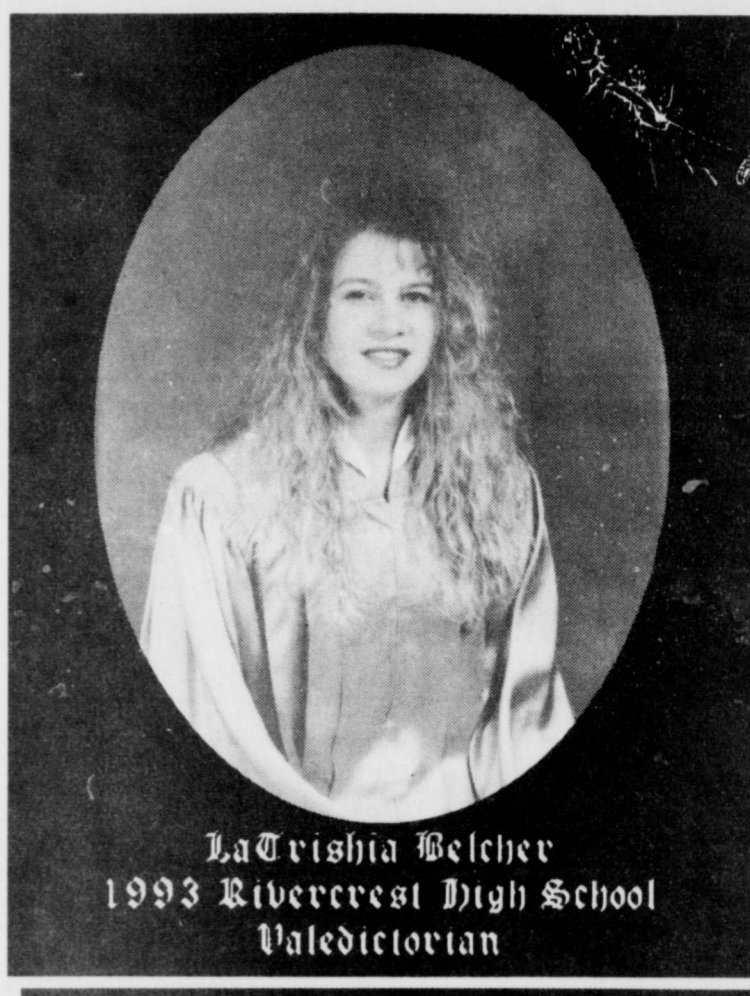

Letters Faxed To Austin Opposing Tax

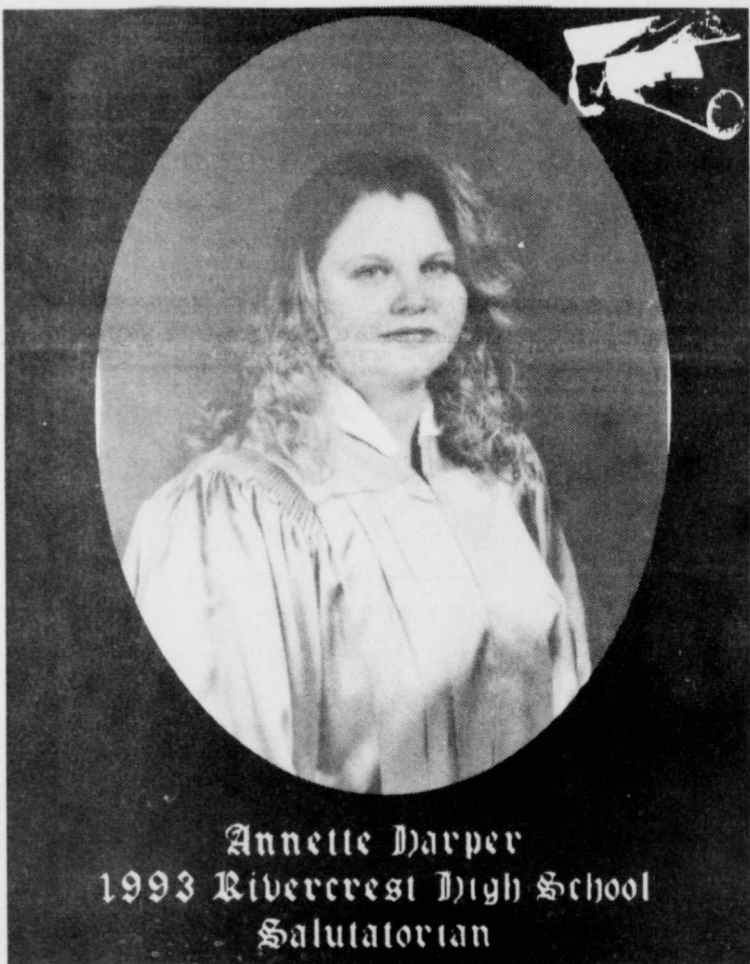

I've been told by my family that my nose is the only thing I have which really works well, and that sometimes they wish it didn't. My daughter has threatened to hunt for a contest for people with the best smellers, and enter me. She says I'll win, hands down. I believe that children should not be disrespectful.

