Talco Bogata CISD Board Had Monthly Meeting

On Monday, May 17, the Talco Bogata CISD met at 6:30 p.m. to tour the Rivercrest Campus.

At 7:30 p.m., the board's regular monthly meeting was called to order. Newly elected and returning board members, John Ward, Eddy Brown, and Sandra Ingram were administered the oath of office.

The first order of business was the re-organization of the board. Officers elected were Jerry Russell, President, Frank Stubblefield, Vice President, and Mollie Williams, secretary.

The board passed items of consensus on the agenda, and approved a budget change involving the moving of \$11,000.00 from the Transportation fund to the Maintenance Fund to cover the expense of roofing Bogata Junior High.

The bid of Talco State Bank as School Depository was the only bid and was accepted by the board for the 1993-94 and the 1994-95 school terms.

According to the School Calendar adopted by the board, school will begin on August 16, 1993 and end on May 25, 1994.

A report from Architect, Gerald Foster was heard, concerning the alternatives to construction at the

Bogata Campus. No action was taken at this time. The members decided to study the specifications and have a special meeting on June 7, for further discussion. The payment of \$5173.00 to the architect was approved.

On the subject of bus drivers and substitute drivers schedules and pay for transporting students to extra-curricular activities, \$10.00 per hour driving time and \$5.00 per hour waiting time up to a maximum of \$60.00 per trip, was approved.

The Summer Library Program on the Bogata and Talco Campuses will be held again this year during the month of June.

Frank Stubblefield was elected as voting delegate and Sandra Ingram as Alternate to the TASB Convention in September.

Resignations from Ellen Dey, Librarian, Teresa Price, Bogata Math teacher, Tammy Case and Daphne Hood Talco instructional Aides were accepted. The Board hired Cathy Brown for the Pre-Kindergarten Program, Gerry Foos as Health and PE Teacher, and Coach at the Jr. Highs.

The next regular meeting will be on June 14, at 7:30 p.m. at Rivercrest High School.

