Action begins next Thursday night, June 24, at the Bogata Rodeo Arena, for the first of three championship rodeo performances, produced by Bogata's own Jerald Smith and the Wing Ranch Rodeo Company. This is Smith's hometown performance and he always makes it a real treat for the people in the stands. Wing Rodeo Company has a mean string of bucking bulls this side of the National Finals.

The Thursday parade will begin at the south end of Main Street at the old Kiser Store location.

June 24-25-26 will be the dates for western fun in the Bogata Rodeo Arena.

"Gizmo" will be the special attraction at this year's rodeo performances. He is talented, funny and every bit a professional entertainer.

In addition to the regular events of rodeo this year, the Association has added Wild Cow Milking and The Scoop Race.

On Thursday night you will see six wild cows and 18 cowboys all in the arena at one time, trying to get enough milk to prove to the judge that they were successful. This event will get

The Scoop Race will have cowboys riding in a corn scoop on the end of a lariat rope being pulled at breakneck speed by his partner on the fastest horse they can find.

Anyone wanting to participate in these events will have to be 18 years old or have a notarized minor's release.

The Red River Riders will perform all three nights. They will set pivots and post the colors. They are talented and colorful.

The calf scramble is always a hoot for the children under 12 and funny to watch.

The Rodeo Queen will be crowned on Saturday night and will be given a trophy barrel racing saddle compliments of Peoples National Bank, Wing Rodeo Company and Bogata Rodeo Association. Good luck to all the ladies.

The concession stands will be operated by the Bogata Lions Club. There will be plenty to eat and drink as always. Carl Woods will personally see that every snow cone meets his rigid standards before it is sold.

The Saturday parade will start at the Baptist Church lot on the north end of Main Street at 6 p.m. The Rodeo Association is urging everyone to saddle up and be a part of the parade. Many people come to see this attraction and we owe them a show.

Talco-Bogata Board Sets New Policy On Fighting

The Talco-Bogata School Board met Monday, June 14 to make several decisions.

Perhaps one of the most important was a policy change which sets new disciplinary standards for fighting and assaults on campuses in the school district.

The new policy reads that on the first incident of fighting there will be a three day suspension. Students will be required to do their work, but the grade would be only 70% of the actual grade on the assignment.

On the second incident the student would be expelled from school.

The discipline record will be kept from the sixth through eighth grade and from the ninth grade through the twelfth grade.

In another words, an offense would be on record for either three or four years.

Superintendent Freddy Wade said that "the board felt that they wanted to get serious with the problem of fights on campus and have made the punishment severe enough to try and deter fighting on our campuses."

In other action they approved the consensus agenda involving financial report, cafeteria report, tax report, minutes and payment of bills. The board heard a report on the computer bids by Superintendent Freddy Wade who related that tow bids had been received for the computer labs at Talco and Bogata Elementary and Junior high. A bid from compact Computers was \$106,900

and a bid from IB EduQuest of \$99,378. After a recommendation by the superintendent the board agreed to reject all bids and open the bidding process up again. Deadline for receiving bids will be June 30, 1993 at 10:00 a.m.

Meetings were scheduled for July and August. A regular monthly meeting was rescheduled for July 15th and a budget study meeting set for August 2nd. The regular August meeting was set for August 19th.

In personnel matters the board employed Keith Brown as head Girls Coach (basketball, track and softball). Coach Brown will also continue to coach football. He is currently the Junior High Coach.

The board adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

Bogata City Council Meets Monday

The Bogata City Council met Monday, June 14, 1993 at 5:00 p.m. in the City Hall.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor, Mildred Eudy. Buck Ramsey delivered the Invocation.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Paying of monthly bills was also approved.

The Council okayed the extension of the Auditor's contract for another year. They tabled a discussion on installing a telephone at the Sewer-Water Plant. Protection at the sewer plant for 3 phase electricity was approved. They discussed a new

lawnmower for Thomas Park, and decided to wait and discuss it with the Lions Club.

Summer clean up will be the 3rd week in July.

CD 2729 was to be renewed for the General Fund. The discussion as to what should be done with the leftover Park money was tabled until a later date. The final payment on the water tank service was approved.

The Council voted to donate \$500.00 to the Bogata Volunteer Fire Department for beepers and radios.

The meeting adjourned.