The Scoggins have 3 sons. Dan and his wife, Judy have two sons, Danny and Benji. David and Ines have two daughters, Matias and Yvie. Don and Cindi have two daughters, Renee and Lauren. They all still live

in the Dallas area and do not visit as often as their parents would like.

Nora and Harry attend Martin Memorial Methodist Church, in Detroit. Nora's hobbies include crafts, sewing, refinishing furniture, and reading. She also has her first garden this year. She had a Cabbage Patch doll named Nora, who lives in Harry's childhood rocking chair. Nora refinished the chair. She says she makes a new dress for the doll every once in a while. Nora also decorated the house. Her favorite color is blue and the house reflects this fact. She even has a blue kitchen sink. She waited a few months after moving in their home to make her curtains. This was so that she could get the feel of the place. I asked her if it took her long to get settled into a new home, and she said that to her home is wherever she had her stuff.

Nora says that her favorite things to cook are vegetables. She likes trying different mixtures. She especially likes cooking with squash. I guess that the enjoyment she gets from working with vegetables is the reason her new home has a pea-shelling room.

We're going to wait until next week on the gingerbread, so we'll have more room. The Squaw Corn recipe was given to her by her niece, Brenda Kincaid. I can't wait to try them.

Community Council Has A Multitude Of Services

As was previously announced, the Community Council of Red River County, Incorporated will begin serving lunches to children in Clarksville, Bogata, Annona, Detroit, and Avery on June 7, and will continue to serve them until August 20. There are very few restrictions as to who is eligible for the service. First you must be between the ages of 0 and 18. You must be able to get to where the meals are being served, and you must not carry anything edible or drinkable out of the building when you leave. They prefer that the children be able to feed themselves or that someone who will feed them come with them. In cases where babies need a bottle or baby food, they must know in advance. All children should sign up in advance also, so that they will know how many sack lunches to bring. These people will come in, serve the lunches, and clean up when they are through. All they ask is that there be one local adult on the premises. There are no income requirements, no religious requirements, and no race requirements. The funds are for the county to use, and they do not care whether you make a million dollars a year, or 500 dollars a year. This is for working mothers and fathers, parents who would like a free hour to walk on the walking track, or whatever. Just sign the children up.

The Council employs approximately 53 people, and if plans to restore the old WalMart Store go as hoped, they will be able to employ many more, as well as providing a needed service for Red River County.

