## Thunderstorms Rage Through Area, Cause Damage

Violent Thunderstorms caused damage to barns, homes and livestock as they swept through the area last week.

In the early morning hours of Friday, July 3, a massive storm front rolled into Lamar County from the west. It flooded Hwy. 271 briefly, as swollen creeks sprang out of their banks, washing gravel roads severely. Three to four inches of rain fell within a two hour period.

Lightning caused damage to a number of homes. Volunteer fire

departments from Pattonville and Deport responded to the call from Raymond Crossland when lightning knocked out all their lights, damaged their electrical appliances and exploded two windows. Oddly, the lights in Crossland's Garage, next door, were turned ON and fused that way!

Several other people reported lightning damage to televisions and antennas.

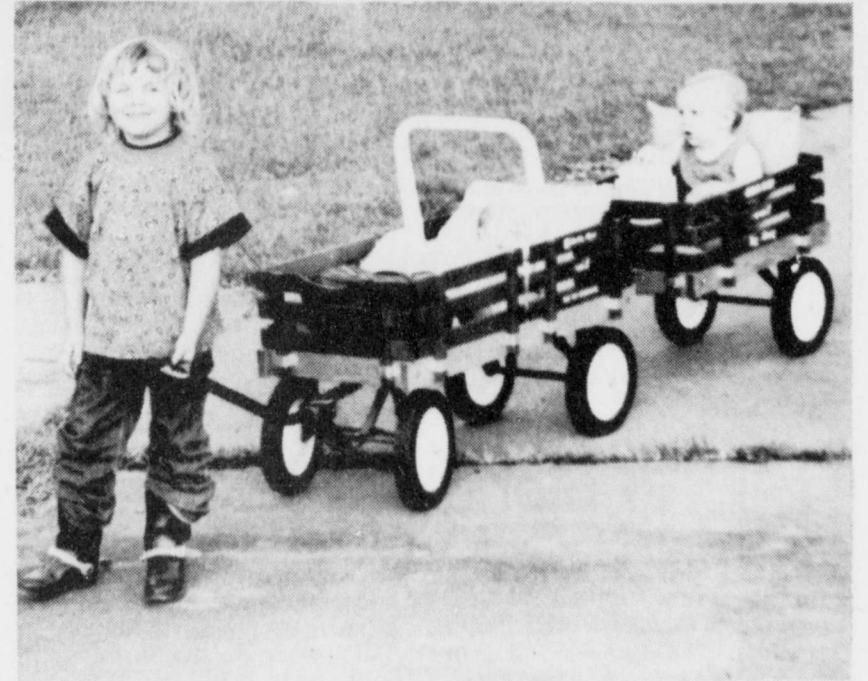
One of the biggest losses dollar-wise was the loss Jamie Barham suffered when seven grown cows and a

large calf were struck and killed instantly by a bolt of lightning.

The storm system continued through Red River and Titus Counties, with an electrical display rivalled by none.

More damage to sheet metal buildings, electrical appliances and trees was reported in those counties.

The weather seems to finally be settling into a more typical "Hot and Dry" configuration this week, and farmers, gardeners and hay producers are undoubtedly ready for a rest from the constant thunderstorms and rain.

## Newspapers Win Awards At Texas Press Association

Thunder Prairie Publishing's newspapers have once more won State-Wide Awards at Texas Press Association's Summer Convention.

The Texas Better Newspaper Contest was held June 26, 1992 in Austin.

The Awards were written up in the Winner's Circle, a tabloid newspaper put out by Texas Press Association.

## Talco-Bogata CISD Trustees Hold Meeting

The Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees held their monthly meeting, Tuesday, July 7, at 7:30 p.m.

A general action was taken to approve the minutes of the previous meeting. The financial report was approved as well as the tax report and adjustments.

The board discussed the student hand books for the Talco-Bogata CISD schools. The books were approved.

The board approved a waiver for Rivercrest High School from the Texas Education Agency. It provides for juniors and seniors to be exempted from mid-term and final exams depending on a combination of academic record and attendance record.

The lower bid on the air conditioner work on the Talco and Bogata campuses was granted to Thompson Air Conditioning of Bogata for \$17,500.00.

A report was given on the track and baseball field as well as other summer maintenance items. Everything is progressing as scheduled.

The board discussed health insurance for employees, but no action was taken.

Superintendent, Freddy Wade gave

a presentation on a Tech Prep Transitional Plan. Batteries of occupational and vocational tests are to be given to eight grade students. Based on these test results, each student can work on developing their strong skills during their high school years.

Hiring of new personnel was approved by the board. New teachers hired for the 1992-93 school year were Keith Brown, PE and Health at Rivercrest and Bogata Junior High and Elementary; Donna Ruth Meals, health occupation and the coordinator for the Tech Prep Transitional Plan at Rivercrest. Johnny Gable was hired as the new principal at Talco Elementary and Junior High. Virginia Spencer was hired as the high school secretary. Jane Cawley was hired as the substitute high school librarian due to Ellen Day's maternity leave. Other secretary and aides hired were Judy Couch, Bobbie Damron, Teri Easterling, Velma Ellis, Janice Franks, Lori Franks, Gerlyn Gray, Linda Gray, Myra Jean, Daphney Hood, Donna Miller, Sue Nolan, Tina Nolan, Melba Reed, Jake Reigert, Kay Ross, Paula Speir, Teresa Taylor, and Linda Woods.