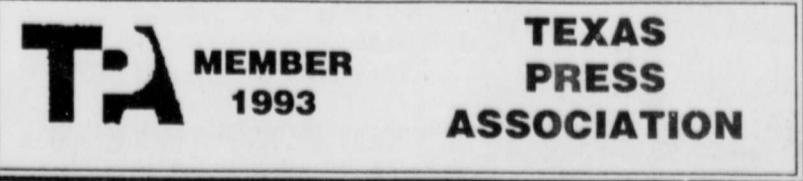

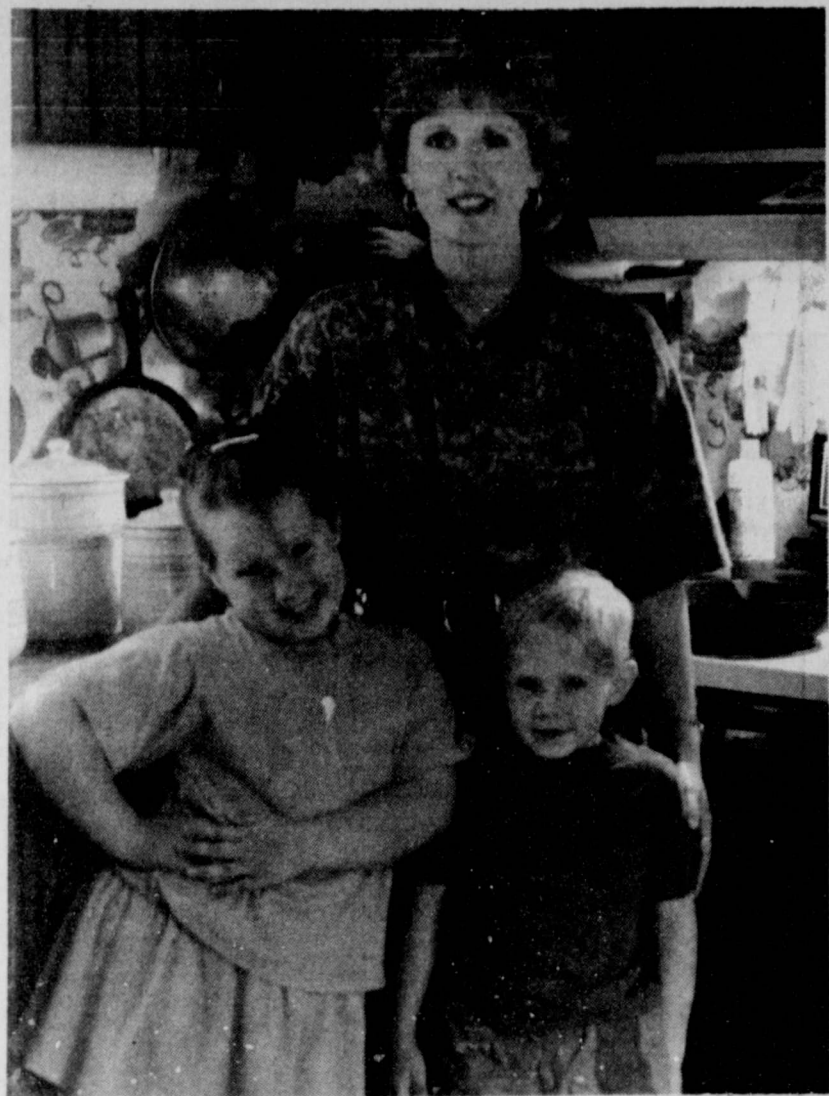

1 pkg. onion soup mix

T-bone steaks

egg
canned milk
salt
pepper
flour
Beat steaks until tender. Leave the bone in them. Mix egg, milk, salt, and pepper. Dip steak in batter and then the flour. Fry in deep oil until brown and as done as you like them.