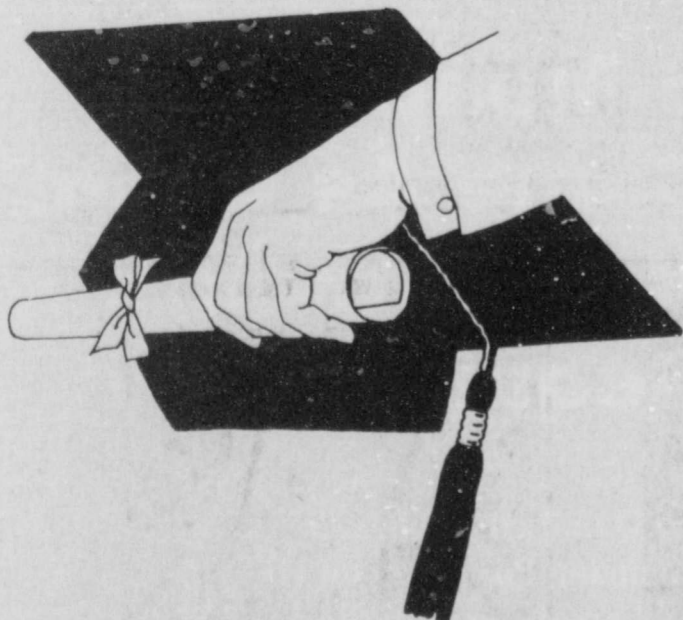



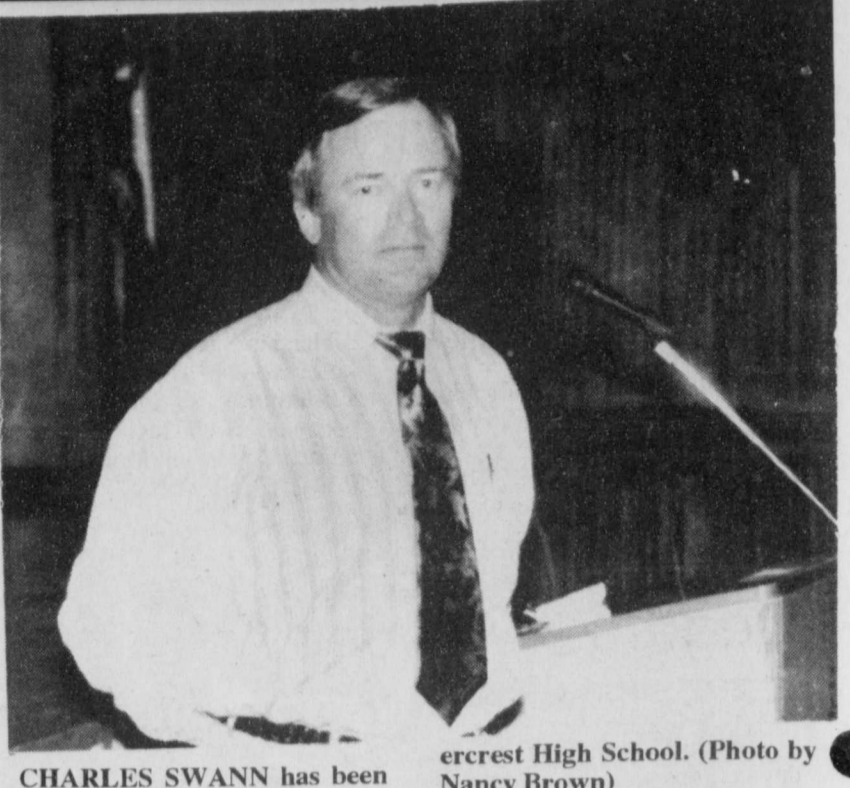

A Look At Religious Revivals In 1923

In 1923, a religious "revival" at a Bogata church was truly a revival of the faith. The Rev. J.L. Sullivan, then pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South (now the United Methodist Church) reported to the Texas Christian Advocate that a 15-day revival January 30-February 13 had resulted in 111 conversions. Eleven others were "reclaimed".

The Rev. W.M. Bowden and party, an evangelist from Ft. Worth, led the services. Revivals in those days normally involved morning and evening services seven days a week, beginning and ending on a Sunday. "Brother Sullivan" reported that during the 1923 revival people were turned away for lack of seats even though three to eight services were offered daily.

All Bogata's business houses closed from 10 to 11 a.m. each day, Sullivan noted. By the third day, more than three hundred people were singing in the choir. The town was divided into four sections, and well-attended prayer meetings were held in each section. Seven "family altars" were built--does any of these survive, the News wonders.

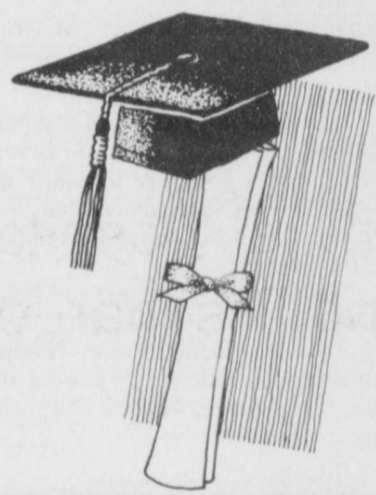
Members of other denominations participated in the meetings. Sullivan reported that all Sunday Schools in town had increased attendance, and several denominations with vacant pulpits began actively looking for pastors.

"The spiritual pulse of all denominations of the town was quickened," Sullivan told the Advocate. "The revival of the membership of our church was one of the old Methodist type," he proudly reported. "Personal work, altar work, testimony and shouting" produced and characterized the revival's success.

In an era when an able-bodied man might earn as little as fifty cents for a day's work in the cotton fields, the collection plates received a total offering of \$700, Sullivan reported. The parsonage family received a \$100 "pounding", and Sullivan's salary, which had been several months in arrears, was brought up to date with \$150 of the money.

Older Bogatans recall that during the Twenties, Bogata supported two Presbyterian Churches, a Baptist Church, a Church of Christ and two active African-American congregations, among others. Sullivan's article reminds us all that "that old time religion" was a central part of community life.


And older Bogatans remember "Brother Sullivan", who with his wife, spent retirement years in Bogata, occupying the house east of town that was later the residence of the Reynard Holts. The Sullivans were the parents of Raviah Howison, who had married a local citizen.

Degrees Awarded At ETSU Spring Commencement

The greatest challenge facing today's college graduates is to achieve racial harmony and justice, Dr. Stuart Anderson told spring graduates at East Texas State University.