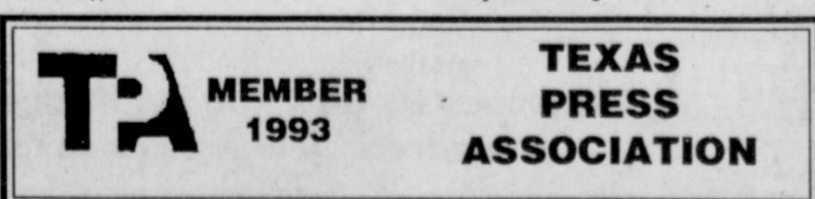

VEGETABLE BARS

Heat oven 350 degrees
2 pkg. crescent rolls (8 rolls in can)
2-8 oz. pkg. Cream Cheese (room temperature)
1/2 cup grated cheese
3/4 cup Mayonnaise
1-6 oz. pkg. Hidden Valley Ranch Dressing Mix

1/2 c. green peppers
1/2 c. broccoli
1/2 c. green onions
1/2 c. carrots
1/2 c. celery
1/2 c. radishes
3/4 c. diced tomatoes

Cover bottom of greased pans with rolls. Bake for 7-8 minutes until brown. Cool. Mix cream cheese, mayonnaise, and Ranch mix until smooth. Chop vegetables until size of peas. mix together except tomatoes and grated cheese. They go on top. Spread Philadelphia Cream Cheese mixture over rolls and sprinkle vegetables on top. Press down and top with tomatoes and grated cheese. Cut into bars and put in fridge.

NO COOK FUDGE

1 quarter lb. Velveeta Cheese
1 cup nuts
1 lb. box powdered sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 stick margarine
1/4 cup cocoa

Melt margarine and cheese. Add other ingredients. Stir well and pour into greased dish.

UNBELIEVABLE PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

1 cup white sugar
1 cup peanut butter
1 egg
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Bake at 325 degrees for 13 minutes.

EASY DEEP DISH PIZZA

3 cups Bisquick
3/4 cup cold water
1 lb. ground beef
1/2 cup chopped onions
1/2 teaspoon salt & garlic salt to taste
1 can (15 oz.) tomato sauce
1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
2 cups shredded cheese

Heat oven to 425. Lightly grease cookie sheet. Mix Bisquick and water until soft dough forms; beat vigorously 20 strokes. Gently smooth dough into ball on floured cloth, covered board. Knead 20 times. Pat dough in bottom and up sides of pan with floured hands or roll into rectangle, forming 3/4 inch rim. Cook and stir ground beef, onion, salt and garlic salt until beef is brown. Mix tomato sauce and Italian seasoning. Spread over dough. Spoon beef mixture over sauce. Top with remaining ingredients. Bake until crust is golden brown, about 20 minutes.