The Board adjourned at 12:15 a.m.

## One Dies In Shooting At Blossom Tuesday Night

Details were sketchy Wednesday morning at press time, but one man is dead after a shooting in the 900 block of West Front Street in Blossom.

Lamar County Sheriff's Investigator Gary Thompson reports that at 7:28 p.m. Tuesday, July 7 a 911 call was answered by the Paris Police Department reporting the shooting.

Lamar County Sheriff's Deputies

were on the scene shortly, and the ambulance arrived at 7:36, moments after law enforcement officials.

Investigator Thompson says the victim's name is David Decker.

Thompson also says the shooting appears to be the result of an argument and that murder charges are being pursued against a 28 year old male suspect currently in custody.

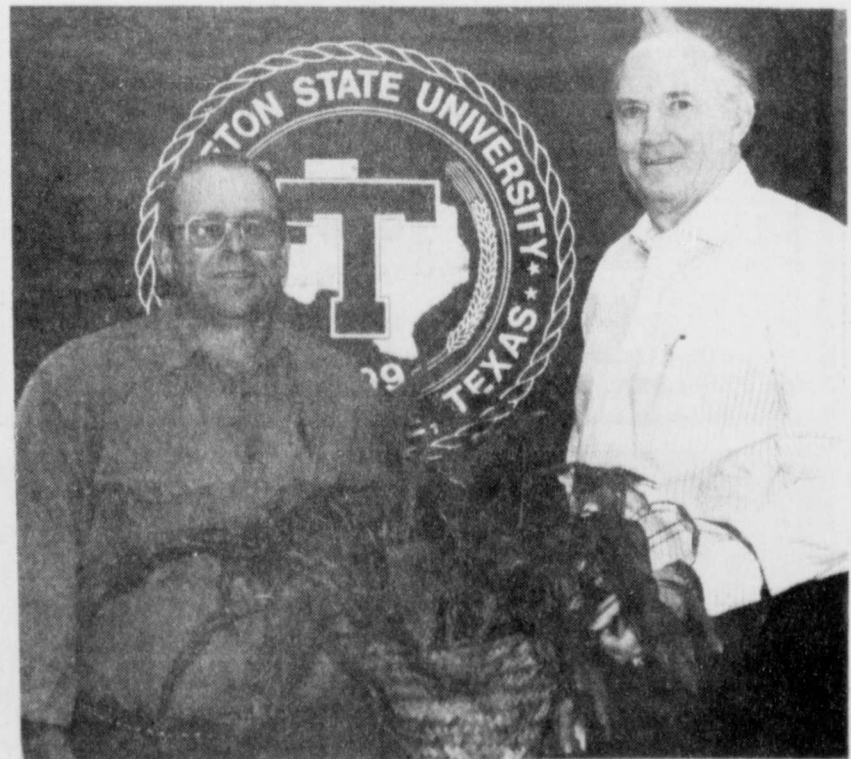

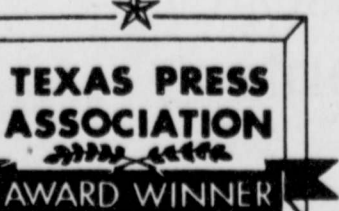

1 1/4 cup sugar  
1 tsp. flour  
1 tsp. vanilla  
2 Tbsp. Cocoa  
1 Cup hot water

Pul all ingredients in a deep pan. Boil about 10 minutes. Stir often. Serve with buttered biscuits, hot. Also good over ice cream.

**Chocolate Fudge**

1 can Eagle Brand milk  
1-8 oz. chocolate chips or 1 8 oz. white chocolate  
1 tsp. vanilla  
dash salt  
1/2 cup nuts optional

Melt chocolate chips in milk. May be done top of stove or in microwave. Add salt and vanilla and nuts. Stir until mixture loses shine. Pour in buttered pan 9x9 is a good size. Makes 2 pounds.

**Chinese Ting A Lings**

12 oz. Butterscotch chips  
5 oz. can chow mein noodles  
1 Tbs. Peanut Butter  
1 tsp. Vanilla

Melt butterscotch chips in microwave - stir in peanut butter and vanilla. Stir in noodles, mashing with spoon as you stir. Drop by teaspoons onto wax paper and cool.

**Green Chili Enchiladas**

Brown 1 lb. hamburger with 1/2 lb. chopped bacon until meat is done. Make separate mixture of:  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1/2 cup can of water  
1 can Swanson chicken broth  
1/4 lb. Velveeta cheese  
1/2 tsp. black pepper  
small can chopped green chilis

Cook slowly until creamy

Soften 8 corn tortillas in 2 Tbs. oil. Drain paper towel

slice 2 slices cheese into 8 pieces. Put one slice of cheese on each tortilla add 1/8 of meat mixture and roll tortillas tightly

**Tollhouse Pie**

2 eggs  
1/2 cup all-purpose flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
1 cup butter or margarine, melted and cooled to room temperature  
One 6 oz. pkg. (1 cup) Nestle Tollhouse Semi-Sweet Chocolate Morsels or chips.  
1 cup chopped nuts  
One 9 inch unbaked pie shell

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. In large bowl beat eggs until foamy. kAdd Flour, sugar and brown sugar; beat until well blended. Blend in melted butter. Stir in chocolate morsels and nuts. Pour into pie shell. Bake at 325 for one hour.