Speaking to the graduates in three ceremonies on May 15, Anderson urged his audiences not to become complacent.

"Individuals must instigate harmony and justice; we must each find our station and act now to mend and to heal," said Anderson, head of the ETSU department of mathematics.

Texas-New Mexico Offers Bank Drafting To Customers

Texas-New Mexico Power Company is now offering an automated bank drafting service to qualifying customers who would like their checking accounts drafted each month for the amount of their electric bill.

To qualify for the service, customers need to have good credit, no more than one insufficient fund check during the past 12 months, and to use a financial institution within the continental United States that accepts the automated payment method.

Automated bank drafting can be used to pay electric bills for residential and commercial customers. Customers using the program will receive a statement each month showing the amount that will be withdrawn from their account.

"This program is being offered to make it easier for customers to pay their electric bills," said Petty, Manager of TNLP's Bogata district.

"There is no extra cost to the customer, and they won't have to worry about mailing the bill or making a special trip to pay the bill in person."

Customers must authorize TNP to start the drafts. Forms are available in TNP offices and will request information such as the customer's bank name, address and account number. Customers will also need to provide a voided check to verify bank information.

Once the application is complete, TNP will require at least 30 days to verify bank information. The customer will continue to receive a regular electric bill during this period and will need to pay the bill as usual. The customer will be notified when the drafting process is ready to begin.

Savings Bonds Rate Set

The semiannual market-based rate for United States Savings Bonds, in effect from May through October 1993, has been set at 4.78 percent, the Treasury Department announced today. The rate is 85 percent of the average market yield during the preceding six months on Treasury marketable securities with five years remaining to maturity.

The new rate, down from the 5.04 percent semiannual rate of the November 1992 through April 1993 period, reflects the general decline in market interest rates over the past year.

When bonds are held for five years or more, yields at redemption are the average of semiannual interest rates declared during the time held, or the guaranteed minimum rate, whichever is higher. For Savings Bonds issued on or after March 1, 1993, the guaranteed yield is 4 percent. Interest is compounded semi-annually from the date of issue and for EE Bonds issued since March 1, accrues monthly. The Savings Bond semiannual rate changes each May 1 and November 1.

Federal income tax liability on bond interest earnings can be deferred until a bond is redeemed or reaches final maturity. Bonds are exempt from State and local income taxes.

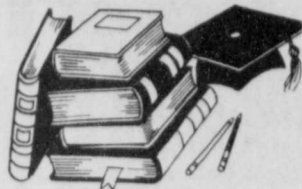

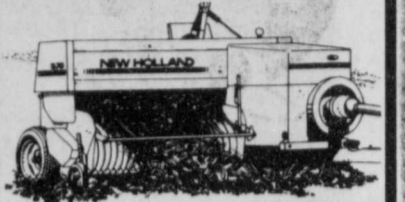

Would you like to be given a suite in a plush hotel with all your meals furnished, and whatever you wanted to eat provided, anytime, day or night?

Throw in a plane ticket round trip from Dallas to O'Hara Airport in Chicago with that limo on hand to meet you and your personal attendant on hand to cater to your ever whim and you have the stuff that dreams are made of.

For Wood Armstrong of Bogata this dream has come true not once but twice.

Wood is a familiar figure in Bogata, a friendly, active eighty-eight year old who knows hard work and leads a simple life, attending church regularly and helping others when he can.

His journey towards luxury dream trips began sixty-six years ago. Wood was a young, hard-working man who attended church at Morris Chapel Baptist Church, south of Rugby. There he served as church Superintendent. His duties included hiring a preacher for the small congregation.

When a young man just returned from the service asked for the job Wood gave him his chance.

The young man needed a job as a pastor in church somewhere to become ordained.

Wood stood with Pastor Hyles in front of 7,500 people and recalled their first meeting and sang gospel hymns. The service Wood attended was taped for television and will be aired later this year.

Wood was given a love offering from the church, as well as the royal treatment of limosinetransportation, hotel, and that custom tailored suit!

Then, it was time to board the plane homeward back to the quieter life in Bogata.

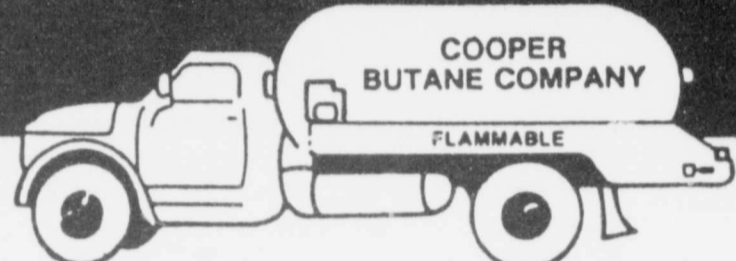