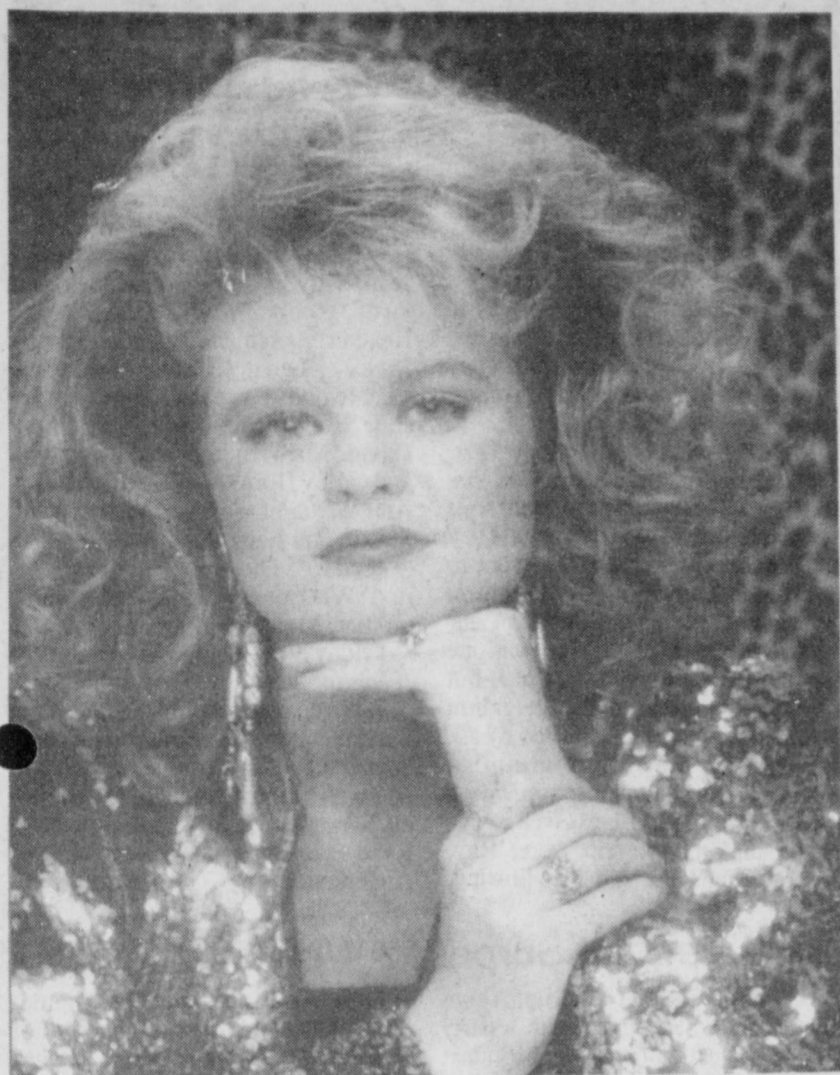

Sisters Featured In Arkansas Newspaper

(From the June 3, 1993 Edition of the White River Journal in Des Arc Arkansas.)

Two women who remember living at Des Arc as young girls, returned this week to look for records of family members of the past and to enjoy the activities of today.

When Mrs. Texarkana (Tommie) Clark Lanier, age 79, of Midlothian, and her sister, Mrs. Lore Clark Roach, age 71, of Bogata, Texas, came to Des Arc on Monday of this week, little did they know that they were stepping into one of the most exciting times of the year for Des Arc community-so, they decided to stay a few days.

Accompanied by daughters, Dorothy Bradford, of Hurst, Texas and Peggy Burrow, of Midlothian, they stopped first at the Prairie County Museum where they met with museum director, Elsie Minton, and learned much about the information they were seeking. They were soon located at the "tree house" in the Roy and Ann Hille home. (It had formerly been a boarding house). From there, they continued to investigate their family records.

Mrs. Lanier and Mrs. Roach had attended Sand Hill School before the moved with their brothers, Lewis and Leander, and sister, Velma, to Damascus after the flood of 1927. Their mother, Delia Wyatt Clark, died during a flu epidemic in 1926. Her grave was found at Sand Hill by the daughters and granddaughters here this week. Three members of their family died during the epidemic.

They came to Des Arc from Damascus this week, where they had visited relatives. Here, along with

finding information about their family, they have participated in the music at Branham's Music Hall, and are looking forward to continuing Steamboat Days activities.

Another sister, Velma Clark Roach, 88, lives in Garland, Texas. Both brothers are deceased.

The family moved from Damascus into the Texarkana area in 1931, and then on to Texas. Texarkana (Tommie) got her name from the combining of Texas and Arkansas.

(When Lore Roach told me that she and her sister, Tommie, along with Tommie's daughters were going to Des Arc, to find the location of their mother's grave and put a monument on it, I had no idea they would become celebrities while they were there. I asked her to bring me a write up about their trip and a picture. I didn't know I'd be able to get my information from a newspaper. She said that when the people in town found out what they were doing, they just took them under their wings. They asked them to sing at the Music Hall. They both did so. When they got to church, the folks wanted them to sing again, but Tommie had developed a sore throat, and Lore had to sing by herself.

Lore was just a little girl when her mother died and was pretty well raised by her older sister, Velma. They had had to leave their home when they were so young, that there was no way of knowing anything about where their mother was buried.

I want to thank Lore and Tommie for sharing this very special occasion in their lives. Surely this is a vacation they will never forget.)