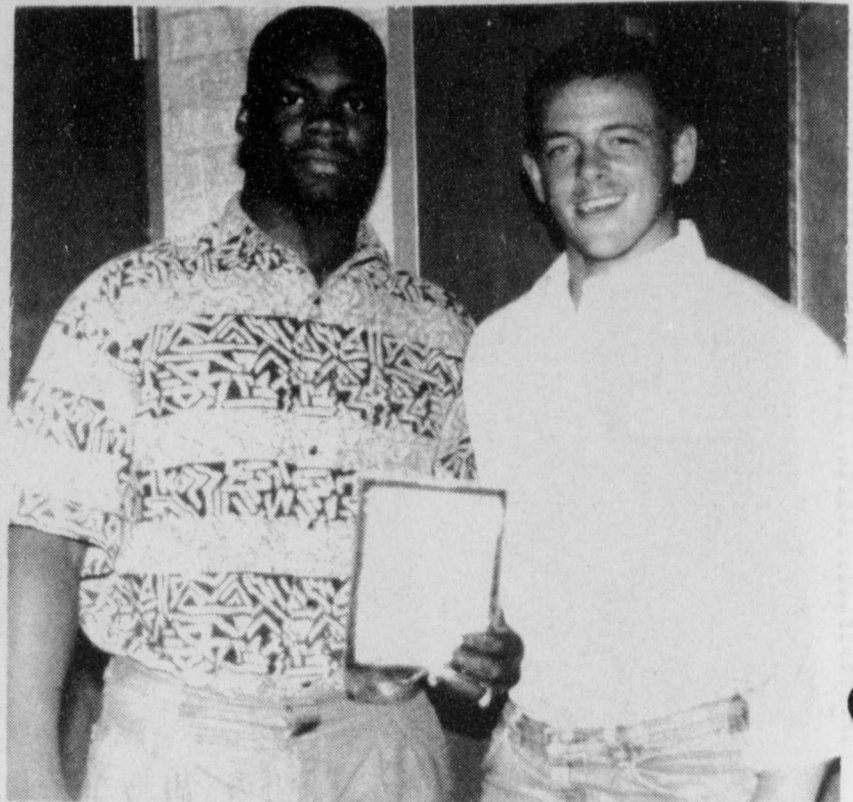

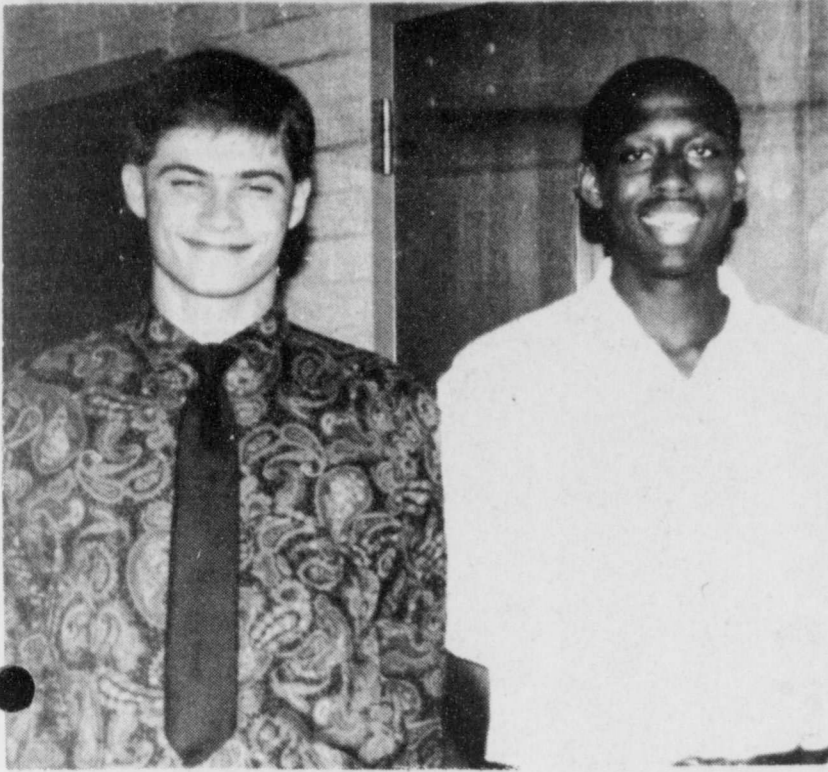

Comments From Your County Attorney

Juvenile Crime. Who are Juveniles? What crimes are Juvenile Crimes? A juvenile is defined as a child from 10 years to 16 years. Also a 17 year old can be treated as a juvenile if the acts charged with occurred before age 17.

My office handles juvenile cases along with all adult cases. Juveniles commit the same crimes as adults do. Only the punishments are different. In Red River County we have had cases ranging from skipping school to murder.

Juvenile cases are divided into two groups:
1. Conduct indicating need for supervision.
2. Delinquent conduct
Conduct indicating a need for supervision includes: truancy, runaway, DWI, paint and glue inhalation, finable offenses other than traffic violations and public intoxication. These offenses are punishable by a period of probation only, under the supervision of the Juvenile Probation Officer Diane Allen Phelps.

Delinquent conduct includes all felonies and misdemeanors that carry a jail sentence. It also includes probation violations of the offenses listed under conduct indicating a need for supervision. Punishment can range from probation to incarceration under the authority of the Texas Youth Commission. A child sent to TYC can be locked up until their 21st birthday.

Repeat offenders and violent offenders and any other felony offenders that this office deems appropriate can be certified to stand trial as an adult and face the penalty of TDC prison. This certification only applies to juveniles who are 15 years of age or older.

We treat juvenile offenders seriously and attempt to work with the Juvenile Probation Department and parents to reach a course of action which will be helpful to the child. If we can save a child from a future life of crime, that is what we want to do. If all else fails, TYC is the last option.
