Mrs. Wright was a former resident of Haskell and had lived in Stephenville for the past six years. She was born Sept. 12, 1884, in Carlton. She married Kent J. Wright Sept. 23, 1904. He died in 1966.

Investigating Highway Patrolman Fred Cummings of Stephenville said the accident occured about 2 p. m. on a straight section of road under ideal weather conditions. Cummings said that apparently one of the vehicles was in the wrong lane, and that no skid marks were left by either car. The car driven by Brown was west bound and the Belcher car was heading east at the time of the collision, he said.

WTC To Offer Physical Science

Course

A physical science course ofin astronomy and geal by h being planned for the secod summer session at Western Texas College.

The course will be of special interest to elementary school teachers who teach science concepts from a wide range of science subjects.

Included in the astronomy portion of the course will be an overview of the solar system, structure of the universe, interpretation of earth motions and ways of using the planetarium in fields other than astronomy. Mickey Schmidt, planetarium director, will be instructor for this portion of the course, which is scheduled from July 11-31.

Field trips will give the students the opportunity to visit area points of interest during the geology study scheduled from Aug. 1-15. Two or three afternoon trips are planned to sites within easy driving distance of the campus and one or two weekend trips will also be required.

Topics to be covered are com-mon rocks and minerals, erosion and sedimentation, volcanism, glaciation and mountain buildng, interpretation of rock records (fossils, etc.), earth hist-ory and continental drift.

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
