
Tuesday morning is when Dad makes the rounds for us, gathering news, mail and film up from a number of locations and bringing it back to the central office.

He arrived back in the fog safely, handed us the stuff and proceeded to regale us with his tale.


Being busy, I missed thesparkle in his eye.

Death, Destruction Result From Firetruck Theft

Thursday, December 24, 1992

The Deport Volunteer Firemen met Monday night to lay careful plans on what to do in case of a major structure fire within the city limits.

This was after the city's pumper truck was completely totalled in the early hours of last Friday, December 19, leaving one dead and an investigation ongoing.

Dead is Gaylon Courtney Frazier, age 19, of Deport, who apparently died of internal injuries suffered when he wa thrown from the pumper truck after it was stolen that same night.

The vehicle was taken from the Deport Volunteer Fire Station, with the bay doors being lowered and locked behind the vehicle.

The crash occurred north of Deport on a county road, as the truck manuevered a series of turns in heavy fog, then left the road on a straight stretch. According to DPS Trooper Don Watson the vehicle" essentially left the road to the right, striking two pine trees, causing the truck to turn over to the left". "The vehicle went into a broad slide and ejected Frazier".

Fortunately for the city, the new truck purchased three years ago will serve as effective fire protection until a pumper truck that will meet insurance requirements can be located and financed. The "new truck" comes very close to meeting specifications, and was purchased to serve as a back up unit to the pumper truck as well as fighting fire outside the city limits. (3/4ths of all fires Deport responds to are outside the city limits). When the

department decided they needed a backup they invisioned breakdowns, not total destruction, however.

Mayor Charles Foster has contacted the Ark-Tex of Governments and officials in Austin and Washington on the possibility of obtaining grants to help finance another pumper since insurance will not cover the

Investigation continues into the possibility that there may have been others involved in the incident.

The tragedy leaves the city of Deport facing several serious problems.

The pumper truck was totalled, and it is the fire truck which enables the city of Deport to meet insurance "key rates" which give a substantially lower insurance rate to home-

full cost of replacement.

The town and the firemen are shocked by the theft and death.

In addition to the destruction of the vehicle itself, several lengths of hose, extremely expensive air packs, drafting lines which had just been purchased this year, flashlights, ladders, and other expensive items were damaged or destroyed in the crash.

Although this is the first incident in over forty years of the fire station, plans are underway to provide a system that will deter theft from ever happening again.

"We've just never had this kind of problem" Fire Chief Duane Glover says sadly.







On December 18, Rene LeClaire


became an American citizen in a se-rious and heartwarming ceremony in the Federal Court Building in Sherman.

Social Security Notes

By Ray Hudson

Social Security Fraud... One of the main missions of the Social Security Administration is to pay the right benefit check in the right amount to the right person at the right time. Social Security accomplishes this mission, but our efforts are occasionally hindered when dishonest people attempt to commit fraud.

In Fiscal Year 1991 there were 1,066 convictions of Social Security Fraud. These convictions ranged from individuals attempting to collect the Social Security checks of beneficiaries who had died, to persons who file false claims for Social Security benefits.

Acts of fraud affect each Social Security program differently. Following are some examples:

The disability insurance program and the retirement and survivors insurance program are defrauded by claimants who make false statements and conceal work activity that affects their initial or continuing entitlement.

For example, a Wisconsin man was investigated for concealing his work earnings so he could illegally collect disability payments. Further investigation showed that the man worked under his son's Social Secu-, rity Number and earned \$20,000 in wages while receiving disability benefits. After conviction for concealment, he was sentenced to 12 months in prison and ordered to pay \$72,462 in restitution.

The Supplemental Security Income Program is defrauded by persons who file false claims, conceal assets or resources, or make false statements and conceal events affecting entitlement

A North Carolina man was investigated for concealing his mother's death and forging her signature on her SSI benefit checks. A furniture store reported that someone attempted to cash a SSI check issued to a woman they knew had died. Furter investigation showed that the son filed false statements with Social Security each
