the intersection of Highway 37 and FM 71 in Hagansport Monday afternoon, October 19, sent Wayne Crafton of Cunningham to East Texas Medical Center in Mt. Vernon.

Crafton was in stable condition Tuesday morning at East Texas Medical Center in Tyler, and had been scheduled for surgery. Medical authorities said that he had a broken leg, dislocated jaw, numerous lacerations and undetermined internal injuries.

The accident occurred as Crafton pulled out of B&E Grocery onto Highway 37. A Hart Lumber Company truck from Shreveport, LA was headed north on Hwy. 37. The bumper

door of the Chrysler, crushing the inside compartment of the vehicle to 26 1/2 inches wide before the two were pulled apart.

Crafton was pinned in the vehicle and had to be freed by the Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department Rescue Unit with the Jaws of Life.

The North Franklin Volunteer Fire Department was on the scene almsot immediately and was attempting to remove the door from Crafton's car so that medical personnel could start working on the victim when the ambulance arrived. Other North Franklin firemen stood by in case there was a fire.

A grinding two vehicle accident at of the 18-wheeler hit the right front Crafton, a CareFlite helicopter from East Texas Medical Center in Tyler was enroute before the ambulance reached the hospital in Mt. Vernon.

The driver of the truck said "he just pulled out in the road in front of me and I couldn't get it stopped before we hit". The truck skidded some 155 feet after impact and before coming to rest on the north side of FM 71 and on the east side of Hwy. 37. The intersection of Hwy. 37 and FM 71 was partially blocked for several hours before Department of Public Safety Trooper Scott Lee completed his investigation.

The driver of the truck was not injured in the accident.
