oz. cream cheese (soften)
1 stick margarine
1 cup flour
Blend well. Chill 1 hour. Shape in 24 balls. Press into muffin tins. Sprinkle with bacon bits.
Filling:
1/2 cup milk
2 beaten eggs
1 teaspoon salt
dash cayenne
1 teaspoon chopped parsley
1/2 cup grated Swiss cheese
Mix all ingredients well. Fill pastry shells. Bake 30 minutes at 350.

Chicken Divan
4 chicken breasts or thighs, cooked and boned
1 pkg. frozen broccoli spears, cooked and drained
1 can cream of chicken soup
1/2 teaspoon curry powder (more if desired)
1/3 cup milk
3/4 cup grated cheese
1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs
Arrange broccoli in baking dish. Top with chicken pieces. Mix soup, milk and curry powder. Pour over chicken and broccoli. Top with grated cheese. Sprinkle buttered crumbs on top. Bake at 400 for 15-20 minutes.
This recipe doubles easily and freezes well. Yield 4 servings.

Coffee Cake
3 cans biscuits
1 cup white sugar
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 stick margarine
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1 cup finely chopped nuts
Cut biscuits in half. Mix white sugar and cinnamon in bowl. Drop biscuit halves in this and coat well. Put a layer in greased bundt pan. Spoon a little of mixture of margarine, brown sugar and chopped nuts over all. Make another layer of coated biscuits. Sprinkle more of margarine, brown sugar and nut mixture over layer. Make third layer of biscuits. Sprinkle rest of margarine, sugar and nuts. Then sprinkle any sugar and cinnamon mixture left; over all. Bounce pan to settle and to let sugar sift down. Bake in 350 preheated oven for 30 minutes.

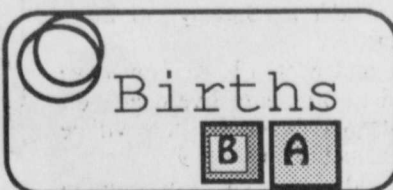

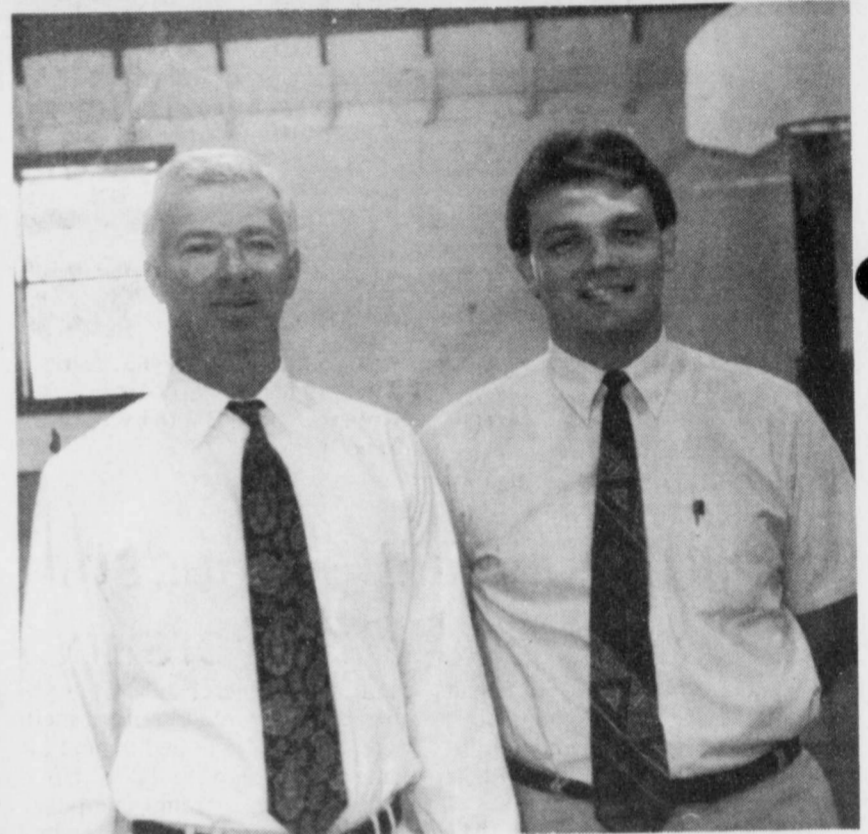
Bells Open Rosalie Store

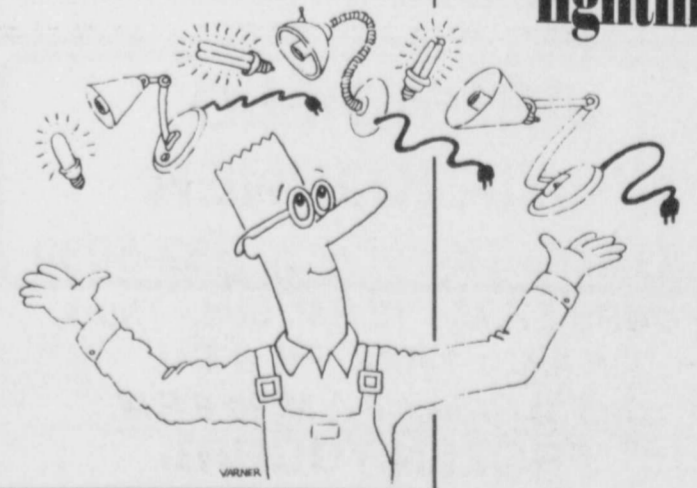

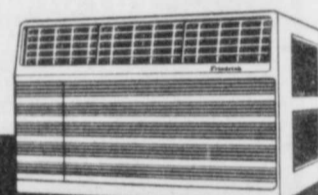

Spinal Screening For Bogata Students Is May 6

The Legislature passed a law in 1985 that requires all sixth and ninth graders to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through early de-

tection. Spinal screening for Bogata Elementary School, sixth graders, has been scheduled for Wednesday, May 6.

Children will be screened for two types of deformities: scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to much pain, as well as complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is an exaggerated rounding of the spine. Progression of these two conditions can often be arrested if detected early.

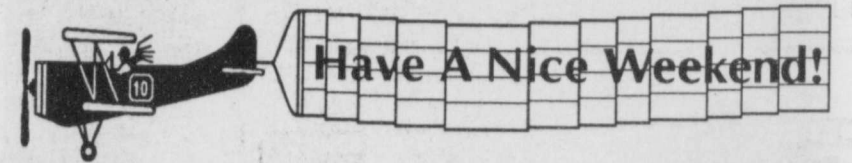

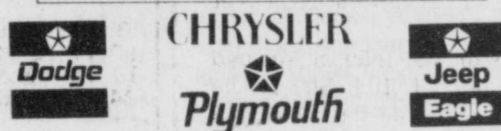



 So far she likes Bogata. Assisting all residents in meeting their psychological and social needs is what Ms. Anderson hopes to accomplish.



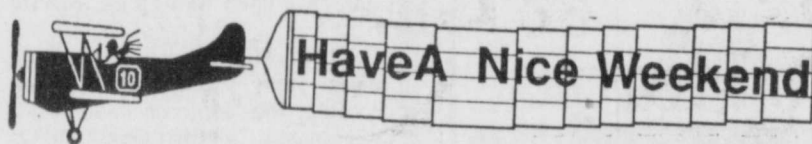