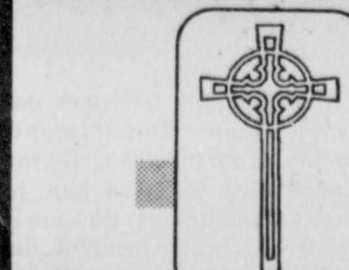

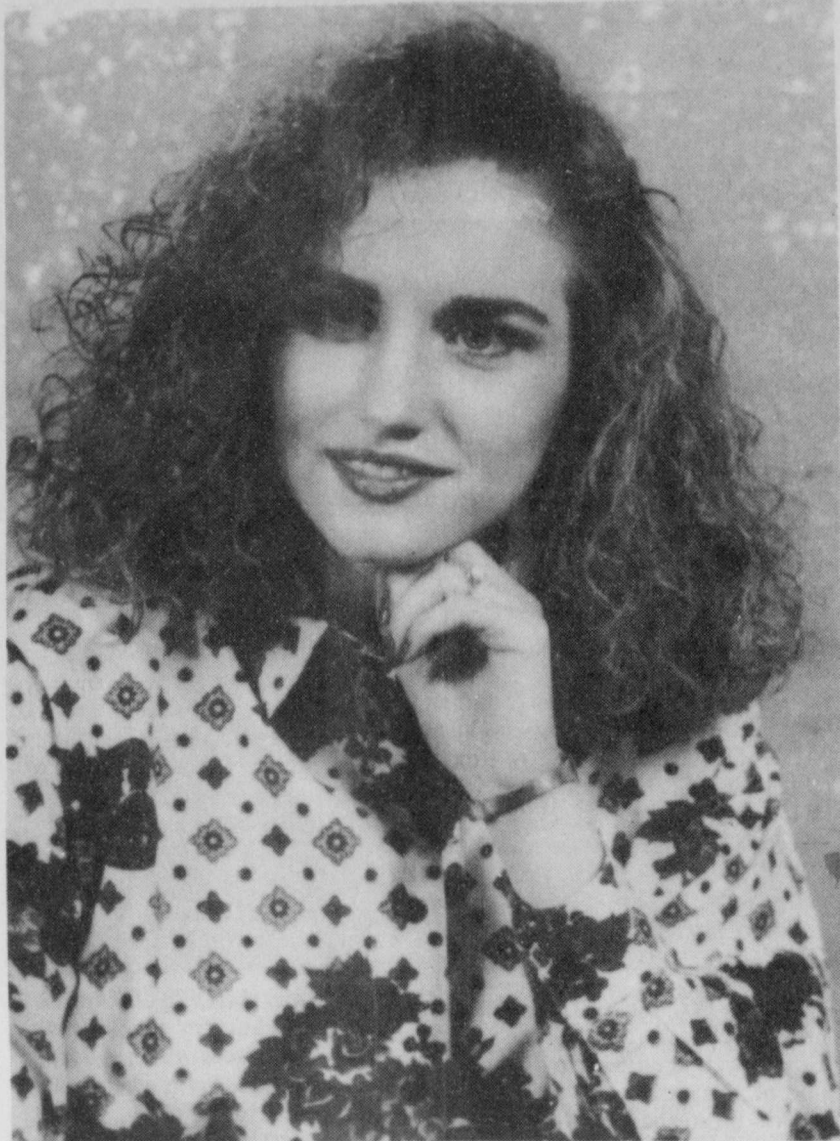
## Greers To Celebrate 50th Wedding Anniversary July 19

Pet Care by Cleo & Brad Conrad

This is the time of year to start thinking about flea control. Of course, if you live in a place that is warm all year, you should be on top of this problem constantly.

The purpose of this meeting is to allow citizens an opportunity to discuss the citizen participation plan, the development of local housing and community development needs, the amount of TCDP funding available and the types of eligible TCDP activities.

The City encourages citizens to participate in the development of the TCDP application and to make their views known at the public hearing. Citizens unable to attend the meeting may submit their views and proposals to The Honorable K. Mike Sloan, Mayor, City of Talco.

What should you do if your pet has fleas? First, you must know that treating the animal alone will not get rid of the fleas. Flea control should involve treatment of the infested pet(s) and thorough environmental flea control.

Treatment of the indoor environment should be conducted by using flea products and mechanical control measures. The pet's bedding or other places the pet frequents (throw rugs, behind furniture, feeding areas) should be washed, shampooed or vacuumed before treating.

Treatment of the flea-infested pet should be conducted the same day the home is treated. When flea control in the home is properly conducted, the once or twice weekly application of a non-residual shampoo or short acting flea spray is often all that is needed.