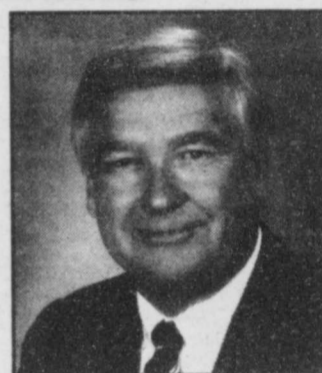



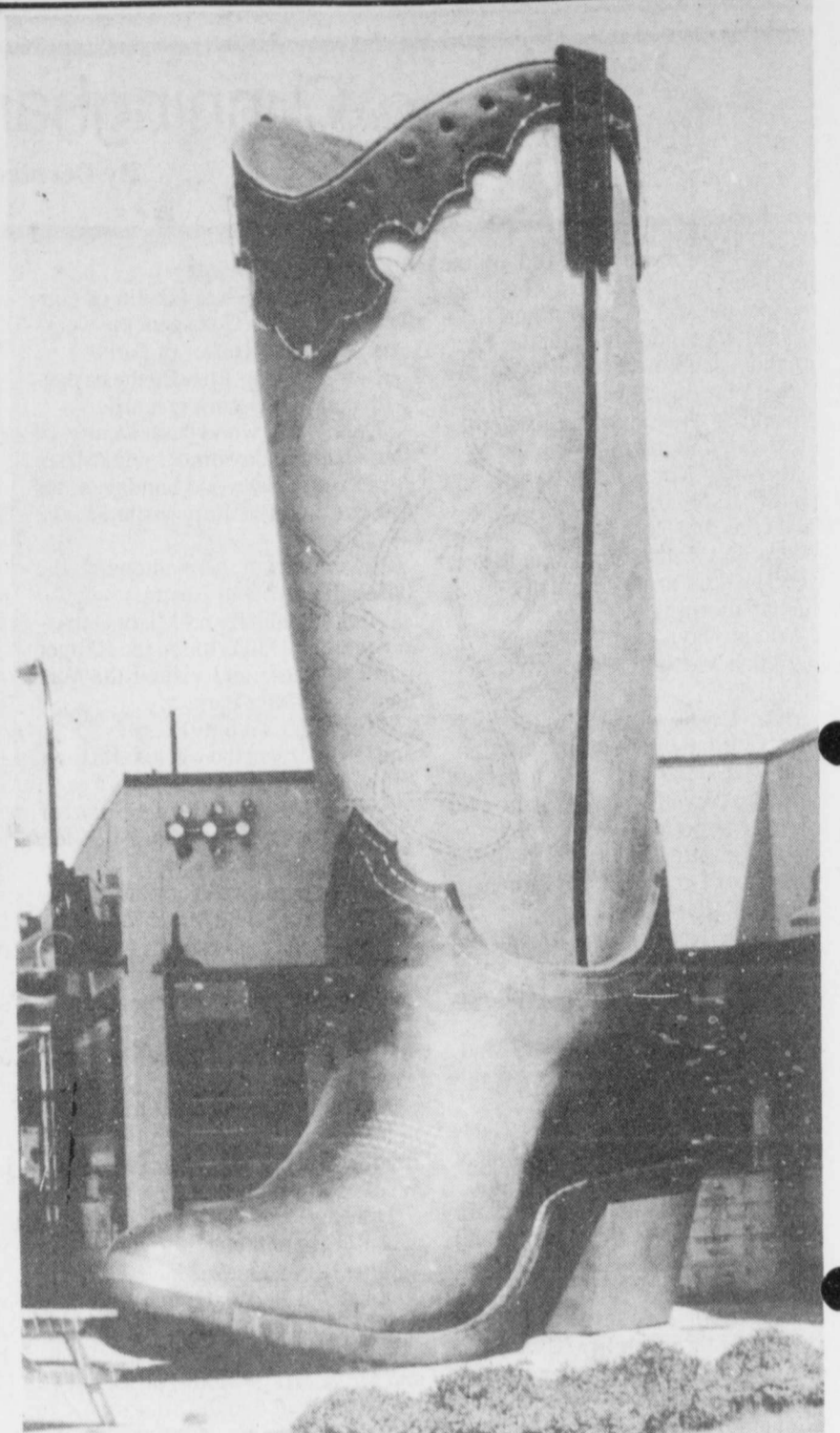

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT RENEWAL
CITY OF BOGATA, P.O. Box 400, Bogata, Texas 75417 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 10065-01 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 332,000 gallons per day. The wastewater treatment facilities are southeast of the City of Bogata, approximately 3100 feet southwest of U.S. Highway 271 and 5000 feet east of State Highway 37 in Red River County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into Morrison Branch; thence to Little Mustang Creek; thence to the Sulphur/South Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River Basin.
In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge. The unclassified receiving waters of Morrison Branch have no significant aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 0303 are contact recreation and high quality aquatic life uses. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing in stream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revision.
The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will enforce more stringent effluent limitations in order to meet existing applicable rules and regulations. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.
Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.
No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application specifically requests a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and daytime phone number of the person making the request; (2) the statement "...request a public hearing"; and (3) a brief description of how the requestor, or persons represented by the requestor, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the application, or that a public hearing, would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.
