






PAT COX stands in her living room in her Bogata home, displaying the carousel pony with a mop doll sitting on its back.



1/4 cup olive or vegetable oil 2 T. lemon juice 1/2 t. salt

1/4 t. pepper
1 medium green pepper, chopped
1 small onion, chopped
1 stalk celery, chopped
Heat enough salted water to cover potatoes (1/2 t. salt to 1 cup water) to boiling. Add potatoes. Heat to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and cook until tender, 30-35 minutes; drain. Cool potatoes; slip off skins. Cube potatoes, place in glass or plastic bowl. Mix oil, lemon juice, salt and pepper; pour over pota-toes. Cover and refrigerate at least four hours. Stir in green peppers, onions and celery. Garnish with parsley.

Mexican Bread Pudding

1 cup packed brown sugar 1 1/2 cups water

2 T. margarine 1 t. ground cinnamon

1 t. orange peel, grated 5 cups 1/2" cubes toasted French bread

1/2 cup chopped blanched almo walnuts 1/2 cup raisins

1 tart apple, chopped 1 cup shredded Monterrey Jack or cheddar cheese (4 oz.)

Heat brown sugar, water, margarine, cinnamon and orange peel to boiling; reduce heat. Simmer uncovered 5 minutes. Layer half the bread crumbs, nuts, raisins, apple and cheese in ungreased 1 1/2 qt. casserole; repeat. Pour hot syrup over top. Bake uncovered at 350 oven until syrup is absorbed, 30-40 minutes.
